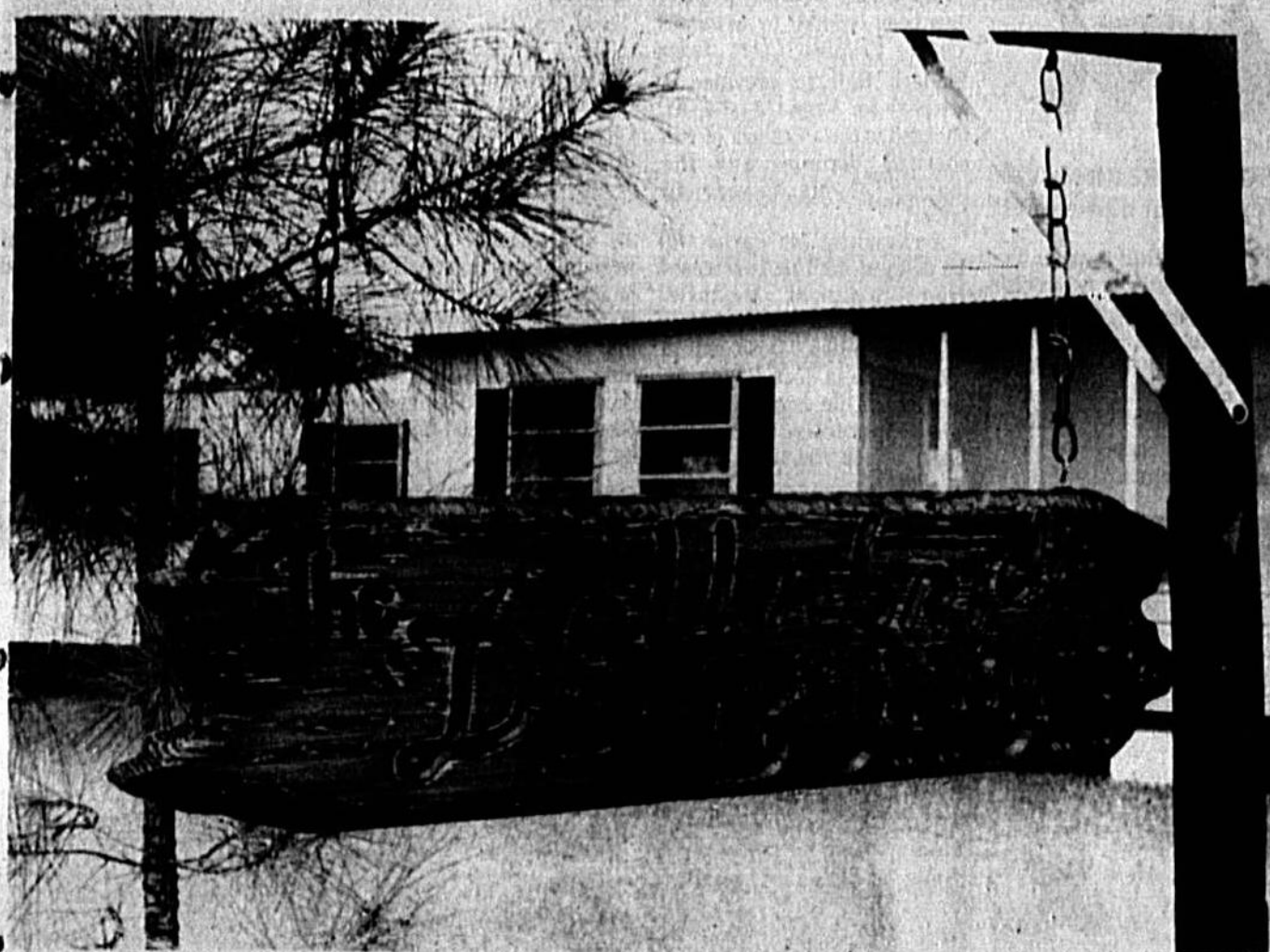

## The Dallabridas: Well-Remembered

Shocked and saddened by the tragic accident that took the lives of four family members and injured five others, friends of the Albert E. Dallabrida family of Miller Road, Sanford, are rallying to their support with expressions of sympathy and financial contributions.

The Flagship US Bank of Seminole said as of the 2 p.m. closing period Tuesday there was \$136 in the fund. In addition approximately \$200 has been collected at Seminole High School, Principal Don Reynolds said today. Other organizations also are organizing drives.

Mrs. Betty Dallabrida, 51, and her children Robert, 15, Robin, 16 and Richard, 14 all of

whom died as a result of the accident were buried today in Lake Mary Cemetery.

Upset over their loss, friends, neighbors and classmates praised the family as they shared their feelings.

"We were just like sisters," said Mrs. Mickey D. Herman, of Murdock Boulevard, Union Park, good friend and former neighbor of Mrs. Betty Dallabrida.

"She was a faithful friend and she helped me get through a recent death in my family. Betty was a dedicated member and librarian of the Women of the Sanford Moose Lodge No. 1851 of which Albert E. Dallabrida is a member, said the lodge is also taking up donations among the members to help the family.

Dallabridas when she was living at 2520 Palm Way, Sanford, and recently moved to Union Park. "They were a nice quiet family and the children were well-behaved. Robin was very talented and could sing. All I can do is praise the whole family, you couldn't ask for better people," Mrs. Herman said.

Mrs. Herman said the Winter Springs VFW Post and auxiliary, of which she and her husband are members, is going to donate a fund to aid the Dallabrida family.

Howard Price, secretary of the Sanford Moose Lodge No. 1851 of which Albert E. Dallabrida is a member, said the lodge is also taking up donations among the members to help the family.

"The boys often washed dishes after the weekly Friday night suppers at the lodge. The family was close and the kids didn't fuss and fight," he said. The Dallabridas had attended a

"We will probably have a fund-raising activity to benefit them as well," he added.

Price said the lodge would provide a luncheon for family and guests following the funeral services today for Robert, Robin, Richard and Mrs. Dallabrida.

Price said the Dallabridas participated in most of the lodge's activities. He said Dallabrida and the boys mowed the grass around the lodge on South Palmtoe Avenue, as well as homes around the city.

## Three Dallabrida Children Buried Today

Three children of the Albert Dallabrida family were to be buried today.

They were... but not alone. Their mother was buried, too.

All died of injuries suffered in a van-truck accident last Friday. The mother, Mrs. Albert (Betty) Dallabrida, 51, of Rt. 2, Miller Road off South Sanford Avenue, lost the battle for her life Tuesday night at Orange Memorial Hospital in Orlando where she had been since the Friday tragedy.

She and eight other members of her family were riding in the van that was slammed broadside on U.S. 17-92 near the Burger King Restaurant in Sanford.

Funeral services for the four were at 10 a.m. today.

