

Record Cold Threatens County's Citrus Crop Lows Of 26-32 Board Seeks Fire Escape OK Reported In **Some Sections**

A severe cold front ripped into Sanford and Seminole County Monday night and early this morning bringing temperatures to new record lows for the year and a threat to the county's multi-million dollar citrus industry.

Temperatures carly this morning ranged from lows of 26 to 32 in certain areas and increasing "severe cold" is expected tonight and Wednesday.

County Agent Cecil Tucker reported that heavy winds saved many of the citrus Monday but warned citrusmen that a calm followed by more cold would bring "serious consequences to the industry and especially young, tender fruit."

Tucker also urged all homeowners to cover tender shrubbery.

One of the steadlest sounds in the world for 20 years has been the Voice of America --- and it's going to be louder than ever in the years just ahead.

The business of propaganda was totally new to this country when the Voice started broadcasting in 1942 soon after our entry into World War II. It was perhaps inevitable that we should make a lot of mistakes in learning how to tell the world the true and meaningful story of the United States. Many congressional storms swirl-

ed about the Voice, and the U.S. Information Agency of which it became a part.

We can all be grateful, however, that this important broadcasting enterprise was not only maintained but enlarged, and that we yielded the field neither to our World War II enemies nor to our present Communist adversaries.

Today the Voice of America is so feared by Moscow that Russla spends an estimated \$150 million a year to try to blot out our broadcasts with thousands of powerful jamming transmitters. United States specialists figure that with all this Red effort, more than half the Voice's program material is nevertheless heard in target areas.

By the end of this year, VOA will be operating a new \$23 million group of transmitters at Greenville, N. C., which will give us a stronger "signal" in Latin America and portions

of Africa, the Near East and Europe. In 1963, a \$14 million facility is expected to start broadcasting in Liberia.

With its 780 hours a week of direct international broadcasting, the Voice surpasses British effort, nearly matches Red China's 734 hours, but still trails Russla's 1,067 hours.


On top of this, however, Volce materials going to non-U.S. stations. abroad accounted in 1960 for 5,462 broadcast hours weekly. U. S. officials say 45 million people heard these programs, besides the estimated 20 million who catch our direct broadcasts.

The necessarily fragmentary evidence supporting these estimates is taken as powerful encouragement to push on. More than 170,000 letters from listeners poured in during 1961. Diplomats, agents, refugees and many others testify.

The \$20 million we expect to spend on VOA activities this year is about the same amount the government plans to spend keeping our national parks in shape in fiscal 1963. It seems a genuine bargain, espe-

cially when set beside what the Kremlin spends just trying to drown out the Voice.

But the Voice of America's value for us and others, at any price, can only be sustained so its original 1942 pledge to tell the truth whether good or bad. That gives us an edge Mossow could not rub out in 8,000 broadcast hours a week.
