50 Superforts Bomb Tokyo New Offensive

Japs Claim Nine Shot Down While Raid Is Made On American Base On Saipan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27. (AP)—The destruction of a large Japanese aircraft carrier, six additional enemy warships and 20 other vessels by American submarines was announced today by Navy Secretary Forrester, including one converted light cruiser, a destroyer and two escort vessels.

About 50 Superforts bombed Tokyo today in the first mass raid on the enemy capital since Dec. 3 as the stepped-up tempo of the air war saw American fighter pilots destroy 74 Japanese planes over the Philippines and in North China.

Japan claimed nine B-29s were shot down, five more probably and 27 others damaged while admitting the loss of four interceptors. No details have yet been announced by the War Department.

Fighting in the Philippines continued to mop up on Leyte but the Chinese communist army reported it had defeated a Japanese force 30 miles east of Luyang in new fighting in west-central Hainan province.

Between 16 and 25 Japanese planes raided the Marianas Christmas eve in an attempt to cripple the base used by US super-fortresses in their raids against Japan.

Three of the Japanese planes were shot down by tank fighters over the island. A report reporting the attack today. A fourth was brought down by anti-aircraft fire.

One American plane was destroyed on the ground and several others damaged. Six men were injured in the night's bombing, one of the first raids against Saipan reported since the 10 plane raid of Dec. 6.

The enemy aircraft struck either from Iwo Jima, in the Volcano Islands or from little Marcus Island, both within 800 miles of Saipan. They apparently were ferried to a staging area near Japan with the hope of slowing down the regular superfort raids on Japanese homeland islands.

