### No-Cook Fruit Relish And Pork



CURRIED dried fruit has a guess-what's-in-it flavor and is delicious served with roast loin of pork.

A friend of ours concocted an interesting no-cook fruit relish with little sugar. We think the recipe is worth passing along to you.  
The main part of the relish is made with dried apricots, raisins and onion. The marinade contains curry powder, salt, sugar, red wine vinegar and tarragon. Don't be surprised at that, too. It adds excellent flavor and color. Old-fashioned cooks used to steam prunes in use and that's what inspired our friend.  
This relish is fine to serve with a pork loin roast. And here's where you can get your mind to that government cooking and research specialists now tell us that pork loin needs only to be roasted to 170 degrees to be safe to eat. The recommended temperature used to be 185 degrees. If you can cut down on roasting time, a pork loin roast that weighs 3 to 5 pounds and is at refrigerator temperature can be roasted at 325 degrees to a temperature of 170 degrees in 2 to 2 1/2 hours.  
**CURRIED DRIED FRUIT RELISH**  
1 package (1 1/2 ounces) tenderized dried apricots  
1 cup raisins  
1 tablespoon instant minced onion  
1 tablespoon curry powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 cups boiling water  
3 heaping tablespoons red wine vinegar  
1/2 cup red wine vinegar  
Into a medium bowl mix apricots into five or six pieces each with a sharp heavy knife cut off straight across, one inch from top of apricots. With a kitchen scissors clip off the tips of the leaves.  
Stand artichokes upright in a saucetup into which they will fit snugly. Pour in enough boiling water to come up about 2 inches. Boil gently, covered, until the base can be easily pierced with a fork—30 to 40 minutes. Replenish water if necessary.  
Drain off water. Turn artichokes upside down to finish draining.  
Cut each center leaf including the small paralytic ones, use a teaspoon to scoop out thistle portion (choke) being careful to leave as much of the heart as possible. Sprinkle with mixture of curry powder, salt and sugar.  
Fill out small holes including the small paralytic ones, use a teaspoon to scoop out thistle portion (choke) being careful to leave as much of the heart as possible. Sprinkle with mixture of curry powder, salt and sugar.  
Cover artichokes and chill overnight if you like. Use as directed in stuffed artichokes recipe.  
Note: The olive oil added to the cooking water makes the leaves glisten and flavors them.

### Prepare A Swedish Ham For Holiday

Swedish cooks have a fascinating way of brining a fresh ham for four to six weeks and then cooking it. They serve the ham cold for a Christmas or New Year celebration.  
If you feel adventurous, you'll be interested in this recipe. It is absolutely authentic—the work of a young Swedish woman and her neighbor, an American home economist.  
**SWEDISH HOLIDAY HAM**  
3 to 15 pound fresh ham  
1 tablespoon saltpepper, available at some drugstores  
2 tablespoons salt  
3 tablespoons sugar  
3 carrots, pared and sliced  
Coasting, see recipe below  
3 tablespoons fine dry bread crumbs  
Chase a crack or enamelware (do not use aluminum or plastic) container large enough to hold the ham so that it can be completely covered with water; an enamelware infant's bathtub is ideal. The ham may be placed in a horizontal or upright position in the container.  
To find out how much water you need to cover the ham completely, place the ham in the container and cover with cold water, measuring the water as you add it. Make a note of how much water was needed and use this amount in preparing the brine. Remove the ham and place it on a large platter or tray.  
Stir together the saltpepper, salt and sugar. Measure the mixture over surface of ham. Let ham stand, loosely covered, if you like, in refrigerator or other cold place overnight.  
Prepare the brine so it, too, can stand overnight.  
The next day place the ham in the chosen container and cover completely with the brine. Cover container (with foil if necessary) and place in refrigerator or other cold place for four to six weeks.  
Place ham on a V-shape rack in a shallow roasting pan. Bake in a 325-degree oven until golden-brown—20 to 30 minutes. If time does not return ham to a fresh cold water, cover in the pan, and soak overnight in refrigerator.

**1,420 Acres Sold; Price \$829,800**

A land transaction first reported May 20 in The Sanford Herald disclosing the option to buy 1,420 acres of Seminole County property near Geneva by Mackle Brothers Corporation was confirmed yesterday with an announcement from Miami that deal had been completed.

According to information from county courthouse, the completed transaction cost Mackle Brothers a reported \$829,800 and was handled by Florida Ranch Lands of Orlando for the developers.  
Purchase was made from a New York union retirement fund known as 1963 Pension Fund. Lying north and west of Buck Lake off SR 408, the property was first rumored for a mobile home city, but, according to reports, the firm decided to locate the trailer park at St. Augustine after receiving preliminary indications that county zoning board would not approve an application for special exception to locate the mobile home city on the site.  
Local Mackle sources say they have no information what use the firm plans to make of the acreage but discount a mobile home city.  
Robert Brown, county zoning director, said neither Mackle Brothers nor any representative had approached county with a mobile city plan.  
He stated belief the transaction was for investment purposes only, and indicated zoning board would not look with favor on any plan to put a trailer complex on the property.  
Next zoning meeting is scheduled for Dec. 10, and Brown said an application for zoning change would be two late now for Wednesday's session.  
Next board meeting is Jan. 14, and Brown advised this would be the earliest date that board could take up the matter, if requested.