Mrs. Dallabrida had been aided in her struggle to survive by life-support machines and medication, much in the manner of her son, 14-year-old Richard Dallabrida, who died Tuesday morning.

Bobby Dallabrida, 15, and Robin Dallabrida, 16, died Friday and Saturday, respectively.

The three youths were buried at Lake Mary Cemetery this morning. Mrs. Dallabrida was scheduled for burial at 4 p.m., according to a spokesman for the Gramkow Funeral Home.

Sanford police said charges may still be filed pending the outcome of an investigation.

The accident occurred at 8:45 p.m. on U.S. 17-92 just north of Airport Boulevard near the Burger King Restaurant. There were nine persons in the van. Mrs. Dallabrida rode in the front with her husband and grandson, Tod Miller, 5, who has been released from Seminole Memorial Hospital following surgery for a broken arm.

The only family member remaining hospitalized is Albert Dallabrida Jr., 20, who is listed in "good" condition at Seminole Hospital.

Three family members — father Albert, 53, and his two sons, Max, 12, and Frank, 18 had previously been released from

hospital care along with the driver of the truck, James Lane, 22, of Jacksonville.

Police said the van was attempting to cross the southbound lanes of U.S. 17-92 into the Burger King restaurant. By crossing in front of median strip the van was forced to travel briefly north in the southbound lanes and was hit by the 25-foot truck traveling south.

Ten-year residents of Sanford, a fund-raising effort has begun on the family's behalf with an account opened at Flagship US Bank of Sanford.

The Dallabridas reside in a mobile home on Miller Road off Sanford Avenue.

## County Won't Take Over SCA; Releases Program Funds

The Seminole County Commission this year will not attempt to assume direct control of the poverty-fighting programs of private, non-profit Seminole Community Action (SCA).

Commissioners Tuesday unanimously voted to release \$23,000 budgeted for SCA programs to the anti-poverty agency in accordance with a contract to be negotiated by December with the Rev. Amos Jones, SCA's executive director.

The contract will specify anti-poverty services to be undertaken by SCA and will specify terms of disbursing the county's \$23,000 contribution to SCA. The money will be disbursed throughout SCA's

budget year. Human Services Director Troy Todd said.

Negotiating the contract with the Rev. Jones will be Todd, who told commissioners a county takeover of SCA would take "at least 90 days" under regulations of the federal Community Services Agency, which has designated SCA as the county's anti-poverty agency for 11 years.

"We don't have the time to go through a change by December," said Todd. "There is adequate community interest to pursue the SCA program and to continue the programs uninterrupted. We should release the \$23,000 to SCA and study a possible change in administration of the anti-poverty programs in the coming months."

Commissioners will eventually decide whether to designate itself as the policy-making body for SCA. That function is now handled by SCA's board of directors, whose role would be reduced to determining the county's need for anti-poverty programs if the county assumes direct control of SCA.

Citing Orange County's takeover of its private anti-poverty agency, Commissioner Bill Kirchhoff had proposed in September studying a possible Seminole takeover of SCA. The change might result in more efficient spending of county money to fight poverty, Kirchhoff had said.

"My own thoughts are the county couldn't take these operations over in the time involved," Kirchhoff said. At last week's committee meeting,

county budget director Jeff Eichberger agreed to meet with the Rev. Jones to convert SCA's budget into a new format. Eichberger is developing for the county's departments. "Then we'll know what's going on with SCA," Kirchhoff said.

After hearing Todd tell commissioners, "Rev. Jones needs assurance of county funding in order to receive federal funds," Commissioner John Alexander moved to authorize negotiation of a contract with SCA and release the budgeted \$23,000 funds in accordance with the agreement.

Seconded by Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski, the motion passed unanimously.

"If SCA's programs are working, by all means I want the programs to continue,"

Todd said after the meeting. He had settled anti-poverty officials in county budget deliberations earlier this year by recommending against any county funds for SCA "until objective measures of program effectiveness have been provided."

In his report to the county's budget office, Todd had written: "It is the right of the poor to have a higher standard of living at the expense of the more affluent? Will gifts of food, home repair, utility payments and other material goods encourage the poor to achieve self-sufficiency without subsidy?... Community money contributors apparently have answered in the negative."

Tuesday, Todd said, "I've never questioned the efficiency of SCA. I'm not doing so now.

The provision will be included in the contract with SCA, said Todd. He had considered requiring submission to the county of only paid invoices but changed his mind, said the human services director.

"Half a dozen agencies we fund have signed contracts this year with the invoice provision in there," said Todd.

# Now Is The Time For Heavy Caution

The South African government's crackdown on black consciousness movements, as it should, the canons of morality and democracy, it is the sweeping nature of the crackdown — including the outlawing of 17 black protest groups, the closing of the major black newspaper, and the arrest or detention of some 70 protest leaders — that would seem to call for something more, surely this time, than the official outrage expressed by Hodding Carter at the State Department.

Indeed, officials in Washington apparently feel that there is something woefully inadequate about this response: that, in a sort of eye-for-eye understanding, the American condemnation does not fit the South African crime. No doubt it is this sense of justice out of kilter that has driven the administration to announce a review, in light of the crackdown, of its policy towards South Africa.

And yet, what can the administration do? How can its policy be changed? How, that is, to ensure that its sense of justice is satisfied? One U.S. official has suggested the application of diplomatic and economic pressures against South Africa, but these tourniquets already are in place, and their tightening very well might be pointless, counterproductive, and even anti-climactic.

Additional embargos probably would work like our current embargo of arms sales; the South Africans would buy the forbidden goods elsewhere, just as they buy all the arms they want elsewhere. As for American financial investments, the United States might forbid these, but then it would be hard to see which would be the net loser, the Vorster regime or the Bantu. And in the area of diplomacy, the administration might instruct Andrew Young to open wide his mouth, but Mr. Young already has hit his highest notes of denunciation of apartheid.

Besides all of which, it is useful to remember that the United States is counting on South African cooperation in achieving black rule in Rhodesia, a cooperation likely to diminish or vanish with the end or economic pressures upon Johannesburg. There is very little, then, that the United States can do to influence the internal affairs of South Africa, either now with the crackdown, or later, with other occasions of the government's repression of the black man. And the very little the United States can do has already been done by Hodding Carter, who has sounded the necessary incendiary noises.

What this means for the administration's sense of justice disturbed, but in dealing with the complexities of South Africa, as well as Rhodesia and South-West Africa, this may not be such a bad thing. These are perhaps the most inviting places in the world for the United States to wage a war of morality. Because they are so inviting, and because, as our own experience should teach us, wars of morality often lead to shooting wars, we should be cautious.

