Fierce Sky Battles Rage As Tokyo Reports Troops Drive Into Johore State

30,000 British Are Encircled

Nippons Claim Capture Of Strategic Railroad Junction

(By Associated Press) The Japanese were said by Tokyo today to be driving into the rain-swept jungles of Johore state, less than 110 miles north of Singapore, while British and Dutch planes fought Japanese raiders in fierce dog-fights over Singapore itself.

A bulletin from Japanese army headquarters said the invading troops were advancing down the west coast of Malaya and had crossed the border of Johore state last night, capturing the strategic rail junction of Gemawang.

Donel said 30,000 British defending the approaches to Singapore had been "completely encircled" and claimed the capture of Gemawang, a main point south of Singapore, only 35 miles north of Malaya.

Another bulletin said that the Japanese a major offensive against the British, after a long and discouraging withdrawal step by step down two thirds of the peninsula, were getting ready for the main defense of Singapore along the northern border of Johore Sultanate some 100 miles to the northwest.

The situation did much to awaken Singapore's mixed population to the gravity of their situation. After less than six weeks of war they now realize that only about one-fifth of federated territory and one-fourth of its population remains under the British flag.

Increasingly heavy Japanese air raids brought home to most of the Asiatics here the impending battle for Singapore. The ministry of information said yesterday's Japanese raid resulted in 85 casualties—the heaviest toll yet announced.

Fifty heavy Japanese bombers escorted by 30 naval fighters participated, and the British announced that one of them was shot down, three others probably were destroyed, and more damaged.

19,500 Young Men In Florida Will Register Feb. 16

(ST. AUGUSTINE, Jan. 15.—Special)—Approximately 19,500 male residents in Florida will be registered in the 20 and 21-year-old age groups on Feb. 16, Brig. Gen. Vivian Collins, state director of Selective Service, announced today.

National Selective Service registration anticipates a total of about 9,000,000 men between the ages of 20 and 45 years, and the director has been advised, and of these about 1,650,000 will be in the 20 and 21-year-old group.

It also is estimated that about 7,350,000 in the 36 to 44-year-old group will be registered throughout the United States on Feb. 16, together with some in the 21 to 36-year-old groups who were unable or neglected to register at the two previous registrations.

The age groups to be registered on Feb. 16 include all men not previously registered who have attained their twentieth birthday on Dec. 31, 1941, and who have not reached their twenty-first birthday on Feb. 16, 1942; that is, all unregistered males resident in the United States who were born between Feb. 17, 1921, and Dec. 31, 1921.

Opinion On Citrus Workers Is Reversed

TALLAHASSEE, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Attorney General Tom Watson, reversing a previous opinion, declared Wednesday that the citrus grove workers are not included in the Florida Workmen's Compensation law.

He decided that horticulture, which includes spraying, pruning and caring for citrus trees, is "the department of the science of agriculture which relates to the cultivation of gardens or orchards, including the care of vegetables, fruit, flowers, and ornamental shrubs and trees."

The 1941 Workmen's Compensation Act specifically exempts agricultural farm labor. It did not in express terms, exempt horticultural farm labor.

Tokyo Declares U. S. And Filipino Men Are Forced To Retreat Southward

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—The War Department announced today the defenders of Philippine fortifications shot down two heavy Japanese bombers and all others in a flight of nine which attacked Corregidor Island in Manila Bay.

The casualties among American and Philippine troops were slight.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Secretary of War Simon today announced the U. S. Army had started expanding to about 3,600,000 officers and men more than double its present strength in ground and air forces.

Mr. Simon said the increase, authorized by President Roosevelt, would be made this year with the first three new divisions to be organized by May 25. The expansion calls for more, than double the number of air combat units.

(By Associated Press) In the Philippines, a Tokyo broadcast declared Japanese troops were pressing the American-Filipino defenders southward into the Bataan peninsula from Hermosa. The broadcast added that dive-bombers attacked an "important U. S. air base" on the peninsula.

Japanese imperial headquarters today issued the list of war prizes taken as a result of the battle of Manila up to Jan. 13.

130,000 rifles, four artillery pieces, 50 machine guns, 674,000 rounds of ammunition, 500 automobiles, 70 railway carriages, 91 vessels, a large quantity of gasoline, large amounts of food and clothing and other supplies.