### State Election Law Not Binding On City

Sanford City Attorney William C. Hutchison says under recent charter city is not required by law to publish a sample ballot as indicated yesterday by defeated city major-candidate Harry Shop.  
Hutchison answered Shop's charges before a vote canvass of the City Commission held Wednesday afternoon at commission chambers, and later informed The Herald that Section 102.02 of state election laws quoted by Shop in questioning the legality of city's Tuesday elections has no application in the city election.  
Paragraph two of the section states: "Upon completion of the list of qualified candidates, the board of county commissioners shall publish in a newspaper of general circulation, in the county at least seven days before any primary of general election, of what- ever nature, a sample ballot form."  
Hutchison insisted that city is not covered under this section and is only required to publish a proclamation in a general circulation newspaper, which was done preceding the election.  
County Attorney Harold Johnson said the disputed section was never adopted by the city and was optional.  
Final election figures certified yesterday as official by city included: Mayor-commissioner, Leo P. Moore 973, Earl Higginbotham 705 and Harry Shop 277.  
Gordon Meyer defeated incumbent A. L. Wilson 1,145 votes to 661 and will replace the 12-year veteran when new commission convenes Jan. 6. At that time the run-off to decide the mayor's slot will see either Higginbotham or Moore serving as chairman of the five-member group for the next three years.  
A Dec. 16 election will pick the mayor for a three-year term, and should Moore win, it will mean a one-year appointment for someone to fill Moore's unexpired year left on his present term.  
Names being mentioned for the position which will be filled by four commissioners include Thomas McDonald and M. L. (Sonny) Raborn, both former commissioners.

**Francisco Happy Birthday**

MADRID (AP) — Generalissimo Francisco Franco turns 77 Thursday, still as firmly in control as he wants to be after running Spain for three decades. But both age and demands for modernization are chipping away at the diminutive general's influence.

For one thing, a whole generation of teen-agers is striding toward what they hope will be a more mature Spain, free of the hates and divisions that resulted in bloody conflict and brought Franco to power.

"They don't know about the Spanish Civil War and they don't care," says a Madrid University instructor. "They see what's going on in the rest of Western Europe and they want to be a part of it."

Francisco has slowly loosened his grip on power, obviously looking to the day when he won't be around to call the shots.

In July he provided for restoring the monarchy by naming Prince Juan Carlos de Bourbon to succeed him as head of state.

Hard-line Falangists, members of the rightist nationalist organization of which Franco is still the titular leader, accused him of betraying the Falange by this action.

The prestige of the Falangists had been declining for years, and Franco dealt the organization a serious blow when he shuffled the cabinet recently, giving the balance of power to technocrats who favor a more progressive economic policy.

To contest the new technocrat government and try to regain lost prestige, the Falangists are trying to form a new nationwide "association."

Spain has no political parties, but "associations" with political trends are permitted—provided they adhere to the rules of the National Movement. The Movement, created by Franco, rigidly regulates all political activity in the country.

Francisco has apparently given the technocrat government wide license to implement reforms as long as they stick to his cardinal principal of putting God and Country first. This means, says one government source, new tactics but no fundamental change in policy.

One U.S. expert on Spain describes the cabinet shuffle as modernization, not liberalization.

Francisco still leads an active life. He presides at Cabinet meetings, receives hundreds in official audiences at El Pardo Palace on the outskirts of Madrid, and shows up whenever protocol calls for his presence. His photograph appears almost daily in the Spanish press.

Those who have hunted with him recently describe him as almost indefatigable, a good shot who can still go to either side, although he is slower than he used to be at swinging around. He is also a fisherman and a golfer.