## Give SST Chance

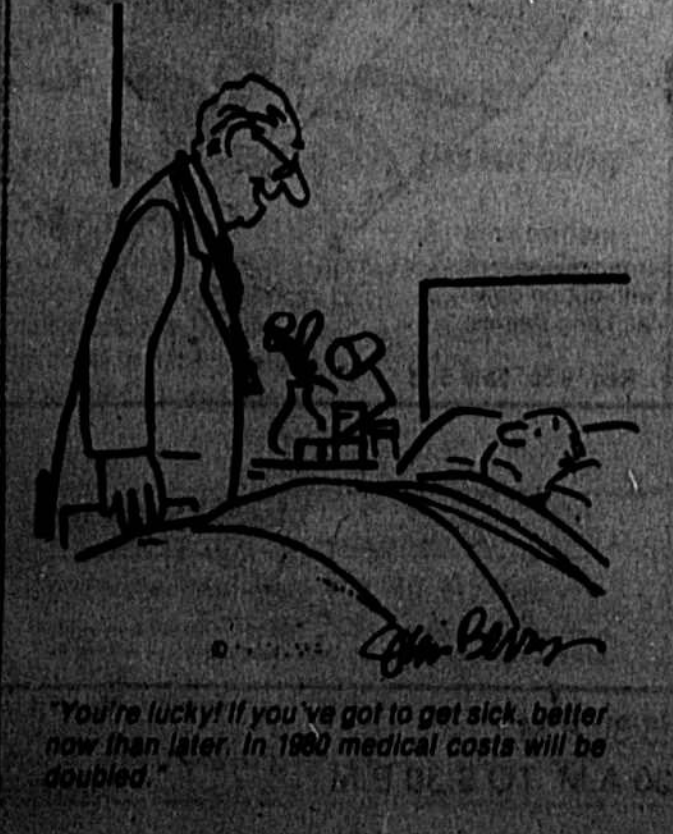
Admittedly, the "test" of the Concordie supersonic jet against New York City noise standards was performed under ideal conditions.

But the special procedures adopted for the effort to convince New Yorkers that they can live with the speedy craft resulted in about the same amount of noise as produced by slower planes. And the protesters who have made a political issue of the city's 18-month ban on the Concordie, developed jointly by Britain and France, should give the operators every opportunity to make their case. A court order paved the way for the "familiarization" flights that should have been permitted through the spirit of fair play.

The operating airlines insist that the New York market must be available to them to insure financial feasibility of the scheduled flights of the Concordie.

If the bird-behind plane can perform consistently within the noise limits established by sensitive New Yorkers, the agencies fighting commercial flight should abandon the battle. The United States dropped out of the competition to develop the speedier-than-sound passenger plane. Those who stayed with the effort, deserve the chance to recoup their investment.

## ANGLE-WALTERS 'Latch Key' Kids Roam The Streets

WASHINGTON — The city streets are full of "latch key" kids, the children of working mothers who cannot find or afford child care help.

Teenaged pregnancies are reaching epidemic proportions. Wifebeating, the hidden shame of countless families, is a crime without punishment in many states.

Spiraling divorce rates are creating an ever-growing class of newly disadvantaged citizens — the "displaced homemakers," who have neither the job skills nor the training to support themselves and their children.

These are serious social problems that exact a devastating toll among women who make up a majority of the American people.

All are scheduled for intensive discussion in Houston from Nov. 19-21 when the observance of the International Women's Year will culminate with a national conference of nearly 2,000 delegates elected from every state in the union.

And yet, such issues are in danger of being lost in the tumult and shouting that now appears inevitable over more inflammatory subjects like abortion and the Equal Rights Amendment.

By the thousands, anti-abortion and anti-ERAs women are expected to converge on Houston for rallies and demonstrations outside the conference. And by the thousands, feminists who support both will probably show up to counter the protesters.

Organizers of the conference are deeply and justifiably concerned that the entire exercise, which is being funded by Congress, will wind up being perceived as an angry screaming match that simply gives the entire women's movement a black eye.

It wasn't supposed to happen this way. Early in the year, when the first state meetings were held to elect delegates to the Houston conference, everything was moving smoothly.

By late spring, however, the National Women's Conference suddenly became the target of a variety of conservative groups and churches ranging from the John Birch Society to the Mormon Church.

In state after state, right-wingers who had never shown any interest in women's issues began showing up at the delegate-election meetings and electing their own slate to the Houston conference.

By the time the state meetings had ended, conservatives bent on turning the National Women's Conference into a political confrontation had succeeded in electing up to 20 percent of the delegates who will be in Houston.

Since then, they have been drilling those delegates in parliamentary tactics designed to disrupt the conference, organizing anti-feminist rallies and trying to block the Houston meeting from being held, through lawsuits and lobbying before sympathetic members of Congress.



## WASHINGTON WINDOW Torrijos And Drugs

By STEVE GERSTEL WASHINGTON (UPI) — On both sides, the fight over ratification of the Panama Canal treaties has become a no-holds-barred brawl.

Even the old Duke — John Wayne — has saddled up one more time to ride into battle on the side of the administration.

The lines are being drawn as the two sides — months in advance of a Senate vote — seek to fire grassroots support around the country.

Into this already delicate political situation, some opponents of the pacts have injected a completely alien factor — the moral character of Panamanian strongman Omar Torrijos.

The allegations surfaced by high-ranking conservatives are that Torrijos and members of his family are multi-bills deep in drug trafficking. Torrijos, in a recent interview with the Washington Star, denied the allegations.

And, indeed, the conservatives have not come up with any solid evidence that Torrijos himself is in the drug business. What they do have is a purported copy of intelligence reports from the Drug Enforcement Administration which could raise suspicions.

One quotes a confidential source who claims that one Ramiro Rivas, also a Panamanian, told him that he was in partnership with Torrijos in trafficking of drugs. Another has him linked with one Frank Marshall Jimenez in the same kind of business.

Although the evidence is skimpy at best, it was enough for Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., to ask Attorney General Griffin Bell to explain what has been done to investigate the allegations.

As another effective tactic, Livingstone recommended that the Panamanians generate grassroots pressure. This could be accomplished, he said, by recruiting businessmen and labor leaders to contact senators personally, by establishing close contacts with "key opinion-generators in each state" and by creating a citizens committee of "prominent Americans."

The committee, he suggested, should be "used as a vehicle to take out newspaper ads countering those placed in local newspapers by treaty opponents." He also had some advice on the advertising style: "The ads should be full-page, concise, attractive and composed with snappy journalism; no long-winded expostulations."

## RONALD REAGAN Lay Off S. Africa, Jimmy

Isn't it time we laid off South Africa for awhile? Already, in its first 10 months in office, the Carter administration has won the International Busbody championship with its non-stop scolding of South Africa and other allies whose internal policies don't suit it.

At the same time, Carter's unwaveringly applied human rights crusade has put the U.S. in first place for hypocrite-of-the-year award. The administration has studiously ignored the sorry state of human rights in such places as Vietnam, Cambodia, Cuba, Panama and most African nations.

