

## MacMahan Avoids Formal Charges

# Casselberry Planner Quits Post

"I had previously written a letter of resignation, but Wednesday afternoon 1 filled in the blanks with a date," said seven-year veteran Casselberry planner Dale MacMahan.

MacMahan's resignation, which will be effective at 5 p.m. Friday, came just two days before the city planned to file formal charges against him with the Civil Service Board, citing the planner for conduct unbecoming a city employee. The charges stem from a series of incidents in which MacMahan allege tity used abusive language and exhibited offensive conduct with city residents and employees over the past year, according to Mayor Owen Sheppard.

Although MacMahan had indicated as late as Tuesday afternoon that be had resigning," he said he found himself in a "no-win situation, and I'm resigning because I just can't afford the publicity and I just can't afford the

legal fees." The 35-year-old planner, who received "an unnual salary of \$22,581, said he met with City Attorney Kenneth McIntosh in Sanford on Wednesday afternoon to discuss the charges.

"It was like a well choreographed water ballet," MacMahan said of the meeting, "He (McIntosh) dropped an inch-thick folder in my lap. I looked it

MacMahan said he had submitted a letter of complaint to Sheppard alleging "numerous occasions of injustices to me, and I just wanted them looked into, but

in the letter, MacMahan said one city employee had pulled a gun on him and had also attacked him with a baseball hat. He added that Sheppard's secretary, Linda H. Thomas, had thrown a cup of coffee in his face at City Hall and that an employee even had attempted to run him over with a vehicle in the parking lot of City Hall, but that "the administration took no action."

"I've just taken and taken from Dale for a couple of years, and after he stepped on my foot as hard as he could that day and threw a cigarette in my coffee cup, I just automatically threw it at him - on his shirt, and it wasn't hot," said Ms. Thomas concerning Msc-Mahan's accusations, "He's been a constant harassment to me and other city employees. He pushed everyone to the brink where we just couldn't take it any

# No Problem Police, Fire Chiefs **Certain They Can Work With Knowles**

Herald Stall Writer There may be talk among Sanford's amendment to transfer administration on the ballot in December. control of the uniformed services - the police and fire departments - to City Manager W.E. "Pete" Knowles.

But the issue is not controversial as far as Knowles, Police Chief Ben Butler and Fire Chief William "Sid" Gailey are George M. Harriett and Butler, Harriett concerned.

"I've worked with Pete for 30 years. This (charter amendment) doesn't change anything," said Butler, "He has always worked with me on anything. Everything still goes through him. I fully inlend to cooperate with Knowles, and I expect he will cooperate with me."

Gailey said there is no objection in his department to being under the control of the city manager or the City Commission. "Our responsibilities are to the city of Sanford," he said.

City Commissioner David Farr failed in an attempt to remove from charter revisions the proposed shift in control of the two uniformed services earlier this week. He said he had heard more "chatter" about the uniformed services among citizens than about districting, considered a controversial proposal.

The attempt to delete the proposed shift in control of the two departments occurred at a joint meeting of the City Commission and the city's Charter Revision Committee.

The commissioners have been discussing the five proposed major city charter changes, including, in addition to the shift in control of the uniformed services, changing city election times from December to September, requiring city commissioners to run from and live in designated geographic areas while being elected at large, changing the City Commission's name to City Council, and extending Mayor Lee P. Moore's term in

office from 1984 to 1985. conformance with state law are con-

The Charter Revision Committee, after 1312 months of study, delivered to the City Commission proposed changes in residents about a proposed city charter late March. The revised charter may be

> Moore noted that the commission in 1971 placed the uniformed services under its direct control out of respect for the two department heads involved. The department heads were Fire Chief retired more than a year ago. When Galley was promoted to chief after Harriett's retirement, he put the commission on notice that he is eligible for and will retire in June 1984.

Moore noted that Butler, after more than 30 years with the Police Department, also is eligible for retirement whenever he chooses.

Prior to 1971 both departments were under Knowles' administrative control. Knowles said today the proposed charter change would mean the uniformed services would be administered in the same way as all other departments. He already has budgetary control of all city departments, including police and fire.

"The uniformed services have no administrative supervision now." Knowles said, adding that supervision of both is entirely within the departments. "It's a case of having someone in a coordinating position who can be held responsible for the departments' working relations with the public and other departments," he added.

Knowles said budgets of all city departments are submitted through his office. With all the departments, except police and fire, he acrutinizes purchases, expenditures and the scheduling of work to make sure projects approved by the City Commission are carried out.

The employees of both departments would then come under the city personnel policy to make the entire city organization is fair and equitable.

# Vogt Concerned Court May Do The Redistricting



...down to the wire

Unless legislative leaders and Gov. Bob Graham can reach an acceptable compromise on congressional reapportionment by the end of this week, it is likely that a federal court will do the districting job, in State Sen. John Vogt's opinion.