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Local CAA Airport Designated To Be Auxiliary Base

Army officials have designated the new Sanford-CAA airport, now under construction, as an auxiliary base of the Third Air Corps to be used for the tactical training of pilots.

Sanford, Seminole County Await Test Blackout Tonight

Executive Will Make Plans To Obtain Defense Contracts

Members of the Executive, Finance, Industrial, Advertising and Real Estate Committees of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce will meet Friday noon at the Tourist Center to discuss plans for the formation of an organization for the purpose of obtaining defense contracts for county firms.

Secretary Edward Higgins announced today, Luncheon will be served at the meeting, which will start at 12:15 P. M.

Mr. Higgins is expected to make a report of his investigation and the information he has obtained in regard to forming a coordinated pool for the purpose of securing from the Office of Production Management contracts for defense work that can be handled by the existing firms.

Russians Launch Another Attack West Of Moscow

(By Associated Press) The Red Army had launched an attack on the Germans massed at Moshak, 57 miles west of Moscow, and a savage battle is still raging. The German command announced Russian attacks in the Taganrog area, 10 miles west of Rostov.

British Cairo headquarters said allied troops had moved forward into new positions against Axis holdouts in their Palfaya border area of Egypt.

A vast Axis air assault in the Mediterranean appeared to be well under way Wednesday night as German and Italian planes battered unceasingly the British island of Malta, across Libya, and attacked imperial troops attempting to encircle the Nazi tank General Rommel.

British planes also were increasingly active, and the future of the battle of Libya appeared to hinge more and more on Malta's ability to stand up under repeated Axis air attacks.

Continuing westward advances by the Red Army, steadily drawing lighter the noose about the Germans in the strongly-held salient of Moshak, 57 miles west of Moscow, were announced by the Soviet information bureau in Moscow.

State Road Revenues Expected To Be Cut

TALLAHASSEE, Jan. 15.—The rationing, restricted automobile sales and other wartime factors may whack \$2,500,000 off the State Road Department's revenues in 1942.

Chairman Thomas A. Johnson used the figure Wednesday in discussing 1942 budget plans which will start here Monday. The budget will be adopted in March.

Various sources, including some in Washington, have estimated decreases ranging from 10 to 25 percent in taxable gasoline consumption this year as compared with last year. Mr. Johnson figured about 15 percent cut in Florida.

President Will Act On Time Saving Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Congressional action was completed by the House today on legislation for nationwide daylight saving time which would advance all clocks one hour. The Senate acted yesterday.

The measure will become effective 30 days after President Roosevelt signs it.

Whistle Will Give Signals

Airplanes Will Fly Over Area To Take Pictures Of Scene

Whistle signals for tonight's blackout will start at 8:30 o'clock, three short and one long blast (This does not concern the general public but is a call for defense officials to occupy their stations).

9:03 o'clock, continuous short blasts for two minutes (This is the black-out signal, and lights of all kind must be put out).

9:30 o'clock, continuous blasts for one minute (Signaling the end of the blackout period).

In the event the whistle is not heard, defense officials warned residents to extinguish all lights at 9:00 P.M. sharp anyway.

Sanford and Seminole County are ready and waiting for the first blackout test in the county's history for a half-hour tonight, defense officials reported today.

In conjunction with eight other central Florida counties, Seminole County will be blacked out from 9:00 P. M. to 9:30 P. M. and a siren will sound from the War Department through the Third Interceptor Command at Tampa.

The whistle at the roundhouse, near the depot, will be used as the signal for starting and ending the blackout. At 8:30 P. M., a victory signal of three short and one long blast will be given as notice to members of the 51 Defense Council committees and other defense workers to take their previously designated stations. At 9:00 P. M., a continuous blast lasting two minutes will herald the period of darkness, the official start of the test. At 9:30 P. M., one-minute whistle will signal the end of the blackout.

