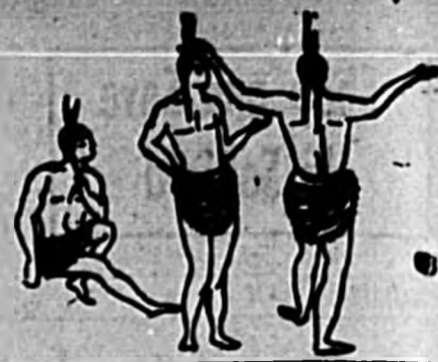

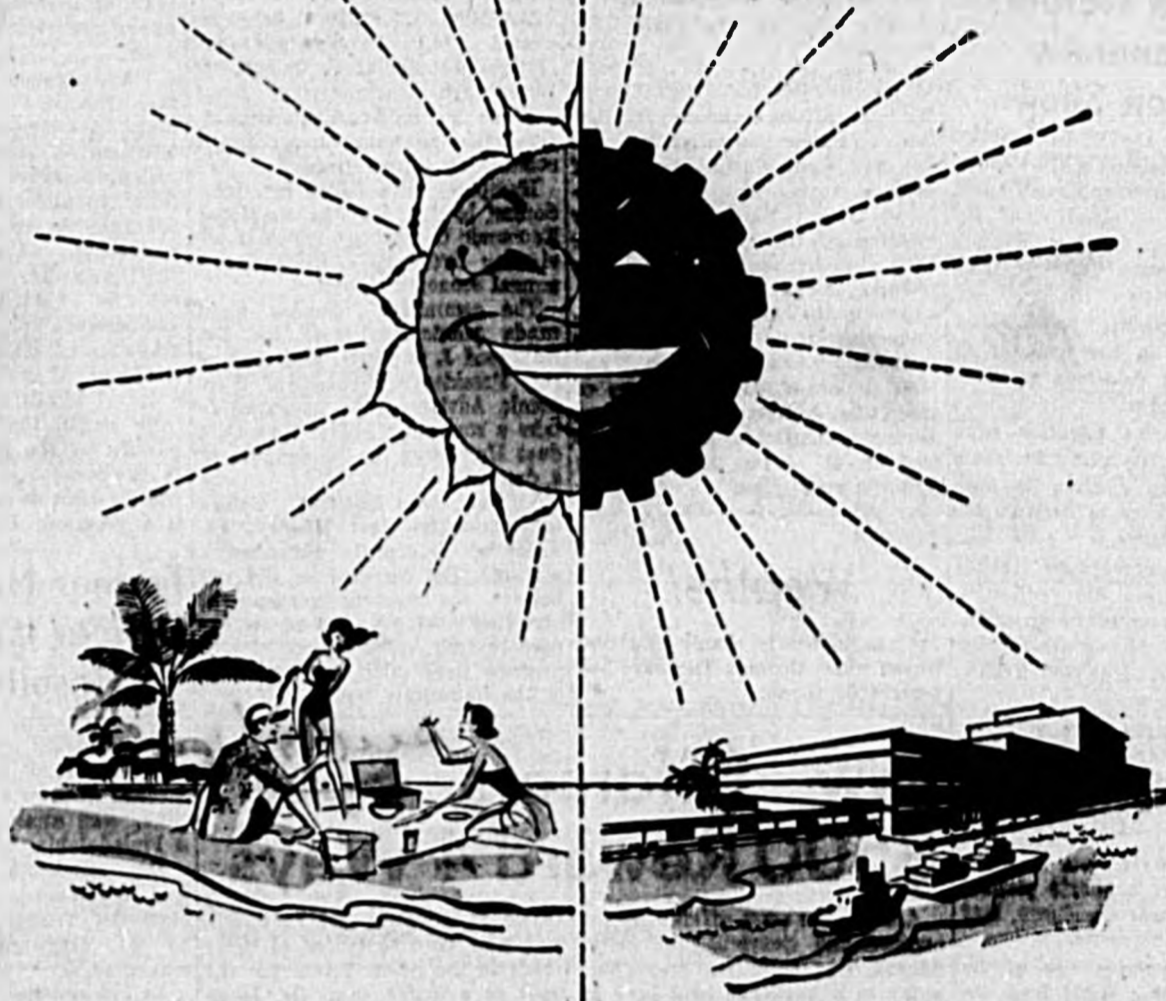
With this one more successful dance goes down in the role and many more looked forward to in the coming year.

