Oviedo bank robbed

Principal, now politico, gets straight A's from students

SEMINOLE COUNTY - He's the ex-principal who now wants to be head of the class - a 65-year-old retiree who hasn't spanked anyone in 30 years but has a new burst of energy and an urge to be a county commissioner.

The race is on, Henley said Tuesday when he gave Supervisor of Elections Sandy Goard more than 3,100 petitions to qualify for a District 4 competition against incumbent commissioner Win Adams, whose petitions have already been certified.

Something that Henley has that Adams doesn't is the approval of several hundred former Lyman High School students who believe their old principal is just the right ticket. "If you're as good a commissioner as you were a principal, Seminole County has a winner," car dealer Luke Potter wrote on a note. Potter enclosed a \$200 contribution. Christine Moore, Henley's campaign manager,

says she is constantly meeting someone who knew Principal Henley. Moore helped Florida representatives Bob Brooks and Tom Feeney in previous campaigns.

"What's fun about this campaign," she said, "has been discovering how enthusiastic all these former students are about Carlton's campaign - they have said nice things and written some beautiful notes."

"I know who you are, you have my vote," another ex-student said when Henley approached his house on a recent door-to-door campaign effort. "He said he graduated in 1973," said Henley, who was Lyman's principal from 1963-1994.

Instead of spending his retirement years with his 10 grandchildren, Henley opted for a run for office. "I've been going from ballfield to ballfield and have spent time with the grandchildren at the lake," he said. "I'll still have time with them - and do this, too."

Great Expectations Board gives school head high marks

SEMINOLE - Seminole County Public School Superintendent Dr. Paul Hagerty rated above expectations among most of the members of the school board. Sixty-one percent of the ratings in the 67 categories fell in the 'above expectations' or higher.

Board members rate the superintendent annually in areas that include integrity, work standards and leadership. Hagerty's strong points were in Impact/Report Building, Technical/Professional Knowledge and Decision Making.

In the evaluation, Board chairman Barbara Kuhn commended Hagerty on his professional knowledge. "(Hagerty) stays on top of latest research and methods through reading, conferences, professional organizations, computer networks, etc."

Not all members of the board gave Hagerty high marks. Board member Bob Goff's ratings were consistently lower than those of the other board members. "I have a tougher grading scale, apparently, than my colleagues," commented Goff. "I believe in accountability."

Lake Mary taps new fire chief

LAKE MARY - Craig Haun, with a 25-year career fighting fire, has been selected as Lake Mary's new fire chief. The appointment becomes effective next Wednesday, June 10.

The hiring follows the retirement earlier this year of Fire Chief Duane Mehl, who had served in the position for the past 5 years. The agreed upon annual salary has been announced at \$55,000.

Lake Mary City Manager John Litton requested a deci-

sion on Haun's hiring during his report at Thursday night's city commission meeting. He explained that the decision followed an extensive review of approximately 60 applications originally received. The number was trimmed to 7 through the assistance of a selection committee. Following personal interviews with the 7, Litton said the decision to accept Haun's application was unanimous among members of the committee.

The city commission also voted unanimously to approve the hiring.

Included in Haun's 25 years experience is 11 years in various fire chief positions for the city of Eustis and Lake County, where he was also senior director of Fire and Emergency Services.

Presently living in Umatilla, he is originally from Pennsylvania. Please See Chief, Page 2A

Park design approved

LAKE MARY - The Lake Mary City Commission gave Conklin, Porter & Holmes Engineers, Inc. the go ahead on the conceptual design of the gateway park at Lake Mary Boulevard and Rinehart Road.

The estimated cost of developing the park, which will also serve as a trail head for a portion of the Florida National Scenic Trail, is \$430,000, including fountains, bathrooms, pavilions, vendor space lighting signage, a bridge across the wetlands area and an extension of the wall at The Forest.

The city will cover the cost of the development by excluding the conveyance of a 2-acre site in the Primera, amending the DRI, Inconsideration for a cash payment. The land is valued at \$522,720.

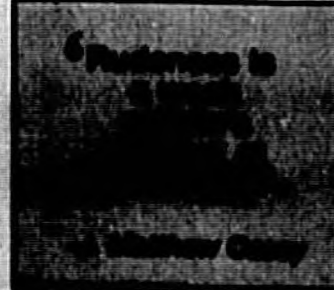
"This is certainly a good funding source," said City Manager John Litton.