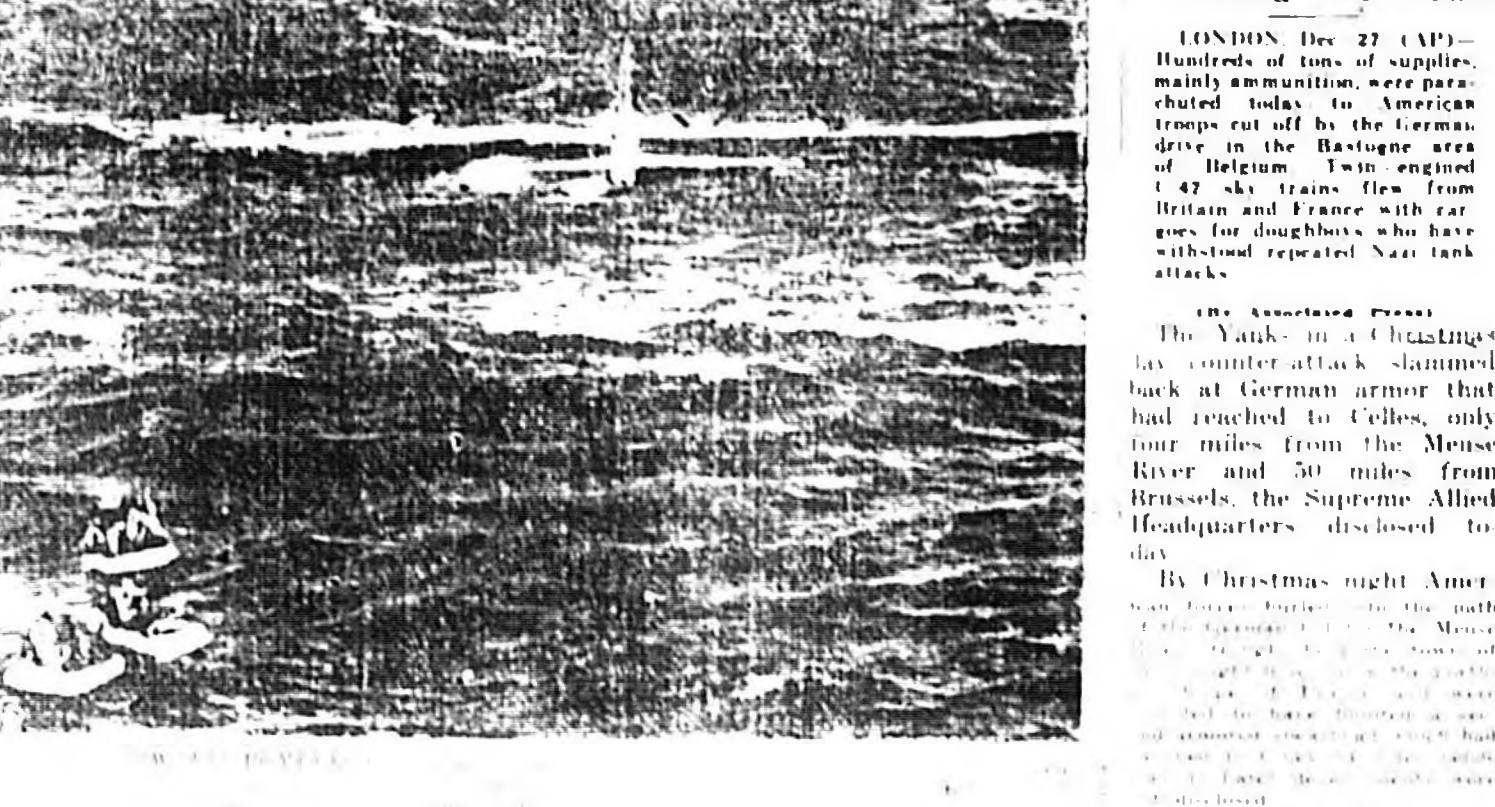

Above The World

George Wharton Pepper, whose autobiography, "Philadelphia Lawyer", has just appeared, was eminent enough to receive an offer of a place on the United States Supreme Court. He served five years in the senate. A member of the Philadelphia aristocracy, he is one of the best-known Episcopal laymen. He has a high sense of honor and personal charm. In fact, his autobiography suggests that he has every gift but one. As that is vital to a public servant Senator Pepper may not object, at 80, to being used to point a moral.

The lacking quality is knowledge of what is happening in the world outside his particular circle. Senator Pepper acquiesced in prohibition without dreaming of the complications it would entail. Even now he boasts of having helped to defeat the League of Nations, apparently not for practical reasons, but because it did not conform to his legal formulas. He speaks of Philadelphia city corruption vaguely, not as anything proper for him to do anything about. When he ran for the senate in 1923, he seems to have been the only person in Pennsylvania who did not know that a group of financiers had raised a huge slush fund to re-elect him. He lost only because the Philadelphia boss raised a fund almost as large, with the support of his machine to boot. So scandalous were the expenditures on both sides that the senate refused to seat the victor.

A great English statesman, Lord Balfour suffered from the same above-the-world detachment. It made his premiership a failure, it may be noble for a philosopher, but not for a public man, to ignore the world about him.

Drafting Nurses

American military medicine is the best in the world. Yet the work of army and navy doctors is in danger of losing much of its value because of a shortage of nurses. According to Walter Lippmann, the former army hospital standard, in this country, of one trained nurse to eight or ten beds, sometimes becomes, of necessity, one to a hundred or more beds. Army field hospitals are preparing to go overseas without a single trained nurse to a unit. And this in spite of the fact that there are still some things which a graduate nurse can do far better than the best trained medical corpsman.

Why is this? Has the country been drained of nurses? Lippmann says no, that surveys made by local medical associations indicate there are still thousands more than are absolutely necessary for civilian care.

Dean Marion G. Howell, of the School of Nursing of Western Reserve University, agrees. She urges drafting of nurses, and explains why. Much of the trouble, she feels, is lack of knowledge by nurses as to the urgency of the need. Much more is due to the shortsighted influence of families and husbands, who argue against joining the services. And a little is just a desire not to give up an easier life for a harder one. Drafting would fill the present gap, which she says will exist for about two years, until the increasingly larger classes of student and cadet nurses are fully trained.

Mixed And Unmixed

The Nazis have introduced a new form of sabotage into the Belgian national library at Brussels. Librarians returning after the German occupation found the books, formerly arranged by subject, now grouped according to size. The stated reason was "to give the place neatness and order."

