

### Who'll Get SS Raise Burden?

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Social Security taxes will be raised, but Congress is having a problem determining who should pay them.

The Senate today was considering a bill putting the increased tax burden much more heavily on employers than employees. But, the House last week passed a bill raising Social Security payroll taxes equally for both. Sen. Robert Dole, R-Kan., planned to propose the House provision on the Senate floor.

### Watergate Burglar Charged

NEW YORK (UPI) - Convicted Watergate burglar Frank Sturgis is being held in lieu of \$25,000 bail for allegedly threatening a government witness who reportedly told a congressional committee she accompanied Sturgis and Lee Harvey Oswald to Dallas three days before President Kennedy's

Sturgis, 12, was arraigned in Manhattan Criminal Court Tuesday on charges of attempted coercion and aggravated harassment of a government witness.

### Mrs. King Urges Boycott

ATLANTA (UPI) - The widow of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. Tuesday urged the Carter administration to ban all American trade with South Africa and encourage a worldwide boycott of the apartheid regime.
In a statement issued through the Martin
Luther King Jr. Center for Social Change,
which she formed after her husband's assassination, Coretta Scott King endorsed the president's six-month ban on arms sales to the South Africans. However, she said American sanctions should go further in pressing the government of John Voorster to move toward black rule.

### **ERA Roadblock Is Removed**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Justice Department has cleared a major roadblock to ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment, advising Congress it can double the period for state approval of the constitutional amend-

The opinion immediately was criticized by opponents of the ERA. "It's changing rules in the middle of the game," said Phyllis Schlafly, a leader of anti-ERA forces. "It's ike playing football and adding a fifth quarter o you can catch up."

The Justice Department opinion, delivered o a House subcommittee and the White House, said Congress has the right to extend the period of state ratification from 7 to 14 years. State legislatures that already have ratified the amendment cannot rescind the approval, the department said.



# Special Exception Extension Is Sought For Plant

granted Orlando a special exception to permit construction of a sewage treatment plant on agriculturally zoned land.

One of the conditions of that special exception to the zoning was that Orlando begin construction within the six months. On Dec. 7, that six-month period ends, but construction on the plant has not begun, nor is it likely to by then, according to Orlando officials.

Orlando Public Works Director Paul Mathes Tuesday urged commissioners to grant an additional six-month extension. Commissioners delayed consideration of the request until next Tuesday's meeting, claiming they need more time to study the

The state Department of Environmental Regulation (DER) and federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) must approve construction and design details, said Mathes, and the project, though "proceeding smoothly" is still "under review" by the

.EPA has approved a Seminole County site for the Orlando "cost-effective proposed by the city."

The special exception was necessary because the sewage reatment plant site is on land zoned agricultural. Without the special exception extension, the plant cannot be built at the Iron

"Orlando has purchased the property," Mathes told com-missioners. "Several things have happened which show progress and Orlando's good faith to build the plant," which will pump 24 nillion gallons of treated waste water into the Little

conlockhatchee River each day. "Orlando officials will advertise for bids on the pro 'sometime after the first of the year," said Mathes. The city will undertake a federally-funded \$175,000 program to investigate the possibility of lightly spraying the treated waste

Bridge area. County commissioners had insisted on such a program when they approved the special exception:

Commission Chairman Dick Williams pointed out EPA had recently released "new waste load allocations" which would allow pumping effluent into Central Florida waterways. Such pumping had been prohibited by EPA, except in the case of the Little Econ, for future sewage treatment plants.

"Any plant now can go to a surface body of water outside of the Iron Bridge plant," Williams told Mathes. "Are you going to build a plant which nobody will hook up to?"

'We won't build it until we get some written agreements to hook up," Mathes answered. Only Maitland has signed such an agreement with Orlando so far, the public works director said. Economically speaking, other governments will go to Iron Bridge because it will be cheaper than building advanced waste

General Waterworks in Orlando and Orange County to hook up to the plant. "With those three, the plant could go," said Mathes Others considering joining the Iron Bridge sewage treatment system include Seminole County (unincorporated areas),

Casselberry, Winter Springs and Winter Park. Commissioners asked how much sewage carrying cap would be taken up by Orange County. Orlando, the waterwood and the Navy base. EPA will permit treatment of up to

million gallons of sewage a day at Iron Bridge. "There will be no allocations of carrying capacity." prohibited by law, unless a government wants to pay for reseving carrying capacity," Mathes said. "Everybody will have chance to go into the system as soon as the line is built." "How much carrying capacity is left?." asked Com