Commissioner Gary Brender called for a campaign to be mounted by the same committee who consulted on the conceptual design, to solicit corporate donations to offset some of the expenses. Brender said certain businesses might be interested in giving specific items. Karen Whitney, owner of Lake Mary Cycles, had indicated a desire to donate some bike racks. Brender said, "I just think there's a potential to tie-in and fellowship with these corporations," he said regarding asking for donations from some of the companies which benefitted from corporate incentives.

Mayor David Meador suggested asking for help from the Lake Mary Heathrow Chamber of Commerce. Meador also called the development of the park a win-win situation for the homeowners in The Forest, which is adjacent to the park. The residents of the community had complained after work began on the Rinehart Road widening, because screening vegetation was removed to make way for the new right-of-way.

Committee to discuss airport noise problems

SANFORD - The Sanford Aviation Noise Abatement Committee (SANAC) will meet Tuesday at the main terminal building at the airport. While many city government selected committees rely on public input, seldom has there been one at which so much is heard.

Most of the comments come in the form of complaints re-

garding noise from aircraft taking off and landing at the Orlando-Sanford Airport. Minutes from the 2 previous meetings point out the extent of the complaints.

In March of this year, Jack Dow, with the Sanford Airport Authority, reported 37,189 flight operations for the month of March. There were 7,953 domestic passengers and 41,678 international passengers for March. The figure re-

sents an increase of approximately 24,000 passengers in March of this year compared to the same time period last year.

In the complaint category, March saw 15 complaints from residents in new households, 113 from residents currently in the area considered as the Noise Hotline database. In specific areas, there were 7 complaints from Heathrow and 45 from Timacuan.

For April of this year, there were 10,070 domestic passengers and 66,085 international passengers, 38,000 more than April of 1997.

Dow reported 16 complaints from residents in new households and 114 from residents currently in the Noise Hotline database.

The calls ranged from 8 complaints from Heathrow and Chase Groves to 39 complaints from Timacuan.

For both months, more than half of the calls were received between 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. The day of the week with the most complaints is Wednesday, where new flights have recently been added to the regular incoming numbers.

In response to questions from members of the general public, airport and noise abatement officials reiterated. Please See Noise, Page 2A