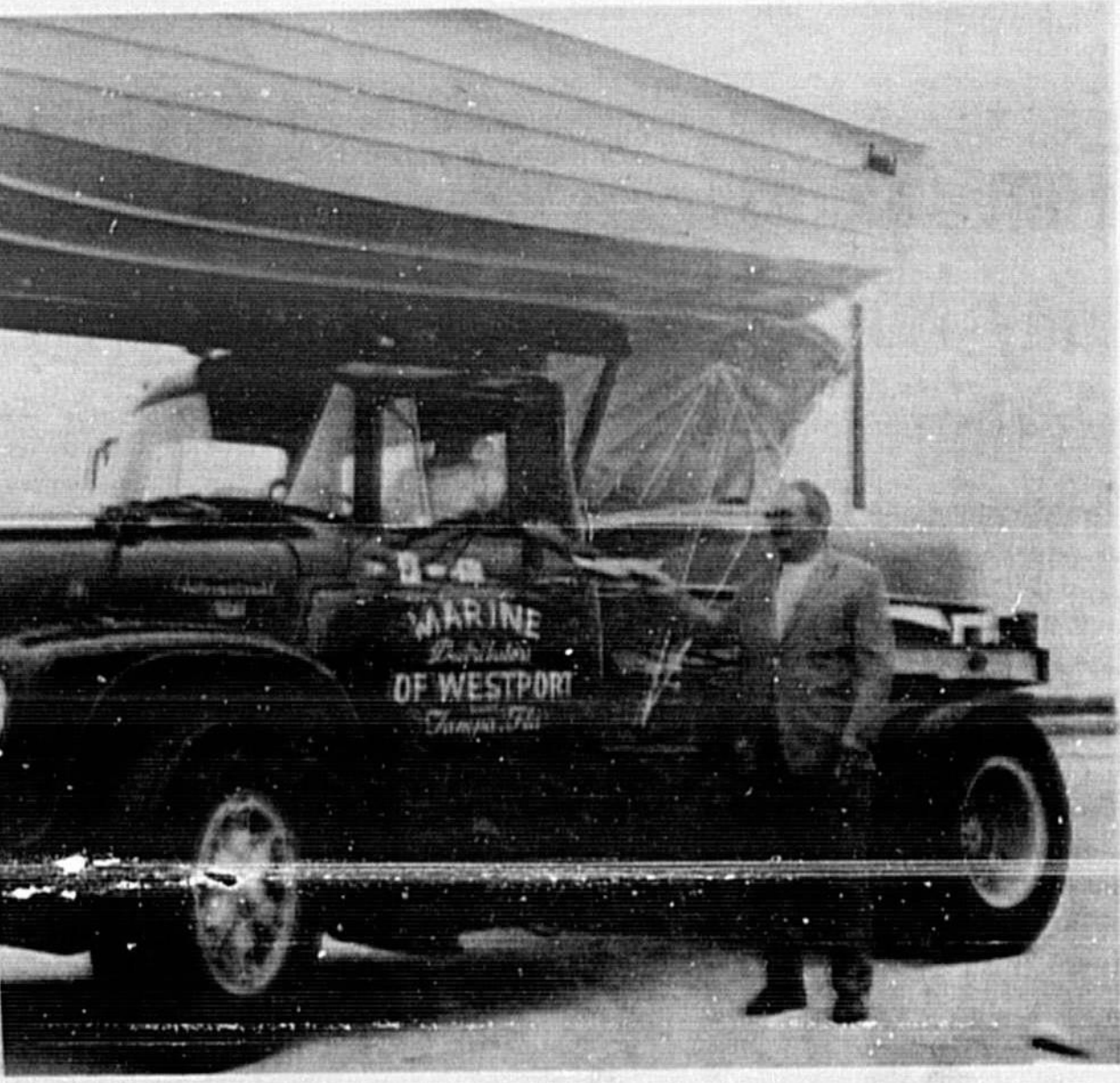

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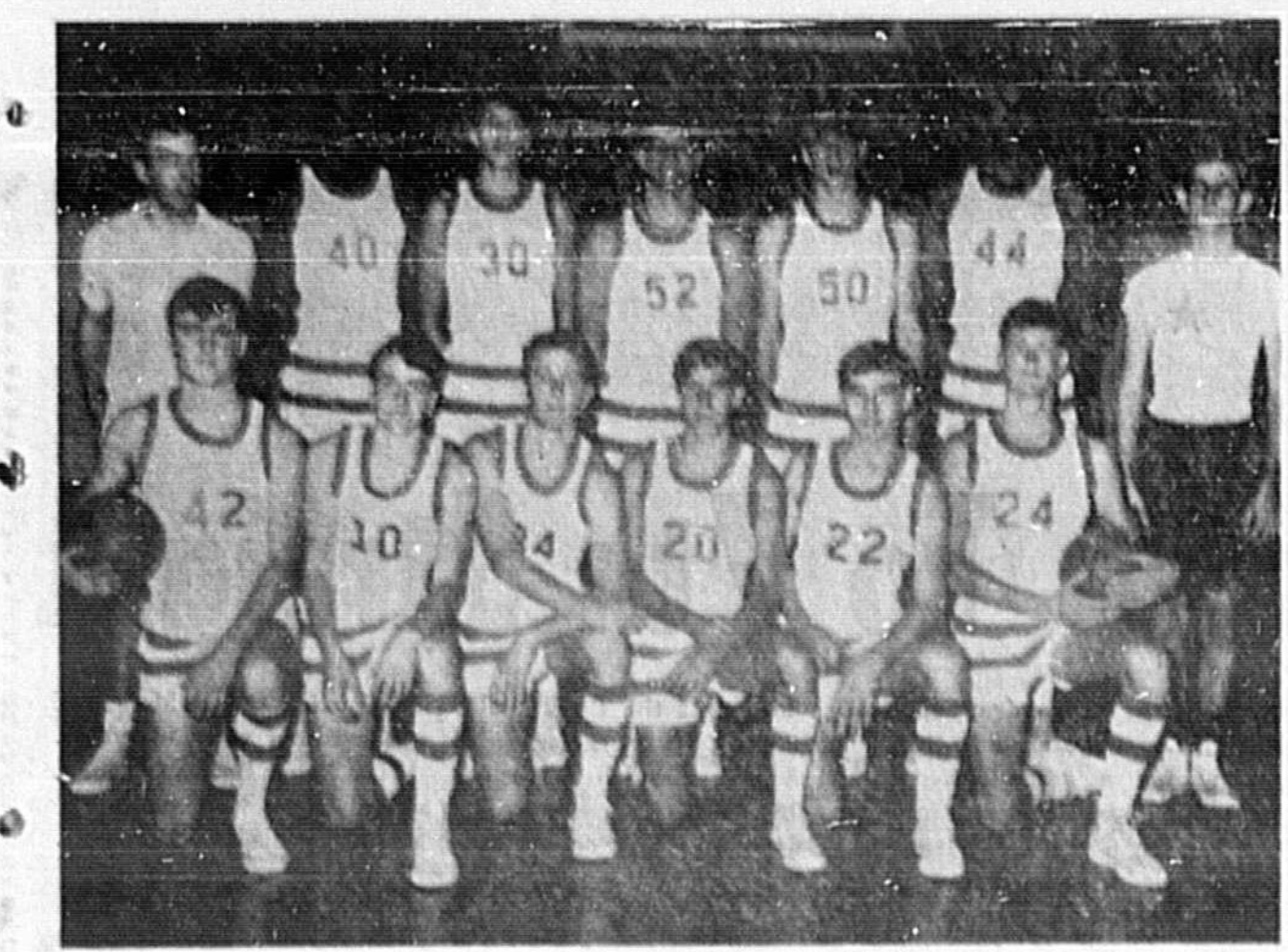

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### Sex Myths And Fallacies

DENVER, Colo. (AP) — It is a myth that the average physician is well trained to deal with his patients' sexual problems, a Texas psychologist says.

Dr. James Leslie McCarty, professor of psychology at the University of Houston, spoke Wednesday about sex myths and fallacies to doctors attending the American Medical Association's clinical convention.