"And no one -- neither legislators nor the governor nor incumbent congressmen - is going to like that," said the Cocoa Beach Democrat, whose district includes Seminole County

"It will be a shame if the federal court performs this function," Vogt said, adding that the court will look only at numbers and compactness in drawing those congressional districts. Florida which currently has 15 congressional districts, is to get four more before the 1963 session.

"We are getting down to the wire," he said. He noted that the federal court has rejected a motion to hold up its decision to give the Legislature more time to move. And the Florida Senate leadership is refusing to consider a special session on congressional reapportionment unless there is prior

agreement, requiring only a one-day session for formul approval.

The hangup. Vogt said, is an early commitment made by State Sen. Dempsey Barron, D-Panama City, and the Senate Republicans to guarantee incumbent U.S. Rep. Bill McCollum, R-Altamonte Springs, a Central Florida district he wants.

"The Republicans are concerned they might lose that seat," Vogt said. "McCollum appears to be honest, down-to-earth and articulate. The minority party has influence, and the Legislature has no reason to try and hurt him. McCollum's root strength lies with the Republican Party."

He said that to protect McCollum and U.S. Rep. Bull Nelson, D-Melbourne, Orange County would have to be split into three districts.

"The counties surrounding Orange have more clout individually and collectively than Orange, Orange County can't stop the split. But the governor can veto congressional reapportionment, and he has said he will veto any plan that splits Grange three ways,"

The senator said McCollum wants some of Orange, but not too much; wants some of Seminole,

specifically the southern and western parts - he is not as interested in the northern and eastern part wants some of Sumter and part of Hernando, at least the section of the latter county that includes his home town, Brooksville.

While all this bartering concerning Orange was taking place, Vogt said, he and State Sen. Clark Maxwell, R-Melbourne, have been working to keep their home county of Brevard as reasonably unscathed and together as possible.

Other Central Florida congressional respportionment problems have included concern for Volusia County, State Rep. Sam Bell, D-Ormond Beach, wants to keep Volusia intact. While Bell, a member of the House Reapportionment Committee says he has no designs on a district for himself, "he acts like a man who is building a district," Vogt said. He said incumbent U.S. Rep. Bill Chappell, D-Ocala, whose district includes a few Sanford precincts, earlier indicated he would be willing to move to Daytona Beach. Now Chappell wants a district built around Ocala. If Chappell and Bell both get what they want, it is likely that at least the north end of Sanford will be joined with Volusia County,

He said Gov. Graham has had a difficult time working with the Senate this year because of his announcement early in the year that he favored requiring all 40 senators to run for reelection this

"That immediately antagonized one house of the Legislature," Vogt said.

The Florida Supreme Court, requested to do so by the House and Senate, is considering whether those 20 senators elected in 1980 will have to run for reelection

The quality of their food is paramount, Terry says, noting he stayed here to open his own restaurant rather than return to Europe.


Their lunch prices are from \$3 to \$5 and dinner prices range from \$7 to \$12.





Animated film characters and stories have traveled a long way since Walt Disney created Mickey Mouse in black and white two-reeler cartoon shorts, to the fullcolor lavish productions that filled theaters as featurelength movies. Along the way, Disney developed the team format - artists. writers, songwriters, musicians and off-screen actors (often major stars) to speak for the animated characters.



# Getting Into Summer With A Splash

"Hey, Morn! Watch this," yells Johnny as he leaps from the diving board of the backyard swimming pool into the crystal clear water on a hot afternoon.

Mom, no doubt, rewards her young son's painfully executed belly-flop with lemonade and cookies as he quickly bobs beaming to the surface.

Pools - at one time only the more affluent could afford to have one in their backyards. But, according to area dealers, more and more people are installing belowground and above-ground pools for pleasure, economy and increased property values.

"People are putting in pools for a variety of reasons," says Tony Leonardowicz, service manager for a Longwood pool company. "Gas is too high to be constantly driving to the beach, the pool increases the property value of your home so it's an investment; it's better, easier to care for and more permanent than lakefront property; and you get a lot more family - at home - recreation

Leonardowicz says this time of year is the "busy

season" for pool builders and adds that, his company will probably build between 190 to 200 pools this year."

Dick Kay of a Sanford pool store agrees with Leonardowicz that this is the time people are installing, cleaning and repairing their pools for hot weather use.

Kay said his store specializes in above-ground pools

made of steel and aluminum.

"They're just as good as the other pools," Kay says, with a store full of waiting customers. "We sell all kinds of pools ranging in price from \$350 to \$3,000, including pool



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



# Perry Throttles Yanks For Big One

to recognize Gaylord Perry for something besides his hyperactive salivary glands.

