90 Flat Cars Slated By Atlantic Coast Line

Atlantic Coast Line Railroad will build 90 special flat cars in its Waycross (Ga.) shops to fill the transportation needs of the Southeast's growing gypsum board industry. It was announced today by ACL President W. Thomas Rice.

The 54' 3" cars, to cost in excess of \$1 million, will be assigned to new gypsum plants under construction in the Southeast or plants undergoing expansion, Rice said.

The car frames will be solid steel castings made by Granite City, Ill., and trucks, brakes

and wooden decking will be applied at the ACL Waycross Shops. He said the use of cast steel frames increases service through elimination of need of repairs.

They will be placed in service at rate of one per day beginning about May 15.

He said the 50-ton capacity cars are especially designed to conform to gypsum board industry requirements. They will be equipped with lading band anchors for securing the load and will contain special lockers at one end for shipping

First Nuclear Unit In Operation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States has put the first nuclear power plant in Antarctica into test operation. The Atomic Energy Commission said a controlled, self-sustained reaction was begun Sunday in the plant, which is located at McMurdo Sound, main support base for all U. S. scientific activities in Antarctica.

At full power, the reactor will provide 1,500 net kilowatts of electricity for the McMurdo station.

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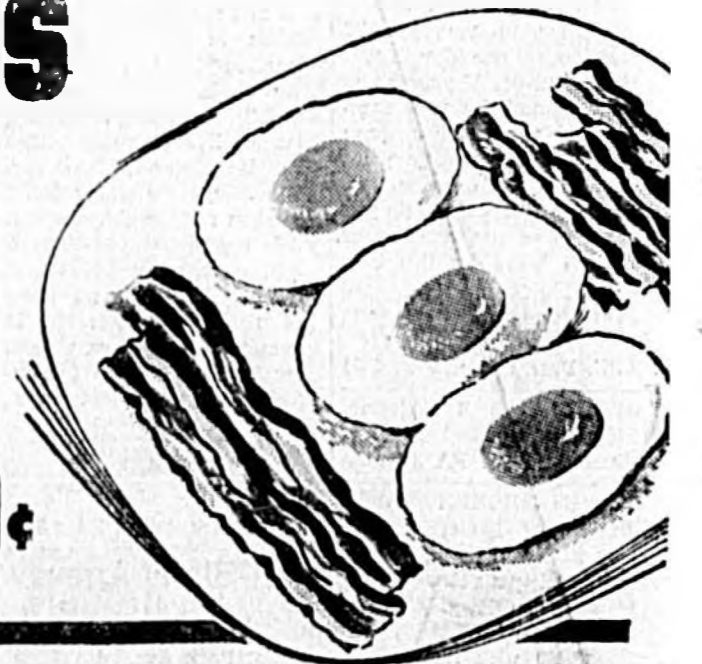