"It is a sad and unfortunate truth that except for adequate knowledge of reproductive processes, physicians as a group are grievously ignorant and actually rather proud in matters of sexuality," he said.

Another fallacy, he said, is that sex desire and ability decrease markedly after age 40 to 50.

Sexual intercourse among the married elderly "occurs considerably more frequently than is commonly supposed," he said. He said a statistical study showed: "Seven out of 10 are 60 years of age or older are sexually active, and the consistent clinical observation is that of both men and women, the sex drive during youth retain the greatest sex drive and virility in old age."

Another myth, Dr. McCarty said, is that persons who commit sex crimes are highly dangerous, oversexed and usually get involved in progressively more serious crimes.

The sex offender "is rarely involved in nonsexual crimes," he said, adding that "only a small percentage use force or duress on their victims."

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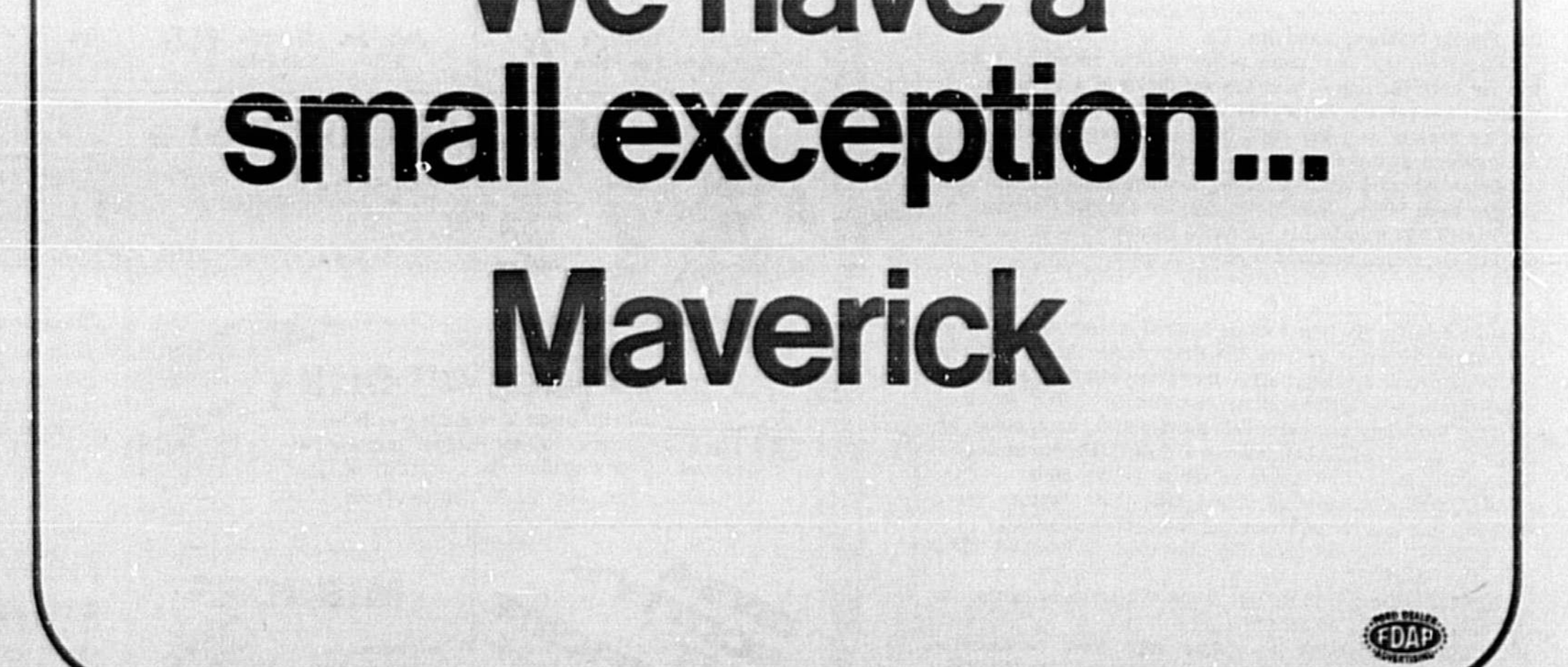

