



MC GEE MAKES AN OSTRICH OF BIG MIAMI BATTLER

Colored Heavy-weight Knocks Out Foe In Tilt Here Last Night

Featuring a card of four interesting bouts bringing together eight recognized negro scrappers, Willis McGee, 196-pound Orlando negro who has as yet found no one who challenges his claim to the colored heavy-weight championship of the south, last night won, by a knockout, a decision over one Black Primo Carners, Miami battler who played ostrich from the time his fight started until Referee Joe Moss counted 10 over his folded body.

Approximately 500 persons, including what appeared to be half the population of Goldboro, alternately yelled and booed at the antics of the eight negro fighters of varying weights who last night appeared on Sanford's second fight card in two years. While the fights were as a whole, much tamer than those seen here last week, there was enough interest in each bout to make street talk, in Goldboro, at least, for weeks.

Carners, who is supposed to have weighed 220 pounds, but could hardly have scaled 200 pounds, was hardly a match for the husky, well-built McGee. At no time did he exhibit the stuff claimed for him. On the contrary, he exhibited an attack of fright or something which kept him on the floor most of the four rounds he stayed. McGee's powerful rights and lefts early taught Carners that he was in the ring with a real slugger, and his fighting certainly reflected his discovery of that fact.

McGee was unable to get at the lanky fellow to whom he could administer a knockout blow which looked like the real thing, however. Carners kept covering his face with his hands, and bending over until his head almost reached the canvas. In that position, ostrich-like, McGee had nothing to hit at but a pair of faded trunks and a kinky backbone. The fans yelled for the big negro from Miami to stand up and mix-it with McGee but the boy was either afraid to do that or just naturally too wise to allow one of McGee's slants to flatten him.

What was easily the feature bout of the evening was the semifinal, between Wade Lumpkin, 164 pound Orlando negro, and Prince Albert, 155 pound Sanford negro field-worker. Lumpkin, a fine specimen both as a fighter and in physical appearance had the smaller, but much more aggressive Prince Albert outclassed from the start. He was unable to measure his man for a telling blow however, due to a shifty, weaving style which the Sanford battler had adopted.

Lumpkin was given the decision after eight rounds of fast milling which saw Prince Albert carry the fight to the Orlando boy all the way, although the Orlando negro landed blows which were of body-shaking caliber. Lumpkin never opened up, confining all his fighting to a series of right handed blows. His tricky and powerful left was never used. He got to Albert in the fourth round, after losing the first three, by a blow under the heart, which kept up through the rest of the fight, had the Sanford negro on his knees once or more in each round.

The main preliminary ended in a draw. It was between Young Kid Glover, 128, of Sanford, and Young Jack Johnson, 130, of Orlando. It was well fought, and brought the fans to their feet several times.

The first preliminary saw Young Lightning, 112 pound Sanford boy win a decision over Young Morrell, 116, of Sanford.

Well, it's all set. Maxie Schmeling will fight Primo Carners on Sept. 17, the place as yet undecided. It took only an hour for Leon See and Joe Jacobs to get together on all the small details of the alleged fight, and an official contract was signed, sealed, and delivered. If the coming fight isn't a test for both fighters, it is nothing else in the world but a set-up which certainly will do harm to the German. On the other hand, maybe the German figures will meet a worthy challenger.

Treatment Of Law Violators Is Not Equal, Says Group

WASHINGTON, July 9.—(AP)—Cyrilus of the federal government for allegedly dealing with youthful law breakers on the same basis as older hardened criminals was launched today through the WPA house by the now disbanded Wickersham commission.

Individual Secret Service operatives attached to the White House who were at the camp have been questioned concerning how the facts reached the reporters. Several newspapermen admitted to cover the White House also have been approached by investigators.

Priest Summoned To Answer Charge In Miami Petition

MIAMI, July 19.—(AP)—Judge Frank W. Blanton yesterday issued a citation for Father Gabriel Ruppert, of Henderson, N. C., to appear in county court here July 27 to answer charges contained in a petition, contesting the will of Count Jean de Hedouville, Miami pioneer, who died Apr. 17.

The petition was filed with the court by attorneys for Armand de Hedouville, of Havana, a brother of Count de Hedouville.

In the will filed for probate here, the residue of the estate, valued at approximately \$100,000, was left to Miss Alice Cohen, Lexington, Ky.; Miss Alexia Bente-Benardes, Count de Hedouville's Miami secretary; Father Ruppert, and the Gesù Catholic Church of Miami. Armand de Hedouville was not mentioned in the will.

The petition filed yesterday charges the will did not express the purpose or intention of Jean de Hedouville for disposal of his property and that the will's execution was secured by fraud and undue and improper influence exercised upon his mind by Father Ruppert and Miss Bente-Benardes. The petition also charges that the will filed for probate was revoked by Count de Hedouville before his death.

Included in the assets of the estate was an account of 1000 pounds sterling in a Nassau bank, which the petition charges has been removed and now is in the possession of Father Ruppert as administrator of the estate. It asks transfer of these funds to the registry of the probate court, pending the litigation.

Under the terms of the will, Miss Bente-Benardes was left the de Hedouville residence in Miami; the Catholic Church of Miami was left the residence owned by Count de Hedouville in Nassau, and Guy Santini, Miami boatman, was left his yacht.