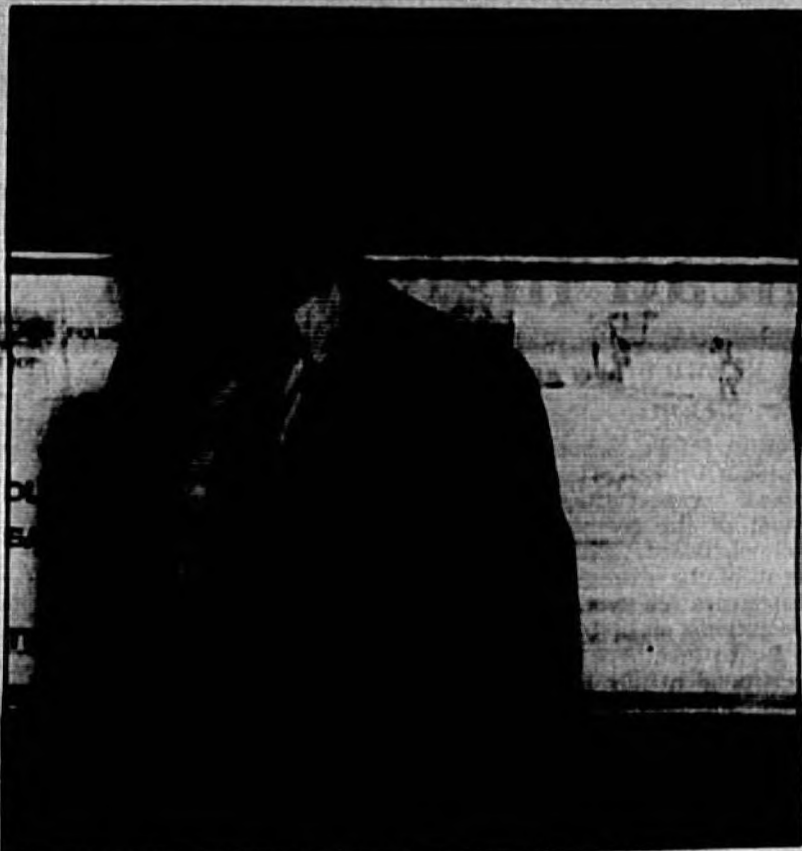

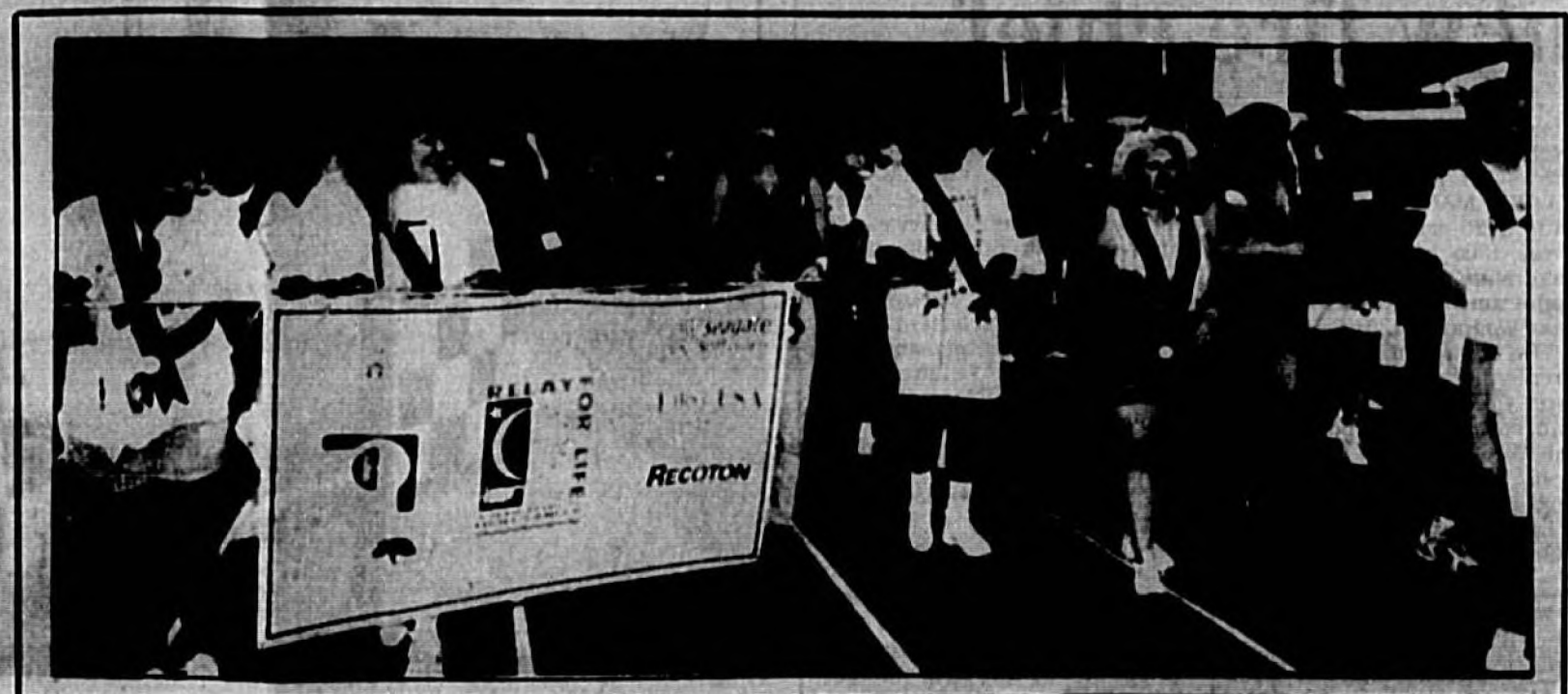

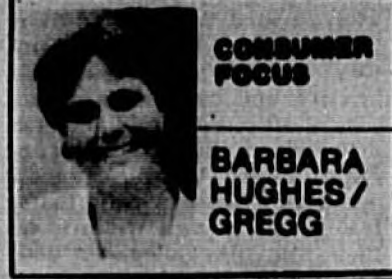

Tips for better teen parent communication

Adolescence, the transition to adulthood, can be a difficult period for the adolescent and the parent alike. The adolescent is growing at a rate comparable to that of infancy. Changes in hormone levels may contribute to unpredictable mood swings.

Peers become more influential regarding the attitudes and behaviors of adolescents and their role as a parent may require re-negotiation. These factors and a multitude of others may result in increased tension in your relationship with your teen. Communication provides one avenue through which some of the stresses could be relieved.

Jane, age 17, is quoted, I hate to say it, but my parents don't talk much to me or it's the other way around. We're just like animals not knowing

sexual intercourse (especially for females), and also lower levels of adolescent depression.

In 1995 there was a study of 800 adolescents to better understand the challenges of parent-adolescent communication. The adolescents reported on two of the phrases that they most wanted to hear from their parents. I'm proud of you was the first desired phrase. Although the need for parental approval is often more blatant for younger children, teens continue to need and want approval. Perhaps more important than parental expressions of pride during times of success, teens need this approval during times of failure. Unconditional pride helps build self-esteem and self-worth.