Once known primarily for his illegal last Friday night, pitches, including the spitter, Perry battled his way Thursday into the baseball record books - and almost certainly the Hall of Fame - by becoming the 15th pitcher in majorleague history to win 300 games in his

Perry, the oldest active major-league player at 43, scattered nine hits and weathered a shaky eighth inning to go the distance in the Scattle Mariners' 7-3 victory over the New York Yankees.

"Maybe now you guys will remember me for winning 300 instead of that other pitch," said Perry, who once publicly admitted he threw a spitball to salvage his career.

The historic 300th win was a characteristic one for Perry, Nothing too artful, but the balding righthander demonstrated the intense determination that has kept him in the major leagues for 21 seasons.

Perry is only the third pitcher in the last 55 years to reach the 300-win milestone and the first since Early Wynn won No. 300 in 1963. Unlike Wynn, who struggled over parts of two seasons to get his 300th victory, Perry did it in his first attempt. Now 3-2 for the season, he won







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# The Robots Are Coming

"The robots are coming! The robots are coming!"

That's the cry of Peter S. DiCicco, district president of the New England International Union of Electrical Workers.

Mr. DiCicco, who regards himself as organized labor's latter day Paul Revere, says union members should feel as threatened by robots as were the colonists by British troops at the beginning of the Revolutionary War. Indeed, he doubts that unions today can defend themselves against the electronic invaders.

Robots, in truth, have already established a major and expanding beachhead on the shores of the industrialized world. Surprisingly, their buildup has been in progress for about 30 years. Because robot inventor George Devol was unable during the 1950s to interest big business in his labor-saving devices, development fell to small companies. Consequently, the largest factor in U.S. robot industry has been a small firm, Unimation Inc., which had relatively modest sales in 1981 of \$57 million.

But the robotics industry is spreading swiftly, spearheaded by such U.S. business giants as International Business Machines, General Electric, Westinghouse Electric, Bendix, and American Can. All of these heavy hitters have taken the plunge into the industrial robot market within the last year. That these firms are acquiring their technologies through licenses from German and Japanese producers admits to a melancholy lag in American research and development.

The star of a recent robot show in Detroit was a little IBM robot called "RS 1," which picked up small electronic components and put them together into three different sub assemblies. Thanks to a new computer programming language, this and similar robots can be easily instructed to perform tricky tasks. Indeed, less sophisticated robots are already hard at work for General Motors, Chrysler, and General Electric doing welding, heavy lifting, paint spraying, and other difficult or impleasant work.

It's calculated a \$50,000 robot costs General Motors about \$6 an hour to operate against the \$19-an-hour cost for a member of the United Automobile Workers. Generally, therefore, the more robots U.S. industry installs, the lower its production costs and the more competitive it can be on world markets. The United States is already woefully behind in the robotics revolution. This country has 4,000 robots at work as against 16,000 in Japan, for example.

Despite their still-early developmental stage, robots are already toddling from factories toward home and office. Unimation has plans for "Isaac," a 4-foot-robot that will respond to voice command, come out of the closet, take orders from guests, go to the kitchen, prepare the orders, and then serve them. Isaac will also be programmed to prepare coffee, put a Danish roll in a microwave oven and, finally, wash the dishes. Such a home android with an on-board computer may be on the market within 10 years. This, we are advised, will be the equal of R2D2, the mechanical midget in the movie "Star Wars."

Meanwhile tinkerers in basements and home workshops around the country are building robots that observers in the field say will lead to real application advances. Portia Isaacson, a Dallas consultant who predicted the boom in personal computers and the development of pocket computers, asserts that the home-robot industry now is where the home computers industry was in 1975. Robot enthusiasts go much further. They compare today's robot developments with the early days of the computer industry and see a parallel with the start of the long boom in electronics that followed the 1958 recession.

The new representative pointed to the fact that until control of the state Department of Transportation (DOT) is taken away from the governor, he feels money and priorities for construction and maintenance won't be done on a proportionate basis.

"The governor has control of the DOT, it is that simple," Steele told the gathering. "And partisan politics should not play a role in roads," he said.

Steele should have an inside track knowledge of how the mechanics of politics work concerning the DOT. He serves on the Transportation Committee, Commerce Committee, as well as the Work Fair, Tourism and Economic Development Committees.

One of the carefully nourished myths of recent years is that the labor movement is free of apologists for the Soviet Union. Well, the myth is just that.

Consider the case of Jack D. Speigel, an organizer for the Chicago District, Amalgamated Clothing & Textile Workers Union, AFL-CIO.

In a letter to the leftwing Nation magazine last month, Mr. Speigel complained that the journal had permitted "anti-communist confessionals" in the recent issue. He angrily denounced those "writers who have swallowed the highly financed, well-organized anti-Soviet propaganda of the ultraright and militarists."

