## Charges Of Fraud Made In Election

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Charges of fraud and the possibility of several contests looms today as completion was being made of the tabulation of official returns of the voters cast in the Democratic primary of last Tuesday.

Tabulations today show that Judge John E. Martinou of the Pulaski county chancery court defeated Governor Tom J. Terrill for re-nomination by a majority of approximately 11,000 votes.

Official returns from 66 of the 75 counties in the state, another with only one precinct missing and with unofficial returns from all except eight precincts of the remaining eight counties give Martinou 115,111; Terrill, 101,179.

## Farming And Textile Industry Are Closely Observed By Hoover

## Man Will Die For Murder Of Woman

CAMDEN, N. J., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Penitentiary and with his nearest relatives, his brother, living in Germany, Paul W. Fuersten, former leader of the Camden philharmonic orchestra, was taken to the state prison at Trenton today to be electrocuted there the week of Sept. 29 for the murder of Mrs. Harriet Vickers.

Fuersten, whose trial lasted only three days, was found guilty yesterday of first degree murder. The jury was out a little more than an hour.

The crime for which the former orchestra leader was convicted was committed June 29 when he shot Mrs. Vickers, the mother of two young children, during a quarrel in his apartment.

Before she died, Mrs. Vickers said he had shot her because she refused to elope to Germany.

## TWO IDENTIFIED IN SLAYING OF JERSEY COUPLE

Mrs. Jane Gibson Points Out Widow's Brother And Cousin As Pair She Saw With Mrs. Hall At Scene Of Murder

Accusation Is Made At Friday's Hearing

Charlotte Mills Declares Relations Between Mother And Minister Were Proper

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Two male relatives of Mrs. Edward Wheeler Hall have been pointed out in open court by a witness of four years ago as the men she saw with the widow at the slaying of Rev. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills.

Henry Carpenter, Mrs. Hall's wealthy cousin, a Wall Street broker, and Willie Stevens, her mentally deficient brother, were the men indicted by Mrs. Jane Gibson, who said Carpenter had a shining object in his hand.

The hearing was adjourned until Monday, resuming that the states rests its case chiefly on Mrs. Gibson's testimony. She related to County Judge Cleary's court that on the night of Sept. 11, 1922, she was riding her mule in search of corn (hubs) when she came upon a group of men and women quarreling about some letters. A pocket light was flashed upon the face of the men, she declared.

Mrs. Gibson accused Carpenter "Whose face did you see?" asked Special Prosecutor Alexander Simpson.

"This here man," replied Mrs. Gibson, pointing to Henry Carpenter.

She saw something shiny in his hand, heard a loud report and saw a woman screaming and another crying "Oh, Henry." Mrs. Gibson declared she lost a moccasin in her haste and the moccasin she identified as hers, found nearby, was introduced into evidence.

She heard three more shots. After she got over her fright she returned and saw Mrs. Hall kneeling, or leaning over and crying. She identified Stevens as a man she had seen with Mrs. Hall earlier, in the glare of an automobile headlight.

Mother Had Tea With Mrs. Hall

Charlotte Mills, bobbed-haired 20-year-old daughter of the slain woman, testified that her mother had tea with Mrs. Hall some time before the slaying and that afterward she was very sick. She said a large book in the rector's study of the Church of St. John the Evangelist was used as a post-office for the exchange of letters between the clergyman and the sexton's wife.

Asked to the relationship between her mother and the rector she said:

"It was quite proper," but that he called often. She said that two months before the murder Mrs. Mills had said she might not live long.

## Six Killed, Six Hurt When New York Train Hits An Open Switch

CALVERTON, N. Y., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Mrs. George A. Shufford of Biltmore, N. C., died in the Southampton Hospital today as a result of the Long Island wreck here last night. She was pinned under the wreckage five hours before being rescued by rescue workers.

The number of dead remained at six, however, as it was learned James E. Way, Brooklyn business man, a supposed victim, was not killed, but only suffered shock. He had been listed as "J. B. Way."

