Worker Relations Commission May Be Revamped In Sanford

By DONNA ESTES Herald Staff Writer A new ordinance revamping Sanford's Public Employees Relations Commission (PERC) is scheduled to be adopted on final reading at the 7 p.m. Sanford City Commission meeting.

Although the city has had its own PERC for several years and is one of the few cities in the state to qualify for such an organization, new state law requires that the authorizing or-

dinance be amended. The major change, required by the state and called for in the new ordinance, is that PERC members will not be employees the commission, have resigned because of the new state law.




