All the propagandists and news bluffs will be unrolled for the real thing when local fans will be invited through the open gates for a sneak preview of the first ever entrance of the baseball club.

Sanford seems pretty well secured behind the plate with rookies Silverthorne and Bob Kuznetsov (pronounced 'MEAN'). Both are 20 or over and Silverthorne carries with his 26 games in O.L. from last year.

Orlando will have veteran catcher and manager Don Ford back of the bat. Ford hit .284, a good average for a receiver, and drove in 62 runs. Bill Rhoads, .378 hitting outfielder is back again. Both these guys hit ball or all of their homers in the inviting confines of the Memorial Stadium. Ben Zingone, an anemic hitting outfielder is back as is Roy Zimmerman, Joe Valmas, two clutch hurlers.

Ticket sales for Monday night's inaugural are going like hot cakes down at the Cardinal ticket booth in front of Touchon's. Latest tabulation shows 213 season tickets already sold and money collected on 260 books of 10 tickets plus 700 reserve tickets for the Monday opener have sold.

J. C. Dunn Is Tabbed As "Best" Playing Pilot In FSL This Year

Just as Chuck Aleno was tabbed the "babe" charge, so J.C. Dunn is being called the "best" playing pilot in this year's FSL. Dunn is being called the "best" playing pilot in the State League this year.

The rugged 27-year-old right hander who packs his first muscles on a one-armed frame is the perfect embodiment of a manager's dream. Dunn, who has been in the game since 1919, is a perfect blend of the past and the present.

Dunn is an industry veteran of four years service in Europe with the U. S. Army during World War II. He broke into organized ball in 1919 after attending Southern College in Durant, Okla. for three and one-half years. In his opening season he smacked 127 home runs on a total .384 average with 42 double, 14 triple and 16 home runs for a total of 251 hits and 111 runs scored in 131 games. He also swiped 35 bases in 1919 with Lebanon of the Class C North Atlantic League.

Moving up to Winston-Salem of the Class D State League, Dunn dropped to .307 in only 81 hits for 1950. In 1951 he played 112 contests, smacking 12 home runs and pilfering 31 steals, but his average dipped below the .300 mark.

Daytona Leads, DeLand, Sanford Tie For All-Time FSL Victories

Daytona Beach, DeLand, and Sanford are the Florida State League's most dependable top teams, it is indicated in official all-time won and lost records revealed at league headquarters here today.

The Islanders boast a .527 average after 13 years of play in which they have appeared in 1,746 regular season games, winning 921 and losing 825.

The DeLand Red-Hats have played the most games—1,760—in 13 years, and boast a .526 percentage thru winning 920 and losing 834.

The Sanford Cardinals, charter members of the loop, also have a .526 mark after 13 years, appearing in 1,692 winning 890 and losing 802. The records:

SILVER SPRINGS (Special)—Only five of the 166 men who have been chosen by the Florida State League's several managers and sportswriters for All-Star Team honors will be in uniform when the circuit starts its 14th season of play Monday night.

They are: Manager Ray Dunno of DeLand, winner as catcher in 1949, 1950, 1951, and 1952; Manager Red Treadway of Jax Beach, right field winner in 1950; Mike Kassaban of Palatka, left field winner in 1951; Al Pirle of Palatka, right field winner in 1948 and 1949.

Wearing the familiar blue of an umpire is another two-time All-Star as a catcher—Johnny Tomcoff who won out in 1947 and 1948.

Hurlers Face Big Task In Cracking State Loop Marks

SILVER SPRINGS (Special)—Florida State League pitching corps which will get its feet wet in spirited competition Monday night will have to reach sensational heights in order to equal or break existing individual records inside nine innings, it is indicated in official all-time figures released at league headquarters here today.

For instance, who wants to equal Mason Leeper's record of walking 19 men while with Gainesville against Sanford, July 10, 1917? Yet, who wouldn't mind breaking Leeper's other amazing record—28 Orlando Senators fanned for Gainesville on May 30, 1947?

It is doubtful that any pitcher will ever hurl 21 innings in one game in the FSL again as old Mill Rat of Palatka when he lost to Sanford, 8 to 7 on May 27, 1948.