Add to this its ignorance of South Africa's history and its misunderstanding of that nation's complex problems and you have a White House that is making matters worse — not better — for South Africa's blacks and colored (mixed race) citizens.

The recent harsh crackdown by the Vorster government on political and journalistic dissidents is partly due to the need it feels to put on a show of strength for hardliners so that it can win big in next month's elections. But, the repression can also be traced, in part, to the Carter administration's meddling.

South Africa had been making progress in improving things for its non-white citizens this year. The Africaner university announced it would begin admitting non-white students. Pretoria businesses signed a pledge supporting equal pay for equal work and non-discrimination in job promotions.

Although it is perfectly proper for opponents of the treaties to be shocked at the allegations, their revision should have no bearing on the pacts. It has to be presumed that supporters, including President Carter, aren't in favor of the drug trade either.

In May, Vice President Mondale told Vorster that the price of U.S. friendship would be one-man-one-vote in South Africa.

Andrew Young, when he visited South Africa, called the government "illegitimate," and said that blacks should mount an economic boycott.

But Jimmy Carter's famous Playboy interview last fall may hold the most revealing clue. He was asked if he had ever had "a failure of moral nerve." In his reply he cited "the fact that I didn't crusade at a very early stage for civil rights in the South, for the one-man-one-vote rule. It might be that now I should drop my campaign for president and start a crusade for black-majority rule in South Africa and Rhodesia."

It begins to look as if U.S. policy toward Africa is to be guided by Mr. Carter's guilt feelings.

more than two decades, this courageous editor has fought for civil liberties in South Africa. He is now under virtual house arrest — banned from speaking to reporters or even issuing written statements.

His crime? He wrote a column called "My Friend Steve Biko."

## FLORIDA IN BRIEF

### Probe Of State's Organized Crime Fight 'Ineffective'

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — State Rep. Eric Smith, chairman of the House Select Committee on Organized Crime, Tuesday said the Florida Department of Criminal Law Enforcement's ineffectiveness against organized crime should be investigated.

Speaking before the Northside Businessmen's Club, Smith, D-Jacksonville, called the FDCL's leadership "lackluster and weak."

He cited, as an example, FDCL head William Troelstrup's recent statement to his committee that he was unable to say how many men were needed to fight organized crime in Florida.

### Can't Sue Us, Mobil Says

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Mobil Oil, and six other companies say Attorney General Robert Shevin's power to sue them on price-fixing charges has not been established despite a U.S. Supreme Court decision in his favor.

The companies asked the Florida Supreme Court Tuesday to enjoin Shevin from pursuing his suit charging a total of 17 major oil firms with price-fixing, monopoly, illegal acquisition of assets of other corporations and agreeing not to compete.

### Big Cypress Oil Drilling

MIAMI (UPI) — Exxon U.S.A. plans to spend up to \$3 million early next year to drill four wells in the Big Cypress Swamp to determine the dimensions of its oil discovery there last spring, a spokesman said Tuesday.

A portion of the money will go for completion of the exploratory well which resulted in the discovery. Work at that site has been delayed through Florida's summer and fall rainy season for fear of causing environmental damage to the swamp, which has been designated a national preserve.

### Murder Suspect 'Competent'

MIAMI (UPI) — A 33-year-old suspect in the 1970 slaying of a police officer has been ruled mentally competent and ordered to stand trial for first degree murder Dec. 5.

Dade Circuit Judge Ellen Morphonios Tuesday ordered that William Garrett be tried for the May 23, 1970, slaying of Miami policeman Roland Lane II.

### Paula To Run With Eckerd?

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Public Service Commission Chairman Paula Hawkins will resign and run for lieutenant governor with Republican gubernatorial candidate Jack Eckerd next year, Commissioner Bill Bevis predicts.

"I expect there to be two vacancies on the PSC in 1978," Bevis said Tuesday.

Bevis says he probably will run for secretary of state instead of seeking reelection to the commission and Mrs. Hawkins will run with Eckerd.

### License Tag Confusion

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A delay by the state Supreme Court on a ruling involving the constitutionality of a 1977 insurance reform law is creating confusion about license tag renewal procedures, the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles reports.

## Panel Will Eye Topless

JACKSONVILLE, (UPI) — State Sen. Dan Scarborough announced the appointment Tuesday of a Senate subcommittee to look into the operation of topless and bottomless bars in Florida during the upcoming month.

"There's a lot of nudity taking place in establishments with beverage licenses and I feel some restrictions may be in order," said Scarborough, newly-installed chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee.

"Holding a beverage license is a privilege, not a green light to sponsor any type of activity a holder chooses," he said.

Scarborough, D-Jacksonville, said the subcommittee will conduct an in-depth review of the state's beverage laws. He said this is done periodically to update statutes and eliminate conflicts between state and local ordinances.

Sen. Sherman Winn, D-Miami, will head the subcommittee, Scarborough said, and Scarborough himself and Sen. Warren Henderson, R-Sarasota, will serve as subcommittee members.

Scarborough said he was surprised recently to visit a neighborhood bar in Jacksonville and discover topless entertainers.