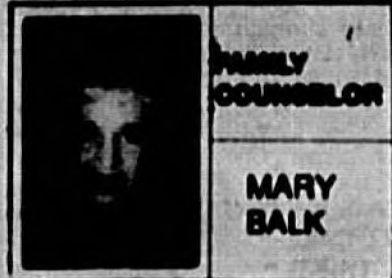
The second phrase adolescents wanted to hear from

their parents was, You can come to me with anything and I'll always be there to listen. Listening is perhaps the most important aspect of positive communication. Swets outlines a model of good listening:

- Pay attention to what the teen is saying.
- Actually hear the actual words that are being said.
- Watch body language, including avoiding eye contact or nervous hand gestures.
- Eliminate distractions, such as TV and open doors.
- Be aware of the tone of voice.

Adolescence is the period during which you as a parent can and do have a great amount of influence on your teens future. Communication provides one avenue by which both you and your adolescent can benefit.

Promote 'I think I can' attitude

When kids have an "I think I can" attitude, they not only learn more, they also have more fun. One of my all-time favorite children's stories, and one I wish every little person could hear over and over again is "The Little Engine That Could." This story is about a little train engine that is faced with the job of pulling a very heavy load of toys over a big hill. He really feels inadequate for the job and fears he may not be able to succeed, but he keeps saying to himself, "I think I can, I think I can, I think I can..." until he finally gets the train over the hill and the toys to the children on the other side of the hill.

What we as parents want for our children is an "I think I can" attitude when they face new challenges. Summer is a good time for us to observe our children in more relaxed settings. Are they go-getters or do they hang back and let others take the lead? When presented with a new experience, do they approach it with confidence or with fear. When being taught a new skill, do

your kids hear you talking positively, both about yourself and about them. Remember, kids learn what they live. Use your refrigerator door as your "Brag Center." Share your children's joys and efforts with grandparents and other relatives.

If your child has a learning disability, (she may believe they can't do things as well as other kids. Use incentives and rewards that your child wants - having a friend spend the night or a trip to McDonald's, when your child makes an extra effort toward achieving a goal. Give specific praise for their extra effort. "You did a great job putting your toys away. I really appreciate the way you helped me fold the clothes. Thanks for taking such good care of the cat today."

Finally, help your child see that every obstacle is surmountable. "If you can't swim, practice swimming to be a good swimmer, dance more. And always remember, "I think I can!"

My wife is also a retired professional with strong willpower. I was a widower (married 36 years with three children); she, a divorcee of about

My departure was occasioned when, nine days after I returned home from a hospital following a painful knee replacement, she attacked me physically and verbally and told me to leave. At the time, I could barely walk. With the help of my son-in-law, I found a place and moved out.

I presented my wife with a separation agreement which she ignored. She has hinted several times that we should live together for financial reasons. I say that is a poor reason to maintain a relationship.

After about seven months, I filed for divorce. She has responded quite greedily and is trying to wipe me out financially. Yes, Abby, we had a prenuptial agreement, but a lot can be acquired in 11 years together. So now we're gearing up for a complicated and expensive trial.

Nevertheless, I am happy to be out of that relationship. My family is also happy for me. My daughter, her family and my sister can visit me anytime they want. My son is visiting me again. There is no tension now.

So, Abby, I want to tell you that I heartily agree with your advice to abused husbands: "Get out. It may be tough at first, but you'll adjust."

DEAR FREE: Thank you for the firsthand testimonial. Divorce is never easy, and it can be costly - but in your case, I'd say it's the better option. Enjoy your freedom; you've earned it.

DEAR ABBY: This is in response to "Anonymous, Naturally," who complained about struggling shoppers who come in three minutes before closing time and expect to "shop the entire store." I understand this situation at least one a week. I also work in a busy department store. We have a public address system for the one you suggest. At 8:45 p.m., we start announcing that the fitting room is closing, and then repeat the announcement every five

How do you get the message across to people like that, Abby? I could go on and on, but why? Most shoppers don't really care. All we want is a little B-E-S-P-E-C-T. JUST ABOUT HAD IT IN CALIFORNIA

DEAR JUST: I was astonished at the number of letters I received from salespeople telling similar stories. I would like to think that most shoppers really do care, and exhibit courteous manners.

If the problem is as widespread as all of you indicate, it may not be resolved until store owners shut down their computers at closing time, and inform customers that their purchases will have to be rung up the next day. It is management's job to strike the balance between being consumer-friendly and being fair to staff.