The other dead are: H. L. Fish, New York; George A. Shufford Jr., three-year-old, Asheville, N. C.; Dorothy Louise Shufford, one year old, Asheville, N. C.; Engineer William J. Squires, Greenport; Fireman John Montgomery, Greenport.

The injured were attended in Riverhead, west of here.

## No Formal Charges To Be Made Against Mexican Church Head

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 14.—(AP)—No formal charges are to be made against Rev. Mora del Rio, archbishop of Mexico, because of utterances made in a recent interview with an American newspaper correspondent in which he strongly upheld the standpoint of the Catholic church in its dispute with the Mexican government over the religious regulations.

After a conference between Attorney General Ortega and President Calles, it was officially announced that the president had decided not to "consider" any formal charges against the priest.

## Petition To Take Charge Of Manley's Affairs Goes Before Court In Atlanta

ATLANTA, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Hearing on the petition for a guardian for W. D. Manley, indicted Atlanta banker, set for today, was postponed today by order of Judge John B. Humphries of superior court.

The order was on application of Solicitor John A. Boykin, who asked for a writ of prohibition delaying the guardianship hearing until Sept. 3, two days after recovery of the Bankers' Trust Company of Atlanta, of which Manley is president, will be given on a hearing in federal court on their petition to require Manley to turn over to them alleged assets of \$500,000.

The petition was filed yesterday which charged that he allowed the Farmers' and Traders' Bank "to become fraudulently insolvent," on July 12, last. The latter institution was capitalized at \$250,000.

The grand jury today continued its investigation into the affairs of the Farmers' and Traders' Bank and the Bankers' Trust Company.

Meanwhile, Manley has been confronted with possible further litigation as a result of the receivership of the Bankers' Trust Company. The receivers have charged that the bank transferred more than \$500,000 in personal effects to the W. D. Manley & Company, Inc. "for the purpose of hiding, delaying and defrauding its creditors who have claims against him for more than \$2,000,000. Endorsed Notes Totaling \$900,000.

The receivers' petition also charged that Manley had endorsed notes for approximately \$900,000 on various banks in the chain for which the Bankers' Trust Company acted as fiscal agent. The petition will be heard in federal district court on Aug. 20.

An answer to the receivers' petition was filed by Mrs. Manley, acting for the banker, in which she emphatically denied the charges was made. The answer stated that several months prior to the time the petition in bankruptcy was filed and at a time when "no question as to the solvency of W. D. Manley existed," his poor health and mental condition made it necessary to seek a plan to separate his private interests and put them into a corporation in which they might be more efficiently handled and through which excessive income tax might be avoided.

## DRY AIDES MAKE BIG HAUL TODAY AT JACKSONVILLE

Man Arrested Attempting To Make Daylight Run With Consignment Of 600 Cases Of The Choicest Liquors

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 14.—(AP)—One prisoner, five cases of assorted liquor, destined for thirsty Jacksonville throats and a 40-foot motor barge were caught in the first dry guard run net at the mouth of the St. Johns River at daybreak this morning when the coast guard cutter patrol boat CG-2341 captured the rum boat "Special" as it crossed the bar in a desperate attempt to make a daylight haul.

The Social, manned by the single prisoner, was sighted by the CG-2341 as the coast guard boat began its daily patrol at the mouth of the river.

Makes No Effort To Escape

The rum boat made no effort to escape when the patrol took up the chase. Its skipper submitted tamely when the government boat came alongside to begin the search which ended in discovery of the liquor cargo.

The prize was taken aside the jetties and anchored. The prisoner's name was not made known.

The capture of the Social, according to Mayporters, resulted because of the foolish attempt of its captain to make a daylight run with his liquor cargo. Today's liquor market quotations would value the cargo at around \$30,000.

## Two Are Drowned At Ft. Lauderdale

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Thelma Goolsby, 13, and her brother, Clarence Goolsby, 19, were drowned at Pompano Beach last night when a undertow carried them off shore. The body of the boy was found 20 minutes later.