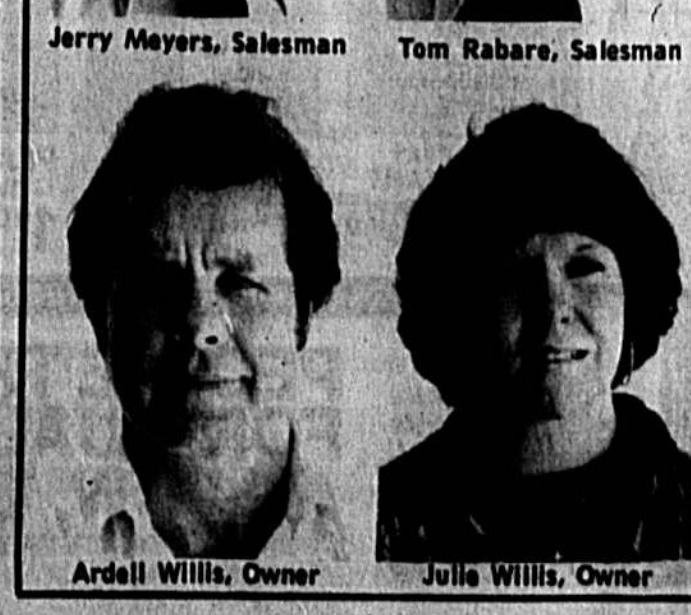

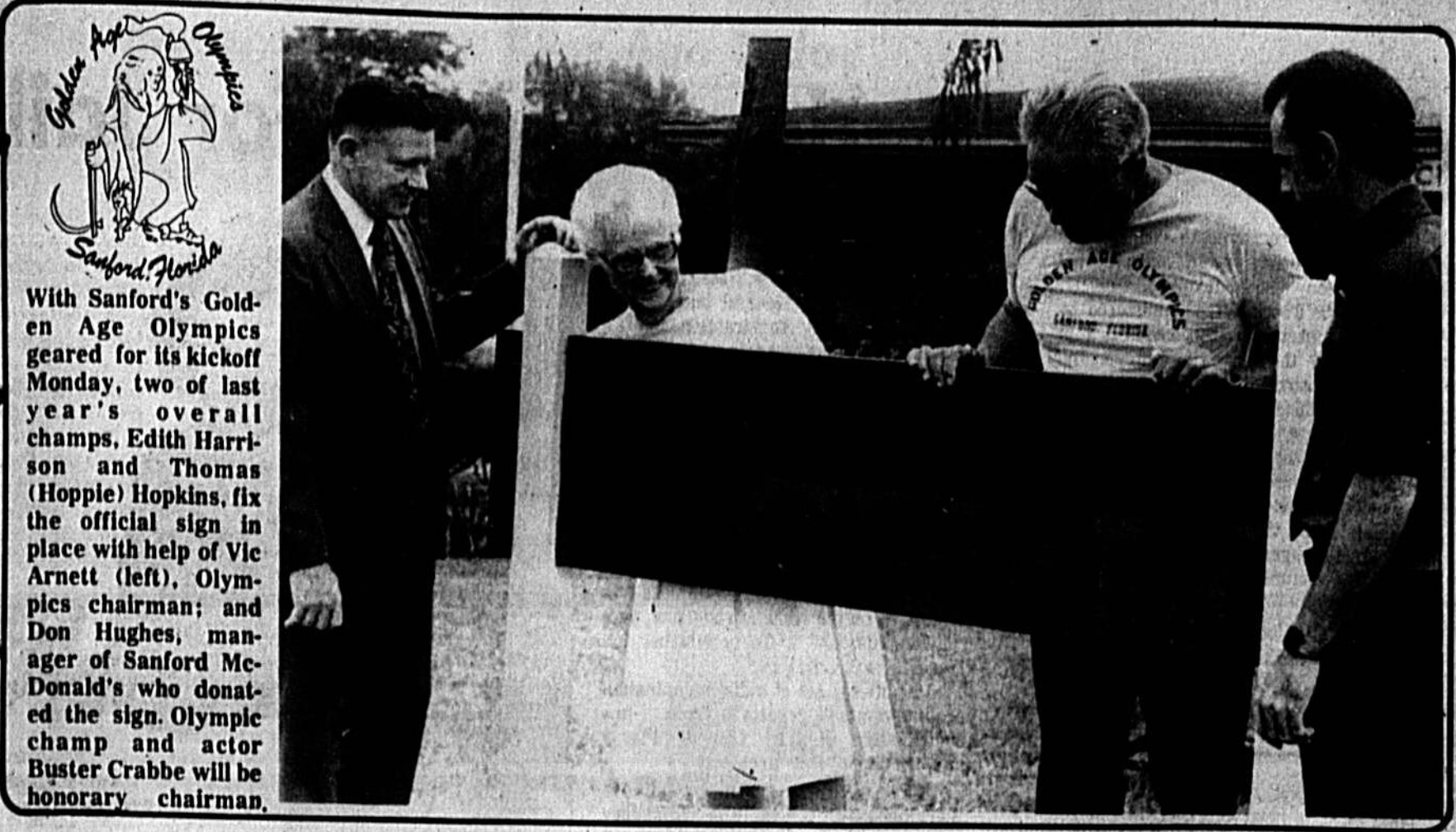

## Good Cooked, Too! Celery Has More Than Crunch

Fresh celery is such a perfect vegetable to eat raw, it is too often overlooked when it comes to cooking — and what a shame! For although a crisp rib is splendid to crunch, cooked celery is excellent, too. Celery also is a cinch to work with and lends itself to many styles of preparation. Try it creamed, sauteed, au gratin or braised.

And with celery there's hardly any waste, according to the United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Association. Everything can be used, including the vivid green leaves which make flavorful additions to soups, stews and salads — and colorful garnishes.

Marinated Celery Italiano cleverly uses the whole bunch in a tasty and impressive dish. A whole cooked celery, with leaves removed and reserved, is steeped overnight in a lemony marinade. Before serving it is stuffed with an onion, tomato, and celery leaves mixture and dressed with the remaining marinade. (To serve, slice the ribs across in one-inch pieces and dish out with the stuffing.) It's a tasty accompaniment to poultry, fish or pork.

Fresh Celery Sauté is actually a delicious hot salad. Celery ribs and hearts are cut into pieces and sauteed in butter and spices. Chopped celery leaves and romaine lettuce pieces are tossed in, and the entire combination is simmered in beef broth until tender. This bright green dish is excellent as a first course or side dish.

Celery makes ideal roughage. It also contains useful amounts of vitamins A and C and other vitamins and minerals. Eaten raw, celery has a detergent effect that is beneficial to dental health, too. Famous for its use in reducing diets, celery is very low in calories. Only 77 in a whole pound!

Buy celery that's crisp, firm and bright. The leaves should be fresh in appearance and the branches snappy. Avoid bunches with cracked, loosened or bruised ribs.

At home, keep celery refrigerated and use within a week. For best results, leave the bunches on the stem until ready to use.

MARINATED CELERY ITALIANO

1 bunch celery

2 1/2 quarts water

1 large onion, peeled and left whole

2 tsp. chopped fresh parsley

1 tsp. dried leaf thyme

Salt and pepper

1 cup olive oil

1-3rd cup fresh lemon juice (3 lemons)

2 lbs. dried leaf basil

1 lb. prepared mustard

1 tsp. salt

1 tomato, coarsely chopped

Wash celery. Leave bunch whole and cut off leafy portion; chop leaves and reserve. Cook whole celery bunch, onion, parsley, thyme, salt and pepper in boiling water, for 20 minutes or until celery is tender. Drain. Remove onion, drain and chop. Combine olive oil, lemon juice, basil, mustard, and salt; mix thoroughly. Place celery bunch in large plastic bag, pour marinade over celery and secure end of bag. Place bag in shallow pan; refrigerate overnight. Combine onion, celery leaves and tomato. Cover, refrigerate overnight.

To serve, remove celery from bag to platter. Measure 1/2 cup marinade and combine with

1/4 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

2 cups bite size pieces romaine (8 large leaves)

1 cup beef or chicken broth

Wash and trim celery; remove leaves, chop and reserve. Slice celery ribs and

hearts on a diagonal into 1-inch pieces. Melt butter in large skillet over medium heat. Add sliced celery, basil, salt and pepper. Sauté, stirring constantly, 2 to 3 minutes. Add chopped celery leaves and romaine, toss lightly to mix well. Pour in beef broth, cover. Simmer 5 to 8 minutes, or until celery is tender. Serve with crustons, if desired.