I wonder how many store owners are as interested in protecting their employees as they are in making last-minute sales.

Written on their hearts: Leading children in right direction

With several recent schoolyard murders done by children, it's no wonder that people are asking, "What's going wrong in this country?" Does fault lie with schools, teachers, parents, drugs, television, music or society in general? Is it something altogether different? Is the situation now really any different from what it used to be?

We may never have conclusive proof about any of this but one thing we can agree: we parents must do a better job of rearing our children. Most children and teenagers are "good kids" who cause no one any real trouble. Then there are the others who get most of the publicity.

Leading children in the right way isn't a new problem. It's been with us since the days of Cain and Abel. What can we do? God's Word is a manual of instruction for child rearing. See what it says about parenting.

Write His Words on Your Heart

God told Israel (Deuteronomy 6:6), "These commandments that I give you today are to be written upon your hearts." Before we adults can lead our children in the right way, we must know what that way is and walk in it ourselves. Too many children have parents who only tell them the right way but don't show it to them. Which will a child follow best: words or example? The obvious answer is the example that a parent sets for his child. This idea is behind the teaching that God gives us here. "Fix these words of mine in your hearts and mind." (Deuteronomy 11:18) should have the emphasis on "your hearts." A family with no spiritual and moral compass, showing right and wrong, will always be adrift, without direction. We shouldn't be surprised when children break laws and go wrong when their parents have done no better.

We can't depend on anyone outside our homes to provide the kind of instruction and example that God says belongs with us parents. We parents have this responsibility. It doesn't belong with the schools, teachers, the government or even the church. God has given us parents the responsibility to rear children in the right way. Of course, even good parents don't always succeed. In every church you can find some Christian parents who have done their best, even set good examples of the Christian life, whose children have gone wrong. As a parent, you can do your best, trust the Lord and pray for the best and sometimes that's about all you can do.

There are many bad influences in the world, some of them behind bars. A prison warden once told his prisoners, "This world is a better place because you're here." But all bad influences aren't in jail. Many are loose to influence our children which means we must all the more be diligent to teach and show them the right way. We have a little plaque on one of the walls of our home that says, "Train up a child in the way he should go—and walk there yourself!" That's biblical. God said, "Fix these words of mine in your hearts and minds."

Write His Words on Your Children's Hearts

God knew that there is no social institution like the family for teaching children. Parents have great power to train their children in either the right or wrong way. So he told us (Deuteronomy 6:7), "Impress (these teachings) on your children." The Hebrew word for "impress" means literally "to pierce" or "to drill." When and how are we to do this? by "talking about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up." (Deut. 11:19). In effect, he says, "Drill these teachings into your children all day long."

Learning is important to children when they're young. The Jesuits of the Roman Catholic Church claim: "Give us your child till he is twelve, and we care not who has charge of him afterwards." Our children have many teachers—television programs, movies, music, friends, even the news—teaching them many things, some good, some bad. But they need you, their parent, as their main and best teacher.

I know that we parents sometimes can't get through to our children as much as we would like, but we do have influence. Some years ago, I read a true story about an Army commander of an infantry company who has frustrated in trying to make a good soldier of a private. The young man lagged behind on patrols, pretended to be ill and managed to spend most of his time at headquarters. The commander tried everything he knew to no avail. One day, though, he changed his tactics and succeeded in getting the private to improve. He explained, "Threats and punishments didn't work so I used the ultimate weapon: I wrote his mother! Teach your children as no one else can or will. Let God Bless Your Teaching."

If you succeed in doing all this, God promises a blessing for you (Deut. 11:21): "Then you and your children will live a long time in the land that the Lord your God promised to give to your ancestors."

God will bless the family that is committed to Him, where the parents have a living faith in Jesus and where they teach their faith to their children. If you want to show your children God's right way, you can be sure that He is on your side. In fact, He wants you to succeed in rearing your children in the right way even more than you do.

Even when you think you can't win, don't give up because God is with you. Don't lose hope. Don't lose faith. Don't think you have lost. The famous Boswell of England used to keep a diary and often told about outings with his father which he enjoyed a great deal. One of those outings he especially enjoyed was a day of fishing with his father. Unknown to him, his father kept a diary too. On one day's entry, his father made this note: "Went fishing today with my son. Day wasted." Little did he know how important that day was to his son. And little did he know how much he meant to his son.

No opportunity is wasted in teaching your children about God. Let them learn from you. Let them see you use your faith, make your church important and put Christ in first place in your life. Write on their hearts what is already on yours—that Jesus is your Savior and your Lord and that living for him is the most important thing in life to you.