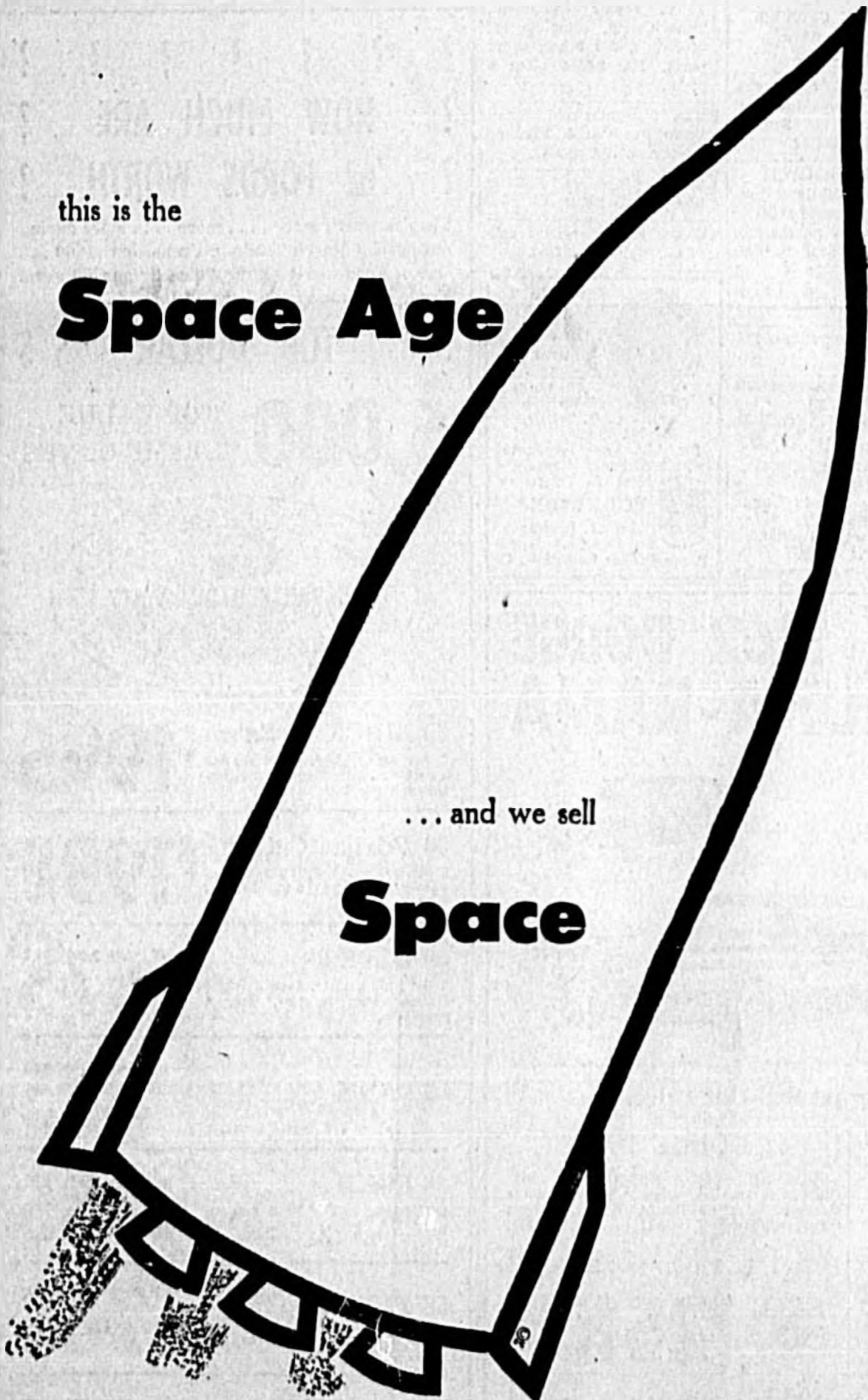

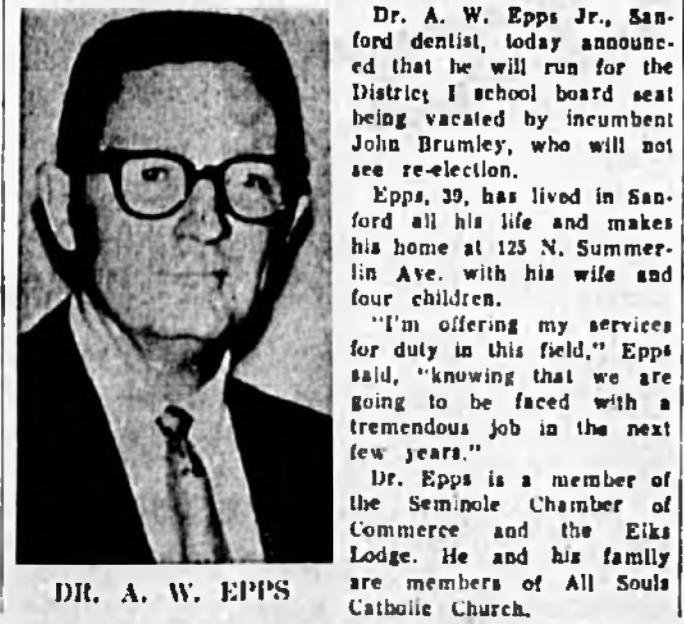

Campbell Gets Up To 19 Years In Slaying

James Howard Campbell, 28-year-old painter from North Carolina, was sentenced Monday afternoon to an indeterminate prison term of six months to 19 years for manslaughter.

After Circuit Judge Volie Williams pronounced sentence, Campbell quietly said, "I'm sorry it all happened," and was led away.