Mr. Spiegel didn't hesitate to express his admiration for the Soviet Union, saying "It lays laim to a broader democracy than ours in terms of providing for social needs." In a masterpiece of understatement, he admitted, however, that the Soviet system has "civil liberties limitations for those in opposition." Yes, indeed, it has "civil liberties limitations" in the Siberian death camps of the Gulag Archipelago."

As a subscriber to The Nation, Mr. Speigel hopes that the magazine won't deviate from its traditional leftist line. He says it can "safely leave anti-communism and Sovietbalting in the paws of yahoo scribblers for ultraright magazines."

The public has a right to wonder why the Amaigamated Clothing & Textile Workers Union hires as an "organizer" an individual with pro-Soviet views, is Mr. Slegel's attitude the attitude of the union leadership? And what is the position of the AF1-CIO leadership with respect to such views?

The late George Meany, head of the AFL-CIO, was staunchly anti-communist. With Meany gone, however, the union federation may be moving in another direction.

The Richmond Times-Dispatch has taken note of a new direction. In an editorial, it noted that in 1979, "a devotee of the extreme left. Jane McMichael, was named director of legislation for the American Federation of Government Employees. The paper pointed out that "Ms. McMichael has been closely associated with the Institute For Policy Studies, an influential, far-left think tank. The very week of George Meany's funeral, she traveled with International Association of Machinists president William Winpisinger to Cuba for a discussion of undisclosed content with Raoul Castro, right hand man to his brother, Fidel, one of the world's kading sponsors of terrorism."

One of the most disturbing aspects of the contemporary governmental scene is that there isn't any mechanism for monitoring those individuals and groups that evidence sympathy for or involvement with our country's enemies. In the part, congressional committees conducted important hearings on internal security matters. As Congress legislates in the labor area, it has a right to determine whether labor organizations are being used by those who are friendly to totalitarian regimes. Revival of the House Internal Security subcommittee and activation of a dormant security subcommittee of the Judiciary Committee is long overdue.



# SCIENCE WORLD Virus Causes MS?

NEW YORK (UPI) — A scientist reports he spotted a virus in the spinal fluid of three persons sick with multiple scienosis — a debilitating disease whose cause continues to elude investigators.

The same scientist has found the identical virus in the spinal fluid of a fourth patient who has another disease, amyotrophic lateral scienosis.

So what do the findings mean?

A virus causes MS? The virus just happened to be there? A virus causes

amyotrophic lateral scierosis?

Dr. Joseph L. Melnick of the Baylor College of Medicine in Houston spotted the virus and reported his discovery in Lancet, a noted

British medical journal.

He and his associate, Edward Seidel, said:

"It is with considerable caution that we report our results of the past two-and-one-half

years and we emphasize the need for further

work ..."

That was the last week in April. Some victims of multiple sclerosis quickly got the idea there was a link between MS and the virus. That suggests that maybe a vaccine can be developed to prevent MS, or at least a new approach to treatment will be possible.

"The finding is real," said Dr. Byron H. Wasman, director of research programs at the National Multiple Scierosis Society. "The question is — what does it mean?"

Adding to the mystery, he said, is the fact that viruses have been found before in MS patients but none has been confirmed as the cause of the disease that eats away at the lining of nerves, leaving patches where nerve signals from the brain cannot get to the muscles to activate them.

"The virus that Dr. Melnick has discovered appears to be very similar to one that was described several years ago in Japan in association with a disease called SMON — subacute myelo-optico-neuropathy,-"

axman said.

"The nature of its relationship to either multiple sclerosis or ALS is highly conjectural at present.
"Ten viruses have been reported over

many years in assocition with MS. None of these has stood the test of time. "Finally, in the past year, measles and Heroes simples viruses have been found both

in MS brains and in normal brains."

Dr. Robert J. Slater, director of medical programs at the MS Society, in a bulletin to all chapters and branches, made these points

about the Baylor finding;
"The virus which was isolated is related to but not the same as one which was isolated in Japan some 10 years ago from patients with subacute myelo-optico-neurophathy. The investigators do not believe that this would be

"The present study is based on findings in the cerebrospinal fluid of only four patients, three with MS and one with ALS.

a laboratory contaminant.

"It is obvious that further laboratory work by the investigators and other laboratory centers is necessary before the validity of these results is ascertained.

"The purpose of this memorandum is to inform you that presently there is nothing in this work which would be directly applicable in the treatment of multiple sclerosis."

# We Still Need A Prosecutor

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Does any attorney general possess the integrity and independence necessary to prosecute the political allies of a close relative, a good friend or a longtime business client?

The Justice Department claims it can readily surmount such potentially serious conflicts of interest, but the evidence suggest otherwise — and that's why a special prosecutor is needed to investigate allegations of wrongdoing leveled at senior officials within the federal government.