A friend sent me this story a few weeks ago that demonstrates the power of example. Use it.

His name is John. He has wild hair, wears a T-shirt with holes in it, jeans and no shoes. This was literally his wardrobe for his entire four years of college. He is brilliant. Kind of esoteric and very, very bright. He became a Christian while attending college.

Across the street from the campus is a well-dressed, very conservative church. They want to develop a ministry to the students, but are not sure how to go about it. One day John decides to go there. He walks in with no shoes, jeans, his T-shirt, and wild hair. The service has already started and so John starts down the aisle looking for a seat. The church is completely packed and he can't find a seat. By now people are looking a bit uncomfortable, but no one says anything.

John gets closer and closer to the pulpit and when he realizes there are no seats, he just squats down right on the carpet. (Although perfectly acceptable behavior at a college fellowship, trust me, this has never happened in this church before) By now the people are really uptight, and the tension in the air is thick. About this time, the minister realizes that from way at the back of the church a deacon is slowly making his way toward John. Now, the deacon is in his eighties, has silver-gray hair, a three-piece suit, and a pocket watch. A godly man, very elegant, very dignified, very courtly. He walks with a cane and as he starts walking toward this boy, everyone is saying to themselves, "You can't blame him for what he's going to do. How can you expect a man of his age and of his background to understand some college kid on the floor?"

It takes a long time for the man to reach the boy. The church is utterly silent except for the clicking of the man's cane. All eyes are focused on him. You can't even hear anyone breathing. The people are thinking, "The minister can't even preach the sermon until the deacon does what he has to do." And now they see this elderly man drop his cane on the floor. With great difficulty he lowers himself and sits down next to John and sits with him so he won't be alone.

Everyone chokes up with emotion. When the minister gains control he says, "What I'm about to preach, you will never remember. What you have just seen, you will never forget."

My own children ever forget how we taught them and demonstrated to them the greatest faith in the world. May they always know Jesus as the Best Friend and remember that we introduced them to him and showed them how to be like him.