Efforts to resuscitate the girl failed. The victims were the children of Mr. and Mrs. Isham Goolsby, who arrived at Pompano from Algood, Tenn., several months ago.

## Several Acreage Sales Are Recorded; Big Demand for Houses Is Reported

Sanford real estate is beginning to move after a prolonged period of inactivity, say Sanford real estate brokers. The demand for houses is given as the reason for greater activity in real estate circles. Rental agencies are daily turning away prospective renters of houses, it is said.

R. C. Tisdale, acreage dealer, announces the sale of approximately \$15,000 worth of land near the city. An unusually good price was obtained for the land it was said. Mr. Tisdale says that there has been a great increase in the real estate demand around Sanford lately and hopes to turn over more property in this city during the coming winter than he did for the corresponding period of 1925.

W. V. Wheeler, president of the W. V. Wheeler, Inc., says there are many new houses going up in the city. Three homes are to be built by local people in Magnolia Heights within the next two months. The material for these houses is already on the ground and work will be rushed to have them ready for occupancy as soon as possible.

"There has been a surprising pickup in real estate in the past month," said Mr. Wheeler, "and the prospects for the winter are that we will dispose of more homes in this city than ever before."

Oscar R. Brooks, dealer in city building lots, was also optimistic about the prospects for the winter, and predicts there will be more stable business here next winter than during the speculative period of last year.

"People are buying in Sanford now with the idea of living here," he said. "The majority of the people who have purchased lots from my company in the past two months express their intention of building a home and living in this city."

## NEW CITY DOCK PLAN FOR LAKE IS GIVEN OKEY

City Planning Commission Today Adopts Pier Plan Over Two Other Plans Submitted By Consulting Engineer

Cost Is Estimated At \$332,000 By Craig

Dock Plan Chosen Has Unit System Of Warehouses That Can Be Augmented

The plan of building two piers, each 100 feet long and 100 feet wide was favored over two other plans in the construction of Municipal docks for commercial purposes on Lake Monroe at a recent meeting of the City Planning Commission and the special committee of the Chamber of Commerce this morning.

The estimated cost of the double pier and warehouse system will be \$332,000, according to figures advanced by Consulting Engineer J. E. Craig of Jacksonville. Money for the project will come from the recent \$400,000 bond issue voted for the purpose.

The plan accepted calls for two piers built into the Lake at the foot of Poplar Avenue. The full type of construction was also considered over the plan to build the docks on piles.

One of the main advantages of the pier system is pointed out in the report of Engineer Craig, the flexible type of unit system of buildings whereby additions can be made when the necessity arises.

The other plans considered at the meeting were the inland or basin type of dock, and the marginal wharf type.

The cost of the slip cut inland was considered prohibitive, and it was believed it would be objectionable to property owners nearby on account of the small amount of stored fertilizers and other matter kept in the warehouses. The cost was estimated at \$124,000.

The main objection to the marginal type of dock was that it would take too much lake frontage and would serve as a means of congesting traffic, besides cutting off the view of the lake. Its plan would also necessitate the building of a turning basin. The cost was estimated at \$124,000.

The Chamber of Commerce committee included A. P. Connelly, R. H. Berg and Volpe Williams.

## Water Of New Well Will Be Pumped Into City's System Today

Water from a new well south of Sanford will be pumped into the mains late today if workmen complete the installation of a new pump which arrived this week.

The new well is one of three additional wells being drilled to increase the supply of the Municipal Waterworks system. A total of 1,000,000 gallons is being pumped from the four soft wells, and 250,000 gallons from Lake Ada.

The waterworks department will be pumping 1,500,000 gallons of water from the large wells within a year, according to City Manager W. B. Williams. Pumping of the Lake Ada water will be discontinued as soon as the well supply is adequate.

Two specimens of water from the new well were examined by the Florida State Board of Health, and the bacterial and sanitary qualities of the water pronounced "good."