The University of Miami Symphonic Band will present a concert in the Seminole High School auditorium on Wednesday, Feb. 6, at 8 p. m.

The program will consist of all types of band music and will feature several specialties. Janis Wadsworth, who holds the title "Miss Majorette of America" will be one of the solo attractions.

The UM unit has appeared many times on national television shows and has played concerts throughout the state and in central America. It is composed of students from sixteen states who were selected by audition months before entering college.

Some of the numbers to be played are: "Der Freischutz Overture" by Von Weber "Jericho" by Gould.

James Hunt of Norfolk, Va. will be presented as a cornet soloist playing "Hungarian Melodies" by Vincent Bach as his first number. William Bussel of Coral Gables, also a cornetist, will play "Ode for Trumpet" by Alfred Reed. A cornet trio composed of Russell Rolfe Reinhardt and Allan Schwarz will be prepared to render "The Bugler's Holiday" by Leroy Anderson and "The Three Modestaires" by Lowell Little.

Expert Gives Tips On Popcorn Popping

EAST LANSING, Mich.—There's a trick to keeping popcorn at its "popcorn best," according to a Michigan University farm crops professor.

Popcorn, purchased at the grocery usually is packaged in moisture-proof containers to keep it in good condition. S. T. Dexter said. But when the container is opened and the corn is stored, it usually dries out.

Storing popcorn in the vegetable tray of the refrigerator helps prevent drying, he said. But there is a way that is still more effective.

Make a humidifier by cutting out strips of blotter and soaking them in salt water. Then place the blotters inside a mason jar and place the popcorn inside. If

Dulles Expresses Hopes

At his first news conference since Dec. 18, Dulles said the United States is not thinking of supporting sanctions against Israel. He said the government now is thinking only that Israel will comply with the U. N. resolution. Dulles was asked by a reporter whether the United States would "go to the protection of Israel" in the event of aggression even if this meant risking war with the Soviet Union. Without mentioning Israel directly, Dulles replied that the overall American policy is not to be deterred by fear of what the Soviet Union might do in any particular case. 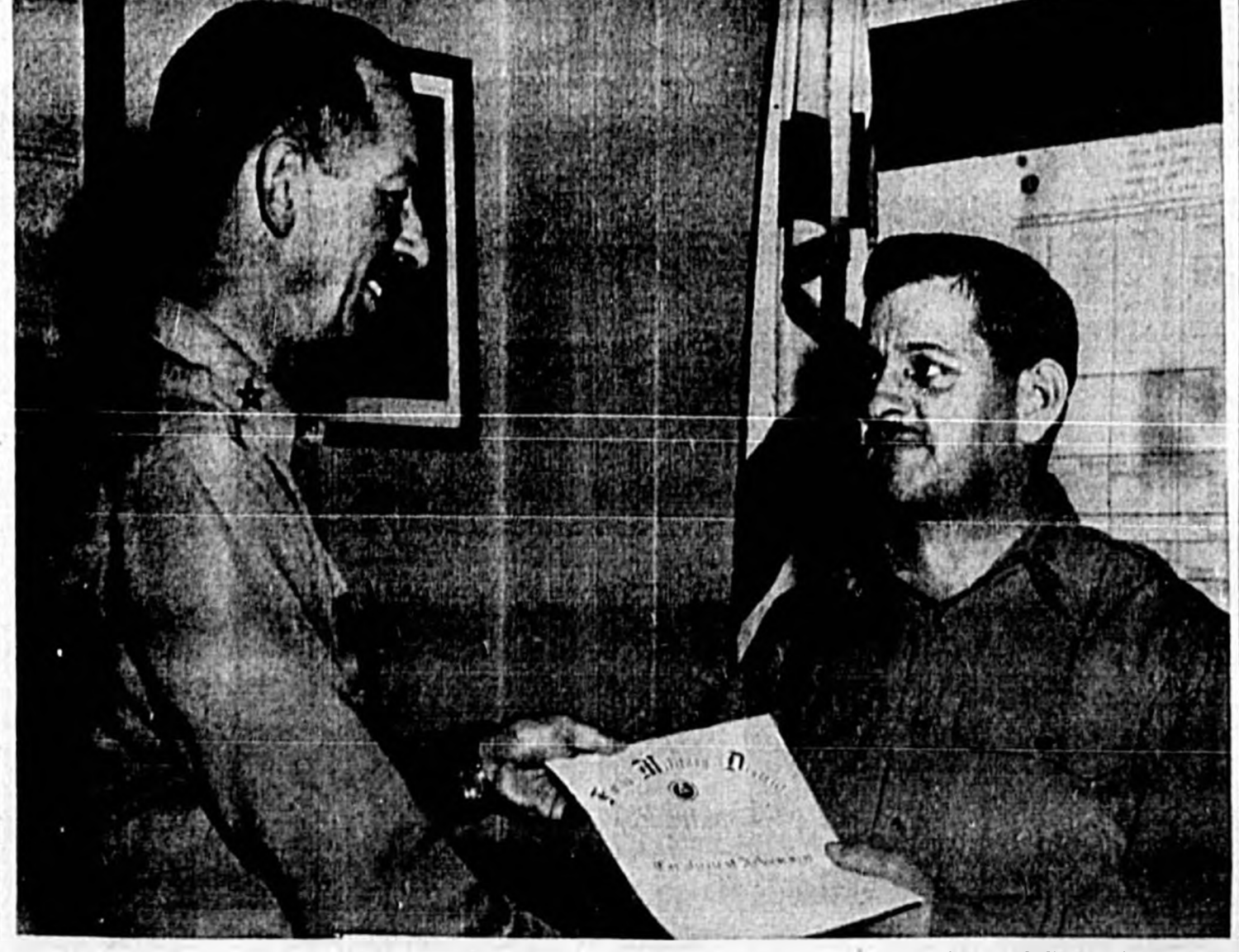
LCDR. GUSTAF O. NORDGREN (Official USN Photo) Retires After 30 Years With Navy