Complete preparations have been made by every branch of the county and city and county law enforcement agencies and the War Department. It was stated, Air raid wardens who had 100 percent attendance at a special meeting Tuesday night, have received full instructions from County Warden Leo R. Lasher, Chief of Police, Dr. Willibald Plochl, in charge of the Civil Protection Division, will pass out leaflets to all citizens at their homes in the county. Capt. F. C. Horner of Company C will place his men at stations in accordance with requests by Chief Warden Lasher. Sheriff H. C. Hester, Chief of Police, Cleveland has a list of volunteer firemen who will be called for instant duty. Defense officials here have contacted all communities in the county and arranged for full cooperation at every point.

Leaflets have been distributed to homes in the county under the direction of air wardens, in which blackout instructions are given. Charles Morrison, manager of the Rite Theater, announced that the blackout would not affect the theater, which will be open as usual.

Sea-foam-Olefin-Kemol-Jet's officials will act at the eighth number of races from 11 to 10, and observe the blackout, running three races before 9:00 P. M., and the remainder after the half hour period ends.

Man will be stationed at all important buildings, cross-roads, bridges and other points considered necessary in the county. Army planes will be overhead. (Continued on Page 1)

Tonight's Blackout

Tonight Seminole County participates in a nine-county Central Florida blackout affecting some 250,000 persons for the first time in this war. It should not be necessary to urge our readers to co-operate wholeheartedly with these maneuvers...

But before blackouts can become effective they must be complete. One light carelessly left burning in an attic window or on a street corner can lead a whole squadron of enemy planes to a thickly populated community otherwise in total darkness.

This will take practice. It is almost more than can be expected the first night. But it must be our goal. And we must achieve that goal in the shortest possible time.

Business men should not take it for granted that the janitor will turn off the lights at the store. They should see to that themselves. They should not overlook that little automatic device which turns on their electric signs.

Residents who stay in their homes should not take it for granted that their Venetian blinds or heavy draperies are opaque and will prevent beams from their brightly lighted rooms from penetrating the darkness outside.

Take no chances. Get those lights off. Play the game. And you will keep out of trouble.

Successes In Business

The Tampa Times agrees with us that war should not be allowed to interfere any more than is absolutely necessary with Florida's customary business of entertaining the tourists, or as the Times says, "to blackout Florida's floral displays."

"Moreover," continues the Times, "visitors and residents ought to continue to visit the public parks, private gardens and flower shows as refreshing relief from war thought and as a reminder of the fact that this can be a beautiful world when the ugly blots on it are wiped out."

Breaking Game Laws

If you ever have the urge to break a hunting or fishing law in Florida, this is warning in advance that you run a big chance of being apprehended, in the act or found guilty in some other way, says the Titusville Star-Advocate.

A total of 201 arrests were made during November, largest number reported in several years. In all, 89 were fined for jumping the gun and hunting before the season opened. Other violations resulted in arrests as follows:

- Hunting without a license, 27; fishing without a license, 17; hunting in game breeding ground, 13; possession of undersized fish, 10; discharging firearms on state roads No. 26 and 27, 9; possession of raccoon hides during closed season, 7; hunting on closed day, 6; selling fish without a license, 5; taking game after sunset, 4; hunting boats without a license, 3; trapping during closed season, 2; discharging firearms on Tamiami Trail, 2; fishing with more than one pole, 2; taking wood duck, 2.

YOUR FEDERAL INCOME TAX

RETURNS OF INCOME OF MINORS

NO. 13 An individual, although a minor, who is single, or is married and not living with husband or wife for any part of the taxable year, is required to render a return of income if he has a gross income of his own of \$750 or over for the taxable year.

Where a minor is married and living with his spouse for part of the taxable year, and each has income and their combined income is \$1,500 or over, they must each make a return for his or her income.

The Internal Revenue Code, as amended, provides for only one normal tax rate, and that is 4 percent. It is upon the normal tax net income—that is, the net income less the sum of (1) allowable personal exemption and credits for dependents, (2) the interest on obligations of the United States and its instrumentalities, and (3) an earned income credit of 10 percent of the amount of the earned net income but not in excess of 10 percent of the amount of the net income.

If the net income is \$3,000, more than \$300 earned net income would be deductible from the net income. The entire amount of the taxpayer's net income up to and including \$3,000, regardless of the source, is considered earned net income.

