

Three File In Oviedo For Annual Election

Three men have filed as candidates in the Dec. 3 elections for posts open on the Oviedo City Council with all indications being that none of the three will face opposition. Deadline for qualifying is Friday.

Offices open are those of the mayor and two members of the council. Seeking re-election are Mayor Lee Gary and Councilman T. L. Lingo Jr., while Robert L. Ward, brother of Councilman Ben Ward Jr., whose term expires this year, is running for this seat.

Gary has been mayor of Oviedo since 1950 and was a member of the council for two-and-one-half years prior to this time. He was elected as County Commissioner for District 4 in 1962 and took office in January, 1963. An active member of the First Methodist Church of Oviedo, he is vice chairman of the church board and is chairman of the trustees. He is employed at Nelson and Company in the Harvest Department and, as mayor of the town, is head of civil defense for the Oviedo area.

Lingo, a native of Oviedo, has served for two years on the council. He is a member of the Methodist Church, of American Legion Post 243 and is a veteran of World War II. He graduated from Oviedo High School and attended Junior College in Douglas, Ga. He and his wife, the former Lacy Arle, are the parents of four children, Thad, Marshall, Guy

and Robin. Lingo is associated in business with the Lake Charm Fruit Company.

Ward, who seeks his first term on the council, is 30 years old. A graduate of Oviedo High School, he also attended the University of Florida. He is associated with the B and R Groves in Oviedo and with Mead Manor, the new housing development. An active member of the First Baptist Church of Oviedo, he also is a member of the Athletic Association and of the American Legion Post having served in the Army from 1953 until 1955. He likes sports of all types and is very active in Little League baseball. He and his wife, the former Jo Ann Fleming, are the parents of three children, Lee, Cindy and Candy.

Huge Gains In County Farm Economy Told

Although the annual observance of National Farm-City Week did not officially begin until today, Seminole County's Agricultural Agent Cecil Tucker kicked off the program locally this week with addresses before the Sanford Rotary Club on Monday and the Junior Chamber of Commerce Thursday.

Rotarians met for their weekly luncheon at the Central Florida Experiment Station while the JayCees held their weekly affair in the Civic Center.

Also, Don Farrans, vocational agriculture instructor at Sanford Junior High School, addressed Thursday night's meeting of the Civitan Club. Jack Dodd of Goldenrod, one of Florida's outstanding young farmers is slated to speak at Monday's luncheon meeting of the Sanford Kiwanis Club. Dodd will relate his experiences during a recent tour of Russia observing Soviet farming programs and procedures.

Tucker told the JayCees Thursday of the increased productivity of the individual farmer. "In 1920," said Tucker, "the average farmer in America was producing food products for eight persons, and by 1940 he was producing for nearly 11. But during the early 1940's a virtual explosion in agricultural productivity began and has reached the point where one farmer is now producing enough food for himself and 27 other persons."

"Consequently," the local agent explained, "the productivity of the American farmer has increased far more during the past 20 to 25 years than all his predecessors through all of recorded time."

On the Florida scene Tucker pointed out that the state's agricultural economy has been better than the rest of the nation, primarily because of the research and educational programs at the university level.

"Locally," Tucker declared, Seminole County's on-the-farm value was estimated at \$12 million in 1940 and last year it was figured to be between 13 and 15 million dollars."

Most Powerful In History, Texans Told

FORT WORTH (UPI) — President Kennedy said today the United States early next year will test a rocket booster so powerful it will put the nation far ahead of Russia in the space race.

The President, campaigning as though it were election time in Texas, told a rain-soaked, cheering crowd outside his hotel that the rocket booster will be the most powerful in history.

The crowd, estimated by police at 5,000, roared approval.

It was the first of four speeches the President scheduled today on a swing through Fort Worth, Dallas and Austin, the state capital. He visited San Antonio and Houston Thursday on his whirlwind two-day tour of the Lone Star state.

The integrated audience in a parking lot outside the Hotel Texas where Kennedy and his wife spent the night, cheered his call for "concentrated effort" to win success in space.

He told the crowd the Saturn rocket booster will put the United States far ahead of the Soviets in thrust and in the payload it can carry.

Kennedy also defended the controversial TFX (fighter plane as a powerful force of freedom.

He said its true worth had been relatively overlooked in discussions of how the contract was awarded.

The President opened the second day of his whirlwind Texas tour with a breakfast speech to the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce.

The TFX was a prime topic of conversation here where the TFX (Tactical Fighter Experiment) will be produced by General Dynamics, the company that won the \$6 billion contract over Boeing Aircraft.

Driver Unhurt In Car Upset

Orlando resident Henry N. Swinson, 22, escaped serious injury at 1:15 a. m. today when his auto overturned at the intersection of Interstate 4 and CRD 436, according to FHP Trooper Bill Stringfield.

Swinson was proceeding west on 436 when he lost control of his 1962 motel auto while approaching the construction area of the intersection. Swinson's vehicle rolled over and stopped just short of going over an embankment.