Cut along side of each dividing membrane from outside to middle of core. Remove section by section over bowl to retain juice from fruit. Add additional orange juice if necessary to make 1/4 cup. Preheat PanHandler (tm) to 350 deg. F. Roll sausages in 1/4 cup of the orange juice in the PanHandler, covered, 5 minutes. Uncover and cook, turning often, until brown, about 10 minutes. CORNMEAL PANBREAD

1 cup yellow cornmeal

1 cup unfluffed all-purpose flour

1/4 cup sugar

4 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 egg

2 1/2 teaspoons grated orange rind

1 cup Florida orange juice, softened

In large bowl, mix cornmeal, flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Add egg, orange rind, juice and butter. Mix at medium speed of electric mixer until smooth. Pour half of batter into PanHandler which has been preheated to 350 deg. F. Cover and cook 10 minutes; turn with wide spatula, cover and cook an additional 5 to 7 minutes or until tester inserted in center of bread comes out clean. Repeat with remaining batter. YIELD: 2 cornmeal pan-breads, approximately 8 servings.

APPLE ROLLS

Last year's recipe repeated by request.

4 cups diced (1/4-inch) pared apples

1 cup coarsely broken pecans

2 cups sugar

3 cups flour

2 teaspoons baking soda

1/4 teaspoon each salt, allspice and nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

1 cup butter or margarine, melted

2 teaspoons vanilla

2 large eggs, slightly beaten

Stir together the apple, nuts and sugar; let stand, stirring often, until juicy — 1 hour. Stir together the flour, soda, salt and spices; add apple mixture and stir well. Stir in butter and vanilla and then eggs. Turn into two greased and floured tall 1-pound coffee cans. Tie a 3-inch wide band of double foil around the top of each can. Bake in a preheated 325-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean — 1 hour and 15 minutes. Cool on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Remove foil and turn out. Serve warm with a pudding sauce, or cold as a cake or a tea bread. Makes 2 rolls.

1 cup all-purpose flour

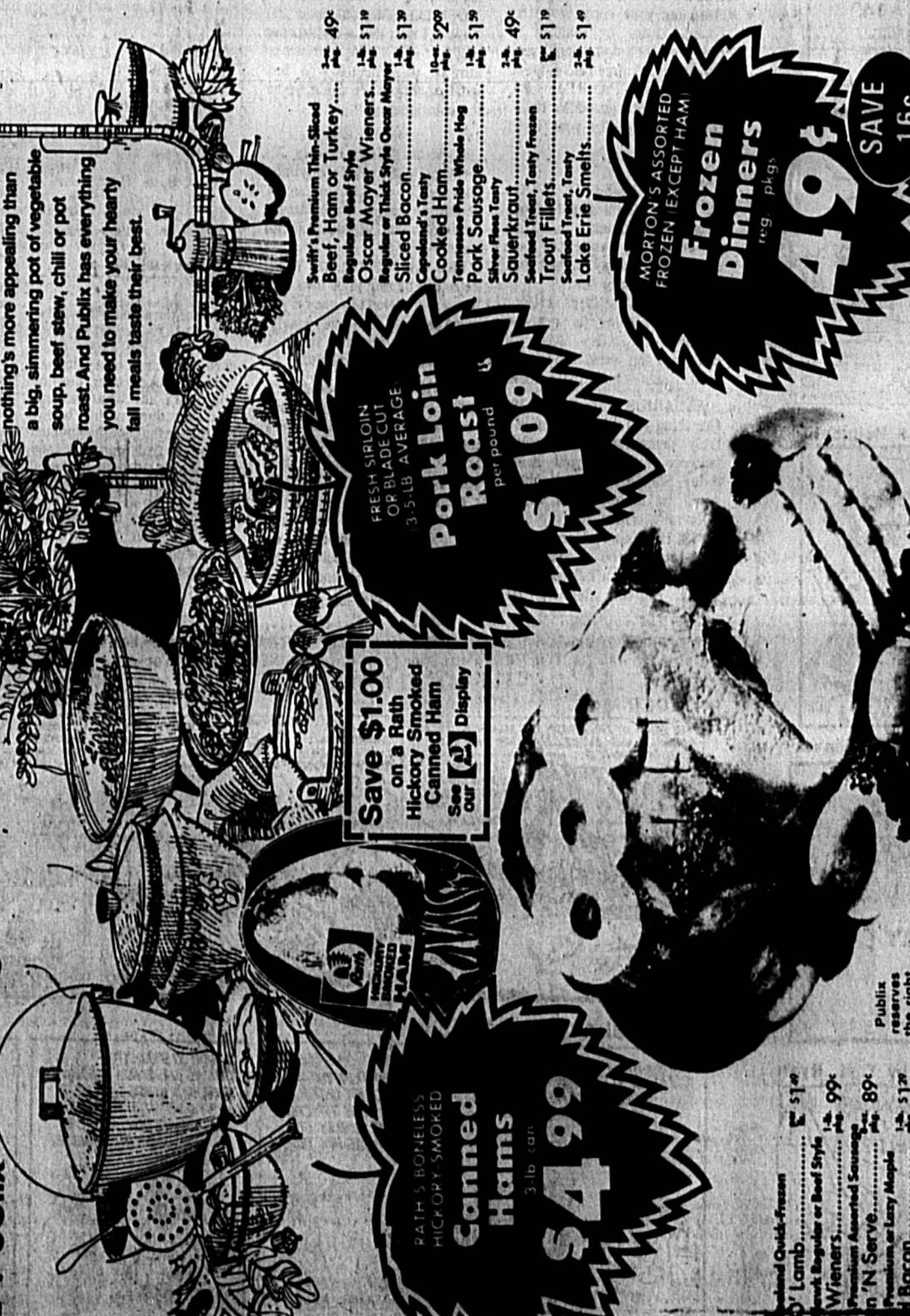

Schlafly: What Would She Think Of The Nurtury?

NEW YORK (UPI) - What would the first guest on the November "Magazine" show think of the people on the other two segments?

Wants to Show True Picture of South on TV

COLUMBIA, S.C. (UPI) - Dr. John Sprot, chairman of the University of South Carolina History Department, believes most people have the wrong concept of the South, whether they live in the South or are from outside the region.
"Think such things as Gone With the Wind have had a tremendous impact on our concept of the South, whether we live in the South or are from outside the region."
Sprot wants to produce a television series to present the true picture of Southern life. The South Carolina Educational Television network has been awarded a \$50,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities for the writing of one pilot television script and the development of ideas for other scripts.

Sprot said in an interview he hopes eventually to receive funding to produce 10 one-hour programs dealing with such topics as southern women, plantation life, life on the riverways, urban areas, free blacks, mountain people and the "plain folk" of the South. The pilot script will deal with the use of slaves in Southern industry.
"Public television is a major public television series of 10 programs on the general theme of the variety of life in the pre-Civil War South," he said. "We will show the economic variety of life and the complex relationships."
Sprot said the series will also focus on historians themselves, showing viewers what historical research encompasses and the detective work needed to reconstruct life more than a century ago. He said scholars from throughout the U.S. will be asked to participate in the series.