The surtax is imposed upon the entire amount of surtax net income. In the computation of the surtax net income the only credit allowed is the earned net income and the credit for dependents.

The rates of surtax increase as the amount of the surtax net income increases. For instance, if the surtax net income is not over \$2,000, the surtax is 2 percent of the surtax net income. course, the audit of their returns discloses most of these errors, but not all of them, that are due to negligence or lack of understanding of the income tax law and regulations.

Care is taken in drafting the instructions for filling out the forms to make them simple and easily understood. The taxpayer should study these instructions before making out his or her return.

The head of a family, as defined by the income tax regulations, is an individual who actually supports and maintains in one household one or more individuals who are closely connected to him by blood relationship, relationship by marriage or by adoption, and whose right to exercise family control and provide for these dependent individuals is based upon some moral or legal obligation. As such, he or she is entitled to a personal exemption of \$1,500.

A credit of \$400 is allowed for each dependent. A dependent is one under 18 years of age, or one who is physically or mentally defective and incapable of self-support. He need not live with nor be related to the taxpayer.

If husband and wife contribute to the support of a dependent, the \$400 credit may be taken by the one contributing the chief support, and it may not be divided between them. Likewise, if two members of a family contribute to the support of a dependent, the one who contributes more than one-half of the support may claim the credit.

Both the personal exemption and the credit for dependents must be prorated when the status of the taxpayer changes during the year, except when the taxpayer is eligible and elects to determine his tax at the optional rates with the use of the simplified Form 1042A.

If a taxpayer occupies the status of the head of a family solely by reason of the existence of one or more dependents for whom he would otherwise be entitled to the credit of \$400, the credit of \$400 in respect of one of such dependents is not allowable. For example, a widower who occupies the status of a head of a family solely by reason of the fact that he is maintaining a home for two dependent children under 18 years of age is entitled to the credit of \$400 allowed for one such dependent, and the credit for the other dependent is not allowable.

SARASOTA, Jan. 15.—(Special)—Florida, through the United Daughters of the Confederacy, will dedicate a monument here on Jan. 27 to Judah P. Benjamin, holder of three Confederate cabinet offices, who fled through Florida after the fall of Richmond. It was announced today by Mrs. Mary Brownell, chairwoman in charge of arrangements.

Schools and business establishments are planning to close that day while Gov. Spens-

sard L. Holland comes here to officiate at the ceremonies for the distinguished Jewish statesman.

When members of the fleeing Confederate cabinet and President Jefferson Davis separated near Washington, Ga., on May 7, 1865, Mr. Benjamin continued down through Georgia and the west coast of Florida to be joined by a farmer in search of land on which to settle, riding in a buggy. Meanwhile, President Davis headed for Texas. Eventually, Mr. Benjamin, who had been successively attorney general, secretary of war and secretary of state to President Davis, found a welcome and temporary refuge at the Goswile mansion near Bradenton until arrangements could be

State May Produce "Rubber" Plants

BABSON PARK, Jan. 15.—(Special)—Roger M. Babson has called a meeting of government officials and representatives of the nation's rubber industry as well as leading scientists and others to make a study and survey of the possibilities of producing rubber in Florida.

The late Thomas A. Edison, Harvey Firestone and others conducted years of research and while their experiments with goldenrod proved unsuccessful

they uncovered much valuable information on the subject. Recent experiments with another plant in southern California have proved successful and Intercontinental Company feels confident that the commercial production of the shrub known as grayule will prove the solution to the rubber shortage problem. The same company is now experimenting with the growing of this plant in south Florida and a report of their progress will be heard at the conference called by Mrs. Babson, which is scheduled for Feb. 18 at Webber College at Babson Park.

The Sun Oil Company of Texas is reported to have leased an additional 1,310 acres in the Parrish section of Manatee county. This transaction brings to a total of 45,600 the number of acres that have been leased for gas and oil rights in Manatee county within the past three months. Leases are also being taken by the Humble Oil and Refining Company and the Gulf Refining Company in that area, and architects will shortly begin the designing of 275 low cost rural homes for low income farm families in the 21 counties west of the Suwannee River. The project, directed by

the Northwest Florida Regional Housing Authority, will be known as the Sarah Delano Roosevelt Rural Homes.