Campbell was indicted by the fall grand jury for second degree murder for the Aug. 2 fatal stabbing of his wife. However, later the court accepted a plea of guilty to the lesser count.

The butcher knife stabbing occurred at the home of Walter Krazdwa in Sunland Estates where the Campbell had been invited at dinner guests after an all-day outing.

Campbell fled from the home after the stabbing but was caught near Deland a few hours later by the Florida Highway Patrol and deputies. They are the parents of a six-year-old daughter.

In other court action, John Day was put on four year probation for aggravated assault and Arthur Martin on five year probation for auto theft.

Reds OK Talks, But With Threat

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev has agreed to open disarmament talks in Geneva at the foreign ministers' level, but threatened to "take measures" if the United States resumes atmospheric nuclear tests, the Tass news agency said today.

"If the U. S. and its allies said another series of tests to the tests they have already held," Khrushchev said. "The Soviet Union will face the need to hold such tests of new types of its nuclear weapons as might be required in the obtaining circumstances to strengthen its security and preserve cold war peace."

Khrushchev said that, while he would prefer a Geneva summit meeting, he had "no objection" to the Soviet, American and British foreign ministers meeting for three-power talks before the disarmament sessions start March 14.

Lyman School Official Hurt

Mrs. Louise Stackpole, DE coordinator at Lyman School, was taken to the Winter Park Memorial Hospital early Monday evening after her automobile was hit by an SFL eastbound train at the Lakemont Ave. crossing in Winter Park.

Mrs. Stackpole is listed as having a possible broken jaw, teeth missing and abrasions on both legs. She faces possible plastic surgery.

According to Winter Park police, no charges have been made pending further investigation. They report that Mrs. Stackpole, driving a 1960 Ford Falcon traveling south on Lakemont at about 7 p. m., ran into the train which carried the car 72 feet down the track after the impact.

Mrs. Stackpole said that she neither heard nor saw the train as she approached the crossing, police said.

Bryant Refuses Reinstatement

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Gov. Farris Bryant said Monday suspended Palm Beach County Sheriff Martin Kellenberger was incompetent to serve in that office, and refused to reinstate him.

Bryant suspended Kellenberger last August and replaced him with Peter A. B. Widener after Kellenberger was indicted on charges of perjury.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The chairman of the House Agriculture Committee said today that Cuba still is the key to the world sugar market.

Rep. Harold Cooley, (D-N. C.) recommended caution in amending the basic United States Sugar Act to upset the commodity's precarious stability.

Lows Of 26-32 Reported In Some Sections

A severe cold front ripped into Sanford and Seminole County Monday night and early this morning bringing temperatures to new record lows for the year and a threat to the county's multi-million dollar citrus industry.

Temperatures early this morning ranged from lows of 26 to 32 in certain areas and increasing "severe cold" is expected tonight and Wednesday.

County Agent Cecil Tucker reported that heavy winds saved many of the citrus trees but warned citrusmen that a calm followed by more cold would bring "serious consequences to the industry and especially young tender fruit."

Tucker also urged all homeowners to cover tender shrubbery.

Three Areas Swept; Some Homes Periled

More than 400 acres of Seminole County lands were burned in three separate fires Monday, Florida Forest Rangers reported today.

The biggest tract, some 350 acres southwest of Geneva, burned from noon on Monday until 5 a. m. today and was set in three places, according to Ranger Jerry Laws.

"The fire came very close to burning two houses and would have if it hadn't been for the quick response and work of the Oviedo Volunteer Dept.," Laws said.

Practically all of Seminole County's Ranger equipment plus a tractor and crew from Orange County and one from Lake County assisted in bringing under control this fire and another one during the afternoon involving some 50 acres on Lake Harney.

Fire Chief Harold Mayo of the Goldenrod Volunteer Dept. also reported that a two acre fire just south of Lake Howell on SR 436, endangered one resident's home and burned off his back yard. However it was brought under control quickly.

The Lake Mary Volunteers answered a call on the Upsala Rd. just north of Tee 'N Green Estates where 50 acres were burned. According to Laws, a group of men burning brush were responsible for this near disaster which threatened a large two-story frame house in the area.

Laws again warned of extreme dry conditions, heightened now by high March winds. Puzzled by the fact that so many of the fires are incendiary, he said "anybody who would set a fire now is either a pyromaniac or just plain stupid."