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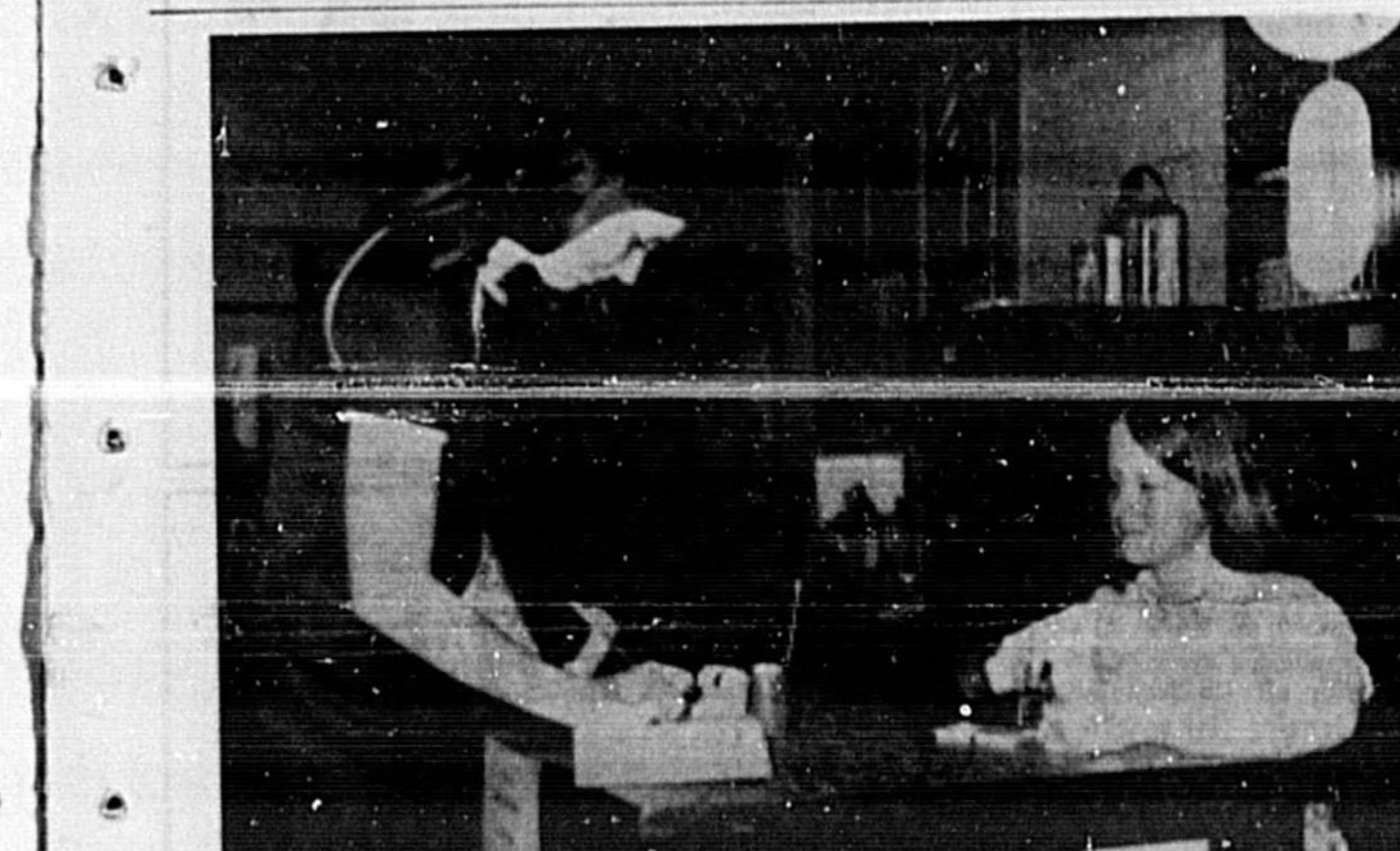

# American Viet War Casualties Are Now Over 300,000

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command said today that 70 Americans were killed in Vietnam last week, one of the lowest weekly death tolls in the war. But the 1,049 Americans wounded pushed total U.S. battlefield casualties in the war past the 300,000 mark, to 300,829.

The 70 Americans killed was the lowest death toll in the past two months and was 46 per cent less than the previous week's 130 dead.

South Vietnamese and enemy casualty totals also were down last week, with the government reporting 373 of its soldiers killed and 89 wounded.

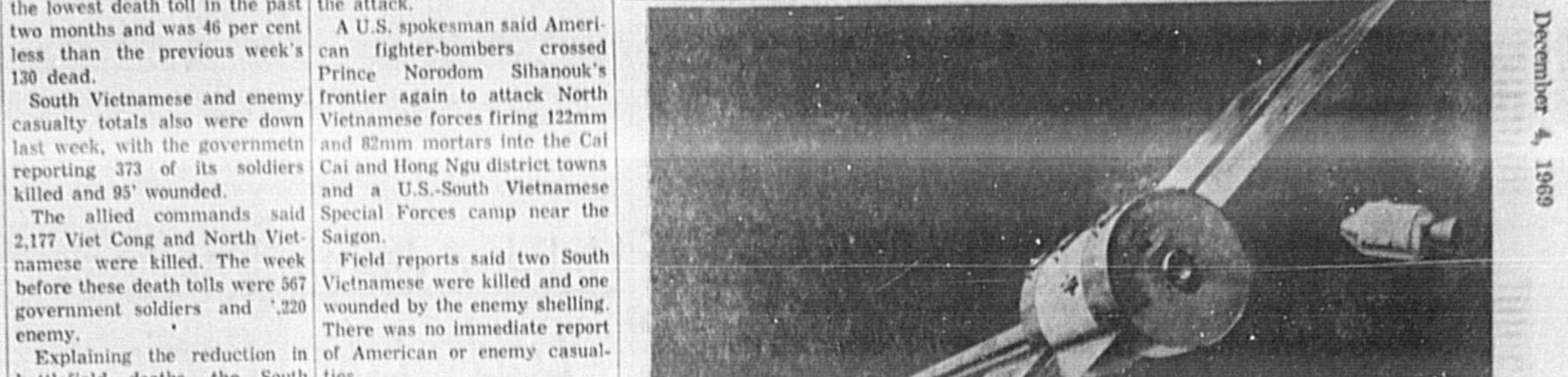
The allied commands said 2,177 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese were killed and one wounded by the enemy shelling. There was no immediate report of American or enemy casualties in the shelling.

Explaining the reduction in battlefield deaths, the South Vietnamese military command said enemy activity last week was at its "lowest level since the beginning of the Communist winter-spring campaign" a month ago.

Meanwhile, the U.S. Command announced that American planes attacked North Vietnamese forces in Cambodia today for the second straight day, and the South Vietnamese government said its forces joined in the attack.

A U.S. spokesman said American fighter-bombers crossed the Cambodian border to attack North Vietnamese forces firing 122mm and 82mm mortars into the Cal and Hong Ngu district towns and a U.S. South Vietnamese Special Forces camp near the Saigon.

Field reports said two South Vietnamese were killed and one wounded by the enemy shelling. There was no immediate report of American or enemy casualties in the shelling.



