tion of a set in each ward, 'says Dr. Sutton, 'There is one definite generalization I can make: Patients are calmer. We haven't had disturbances such as we used to have sometimes on some wards." Visit a woman's ward and you'll see 30 or 40 women sitting about in comfortable chairs watching soap opera. Some seem entranced by the program and others appear only mildly interested. Theirs are the reactions you would expect to see in an equivalent number of women outside the hos-

Go to a men's ward and you'll see 20 or 30 men sitting around watching a variety program. Several laugh approvingly at jokes, as if cued by the performer on the screen Others look as bored es a Jaded television eritie.







In the first anxious days of the President's illness the question of how such power could be transferred was not at all clear. It seems simple common sense, now that we are aware of the difficulties that could arise, that we should do something about it.

For the sake of the person who would take over, for the comfort of mind of the man forced to relinquish power for a time, and especially for the sake of the nation, some definition of the powers of the Vice President in such a case should be made. The matter is far too important to be allowed to go by default. Nor should it be allowed to wait. This emergency is happily dissolving with President Eisenhower's recovery. Another and more serious one might occur in the term of any President.

The succession of duties should not be allowed to become personal. It should be planned, impersonally, with clear definition. on the basis of sensible arrangement, so that in case of a President's illness or incapacity for any reason, the succession may move smoothly and without question, either for temporary or permanent taking-over.