"I'd like to ask everybody not to even light a cigaret unless they just have to have it," he said.

Seventh Storm Of Winter Chills Nation

Winter's seventh great storm—the season's worst in many areas—dropped up to 20 inches of wet, sticky snow along the East Coast and sucked sub-freezing temperatures into the Gulf states.

Heavy rain, driven by 60-mile winds, along the California coast. An arctic air mass plunged temperatures below zero in the northern plains for the second successive day.

The snowfall at Richmond, Va., was the greatest in a 24-hour period since Jan. 24, 1940. Six inches of new snow Monday pushed the total for the season at Sioux Falls, S. D., to 68.8 inches, greatest in history. A 9-inch snow at Columbus, Ohio, was heaviest March snowfall in the city's modern history.

Highway travel was hazardous from the Mississippi River eastward and as far south as North Carolina.

Snowflakes swirled as far south as Montgomery, Ala. At Richmond, Va., the heavy snow was accompanied by a rare winter thunderstorm.

Gale warnings were up along the Atlantic Coast as far north as Portland, Maine. Heavy snow warnings were up for parts of Virginia, Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York and Connecticut.

The worst of the storm hit Virginia, where Culpepper reported 18 inches on the ground and more falling early today. Charlottesville, Va., had 15 inches and Front Royal 14 inches. Richmond had more than 10 inches.

As the storm moved toward Atlantic City, N. J., today it was expected to bring high tides and some flooding in coastal areas. Fifty-mile winds were forecast.

The nation's capital prepared for a snow emergency and police threatened arrest of any auto operated without chains or snow tires.

Dozens of minor accidents were reported in and around Pittsburgh, Pa., where half a foot of snow fell Monday night. West Virginia had up to 5 inches of snow.

A 5-inch snowfall in western North Carolina Monday closed schools in five counties.

Kenton, Ohio, reported a foot of snow and more falling. Sections of Tennessee had an inch of snow. Indiana got up to 4 inches Monday. Wisconsin measured up to 6 inches of new snow Monday and winds whipped up 6-foot drifts near Glenwood City, South Carolina had light snow.

In Connecticut the U. S. Weather Bureau called the storm "dangerous" and predicted tides as much as 4 feet above normal.

The Indiana snowfall came while 20 of the state's highways remained blocked by high water from last week's floods.