### Now Is The Time For Heavy Caution

The South African government's crackdown on lack consciousness movements offends, as it hould, the canons of morality and democracy, It is the sweeping nature of the crackdown — including the outlawing of 17 black protest groups, the closing of the major black newspaper, and the arrest or detention of some 70 protest leaders—that would seem to call for something more, surely this time, than the official outrage expressed by Hodding

Carter at the State Department.
Indeed, officials in Washington apparently feel that there is something weefully inadequate about this response: that, in a sort of eye-for-eye understanding, the American condemnation does not fit the South African crime. No doubt it is this sense of justice out of kilter that has driven the ad-

ministration to announce a review, in light of the crackdown, of its policy towards South Africa.

And yet, what can the administration do? How can its policy be changed? How, that is, to ensure that its sense of justice is satisfied? One U.S. official has suggested the application of diplomatic and economic pressures against South Africa, but these tourniquets already are in place, and their lightening very well might be pointless, counterproductive, and even anti-climactic. erproductive, and even anti-climactic.

embargoes probably would work like our current embargo of arms sales: the South Africans would buy the forbidden goods elsewhere. ust as they buy all the arms they want elsewhere. As for American financial investments, the United States might forbid these, but then it would be hard o see which would be the net loser, the Vorster regime or the Bantu. And in the area of diplomacy, he administration might instruct Andrew Young to open wide his mouth, but Mr. Young already has hit his highest notes of denunciation of apartheid. Besides all of which, it is useful to remember that he United States is counting on South African cooperation in achieving black rule in Rhodesia, a cooperation likely to diminish or vanish with the and-or economic pressures upon Johannesburg.

There is very little, then, that the United States can do to influence the internal affairs of South Africa, either now, with the crackdown, or later, with other occasions of the government's repression of the black man. And the very little the ited States can do has already been done by lodding Carter, who has sounded the necessary mfriendly noises.

What this means for the administration's sense f justice disturbed is that justice will remain sturbed, but in dealing with the complexities of outh Africa, as well as Rhodesia and South-West Africa, this may not be such a bad thing. These are perhaps the most inviting places in the world for the United States to wage a war of morality. Because they are so inviting, and because, as our own experience should teach us, wars of morality often lead to shooting wars, we should be cautious.

# 'Latch Key' Kids Roam The Streets

WASHINGTON - The City streets are full of "latch key" kids, the children of working mothers who cannot find or afford child care

Teenaged pregnancies are reaching epidemic proportions. Wifebeating, the hidden shame of countless families, is a crime without punishment in many states.

Spiraling divorce rates are creating an evergrowing class of newly disadvantaged citizens— the "displaced homemakers," who have neither the job skills nor the training to support themselves and their children.

These are serious social problems that exact a devastating toll among women who make up a majority of the American people.

All are scheduled for intensive discussion in

Houston from Nov. 18-21 when the observance of the International Women's Year will culminate with a national conference of nearly 2,000 delegates elected from every state in the union. And yet, such issues are in danger of being lost in the tummult and shouting that now ap-pears inevitable over more inflammatory subjects like abortion and the Equal Rights

By the thousands, anti-abortion and anti-ERA women are expected to coverge on Houston for rallies and demonstrations outside the con-ference. And by the thousands, feminists who

Organizers of the conference are deeply and justifiably concerned that the entire exercise, which is being funded by Congress, will wind up being perceived as an angry screaming match that simply gives the entire women's movement

It wasn't supposed to happen this way. Early the year, when the first state meetings were held to elect delegates to the Houston con-ference, everything was moving smoothly. By late spring, however, the National Women's Conference suddenly became the target of a variety of conservative groups and

churches ranging from the John Birch Society to the Mormon Church. In state after state, right-wingers who had never shown any interest in women's issues began showing up at the delegate-selection meetings and electing their own slates to the

By the time the state meetings had ended, ervatives bent on turning the National Women's Conference into a political con-frontation had succeeded in electing up to 20 percent of the delegates who will be in Houston.

Since then, they have been drilling those delegates in parliamentary tactics designed to disrupt the conference, organizing anti-feminist rallies and trying to block the Houston meeting from being held, through lawsuits and lobbying before sympathetic members of Congress.