That debate has been rekindled because a Senate subcommittee has initiated action to extend — despite strong opposition from the Justice Department — the federal law authorizing the appointment of special prosecutors.

The first problem encountered in reverting to the traditional practice of granting the attorney general exclusive jurisdiction in such cases relates to the fact that the office has become increasingly politicized in recent decades.

John F. Kennedy selected his brother to fill the position, Richard M. Nixon picked his campaign manager, Jimmy Carter named a longtime friend and Ronald Reagan chose his personal attorney.

Even attorneys generals who do not have personal ties to the president are susceptible to the subtle yet powerful constraints inherent in a situation where they are appointed by—and serve at the pleasure of—the president.

The most vivid illustration of the pressures that can be brought to bear under the traditional system occurred in 1973, when Nixon reluctantly accepted Archibaid Cox as special prosecutor to investigate the Watergate scandal.

But when the White House concluded that Cox was too aggressive, it was able to demand his immediate dismissal because the law guaranteeing independence to special prosecutors had not yet been enacted.

In the infamous "Saturday Night Massacre," both Attorney General Elliot I. Richardson and Deputy Attorney General William D. Ruckelshaus were forced to resign because they refused to carry out Nixon's order to fire Cox.

Even in more normal times, the Justice Department has consistently displayed a marked disinclination to allocate sufficient resources to aggressively pursue cases involving charges of official corruption.

During the Carter administration, the department even attempted to undermine the special-prosecutor law by ignoring the statute's requirement that it must provide "the use of the resources and personnel necessary to perform (the) special prosecutor's duties."

When a White House political aide being investigated by a special prosecutor filed a civil suit asserting that the law was unconstitutional, the attorney general refused to provide any legal assistance to the prosecutor.

As a result, the prosecutor was forced to rely on a legal brief prepared not by the department mandated to uphold the law but by a non-government organization, Common

# Big Brother Pokes Nose Into Trivia

WASHINGTON — I have criticized the Heagan administration when it cuts needed federal programs under the guise of "getting the government off our backs." But sometimes the regulatory bureaucrats are their own worst enemies; their zealous behavior tends to justify the Reagan concept of a Big Brother who is sticking his nose into every citizen's life.

Consider the embattled Consumer Product Salety Commission. It is a prime target of the

Consider the embattled Consumer Product Safety Commission. It is a prime target of the administration's anti-regulatory fanatics. Yet the commission's National Electronic Injury Surveillance System (NEISS) has played right into the hands of those who would like to cut off federal policing of potentially dangerous products.

NEISS plugs into 74 hospitals scross the country, meticulously listing every injury that is associated with more than 1,000 product categories fed into the system's data bank. The system accounts for about 250,000

injuries reported to the safety commission each year, and many of them are grist for the mill of those who ridicule the federal agency's generally worthwhile safety efforts. Here are some examples of the often

frivolous data collected by NEISS:

— Injuries related to drinking fountains

— Injuries related to drinking fountains include such gems as "Ran into water fountain," "Dropped water cooler on finger while loading it into truck" and "Struck nose against water fountain."

— Under candlesticks: "Wood candlestick fell off wall and hit patient in head" and "Jumped down on metal candleholder, lacerated middle toe." Jack he nimble, Jack be quick to notify Uncle Sam.

be quick to notify Uncle Sam.

— Under tombatones: "Lost balance riding bike, hit corner of tombatone" and

"Gravestone fell on lower leg."

— Telephones: "Swallowed a key while talking on phone" and "Ran Into door running to answer phone."

— Pillows: "Jumping on pillow, fell, hit head on stereo," "Put piece of sponge from pillow in nostril" and "Jammed finger and suffered blow to head while in pillow fight."

 Blackboards: "Teacher hit by blackboard that fell off wall," "Put fist through chalkboard" and "Ran into blackboard."

 Bags, as in brown paper bags: "Hit eye

with paper bag," "Slipped on paper bag" and
"Hurt back lifting 100-pound bag of flour."

— Seeds: "Sniffed a seed up nostril,
couldn't remove," and "Patient put a seed in
ear."

incredible as it may seem, these incidents, which would usually qualify as "freak accidents" in most newspapers—if they were even reported at all — are dutifully fed into the NEISS data bank each year.

What's obvious, of course, is that this kind of information-gathering overkill provides ammunition to critics of the safety commission. Ridicule is one of the most effective weapons that can be used against a federal program, and the idea of Big Brother conacientiously collecting information on pillow fights and treacherous shopping bags is enough to jeopardize the entire product safety program.

Product Safety Commission Chairman Nancy Steorts and Commissioner Stuart Statler are leading an effort to cut down on the number of potentially dangerous products being reported on to the government.

Even Dr. Robert Verhelen, creator of the injury-reporting system, acknowledged that it may have gone a hit overboard. But, he told my associate Tony Capaccio, "It's better sometimes to pay for some information you don't need to get information you do need." He said be thinks basically it's "a very cost-

effective system."