## 1,500 Tank Cars Of Oil Are Ordered By Race For Governor

Indication that the giant plant of the Florida Power and Light Company at Lake Monroe was nearing completion is the fact that 1500 carloads of fuel oil have been ordered for delivery to the plant as soon as possible, according to Manager Clyde A. Byrd. Work has been rushed on the plant and the finishing touches are being put on before the trial tests of the machinery.

Oct. 15 is the tentative date set for the first test of the machinery of the plant.

"If everything runs according to schedule the month of November should find us in a position to furnish this district with the maximum amount of power that is needed here," Mr. Byrd said.

The amount of fuel oil ordered here for the plant is 1,500,000 gallons. This is one of the largest orders ever placed with the Standard Oil Company in this state, it is said.

## PAIR OF ROBBERS RIFLE MAIL CAR ON UNION PACIFIC

Hold-Up Occurs Early This Morning Between Rawlins And Wamsutter, Wyoming; Loss Is Not Determined

RAWLINS, Wyo., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Two men early today held up and robbed the mail car on the Union Pacific train number five, Chicago to Portland, Ore., mail and express train, between Rawlins and Wamsutter. The loss has not yet been determined by the railway mail authorities.

The men boarded the train at Rawlins and while it was speeding west entered the mail coach where they bound the two mail clerks and then rifled several registered letter pouches.

Then, evidently by an arrangement with accomplices, the semaphore signal at Wamsutter was changed so that the train slowed and the two robbers jumped off the mail coach while the train was moving at 15 miles an hour.

Wamsutter is 41 miles west of Rawlins, but the robbery was not discovered until it was noted that the two mail clerks, A. J. Miller and Jack Madigan, did not deliver at Rock Springs.

## Small Amount Is Taken From Chamber Of Commerce For Bridge

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Bandits who held up and robbed a registered mail car attached to Union Pacific Train Number 5, near Greens River, Wyo., last night, received a small amount of loot, railway mail officials here believe.

Although some time will be required before a complete check can be made, railway mail officials explained that the train never carries much registered mail of value.

## Fire Stations Will Be In South Sanford And On First Street

The sections of the city in which new fire stations are recommended for construction by the City Planning Commission were announced today by S. O. Shindler, chairman of the commission.

Station Two would be constructed in South Sanford on a property yet to be selected. Station Three would be built on West First Street. These recommendations will be made to the City Commission, which body authorized the city planning commission to select locations for the fire stations.

The business section of Park Avenue will be limited to Fourth Street, the city planners decided in denying the petition of R. B. Wright to erect a filling station and garage on the northwest corner of Park Avenue and Eighth Street.

## Graves Has Plurality Of 18,000 Votes In Race For Governor

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Cal. Bibb Graves won the nomination for governor in Tuesday's Democratic primary by a plurality of 18,000 votes, first- and second-choice votes counted, over Charles S. McDowell of Euflala, in one of the closest races on record in the state.

The result could not be determined until second-choice votes were counted, as Graves failed to obtain a majority over his three opponents, the nomination being determined by counting the combined first- and second-choice votes of the highest candidates.

Hugo L. Black, Birmingham lawyer who was nominated for the senate to succeed Oscar W. Underwood, failed to obtain a majority over his four opponents but had a plurality of 20,000 over his nearest opponent, John H. Bankhead.

## Four Dead, Six Hurt In Boiler Explosion

C., Aug. 14.—(AP)—One white man and three negroes were killed and two other white men and six negroes were injured in a boiler explosion in the plant of the Self Lumber Company at Ninety Six, nine miles from here, this morning. Included in the dead was Ernest Jarrett, 18, son of Superintendent G. L. Jarrett; Superintendent Jarrett was severely injured and R. H. Goodman, Ninety Six, white, had his leg broken.

## Supreme Court Has Reversed Decision in Mary Lee Case

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 14. (AP)—The supreme court has reversed judgment of the circuit court of Calhoun county in the case of Mary Lee, plaintiff in error, versus State of Florida, defendant in error. Opinion was by Chief Justice Brown.