Swinson, who suffered a minor leg injury was booked, according to the investigating officer, for driving while allegedly intoxicated. Damages to the car were estimated at \$500.

DALLAS (UPI)—President Kennedy was assassinated today in a burst of gunfire in downtown Dallas. Texas Gov. John Connally was shot down with him.

The President, cradled in his wife's arms, had been rushed in his blood-spattered limousine to Parkland Hospital and taken to an emergency room. An urgent call went out for neurosurgeons and blood.

The President, 44 years old, was shot once in the head. Connally was hit in the head and wrist.

Police found a foreign-make rifle.

DALLAS (UPI) — President Kennedy and Gov. John B. Connally of Texas were cut down by an assassin's bullets as they toured downtown Dallas in an open automobile today.

The President, his limp body cradled in the arms of his wife, was rushed to Parkland Hospital. The governor also was taken to Parkland.

Clint Hill, a Secret Service agent assigned to Mrs. Kennedy, said "he's dead," as the President was lifted from the rear of a White House touring car, the famous "bubbletop" from Washington. He was rushed to an emergency room in the hospital.

Other White House officials were in doubt as the corridors of the hospital erupted in pandemonium.

The incident occurred just east of a triple underpass facing a park in downtown Dallas.

Reporters about five car lengths behind the chief executive heard what sounded like three bursts of gunfire. Secret Service agents in a follow-up car quickly unlimbered their automatic rifles.

The bubble top of the president's car was down.

Agents drew their pistols, but the damage was done.

The President was slumped over in the backseat of the car, face down. Connally lay on the floor of the rear seat.

It was impossible to tell at once where Kennedy was hit, but bullet wounds in Connally's chest were plainly visible, indicating the gunfire might possibly have come from an automatic weapon.

There were three loud bursts.

Dallas motorcycle officers escorting the President quickly leaped from their bikes and raced up a grassy hill.

At the top of the hill, a man and woman appeared to be huddled on the ground.

In the turmoil, it was impossible to determine at once whether the Secret Service and Dallas police returned the gunfire that struck down Kennedy and Connally.

It was also difficult to determine immediately whether the First Lady and Mrs. Connally were injured.

Both women were in the car, and crouched down over the inert forms of their husbands as the big car raced toward the hospital.

Mrs. Kennedy was on her knees on the floor of the rear seat with her head toward the President.

Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson was in a car behind Kennedy's.

There was no immediate sign that he was hurt. In fact, there was evidence at all at what might have happened to Johnson since only the President's car and its Secret Service follow-up car went to the hospital.

A screaming motorcycle escort led the cars there.

The President had landed only a short time before at Dallas Love Field and was driving to the trade mart to deliver a lunch speech sponsored by three Dallas organizations. The largest turnout of the current Texas tour was on the streets to greet Kennedy.

An estimated 250,000 people lined the streets.

At 12:50 p. m. Central Standard Time, acting White House Secretary Malcolm Kilduff was asked whether the president was dead.

"I have no word now," Kilduff replied.

A few minutes later, Rear Adm. George Burkley, USN, the White House physician rushed into the hospital. He headed for the emergency room where the President and Connally were taken.

The motorcade was so strung out as the result of the speedy secret service departure from the scene of the shooting that members of the Kennedy staff were from

the President.

He and three other colleagues along with Kilduff raced to the hospital behind the President's car and arrived at the emergency entrance before litter was brought up to remove the President and the Governor from their car.

When the President was taken into the emergency room, a call was sent out immediately for some of the top surgical specialists in Dallas.

A call also was sent for a Roman Catholic priest.

Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth said both Kennedy and Connally were seriously wounded but were alive.

Blood was spattered over the limousine, which had been flown in specially to carry the president in a welcoming parade. The driver was secret service man Bill Greer.

A second priest was escorted in a few moments later.

At the height of the emergency room drama, a weeping Negro woman bearing a small bloody child pushed into the hospital, where a nurse and an intern went quickly to her side.

Mrs. Kennedy apparently was safe. Mrs. Connally also was safe, it appeared. Both women were stunned.

Thanksgiving A Season?

How good it is that we set apart a special time to be reminded that we have much for which to be thankful ALL OF THE TIME. Even such a fine reminder as the "Thanksgiving Season" has a rather subtle danger which is that we may be encouraged to think unconsciously of gratitude as being relegated to a specific time.

When we read in Psalm 103: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits," we are told that not only the benefits are to be remembered all of the time but the appreciation for them is to be remembered constantly.

Perhaps one of the reasons in the "all of the time" attitude is that there are periods when we do have very difficult experiences and the question arises as to how can we be thankful then. This thought is worthy of an answer, because it does demand something more than a surface philosophy to be grateful throughout life.

One knows that if he is to be thankful in all seasons and under all conditions that he must have faith in God that was seen in such men as the Apostle Paul. He experienced desertion by friends, a sacrificed career, a disappointed family, and even a personal "thorn in the flesh." Paul still was able to say, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God" (Romans 8:28), because he had faith in an omnipotent God who could and did "hold the world in His hand" at all times.

