Elieene Sacre, chie! of staff of the combined Lebanese
resistance forces, shared this opnion wilth a small group of resistance forces, shared this oplion with a small group of
symphaltizers and supporters al a Dellona Inn meeting this past week.
The ts-year old Lebanese native was educated in Catholic
schools in his homeland and studied philosophy at the College schools in his hoinelaus.

"The current governument of Labanon has no control. Our government is under Syrian and Palestinian control,", he said.
Saying lebanon is a very' civilized nation, Sacre said Christians and Muslems have lived together in harmony in
"The Moslems of West Beirut have been living in the Christian areas because of the sifege. We are not unitied no
because of the Palestinians and Syrians." he said. Saying the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO)
represents all the Palestinians now in represents all the Palestinians now in Lebanon, Sacre sald 80,00 Palestinians moved into lebanon when Israel was given
statehood in 1948 . But loday, he added, there are 700,000 Palestinlians in the country.
Lebanon is a small country, he sid. But the Arab countries with territores four times the size of Europe are paying the
Palestinians to keep thema away from their lands. "They want then in our tiny country," he sald.
Of the Arab nations, Sacre sald, "If the Palestinians are the Arabs' brothers, why won't they lake them in?
Recently at an Orlando neeling, former U.S. Sen. Jim Abourezk, chairman of the Arab-American Anti-
Discrimination Committee, sald that money collectad by Discrimination Committee, sald that money collected by the
organization would be used in part to pressure the United Slates government into letting the Palestinians imunigrate to the United States.
Speaking of that meeting, Sacre said the Arab nations are glving the PIO $\$ 14$ bililion a year. "And the PIO tries to buy verything," he said