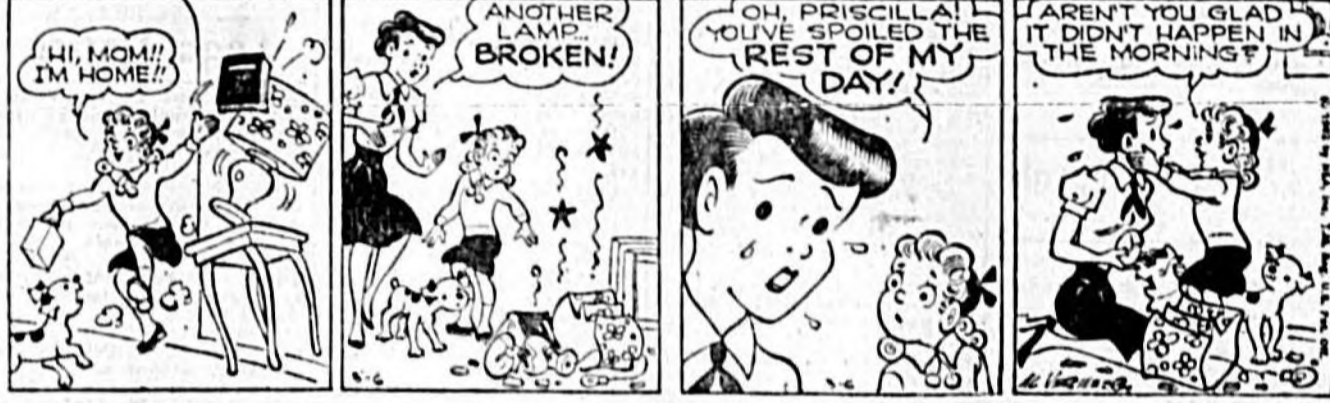

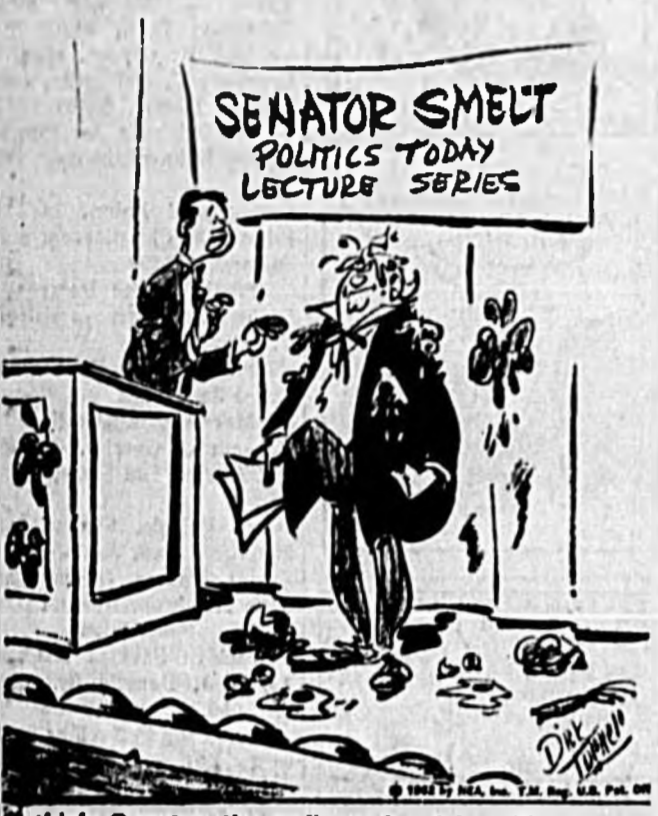

a new site could be discouraged from settling in a community by the uncooperative attitude of the general public. "The entire community must be involved," he said. Mills also pointed out that

statistics show that for every 100 new jobs, retail sales increase \$360,000, with the resulting economic ripples spreading and touching every walk of life and every field of business.

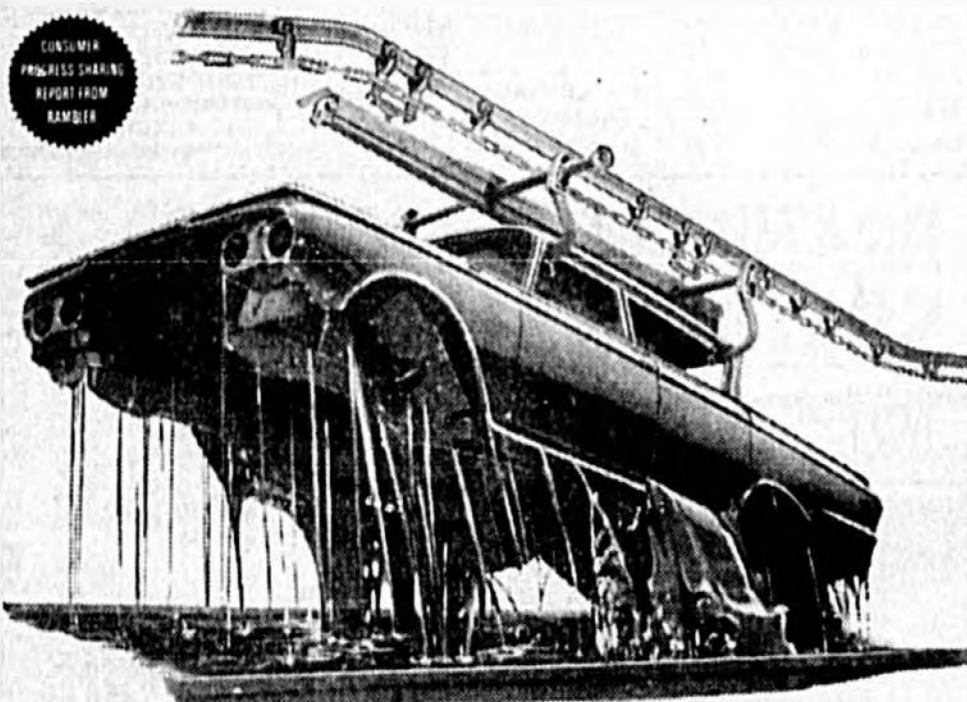