People with just a few shelves of books, whose locations are mostly remembered, will not quickly appreciate how much havoc such a rearrangement can make, and how much good library service depends on grouping books by subject. This is especially true nowadays when shelves are no longer locked off from readers, but thrown open for their use. The open shelf and detailed arrangement of the books by subject both originated in American libraries, and have made possible the boast that while European libraries may be larger, American ones are better planned and better managed.

The Nazis, who know a good many things, were probably aware of the trouble they were making by mixing the Brussels books. They must have appreciated that in a public library books mixed so that they cannot be found are an unmixed nuisance.

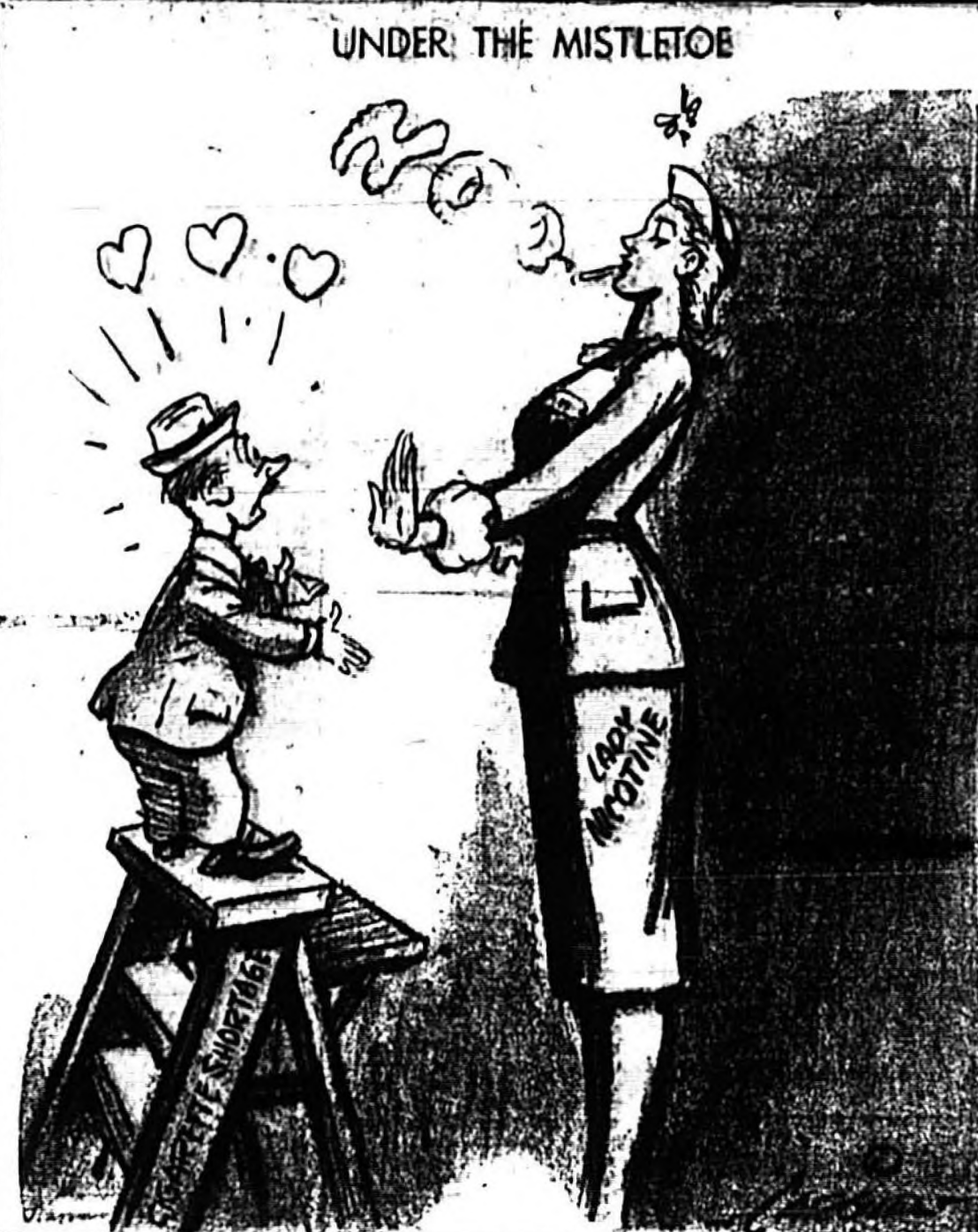



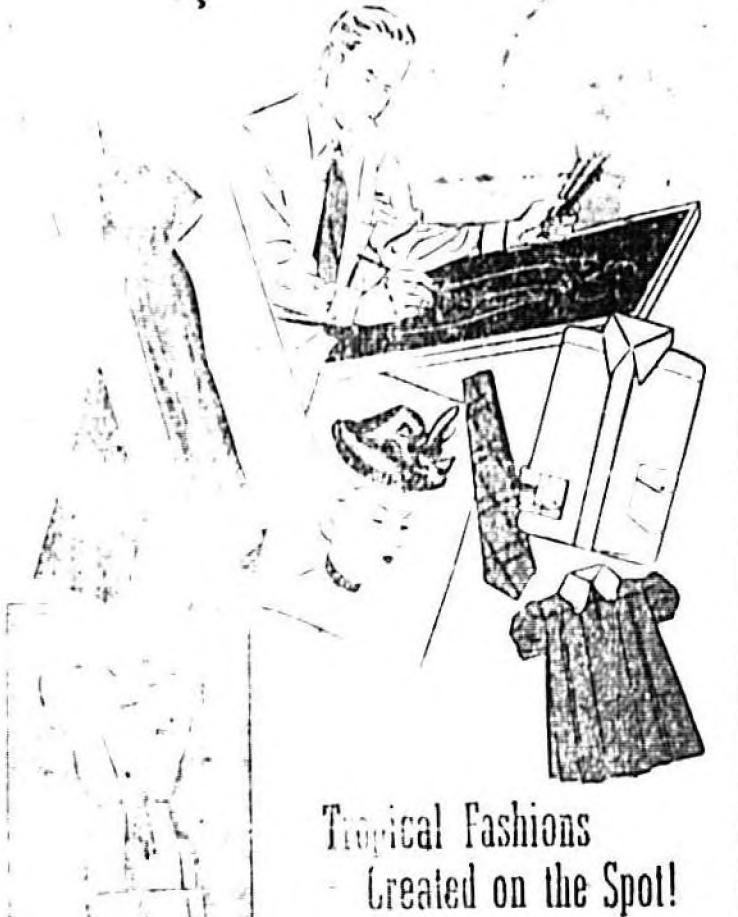

Nazi Advance Spearheads Hurlled Back Across Homme

Patton Raises Siege Of Bastogne Advancing 20 Miles On Front Of 35 Miles

(By Associated Press) Germany's most advance spearheads were hurled back more than ten miles and chased across the Meuse and Rhine rivers into Rochefort as the Americans hammered the Nazi bolche into reverse. U.S. planes, artillery, flamethrowers, tank destroyers, and infantry smashed the Germans from Humain on the Meuse and Homme Rivers. At that point they are 14 miles east of Meuse and 10 miles south of Cellis, the deepest German penetration.