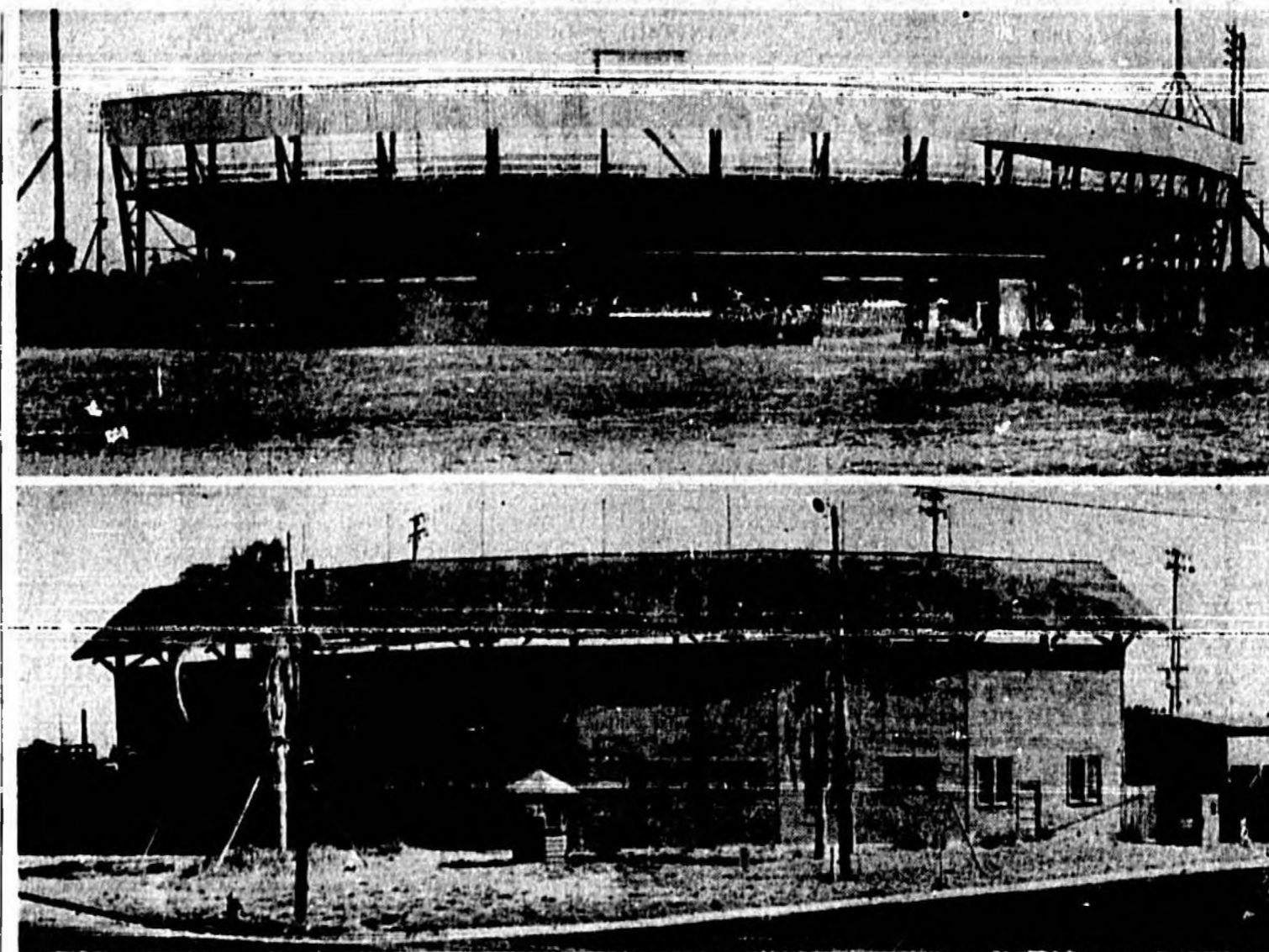
League rules now prevent any inning starting after 12:50 a.m., so it meant that a hurler would have to start a double-header about 7 p.m., and stretch it into two full games and three more frames, all before 12:50 a.m.

Dopey loan of Sanford holds the enviable record of having won the most games in a row—17, back in 1939. Walley Gaddis of Daytona won 20 straight for Daytona a few years ago but 11 came in order as the 1919 season ended, and nine more went to his win credit at the start of the 1920 season.

Longest all-time losing streak was set by Brannan of Leesburg in 1948 when he dropped 12 straight.

Record for the most regular season scoreless innings pitched is held by Nick Gunnato of St. Augustine who came through with 28 in 1947. Davis of Orlando pitched 40 in 1948 but four were in the first play-off game, so the record doesn't officially count.

Too, the fabulous Pierce Corley of Gainesville left-handed his way through four consecutive shut-outs in the playoffs of 1938—36 consecutive scoreless innings. He also blanked his opponents in the final

Using the modern park last year for the first time, the Sanford club doubled its attendance from 19,000 in 1951 to 38,360 in 1952. Local baseball officials predict a record opening crowd of 2,100 will jam their way into the Memorial Stadium to witness Monday's contest. Last year's opener attracted nearly 2,000 fans in bitter cold weather.

2,762 Paid To See Tilt Here In 1952

The second straight year, officials of the Florida State League have accorded Sanford the privilege of having the annual FSL All-Star classic played in the Memorial Stadium again this summer. It wasn't a question of deciding where the 1953 dream game should be played so much as it was a problem to convince the Sanford club officials that it had to be played in the City and that the local club "must" be stay here in the league.

This was last fall. Since that time, whether out of a moral obligation, or whether out of the love of the game, or both, such men as Cardinal President John D. Callahan, J. C. Davis, John Hider, Jim Fields, Zeb Hatfield, Bobby Swann, W. A. Morrison and many others shouldered the task of putting the local debt-ridden franchise back on a solvent and working basis.