# Seminole County Happy Over Federal Grant For Jail

By MARK WEINBERG Herald Staff Writer

Seminole County officials were glad to receive a \$3.4-million federal grant to build a new jail complex at Five Points. They weren't so happy to read the fine print. Uncle Sam never gives anything away without expecting something in return, and in the case of federal construction grants, county officials must insure that contractors and subcontractors follow provisions of several federal laws.

executive orders and agency rules.

It all adds up to additional costs, which contractors must figure into the competitive bids they submit for federally-financed construction contracts. In all cases, the federal requirements include submission to federal agencies of moun-tains of forms certifying details of how the federal commandments will be fulfilled. It also means aggravation for con-tractors who bid on federally-financed

construction jobs. With construction going strong again in Seminole, county officials were dreading the possibility no contractors would bid Oct. 21 on site preparation work for the jail complex.

Three firms submitted bids, and the lowest — from James M. Barker Construction Co. of Jacksonville - was \$37,000 higher than the bid estimate prepared by ngineering consultants of Clark, Dietand Associates of Sanford.

Since the estimate was prepared purely on the basis of unit-price costs for similar construction projects in the Seminole County area, it did not take into consideration the added cost of following the federal rules.

The six main categories of such requirements are: -The Davis Bacon Act, which requires minimum salaries for construction workers according to federallydetermined prevailing wages for the area in which construction takes place. -The Copeland Act, which prohibits

contractors from collusion with suppliers or anyone in government agencies, and which requires weekly contractor certification that Davis Bacon wage rules are being followed.

— Anti-pollution laws, prohibiting water, air or noise pollution.

-Executive Order 11246, prohibiting discrimination in hiring for construction jobs financed by the federal government.

- The "Orlando Plan," which requires minimum percentages of minority group members in each building trade. -"Minority business enterprise" rules



them. But the longer he was there, the more good he did. He wasn't there 30 days when he became one of us. "Tom Seaver is the complete professional. This man knows how good he is. That doesn't mean he doesn't listen or that you can't bawl him out the same as anyone else on the ball club. He'll take it if he feels it's coming to him."

Seaver wound up the season winning 21 games, 14 of which were with the Reds, and compiled a 2.59 earnes, but average while striking out 196 batters, By contrast, Cariton won 23, had a 2.64 ERA and struck out 198. "Everyone says Seaver is going to win 30 games for us next year," Anderson says. "That's a lot easier said than done. You can't walk in and win 30. Remember, he'll only start 38 or 40 times. If he's healthy, he'll very likely go over the 20 mark, but he doesn't have to win 30 to justify his place with us. There'll be games where he'll go seven or eight innings and he won't get credit, but we'll win those games. They count in the standings

The increase, which translates into 9.6 percent annual rate, was consistent with economic forecasts promising a new surge of inflation approaching the double-digit range in the next few months.

Farm prices rose 2.4 percent in October, reversing a steady five-month decline that severely hurt income among the nation's farmers. Economists expect grain and beef prices soon will drive farm goods even higher. Higher prices for 1978 model cars and trucks brought a 2 percent rise in the cost of transportation equipment. All industrial prices rose 0.6 percent, and processed foods were up 0.8 percent.

October brought the biggest price increase in the wholesale market since a 1.1 percent increase in April. Wholesale prices have either declined or risen moderately in each month since then.

The Wholesale Price Index was 196.3 in October, up 5.9 percent over the past year. This means that goods costing \$100 a decade ago, now cost \$196.30 — almost double.

The wholesale index reflects costs at all stages of processing. Finished goods also rose 0.8 percent, and producer finished goods were up 1.5 percent - the biggest increase since

Foods ready for consumer sales rose 0.3 percent, the first increase in five months. Higher farm prices were blamed on

higher price supports, and some speculation in advance of newly announced Soviet grain purchases. Beef prices are expected to rise 10 to 15 percent in the next few months. Processed foods are now beginning to

reflect the result of earlier farm shortages. Prices rose for meats, poultry, fats and oils.

October's increase in industrial goods was more moderate than the 0.8 percent hike in September. In addition to automobiles and trucks, one of the biggest increases reported was for jewelry.

Machinery prices also rose a substantial 1 per cent, but fuels and power prices showed signs of moderating. The higher food prices were reflected today

in the Labor Department's report on wholesale prices during October. price increases of no less than 1 percent per

Ratajczak, chief of a highly regarded economic forecasting project at Georgia State University, expected October's food price increase would exceed 2 percent — with farm products up more than 3 percent.