But Verhelen said they are weeding out some products. Tombstones, he said, will go.

For faster tree recovery, the application of general purpose fertilizer is recommended. One pound of fertilizer per inch diameter of tree is a good rule to follow. Placing the fertilizer in punch holes will make the fertilizer available

Broken branches should be pruned. Trees with severe bark damage will likely require some pruning, but this the branches and trunk. Most of the should be delayed several months until extent of damage can be determined. Some of the bruised bark will continue to break down for several weeks and smaller branches continue to die back. Pruning compound should be used on any pruning cuts larger than a dime.

Because the bark damage leaves the tree susceptible to invasion of disease

organisms, a fungicide application b recommended. Copper is a good fungicide, making sure the spray covers citrus fruit nicked by the hail will drop off before maturity. If there are signs of borer damage to tree trunks, particularly pines should be sprayed with Lindane or BHC.

The main thing to remember is that damage to trees in the main storm area was severely damaged and will take time







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## Faces 5 Years In Prison

# Sanford Man Guilty Of Choking Officer

A Sanford man is facing up to five years in state prison and a \$5,000 fine following his conviction of battery on a law en-

A Seminole County Circuit Court jury determined that Robert Engene Gordon, of Sanford Court Apartments, 3301 S. Sanford Ave., is guilty of battering Sanford police officer Paul Peterson last December.

However, during the trial, Gordon testified that Peterson was trespessing in his apartment and pushed Gordon in the chest with his index finger.

Gordon said he then picked up Peterson by the arms and threw him on the couch, grabbing him around the throat. When Peterson attempted to draw his gun, Gordon reportedly knocked it out of his hands and carried it out of the apartment. Gordon testified that he "didn't want anybody getting shot." Despite Gordon's testimony, the jury determined that Peterson was acting in his official capacity because he had

been summoned to the home by Gordon's girlfriend Joyce Louise Williams, Gordon's girlfriend who shares the Sanford apartment with him, had called police requesting an escort when she returned to the apartment to get her belongings because she and Gordon had been fighting.

However, when Ms. Williams arrived at the apartment, an officer had not yet showed up. Ms. Williams told the court that when the officer did arrive, she asked him to wait outside while she and Gordon talked.

## Mrs. Hinckley Testifies **About Her Troubled Son**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - John W. Hinckley Jr.'s parents badgered their son to get a job so he would stop "clinging" to his wealthy family - unaware of his fantasies about Jodie Foster and his trips to-stalk two presidents, his mother told a

JoAnn Hinckley sobbed Thursday when she testified that, on a psychiatrist's advice, she sent her son away from home a week before he shot President Roagan on March 30, 1961. Mrs. Hinckley, the first witness in her son's insanity defense,

told the jury she and her husband, Jack, drew up a plan to force him to become self-sufficient, told him to have a job by March 1, 1981 and be out of their house by March 30 - the day Reagan was shot.

She was to resume testifying today,

In 44 hours of testimony Thursday, with her son sitting restlemly before her, Mrs. Hinckley said she never knew about his obsession with Miss Foster or that he purchased guns and practiced target shooting. She also was unaware her son traveled the country stalking Presidents Carter and Reagan. Mrs. Hinckley said once, her son asked her what she thought

of the movie "Taxi Driver," a story about a man who tried to kill a presidential candidate - a story his lawyers say fascinated him. Miss Foster played a prostitute in the movie. Hinckley left a note in his hotel room shortly before he shot Reagan and three others, declaring his love for Miss Foster, an actress he had never met, and saying he hoped to impress her with a "historical deed."

While Mrs. Hinckley wept as she described learning from a reporter her son had been arrested for shooting Reagan, Hinckley put a hand over his eyes. She chronicled her son's early childhood and teenage years,

describing a young man who had few friends and spent much of his time in his bedroom playing his guitar. His father kept "fusaing" at him to get a job and find some

direction, and John went to college only to please his parents, she said. In the fall of 1980, Mrs. Hinckley said she and her husband

consulted Dr. John Hopper, a Denver psychiatrist, after discovering their son groggy at home one day and apparently suffering from a drug overdose. Although they wanted to send him to a mental hospital, Mrs.

Hinckley said, Hopper talked them out of it, arguing it would "cripple" him

Instead, at his advice, his parents drew up a plan to make Hinckley more self-sufficient and force him to make it on his

Hinckley paid two visits to Hopper, and outlined in written formhis obsession with Miss Foster. Hopper never delved into the existence of mental illness in Hinckley, his lawyers have

In one of his last pleas to come home, Mrs. Hinckley testified. Hinckley called before dawn on March 6, 1981, saying he was in New York and penniless. On the advice of Hopper, they let him spend another night on the street, then flew him back to Colorado where they gave him some money, but did not let him in the house.