### Moon Tied To Canes

MIAMI (AP) — The full moon, often blamed for spawning werewolves and spurring marriages, now is being accused of casting its fabled spell over hurricanes.

Ronald L. Holle, a meteorologist with the government's Experimental Meteorology Laboratory here, said Wednesday he has completed a study that probed the history of over 1,000 hurricanes, tracing them back to 1801.

The study backed up a common belief among weather scientists that more tropical storms form — quite mysteriously — during the period of the new and full moon than at other times.

Holle's research also gave foundation to theories that the worst hurricanes and typhoons were stirred during these two periods in the 29 day cycle.

While the statistics indicate the full-moon increase has nothing to do with supernatural spells, and says the storms are influenced by the lunar effects on the tides and atmosphere.

But the meteorologist says that where most of the earlier information leaves off, because no one has pursued the moon's effect on tropical storms in a quantitative manner.

Holle's study was unveiled over and penciled by delegates to the American Meteorological Society's sixth annual Technical Conference on Hurricanes here Wednesday.

Prominent in the repetitive data the hurricanes' histories yielded were the consistent high tides when the sun's small gravitational attraction is added to the moon's larger gravitational attraction as the moon turns full.

Holle suggests that the answer to the moon's influence on the hurricanes lies in the complex effects of the lunar tides on the earth, both water and atmosphere which are still largely a mystery.

### Delay Is Expected On More Withdrawals

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon is expected to delay a decision on further U.S. troop withdrawals from South Vietnam because of the lunar tides and increased American casualties.

### Another Airliner Crashes

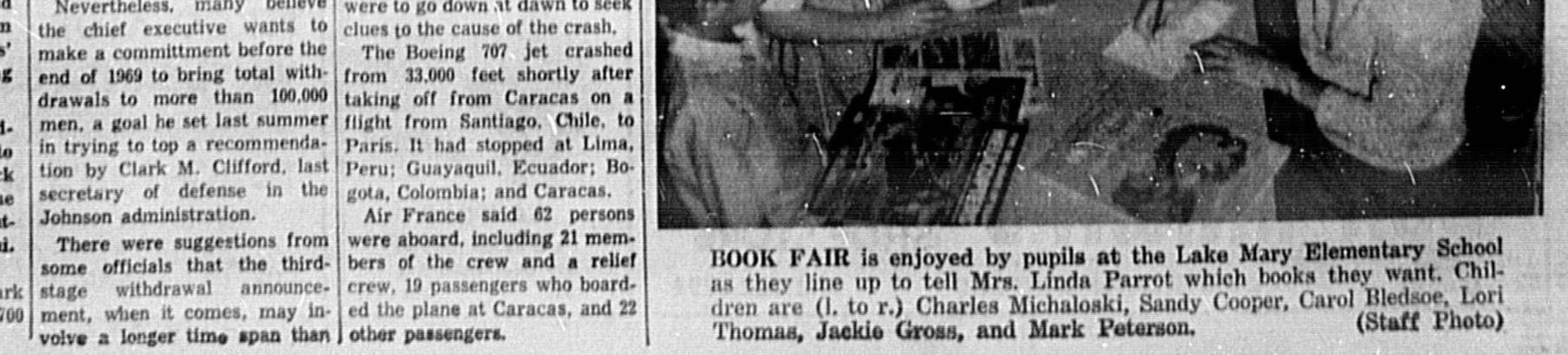

CARACAS (AP) — Rescuers pulled bodies, clothing and parts of an Air France airliner from the shark-infested waters of the Caribbean today, and said there was no hope that any of the 62 persons reported to be on board had survived its plunge into the sea Wednesday night.

By early morning, the bodies of 11 women, and nine men had been taken from the waters off La Guaira port, seven miles north of Caracas.

The search area was in waters 100 to 150 feet deep. Divers were to go down at dawn to seek clues to the cause of the crash.

The Boeing 707 jet crashed on taking off from Caracas on a flight from Santiago, Chile, to Paris. It had stopped at Lima, Peru; Guayaquil, Ecuador; Bogota, Colombia; and Caracas.

Air France said 62 persons were aboard, including 21 members of the crew and a relief crew, 15 passengers who boarded in a flight from Caracas, and 22 other passengers.