T. R. Higgins, Veteran Editor, Dies At Age 78

Death Comes Suddenly To Sentinel's Correspondent Here

Thomas Roland Higgins, 78, veteran newspaperman and for a number of years Sanford correspondent for the Orlando Morning Sentinel, died unexpectedly at 10:35 o'clock Wednesday evening in his office in the Brumley Puleston Building.

For the past week, Mr. Higgins had suffered from a severe cold but preferred to stay in his office where he had a cot to lie down on. A bit prior to the death, Higgins Gobay, his son-in-law, had brought him some milk to drink. Noting his condition, Mr. Gobay had summoned his physician, Dr. J. A. Smith who ordered the ambulance to take Mr. Higgins to the hospital to treat his cold which had caused some chest soreness. Mr. Higgins died suddenly of a heart attack just after the ambulance arrived.

Mr. Higgins, the youngest of six children, was born Aug. 11, 1866, in Kittanning, Pa. He came to this country from England. He entered newspaper work at the age of 19, setting type on the Sharpsburg and Elm Weekly (U. S. server in a suburb of Pittsburgh, Pa., which he purchased six years later. He later joined the staff of the Pittsburg Pa. Chronicle Telegraph which he served for 12 years as sports writer, court reporter and telegraph editor. Later he became exchange editor on the Orlando Morning Sentinel.