Stones Men U.S. Loans To Text Industry

WASHINGTON, July 16.—(AP)—The U.S. Textile Institute, the marketing association of the U.S. textile industry, yesterday before the farm board application for supplemental loans to aid the depressed industry.

Secretary Stimson told me, he said, "and I agreed with him that if Europe is tranquil, we are going ahead to certain economic recovery."

At the disarmament conference, to which he said Italy would go with "a spirit of perfect loyalty and honesty," the premier insisted that arms reduction should be discussed on the basis of general principles rather than guns and tons.

"Italy is disposed to accept the lowest figure of armament—even a limit of 10,000 rifles for all Italy, paralleled no other nation has seen," he said. "Of course, if any other nation had more such a reduction would be placing Italy in the position of defending herself with a club against a pistol."

ITALY CHOOSES PEACE AS ITS BIG OBJECTIVE

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The present economic crisis he said is largely "one of morale." It is easy to borrow 1000 lire for a week, he said, by way of illustration, but it is difficult to get 100 lire for a year. Citing Italy's recent experience when an issue of 1,000,000,000 lire was subscribed, he said this was "fine for the government," but that the country would be better off "if the people instead of wishing to clip coupons, would put their money into business, quickening commerce and giving work to the unemployed."

"I have a great optimism over the prospects of economic recovery during the coming years," he said, "especially if the disarmament conference is a success. Disarmament success would clear a horizon which would be obscured if the conference does not produce results."

He described the Hoover moratorium as a momentous event. "Italy secures fully President Hoover's initiative," he said, "an initiative that I consider one of the greatest political factors since the war."

Secretary Stimson had a talk yesterday morning with Dino Grandi, Italian foreign minister. The conversation prepared the ground for Stimson's meeting with Grandi. There was no official statement after the conference but he revealed, their talk touched on the Hoover moratorium and possibly included a discussion of the moratorium which France is understood to have made regarding a loan to Italy.

Grandi received American newspapermen at his office following the conference with Secretary Stimson.

He painted a picture of the possibility of the failure of the disarmament conference, or even the possibility of declaring either party to be "disastrous." If the conference should be disillusioned, he said, it would follow a panic and a depression. He proposed, for the possibility of the date of the conference, which is slated to be July 20, will come from Italy.

Widely Separated Sections Of Nation Are Hit By Drought

WASHINGTON, July 16.—(AP)—Three widely separated sections of the nation are feeling the pinch of acute water shortage.

Drought conditions in the Southwest, centering in Oklahoma, and in the Southeast, centering in Georgia, were said by the Weather Bureau yesterday to have reached a critical stage.

While rains have brought relief to the stricken Northwest, it added, Montana and Wyoming are still parched.

Government drought relief loans have been reopened in North Dakota and Montana to enable farmers to buy feed for livestock. Heavy

wheat losses have been suffered in the Northwest states. Cotton is being damaged in Georgia and the drought there has overlapped into Alabama and East Tennessee.

The South as a whole, J. B. Kincaid, weather bureau meteorologist, said, is dry and needs a drenching rainfall. It has been deficient in normal precipitation since March.

Seasons injury to corn was reported from Oklahoma, Northern Texas and Western Arkansas also to have been affected.

From the Appalachian to the Rocky Mountains there has been a deficiency in rainfall since March. About a third of Kentucky, and many localities in Ohio, Indiana and Illinois were reported as needing rain badly.

New York Bankers Are Cheerful Over Financial Outlook

NEW YORK, July 10.—(AP)—Wall Street bankers were optimistic yesterday over the German financial situation.

While Dr. Hans Luther, head of the German reichsbank, visited foreign financial capitalists seeking a huge loan, the New York Stock market developed a more confident tone, and closed with numerous gains in the principal issues ranging from a few cents to \$5 a share.

Trading, however, was in light volume, the day's turnover approximating 1,500,000 shares.

In the bond market, the German government 7 percent, or Dawes plan issue, sagged slightly. The German 5 1/2 percent, or Young plan issue, however, reacted moderately, closing about \$20 lower per bond of \$1000 par value.

In foreign exchanges, the German mark was well supported, and ruled a little above Wednesday's final level.

Reports that the federal reserve might extend a further loan to Germany were discounted as premature.

International bankers felt that adequate credit would be forthcoming to take care of Germany's needs. There was considerable difference of opinion as to how much of these requirements were. It was felt that what was needed principally was a restoration of confidence.

There is now little doubt that the \$100,000,000 German credit maturing a week from yesterday will be renewed.

7 Okeechobeeans Are Bitten By Mad Dog

OKEECHOBEE, July 10.—(AP)—Seven persons were under observation of health officials today after they were bitten by a mad dog that ran at large three days before it was learned the animal was afflicted with rabies.

A number of dogs and livestock were also bitten. City officials ordered all dogs impounded or muzzled and vaccinated. Six of the seven persons bitten have been innoculated.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—(AP)—While members of the National Miners union paraded in front of the White House yesterday, the government was informed by bituminous operators of their states that "little could be accomplished" at this time by a national coal conference.

Shortly after the operators had concluded a four-hour conference with Secretaries Lamont and Doak, at which they failed to agree on a general conference between all elements of the industry, the paraders appeared at the White House bearing banners which were taken from them by the police.