## The Sanford Herald Reports . . . 'Here Comes The Bride' For Three Generations

On Thursday, Nov. 9, 1922, The Sanford Herald reported the marriage of Kathy's grandparents, Miss Eleanor Roberts and Ernest Gormly, which took place Nov. 8, 1922 at the Methodist Church of Sanford with Dr. S. W. Walker as the officiating clergyman. The lengthy account of the formal wedding was well written with much of the same literary style reflected in today's form. Assistants and attendants at the beautiful ceremony included Miss Lillie Ruth Spencer, soloist; Emily Griffin and Irma Smith, candle bearers; Miss Julia Laing and Miss Ada Wagener, bridesmaids; Mrs. Margaret Spencer, "Dance in Honor"; Miss Dazie Eldridge, maid of honor; Saldee Williams, flower girl; Harry Joe Minark, ring bearer, and George Gormly, best man. The bride's gown of 47 years ago was described as "The bride was radiantly lovely in her bridal robe of white kitten's ear crepe, the skirts being a draped model with panels at either side, at the bottom of these were hand-made roses." "The blouse was simple effect, with slashed sleeves, and fastened with ropes of pearls at either side of the girde were roses centered with pearls. 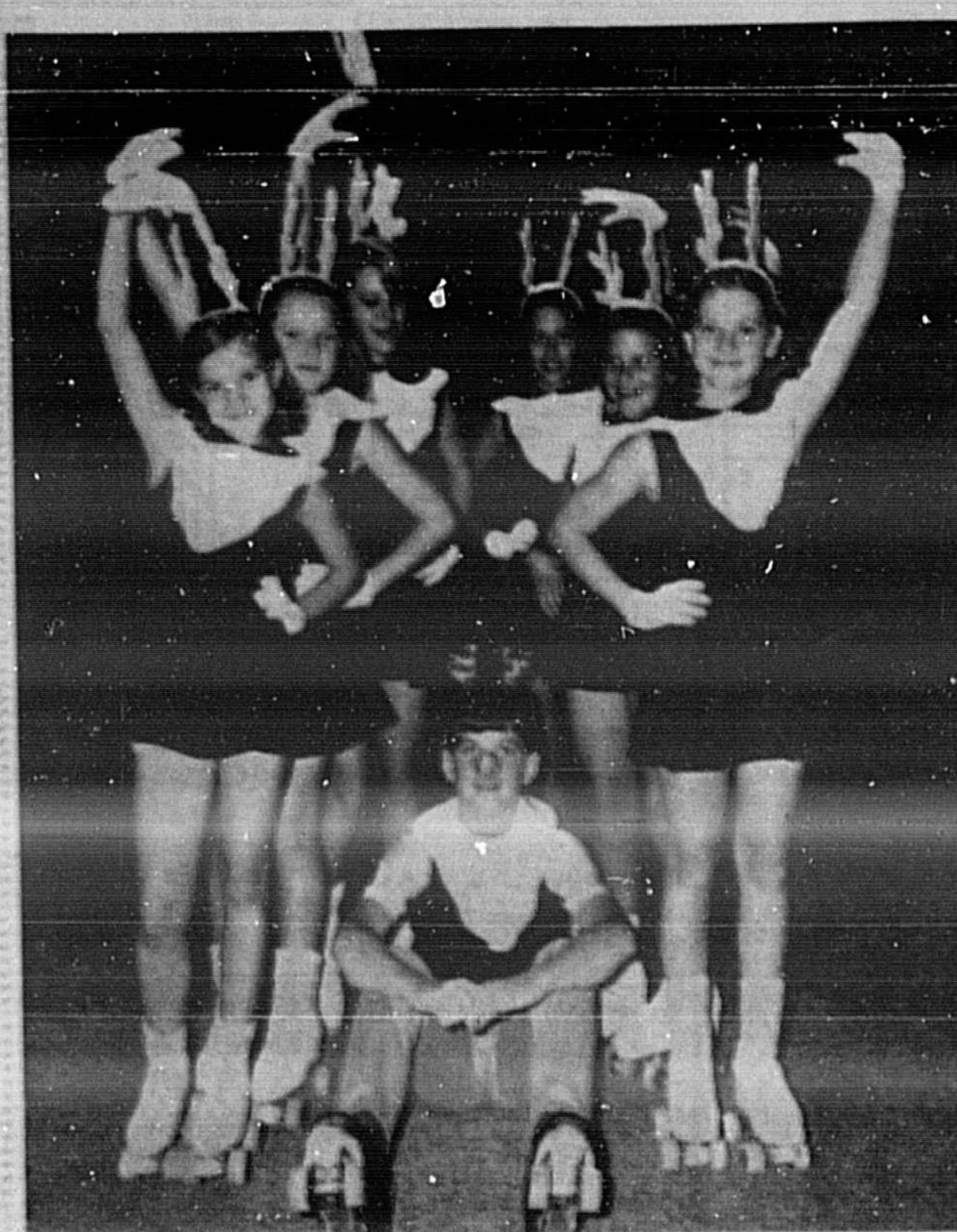

### Nixon Deplores Situation

## New Attack On Poverty Proposed

WASHINGTON (AP) — In May this year, President Nixon admitted that 20th century Americans still go hungry.

"We have long thought of America as the most bountiful of nations," the President told Congress. "That hunger and malnutrition should persist in a land such as ours is an embarrassing and intolerable."

He proposed a renewed attack on a problem that has plagued the untilled land in search of food. And once again the politics of hunger was set into motion and is continuing today at a White House Conference on Food, Nutrition and Health. It's purpose is to advise the President on how to alleviate America's hunger.

The latest round in the politics of hunger may have started in 1967 when the Senate poverty subcommittee, chaired by then Sen. Joseph A. Clark of Pennsylvania, found "stark, horrifying hunger" in Mississippi.

And not long after, a special committee of private citizens concluded after a nine-month study: "If you will go look, you will find America is a shocking place."

"A thousand people who must go without food for days each month would be shocking," wrote a board set up by the United States in the last decade of the 19th century.

Two weeks after the Nixon administration took office, McGovern urged the new secretary of agriculture, Clifford Burton, to start emergency food aid programs in all U.S. counties which lacked them or had inadequate aid. He said there was "a national emergency."

But Sen. Allen J. Ellender, D-La., described reports of hunger in Louisiana and other southern states as gross exaggerations.

Committee on Nutrition and Human Needs, headed by Sen. George McGovern, D-S.D., began hearings, calling more than 200 witnesses.

In August 1967, the House Agriculture Committee took issue with the board's findings, saying there is little acute hunger, but malnutrition did exist as the result of "ignorance of a balanced diet or parental neglect."

Department of Agriculture Secretary Earl Butts, Jr., said the program was attacked by a number of congressmen.

Sen. Clark's subcommittee, meanwhile, continued to hold widely publicized hearings but the Johnson administration, under pressure of the Vietnam war and domestic inflation and unrest didn't want to embark on an expensive new program. Congress also let the issue slide.

## Rathel 'Forgets' Airport Client

"Forgetfulness" on the part of the director of the Sanford Industrial Commission was blamed today for Sanford losing 110 jobs for the repair of nine Air Force fighter planes under a \$434,400 contract. The blame was placed by Bill Coley, president of Aero Corporation, Lake City, in a long distance telephone interview shortly before noon today.