The use of a television series to discuss history will also be a part of the program.
"I think it is about time historians came to terms with television," Sprot said. "We need to use the medium as a vehicle the way we do books and research papers to convey scholarly material."

# Bread Of A Different Color

DEAR CECILY: Some time ago you gave a recipe for Yam Quick Bread. I made it one day and my family ate half the loaf. The following morning the rest turned a lovely green! Because I often have leftover cooled yams to use in such a bread, I'd like to know how to make one that doesn't change color — PUZZLED.

DEAR PUZZLED: Sorry about those gremlins in the Yam Quick Bread. My loaf, made by the same recipe, stayed the right hue even after a week of storage. (I always keep such bread in the refrigerator.) To make sure your yam bread won't change color, here's a new recipe that calls for a lot less baking soda than the old one. Baking soda, without sufficient acid to balance its alkalinity, may cause yam bread to turn green, blue or dark brown — G.B.

**NEW YAM BREAD**  
1½ cups all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
¼ teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 teaspoon nutmeg  
2 eggs  
½ cup corn oil  
¾ cup firmly packed dark brown sugar  
½ cup mashed cooked yam  
1-3rd cup water  
Grease and flour 4 (each about 10½ ounces) cans from soup or other food (each about 3½ inches high and 2½ inches in diameter.) On wax paper thoroughly stir together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. In the bowl of an electric mixer, at medium speed, beat together the eggs, oil and sugar until blended. Add yam and water; beat until blended. Add the flour mixture and yam until dry ingredients are moistened. Turn into the prepared cans, filling each a scant two-thirds full. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven, with cans placed directly on the middle rack in the oven, until a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean — 40 minutes. Cool on wire racks. Loosen edges and turn out. Store in the refrigerator. Makes 4 rolls.

**MORE YAM BISCUITS**  
From North Carolina, this recipe is for cooks who want standard fluffy biscuits.  
½ cup all-purpose flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
¼ teaspoon salt  
¼ cup butter or margarine  
¼ cup leftover mashed baked yam  
Milk  
Stir together the flour, baking powder and salt. With a pastry blender cut in the butter until particles are fine. With a fork stir in the yam and enough milk (about 2 tablespoons) to make a soft dough; shape into a ball. Turn out on a prepared pastry cloth; with a stockinet-covered rolling pin roll out ½ inch thick. With a floured round 3-inch cutter, cut out biscuits. Place slightly apart on an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in a preheated 425-degree oven until lightly browned — about 15 minutes. Serve hot, slathered with butter. Makes almost a dozen.

### \$473 Donated For Dallabridas

Thus far \$473 has been raised on behalf of the Albert E. Dallabrida family. Four members of the family were killed in a van-truck collision Friday.

Betty Dallabrida, 51, was buried Wednesday at 4 p.m. at Lake Mary Cemetery. Her burial was preceded by that of three of the Dallabrida children, Bobby, 15, Robin, 16, and Richard, 14.

A Dallabrida fund has been established at Flagship U.S. Bank of Seminole. Donations can be sent to P.O. Box 1858, Sanford, or brought to the bank. Several schools and organizations also are conducting fund drives.

Only one person involved in the accident remains hospitalized. Albert Dallabrida Jr., 20, is listed in good condition at Seminole Memorial Hospital following surgery on his left leg.

A total of 10 persons was treated following the accident at U.S. 17-82 just north of Airport Boulevard. A 25-foot truck smashed into the van as it attempted to travel briefly north in the south bound lanes. Police said charges may be filed pending the outcome of an investigation into the accident.

The Dallabridas have lived in Sanford for 10 years.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Wholesale prices rose 0.8 percent in October — the biggest increase in six months — reflecting dramatically higher prices for farm goods and 1978 model cars, the Labor Department reported today.

The increase, which translates into 0.8 percent annual rate, was consistent with economic forecasts promising a new surge of inflation approaching the double-digit range in the next few months.

Farm prices rose 2.4 percent in October, reversing a steady five-month decline that severely hurt income among the nation's farmers. Economists expect grain and beef prices soon will drive farm goods even higher.

Higher prices for 1978 model cars and trucks brought a 2 percent rise in the cost of transportation equipment. All industrial prices rose 0.6 percent, and processed foods were up 0.8 percent.

October brought the biggest price increase in the wholesale market since a 1.1 percent increase in April. Wholesale prices have either declined or risen moderately in each month since then.

The Wholesale Price Index was 196.3 in October, up 0.9 percent over the past year. This means that goods costing \$100 a decade ago, now cost \$196.30 — almost double.

The wholesale index reflects costs at all stages of processing. Finished goods also rose 0.8 percent, and producer finished goods were up 1.8 percent — the biggest increase since late 1974.

Food prices for consumer sales rose 0.3 percent, the first increase in five months.

Higher farm prices were blamed on shortages, livestock, fresh and dried fruits and vegetables, grains and live poultry. Prices were lower for eggs, coffee, cocoa, tea and milk.

Economists blame the grain prices on higher price supports, and some speculation in advance of newly announced Soviet grain purchases. Beef prices are expected to rise 10 to 15 percent in the next few months.

Processed foods are now beginning to reflect the result of earlier farm shortages. Prices rose for meats, poultry, fats and oils.

October's increase in industrial goods was more moderate than the 0.8 percent hike in September. In addition to automobiles and trucks, one of the biggest increases reported was for jewelry.

Machinery prices also rose a substantial 1 percent, but fuels and power prices showed signs of moderating.

The higher food prices were reflected today in the Labor Department's report on wholesale prices during October.