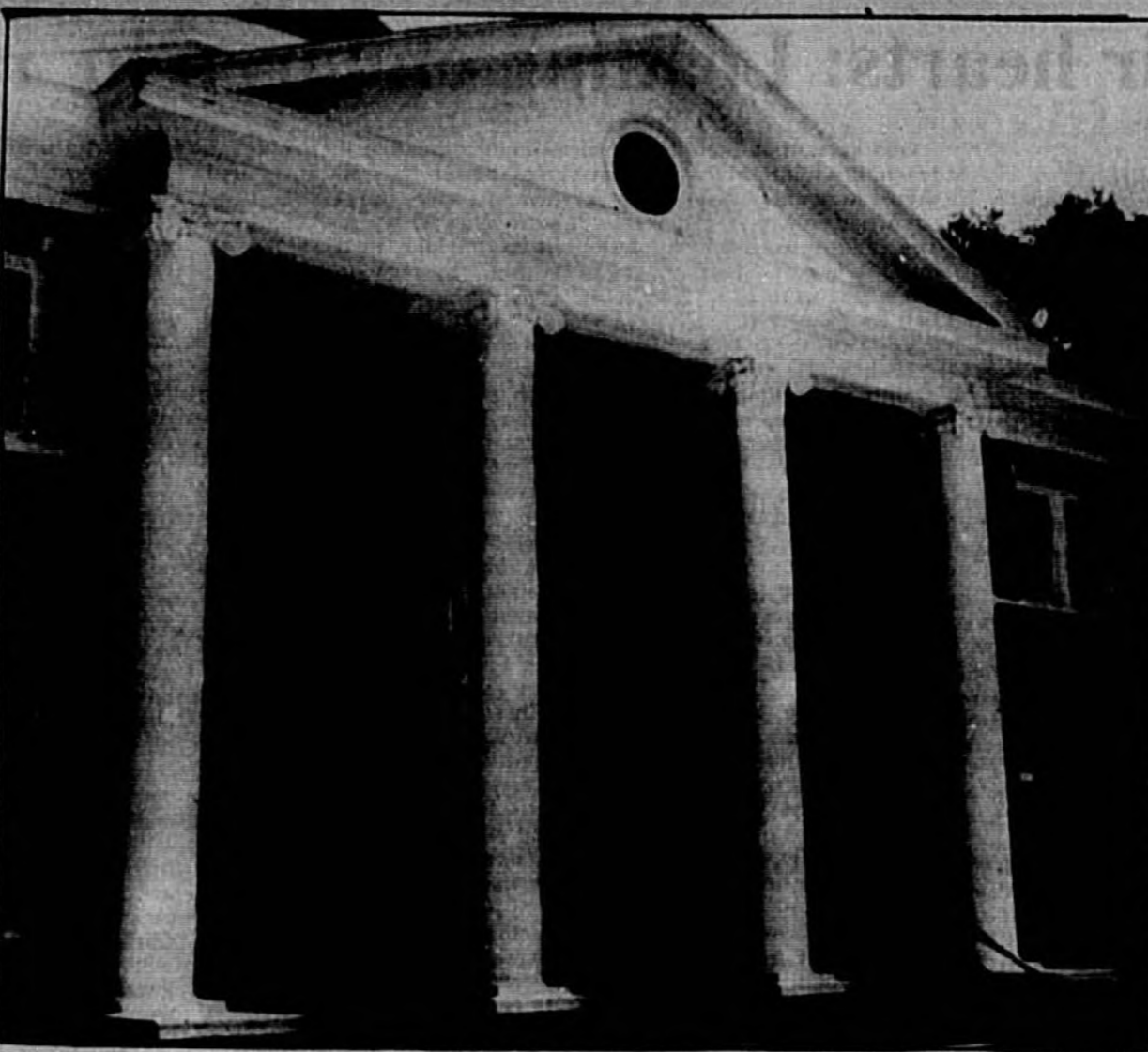

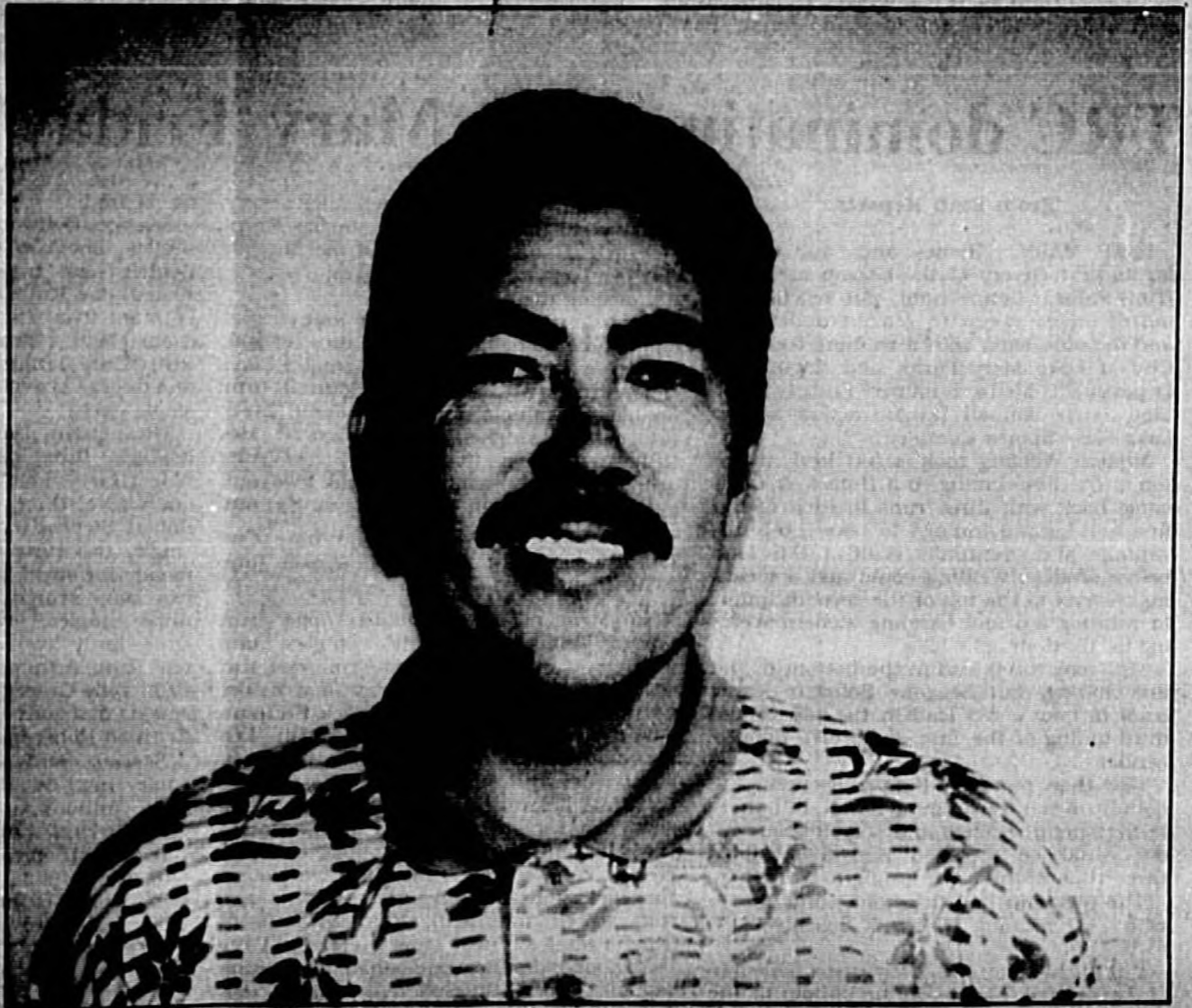

Add to that the fact that you are seeing sons of your friends and kids that you coached in amateur ball being drafted (Tim Raines Jr., Chris Knapp, Alex Acosta) and you really start feeling old.

But hey, I feel very lucky to still be playing competitive baseball at my age. I can remember back just a few decades ago that our fathers quit playing sports in their mid-20's or early 30's because they were too old.

Now guys are playing very well into their late 40's and 50's in competitive baseball and softball leagues and senior leagues are attracting players in their 60's and 70's.

While I was playing last Sunday someone asked me if I felt so-and-so was ready to turn pro or should they go to college.

Well my way of thinking has changed over the years.

Back in the 70's and 80's it used to depend on where you were going to school, could you handle college work, or how much of a bonus you were getting.

Some people went straight to the minors because they knew they weren't college student material, but others had to decide whether to take a \$15,000 to \$25,000 bonus or a \$30,000 college degree. Some had a portion of their bonus earmarked for use for college only, a clause normally instated upon by their parents.

Now things are even more complicated.

While those earlier factors are still there, with bonuses in the million's for an early round pick, the decision on signing or going to school become moot. With that much money you could probably buy some college's, let alone pay for your own schooling.

But I think the biggest consideration now to the amateur ball.

Professional baseball only uses wooden bats and there is no way it will ever go to metal, someone would get killed.

So you have to think about signing now so you can start using wooden bats sooner. A majority, if not all, of today's players have probably never used a wooden bat and it takes some getting used to.