"Dr. Hopper suggested we just give John \$100 and tell him goodbye," said Mrs. Hinckley, who said she spent three days crying about the dilemma.

On March 30, she said, a reporter phoned her and asked, "Mrs. Hinckley, did you know your son is the man they've identified as shooting the president?"

## Heiress Murder Probe **Nears Grand Jury Stage**

STUART (UPI) - Defense attorneys for four men charged with the killing of Evinrude heiress France Julia Slater have stopped detectives from questioning their clients further while police said they are continuing to gather evidence in the case.

The four unemployed fruit pickers had accused each other of the 18-year-old woman's kidnep and slaying during interviews

The Fort Pierce men arrested for the killing are being held without bond in the Martin County Jail on charges of robbery,

kidnapping and first-degree murder. Police Identified them as Terry Wayne Johnson, 25; J.B. Parker, 19; John Earl Bush 23; and Alfonso Cave, 23.

Johnson surrendered to police Wednesday night while Parker turned himself into police Tuesday. Bush and Cave were arrested at their homes in Fort Pierce during the day Wednesday.

Martin County Sheriff James Holt said Thursday a search for evidence continued although all suspects wanted in the case were in custody,

"We have wrapped up all the suspects and we will put it all together and get it ready for trial," he said. "We are still seeking evidence at this time."

Holt added he "hoped the case" would go to a grand jury soon and would be tried in Martin County but he would not

discuss the investigation further. "That's why we are getting tight-lipped about this," he said. "We want it to be tried here and don't want anything to jeopardize that."

Miss Slater, the granddaughter of outboard motor king Ralph Evinrude and singer-actress Frances Langford, was abducted about 3 a.m. April 27 from a Li'l General convenience store where she worked.

Her body was found some 14 hours later 12 miles south of Stuart. She had died from a single gunshot to the head and had been stabbed in the abdomen. She was killed two days before

## Kennedy Assassin To Make Televised Plea For Parole

SOLEDAD, Calif. (UPI) - Sirhan Sirhan, publicly silent since killing Sen. Robert Kennedy 16 years ago, has been given approval to make a televised plea he has paid his debt for the assassination and should be paroled.

The Monday broadcast will be Sirhan's flust statement to a worldwide audience since he shot Kennedy in a Los Angeles hotel the night Kennedy won the California presidential primary in 1968.

Television viewers in the United States and other countries will see edited clips of the statement on major American TV

Reading a written statement, Sirhan will be the last speaker at a 10-day California parole hearing considering demands the state cancel a September 1964 parole it has set for Sirhan.

The decision to let Sirhan speak - but not to face crossexamination - was announced Thursday by his attorney, Luke McKlasack of Los Angeles.

Sirhan is in the final stages of a hearing on demands by Los Angeles County District Attorney John Van de Kamp that Sirhan be denied the parole date the state originally gave him

Under parole board hearing rules, Sirhan or any other inmate is entitled to make a closing statement in his own behalf. He could also testify and submit to cross-examination.

Sirhan will be seen on television because the National Broadcasting Co. won a court order allowing it to tap into closed-circuit television of the Sirhan parole hearing at Soledad Prison, 120 miles south of San Francisco. At the outset, television and still cameras had been barred

from the proceedings. After NBC won the right to television access, it was granted to other major networks. McKissack said the hearing has discredited charges by Van

de Kamp that Sirhan threatened the life of Kennedy's brother, Sen. Edward Kennedy. Van de Kamp's argument was based on information from convict informers that has been severely discredited at the hearing.

# Prayer In Schools Proposal Praised And Condemned

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Reagan's proposal to resurrect prayer in public schools is being blasted by foes as "despicable demagoguery" and halled by supporters as "a bright day in America."

President Reagan Thursday said he would propose a constitutional amendment that would leap over two decades of Supreme Court rulings and open public schools to daily

"No one will ever convince me a moment of voluntary prayer will harm a child or threaten a school or state," Reagan told 140 religious leaders gathered at the White House for the National Prayer Day announcement.

In Austin, Texas, atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair said Reagan's proposal was an emotional ploy to win votes for the Republican party in November elections.

"We have here an extraordinarily reactionary president who cares nothing at all for the Constitution when it comes to gathering votes," Mrs. O'Hair said. "This man is

dangerous." The Rev. Jerry Falwell, however, founder of

the Moral Majority and among those gathered at the White House Thursday, said, "I think it's a bright day in America."

Said Falwell, "After 20 years of expulsion of Almighty God from public schools of the United States of America, I think this is the light at the end of the tunnel."