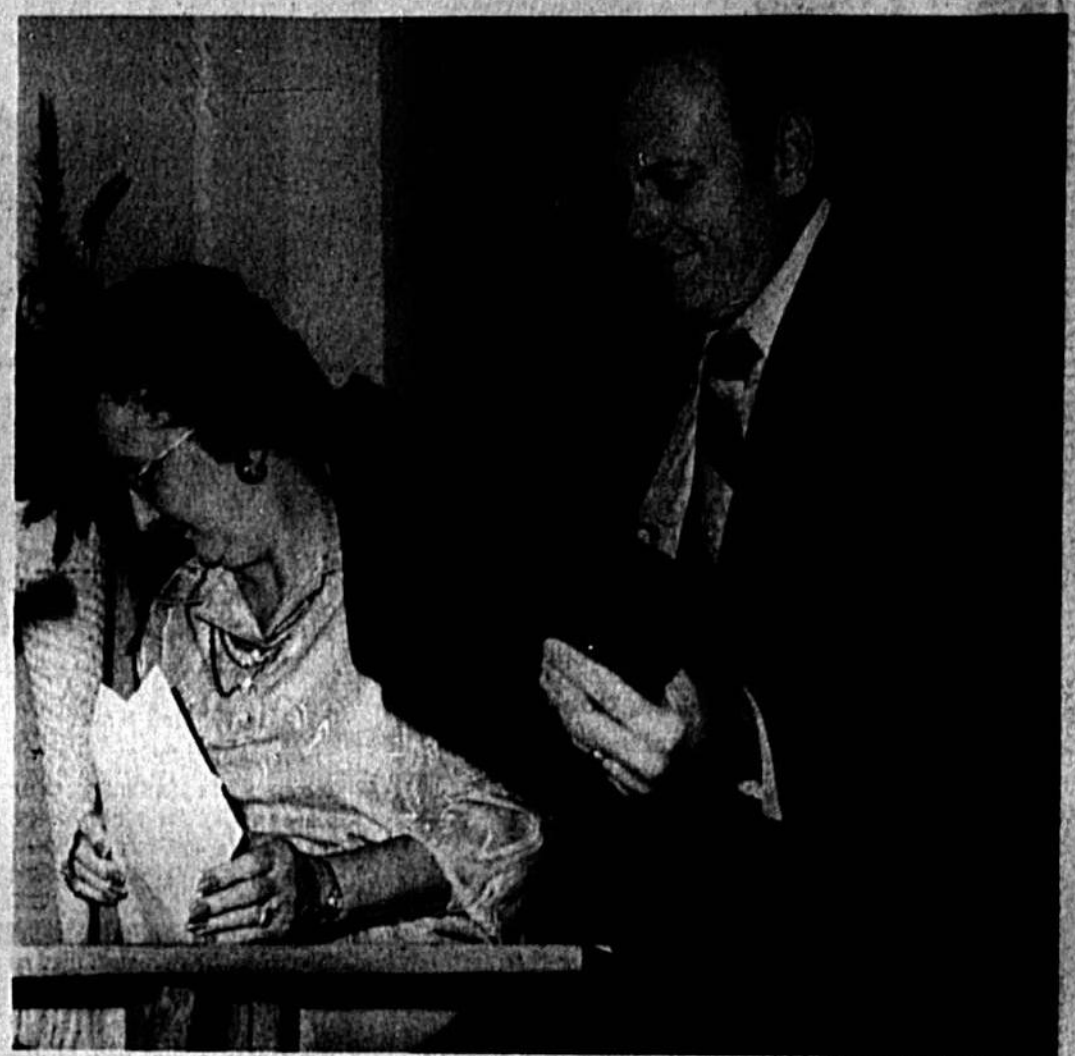
Economic forecaster Donald Ratajczak, who predicted the October wholesale price increase would be 0.8 percent, anticipates food price increases of no less than 1 percent per month during the final three months of 1977.

"Are we going to have more increases in food? The answer is yes for the next couple of months," he said in a telephone interview.

Ratajczak, chief of a highly regarded economic forecasting project at Georgia State University, expected October's food price increase would exceed 2 percent — with farm products up more than 3 percent.

Wholesale food prices fell during the previous four months, bringing a welcome lull in the nation's inflation rate. But Ratajczak said a new surge in food costs would reverse this trend abruptly.

"It could very well dip into the double digit range," he said, meaning that the overall monthly increase would be at least 10 percent when figured on an annual basis.

## Death Penalty Can Save Lives — Shevin

The death penalty is a deterrent to crime, Attorney General Robert Shevin insisted in a speech before the Sanford Women's Club Wednesday afternoon, citing statistics that the rate of murders in Florida has dropped since the state law was passed calling for the extreme penalty in certain cases.

"I don't support capital punishment, because I'm bloodthirsty," the announced candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination said, "but because it can save lives. The human capacity for heinous murders makes the death penalty an absolute necessity."

He said that murders were down 22 per cent in 1976, after the death penalty was adopted. Robberies, he said, are down 25 per cent largely because a "tough" law was finally adopted setting a three-year prison term when guns are used in the commission of a robbery. At the same time the incidence of rape is down only two per cent because more rapes are being reported, he said.

Shevin said the incidence of burglary would decrease even further than the 16 per cent recorded if a law were passed insuring a minimum one-year prison sentence.

Statistics for the first six months of this year show, Shevin said, a further reduction in murder by 10 per cent while burglaries are down nine per cent and auto theft off by one per cent.

Of juvenile crime, he said 50 per cent of the major crimes committed in Florida are by young people under 18. He said the confusion and misapprehension of young people is proved by the fact that the number-one cause of death among children under 15 years old is suicide.

He urged citizen involvement in the criminal justice system by serving on juries. "We must motivate everyone to get involved with their local law enforcement agencies in programs which will prevent crime," Shevin said.

The attorney general commended the women for their crime prevention program, saying that citizens must be educated regarding security measures they should take to prevent residential and business burglary, robbery, shoplifting, auto thefts and crimes against women.

Shevin had been invited to address the Sanford Women's Club as part of its two-year project on crime prevention earlier in the year, prior to his

## Tourney Here This Weekend Angling For Them Thar Bass

The first of a pair of bass-fishing tournaments kick off in Sanford this weekend when the National Bass Association stages its Gold Medalist event on the St. Johns River, with 43 out-of-town entrants seeking \$50,000 in money and prizes.

The tourney opens Sunday for three practice days, with actual competition running Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

Another bass tournament follows Nov. 13-18 in Tavares' Wooten Park, with that U.S. Open event open to the public.

The tourney in Sanford is a closed event, but spectators are encouraged to follow the tourney. Weigh-in will be 4 p.m. daily at Monroe Harbour.

Veteran anglers from throughout the southeast will be competing for the \$20,000 booty. Fishing along with the pros will be 43 observers, including many of the top outdoors writers and editors throughout the country. Rather than a three-day total weight, competition will center around the largest bass by weight for the three days that observers will fish.

All participants will fish out of the Monroe Harbour Marina on Lake Monroe with Holiday Inn as tournament headquarters. NBA Tournament director Jack Atkinson says the Sanford location was chosen because of excellent facilities and accessibility to the prime waters of the St. Johns River.

Total value of the boats alone will be approximately \$475,000. First prize in Tavares will be \$20,000, second \$10,000, third \$5,000; fourth \$5,000 all the way down to tenth at \$2,000; 11th through 30th \$1,000; 31st through 40th \$500; and 41st through 80th for \$300. Largest bass wins a boat and trailer and second largest bass \$500. When the full field of 400 is signed these are the amounts that will be offered as prizes.

Contestants may not need their own bass boat to fish. There will be many contestants who bring their boat complete with all the latest electronic equipment. You'll be paired off with one of them and the only expense will be sharing the cost of gas and oil.
