lew Rocket Booster To Put U.S. Far Ahead Of Russia, Says JFK Most Powerful

DALLAS (UPI)—President Kennedy was assassinated today in a burst of gunfire in downtown Dallas. Texas Gov. John Connally wsa shot down with him.

The President, cradled in his wife's arms, had been rushed in his blood-spattered limousine to Parkland Hospital and taken to an emergency room. An urgent call went out for neurosurgeons and blood.

The President, 44 years old, was shot once in the head. Connally was hit in the head and wrist. Police found a foreign-make rifle.

DALLAS (UPI) - President Kennedy and Gov. John B. Connally of Texas were cut down by an assassin's bullets as they toured downtown Dallas in an open automobile today.

The President, his limp body cradled in the arms of his wife, was rushed to Parkland Hospital. The governor also was taken to Parkland.

### **Best** Investment

The matter of improving our schools is one which draws nearly constant comment yet curiously gengrates all too little general interest.

U.S. Commissioner of Education Francia Keppel believes that to convey the urgency of our educational a requires an extremely difficult leap of the imagination. Said he in a recent Washington conference on fimancing schools:

"Children are not crushed in school rooms as they are on highways. This is the difference . . . The basic problem is that there is no real drama. Growth is only dramatic to grandparents.

"It is extraordinarily difficult to get drama into the question of school improvement when the payoff is so far away."

Keppel is truly on a sensitive point when he stresses the lag between the launching of new educational programs and the "payoff" in better educated youngsters, equip-ped for more highly skilled, better paying jobs.

State after state and city after city in this country are busy enlarging their educational structures, adding schools at all levels and including many technical institutions. Nevertheless the gains come hard