Reagan ordered the Justice Department to draft the proposed constitutional amendment. To become the law of the land, it would have to be passed by Congress and three-fourths of the In 1962, the Supreme Court ruled recitation

of an official state prayer by public school pupils was in violation of the "establishment of religion" provision of the First Amendment. Reagan said, "I have never believed the oftquoted amendment was meant to protect us from religion. It was meant to protect religion

from government lyranny." For various reasons, religious leaders and

Civil libertarians, however, stood united against it.

Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., R-Conn., quoted Jesus in opposing Reagan.

"The president is right in saving the First Amendment was meant to protect religion from government tyranny. That is why I oppose his efforts to turn our public schools into pulpits," Weicker said.

"And a co-religionist said in the Sermon on the Mount (Matt. 5-7) when he advised, 'But when you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your father who sees in secret will reward

Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., said restoring prayer to schools is the key to reversing years of declining discipline and morality. He called the Supreme Court decision "ill-fated" and "disastrous."

Rabbi Walter Wurzburger, president of the Synagogue Council of America, said in a

Mary Anderson Cooper of the Washington office of the National Council of Churches, said "We believe that prescribed prayer demeans true religion."

The American Civil Liberties Union said Reagan was "proposing a repeal, in part, of the First Amendment."

We believe Congress will protect the right of religious freedom in this country and will refuse to pass the amendment," said David Landau, legislative counsel for the ACLU.

## Orlando May Lose Consumer Program

ORLANDO (UPI) - The city of Orlando may lose a consumer computer program designed to help shoppers find the best buys because a cable company refuses to broadcast the price information, the program developer says.

"If we don't get it on cable, there will be no radio, no print, no television. We'll move the operation to Tampa," said Michael Shulman, executive director of the federally-funded Consumer

Computer Project. Shulman has asked Orange County officials to review the much-heralded program and order Orange-Seminole Cablevision to carry the price information. But the company, with 80,000 Orange County subscribers, has refused because of "high-pressure tactics" and concerns about how the in-

formation is obtained. The Orlando Sentinel and local television and radio stations have taken a wait-and-see attitude before agreeing to carry the findings. In addition to the cable company, at least one newspaper and one radio and television station must agree to carry the information if the program is to begin in Orlando.

## **Frost Belt** Vs. Sun Belt **Energy Clash**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Frost Belt political leaders are firing the first shots in what could explode into a major clash with Sun Belt states over the revenue harvest being resped from severance taxes on energy resources.

Congressmen from Michigan and Rhode Island - two energy-poor states - introduced legislation Thursday aimed at limiting the severance taxes states can place on oil, natural

The proposal by Reps. Howard Volpe, D-Mich., and Claudine Schneider, R-R.I., also would place a permanent national tax on domestically produced crude oil.

Under the plan, there would be a cap on the level of state severance taxes on energy resources. It would allow such states to retain their 1978 severance tax levels, with an adjustment for inflation.

A severance tax is one that can be placed on energy before it State's that have low energy taxes or none at all could im-

pose severance taxes up to the inflation-adjusted national average, under the concept. "The energy resources of this country, whether oil in Texas

or coal in Montana or natural gas in Michigan, should be viewed as American resources," Wolpe argued. "The benefits derived from the taxation of these resources should be enjoyed by all of America, not just by the petroleum

# Lawyer Facing Federal Pen For Bribery Conviction

William Borders, who will be sentenced today, faces up to 20 years in prison on his federal bribery conspiracy conviction in a scheme to pay a federal judge to grant judicial

favors for two convicted felons. Borders, a prominent Washington attorney and former head of the predominantly black National Bar Association, was found guilty March 30 on four counts of conspiracy to commit bribery.

Visiting federal Judge Edward Gignoux of Portland, Maine, who presided over Borders' trial, will hand down the sentence. Borders could get a maximum five years on each count and fines ranging from \$5,000 to

only 65 minutes before returning the guilty verdict against Borders. The foreman said the evidence for conviction in the six-day trial was "overwhelming."

Borders was convicted of being the go-between in a scheme to pay his college roommate and Altamonte Springs native, U.S. District Judge Alcee Hastings of Miami, to reduce the sentences of convicted racketeers Frank and Thomas Romano and return some of the \$1.2 million in assets seized from the brothers.

"He (Borders), with the help of his friend, put justice up for sale," prosecutor Reid Weingarten said in closing arguments. "Mr. Borders committed a very corrupt act to line A federal court jury deliberated his own pockets with the help of his

"Judge Hastings is up to his ears in this," Weingarten said.

Borders was arrested in Washington Oct. 9, just moments after he accepted the second installment of the alleged payoff from an undercover

FBI agent posing as Frank Romano. Court documents revealed that Hastings had allegedly agreed to reduce a three year prison term for the Romanos and return part of their confiscated assets. Hastings had not acted on the sentence but had returned \$845,000 of the \$1.2 million in

Hastings, the first black named to the federal bench in Miami and the first federal judge charged with a felony, faces trial later in Florida.