Aero Corporation is Lake City's largest industry, with 1,100 jobs, but runways at Coley Field (named for Bill Coley) cannot handle the newest jets.

"When we were bidding for this Air Force contract to inspect and repair nine F-104 jet fighters," Coley told The Herald, "it was done so with the thought in mind we would complete a lease for space at Sanford Airport. I had been down to your city, talked with your SIC director (I forget his name) and we were all set to accomplish this operation at Sanford."

"However," Coley continued, "when we landed the contract I got in touch with your man and he informed me, 'I'm sorry but I forgot to tell you we leased your building to someone else.'"

Asked if the Sanford contact was Don Rathel, SIC director, Coley replied: "That's the man. He didn't even give me the courtesy of first refusal on the building. I thought we had a verbal agreement but he said no. So we looked around, found acceptable space at Spence Air Base Industrial park at Moultrie, Ga., and we're very happy there."

Rathel said this afternoon Coley did come to Sanford Airport and did look at the building "and then I didn't hear from him again; so I went ahead and leased the facility to Page Airways."

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## Seven Area Men Survived Pearl Harbor Americans Recall 'Day Of Infamy'

It was an infamous day that burst upon the United States on Dec. 7, 1941. But as they pay homage and tribute to the fallen heroes of the "Day of Infamy" they also remember.

"My leg was in a cast," said the skipper G. O. Nordgren, who was then a chief petty officer. "We didn't have anything to fight with." His men had just escaped the boat.

This letter should be written promptly as the back wages must be claimed within a specified time period; for some the time ends in February 1970, Huetter reports.

To help those who would like to take clothing items and other gifts to the family, The Herald is publishing a map showing how to get to the Boston's two-bedroom home.

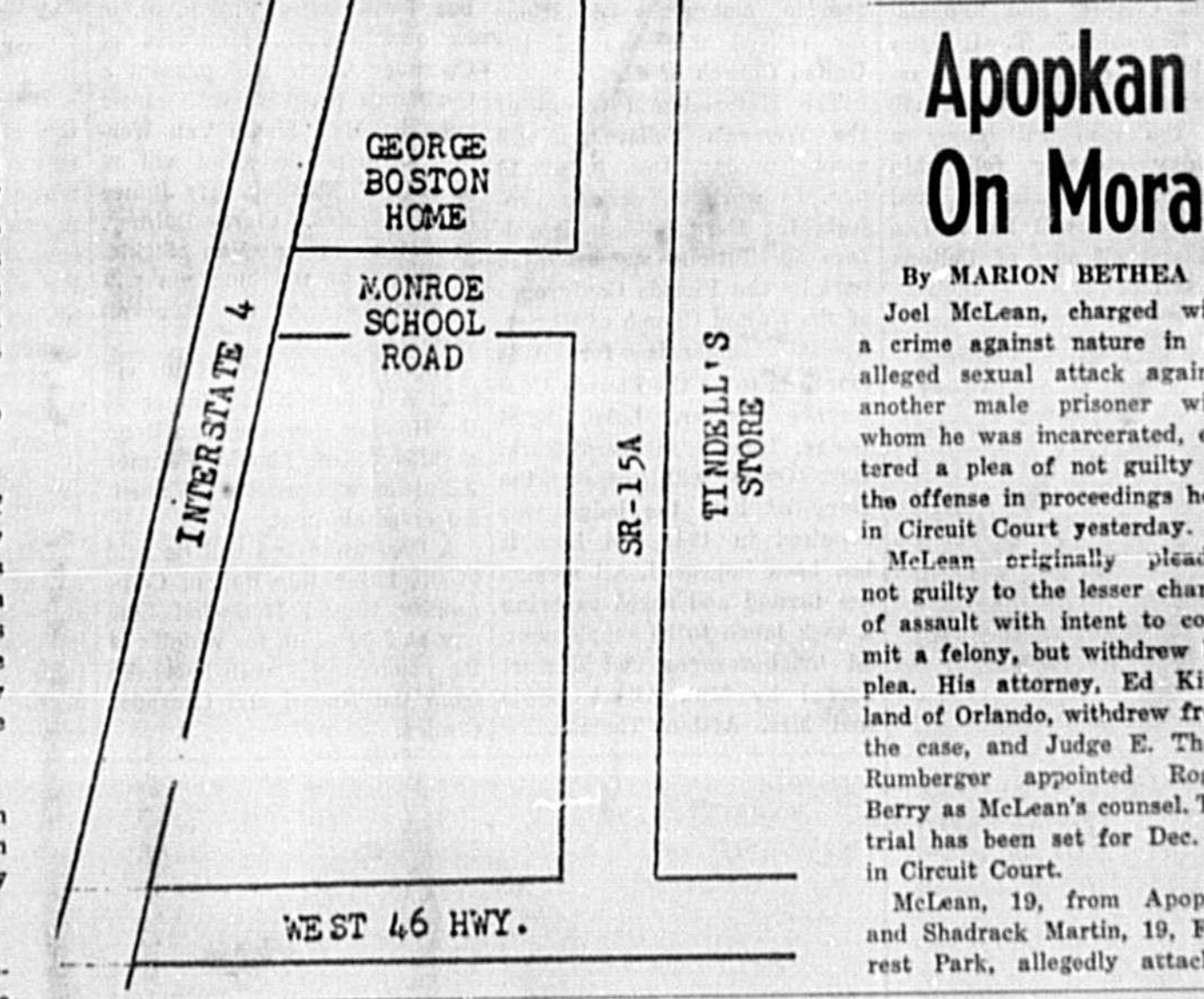