The results of their efforts have born fruition with 136 season tickets, 70 books of 10, and the 70 reserve tickets have been sold for Monday night's opening game.

The night of June 23 has been designated for the 10th annual FSL All-Star game in Sanford. It is the evening after the first half ends and the night before the second half of the season commences.

For the second straight year the two teams will be composed of players from the four teams representing the northern region of the circuit and the four other clubs situated in the Southern district.

Last year 2,762 cash customers deluged the new park, spilling out of the grandstands and bleachers jamming both sides of the foul lines out to the outfield barrier.

While the total gate was 2,762, there were actually more than 4,200 spectators on hand for the big clash, which was won in the bottom of the ninth by the favored North, 3-2. Hundreds of club directors, press, radio, county, baseball representatives and loop officials poured through the gates free to add further congestion to the already overcrowded park.

It was the largest paid crowd since the stadium was built in Gainesville when 3,631 paid their way to attend the game.

As FSL president Jack Dempsey put it recently, Sanford must be commended for its wonderful baseball plant. With such a park available, it would be nothing less than a crime if the league didn't utilize it for just such a game.

Pennant Winning Players To Share \$1,120 FSL Purse

SILVER SPRINGS (Special)—Reminding all Florida State League players that assure of an \$1,120 purse is only one of several reasons why all players should do their best to play Grade A baseball throughout the season, League President Jack Dempsey expressed the hope at league headquarters here today that "1953 will produce more potential top

bracket stars than any season in our past 14."

Pointing out that league directors intend to award a purse of that amount as a reward to the players on the pennant winning team, Dempsey stressed the fact that this "might well be incentive enough for our fine crop of rookies ready to get off to a fast start. I find youngsters respond best when the stakes are high."

He reminded club owners and fans again that in 1953 the pennant will be won by the team winning the abbreviated three-out-of-five game play-off that will be in order if a different team wins each half of the 140-game season.

In other years, he said, the pennant went to the team with the highest percentage at the end of

the regular season, the Shaugnessy playoff that followed being a sort of anticlimax.

"Of course," he concluded, "if one team wins both halves, its players will be the pennant winners. They will divide the purse, while the owner will be the loser in that while salaries thru a play-off may cut up any net proceeds from admissions, concession stand sales usually are the profit-making item."

However, should there be a play-off, it will start on Sept. 1, be a three-out-of-five game affair that, barring rain, could end not later than the night of Sept. 5.

The oldest player on the Cincinnati Reds' roster is southbay hurler Ken Raffensberger. He will be 36 on Aug. 8.

2-Veteran Limit Will Be Enforced By FSL President

SILVER SPRINGS (Special)—With the Class D Florida State League season only three days away, President Jack Dempsey reported an unusual amount of fan interest all around the circuit in the promise that the loop's new "two veteran" rule will mean faster and more exciting play on the part of a "fine looking" crop of rookies.

"As we approach season's opening next Monday night," Dempsey said, "fans everywhere are fast agreeing that some of the best looking rookie prospects ever seen in the state are now wearing uniforms in every league city. Many of the youngsters saw action in service teams while others are fresh from semi-pro or college ranks of importance. I look for immediate public acceptance of our directors' decision to reduce the unlimited veteran requirement from four to two men per club."

This decision by the directors was the most important of all voted during the winter, he declared. In dropping the two veterans, directors also voted that all clubs must at all times have

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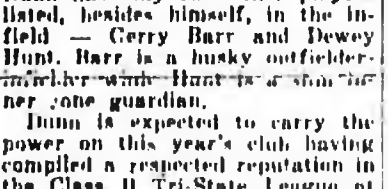

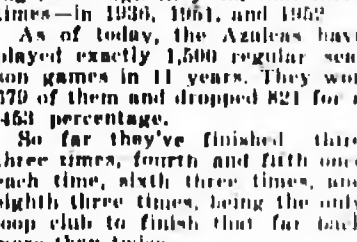

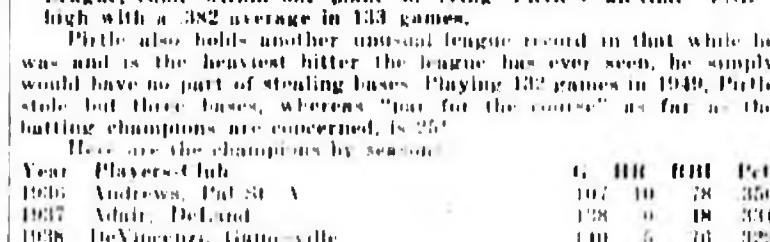

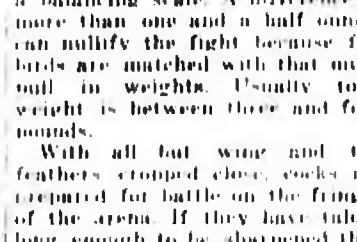