With the money today's pros are making, you want to get to the majors as soon as possible and if you go to college that will cost you at least three years and maybe

more, because you will need some minor league seasoning to get used to a wooden bat.

Even a pitcher may have to think hard about college because if you have been watching the College World Series you have seen a lot of junk ball pitchers. And that's because of the aluminum bat.

No matter how hard you throw, or where you throw it, a good batter can still get a hit with a metal bat.

With wood, if you hit someone on the end of the bat or on the fist, the bat will break and be an easy out for an infielder.

But with aluminum, a handle shot will get over an infielder because the bat doesn't break and I've seen several balls hit right off the end of the bat that has gone out of the ball park for a home run.

With the exotic metals that are allowing the bats to be made extra hard and extra light, and the better training methods in use today, we are seeing little guys hitting monstrous home runs and scores like 14-12 and 10-9 in the World Series.

That's forcing college coaches to develop nibblers and junk ball pitchers, instead of hard throwers who get guys out with a good cut fast ball away or a high and tight burner. And that may mean spending time in the minors learning how to pitch major league style.

So now equipment has to figure into your thinking as much as, if no more than, money on whether to go to college or straight into pro ball.

Last second shot: I hope the American League comes down hard on the Royals and Angels for Tuesday night's bean-ball war.

I also hope baseball may finally realize that it needs a rule like the NBA or the NHL that severely penalizes a player for leaving the bench to enter a fight.

One of Tuesday's fights had been broken up when the bullpens came sprinting in from the outfield corners and starting the whole thing over again. If there were a rule about leaving the bench, the game would have settled down sooner.

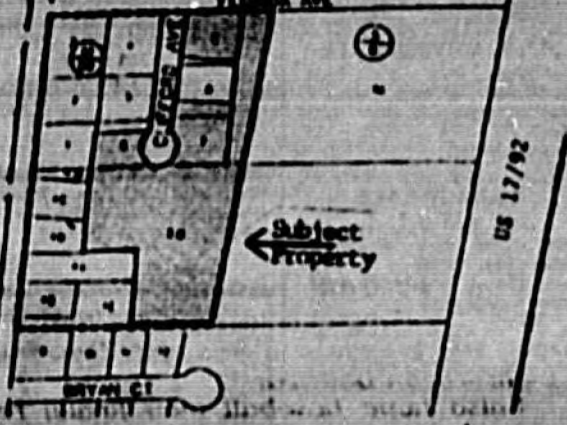