He came to Florida in 1911. In Palatka he served as editor of the Palatka Morning Post, and in 1919 left this position to start a job printing plant here. For a number of years he was secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

In 1925 he came to Sanford and started publication of a weekly newspaper, The Signal, which later became a daily. After the Signal he served for three years as sports writer, court reporter and telegraph editor. Later he became exchange editor on the Orlando Morning Sentinel.

Mr. Higgins is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Higgins (Gobay), 100 Elliott Avenue.

CHICAGO, Dec. 28. (AP)—Government today sought immediate court determination of the legality of the Army seizure of Montgomery Ward and Company facilities in seven cities. A federal official said the court would be asked for an immediate hearing on a government petition for a judgment establishing the legality of the seizure. The employees are working for the government but Sewell Avery, chairman of the company board, refused to re-organize the seizure as valid.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28. (AP)—Chairman William H. Davis of the War Labor Board said yesterday that the case of James C. Petrillo could not be likened to that of Montgomery Ward.

Davis said the action of Petrillo, head of the AFL Musicians Union, in defying WLB orders, did not constitute a threat to the war economy.

Petrillo rejected a WLB order last June that his union lift a ban against making recordings. The case was sent to the White House where Stabilization Director M. Vinson ruled that the union's non-compliance with the WLB directive was not "unduly impeding" the war effort.