Lcdr. Gustaf O. Nordgren, USN, Commanding Officer of the Naval Reserve Training Center at Gadsden, Ala., retired from the Navy on Feb. 1 after 30 years of service. Lcdr. Nordgren, a native of Stockholm, Sweden, came to the United States at the age of nine and calls Sanford his home town. He entered the Navy as an enlisted man in 1927. During World War II he served at the Naval Base, Pearl Harbor, for two tours of duty, being there during the Japanese attack on the base on Dec. 7, 1941. He was the captain of the USS Sotoyama which was sunk during the Japanese attack. Promoted to warrant boatswain in May 1943, he served aboard the attack cargo ship USS Caslow taking part in the Gilbert and Marshall Islands campaign. Commissioned an Ensign in 1944, he returned to Pearl Harbor as a harbor pilot, remaining there until Dec. 1945 when he was transferred to Green Cove Springs as assistant operations officer. He then served as commanding officer of Patrol Craft 178, Key West, and as security officer at Naval Base, New Orleans. In May 1952 he was assigned to the USS Shenandoah, a destroyer-tender, which made two cruises to the Mediterranean with the Sixth Fleet. He was relieved in Nov. 1954 at Beirut, Lebanon and transferred to Gadsden.

He holds the Second Nicaraguan Campaign Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Medal with three combat stars, American Defense, American Theatre, Navy Occupation Service Medals and the Good Conduct Medal with three stars. He is married to the former Miss Alice L. Vihlen, also of Sanford. They have three children. Two of them are members of the U. S. Naval Reserve. Lcdr. Nordgren plans to remain in Gadsden, Ala., until summer.

Smathers Proposes Bill To Establish Scholarship Fund

Senator George Smathers, in his first Washington Newsletter of the year, stated that "I proposed a bill to Congress that would establish a scholarship fund for the training for children of veterans of World War I, World War II, and the Korean conflict." The bill, described by Senator Smathers, would help overcome a serious shortage of trained engineers and scientists. "I propose that these scholarships be paid for by profits from the investment of confiscated enemy property," he said.