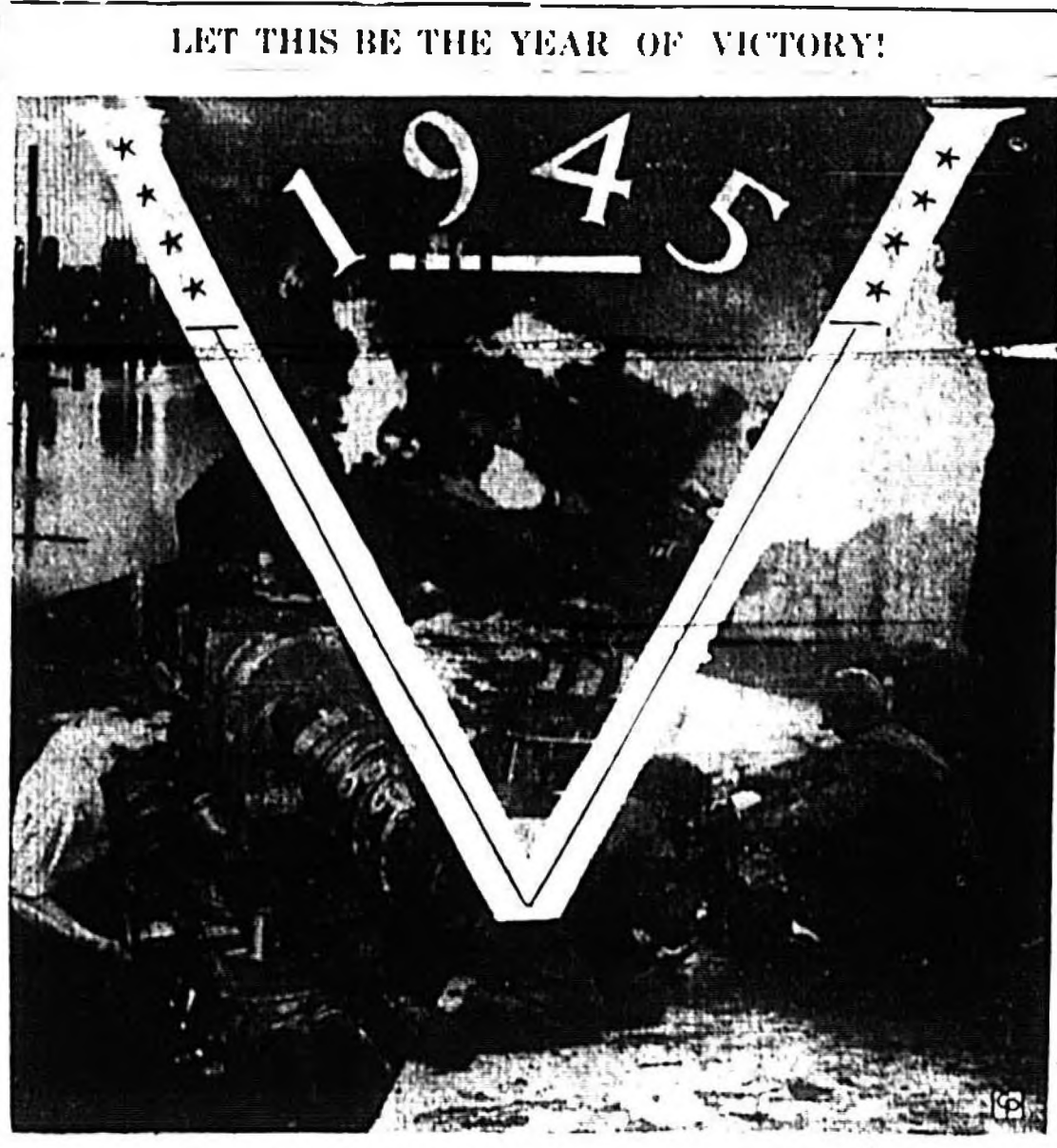

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Japan Claims Sinking Of 6 Of Big Convoy

Mitscher Predicts Big Naval Air Battles Against Japan In Near Future

(By Associated Press) In the Pacific the Japanese reported a big convoy of American transports moving westward through the Philippine waters, and claimed six were sunk in a two-day attack. They said the convoy included 30 transports escorted by more than 20 warships.

Vice Admiral Marc Mitscher said new naval and air battles are expected to develop soon in the western Pacific. He said the United States should have the Japanese "practically well cleaned up" in another year.

The Nipponese continued to bomb the Saipan superfortress base. Tokyo reported another bomber raid on Hawaii after single superfortresses made three raids on Honsu and were said to have dropped incendiaries.

In Washington it was reported that America's Navy, the largest in the world, has 172 men of war to carry on the most extended war in history. Navy officials reported today a review of ship production showed 1943 new vessels and fighting ships had joined the fleet in the last 12 months, boosting the overall total to 61,045 Navy ships all types.

This includes 37,721 landing craft and attack vessels built this year. The report showed 10 battleable transport carriers, 102 escort carriers, 200 other cruisers, 330 other cruisers and 200 destroyers constructed in the last four years.

Directory Printed Revealing Social Agencies Here

The Seminole County Association of Social Workers, composed of members of various social agencies related to welfare work in this county, has recently compiled and printed a blue cover directory of social agencies here.

The directory was compiled by a committee of the association of which Mrs. Carolyn Taylor was chairman and Mrs. Abbie W. Boyd, assistant chairman, and covers a wide range of social and health organizations of the city and county, together with the name of the director, the location, telephone number and particular duties or services performed by each.

Typing and mimeographing work on the booklet were done by the clerical staff of District Welfare Board 12, and copies of the Sanford 12-national School.

Organizations referred to in the booklet which come under the direction of the association president, Dr. Leland H. Dams, are the American Red Cross, the Salvation Army, United Service Organizations, the District Welfare Board No. 12, Unit IV, Seminole County Health Unit, Seminole County Welfare Board, Seminole County Health Department, Acting Juvenile Judge of Seminole County, the County Home Demonstration Department, Child Care Services, supervised by the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction, Seminole County Tuberculosis and Health Association and the City of Sanford Health Department.

James T. Vocelle To Head Parole Board

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 29. (AP)—Millard Caldwell announced yesterday that James T. Vocelle, now a member of the State Parole Board, will be State Beverage Director during his administration as Governor.

Vocelle, a former Varo Beach lawyer who was appointed to the Parole Commission set up in 1941 after competitive examinations will succeed Edgar W. Scarborough of Quincy as head of the beverage department. He will receive \$6,000 a year for heading the organization which supervises the beer, wine and liquor industry in Florida and collects the cigarette tax. Tax collections of the department amount to about \$1,000,000 a year.