Even when the cold winds of discontent chill our souls and discourage our most cherished hopes we can turn to the God of all seasons and know that He will hear and answer in the best way.

Today, we are inclined to be grateful only when our cup is running over with material comforts and goods but this was not the case when the first Thanksgiving was celebrated. When we turn our history pages back we find that a hard and bitterly cold winter preceded the first Thanksgiving. The people were lacking in food, clothing and shelter. This was not only an inconvenience but was so extreme that the Mayflower sailed back to England with only 50 of the original 102 people still living. The original group had included 18 wives

but only four remained. Of course, it is true that they still had much food on the first Thanksgiving table but their gratitude was primarily for the greater spiritual blessings.

Later President George Washington made the first presidential Thanksgiving proclamation by saying, "Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favor; whereas both houses of Congress have by their Joint Committee requested me to recommend to the people of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God, and especially by affording the man opportunity peacefully to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness."

Today we should be aware of the fact that we have so much to make life good. If we sought to enumerate our blessings we would find our space far too short. It takes very little imagination to name many which are not definitely spiritual. Such a list might contain family, friends, peace of mind, abundance of material things, health, memories of the past, and hope for the future. The greatest degree of gratitude that we have should go out to God because He is God and allows us to be His children.

I must admit that when I think of the many blessings that God has given me I am grateful, but a feeling of guilt is in my heart because so much time passes without thought being given to God's goodness. Perhaps this Thanksgiving season will help us all to realize God's mercy at all times and respond by giving our lives to Him more fully.

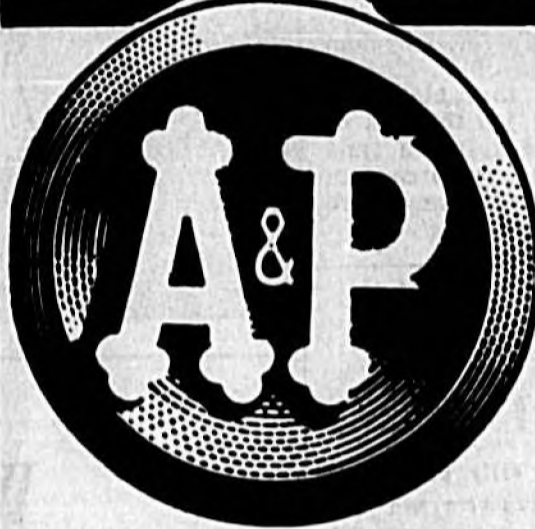

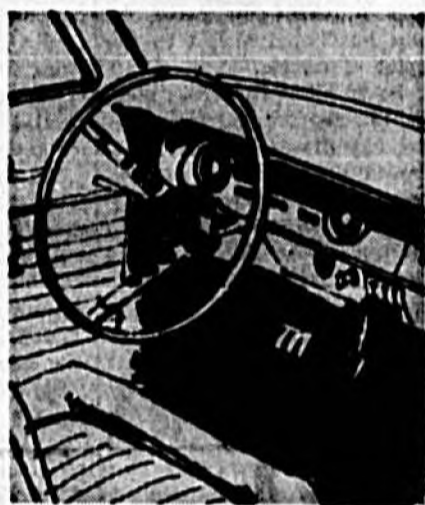

Thanksgiving A Season?

How good it is that we set apart a special time to be reminded that we have much for which to be thankful ALL OF THE TIME. Even such a one-reminder as the "Thanksgiving Season" has a rather subtle danger which is that we may be encouraged to think automatically of gratitude as being relegated to a specific time.

When we read in Psalm 103: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits" we are told that not only the benefits are to be remembered all of the time but the appreciation for them is to be remembered constantly.

Later President George Washington made the first presidential Thanksgiving proclamation by saying, "Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favor; whereas both houses of Congress have by their Joint Committee requested me to recommend to the people of the United States a day of public Thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God, and especially by affording the man opportunity peacefully to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness."

Perhaps one of the reasons for the "all of the time" attitude is that there are periods when we do have very difficult experiences and the question arises as to how can we be thankful then. This thought is worthy of an answer, because it does demand something more than a surface philosophy to be grateful throughout life.

One knows that if he is to be thankful in all seasons and under all conditions that he must have faith in God that was seen in such men as the Apostle Paul. He experienced desertion by friends, a sacrificial career, a disappointed family, and even a personal "thorn in the flesh." Paul still was able to say, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God" (Romans 8:28), because he had faith in an omnipotent God who could and did "hold the world in His hand" at all times.

Today we should be aware of the fact that we have so much to make life good. If we sought to enumerate our blessings we would find our space far too short. It takes very little imagination to name many which are not de-materially spiritual. Such a list might contain family, friends, peace of mind, abundance of material things, health, memories of the past, and hope for the future. The greatest degree of gratitude that we have should go out to God because He is God and allows us to be His children.

I must admit that when I think of the many blessings that God has given me I am grateful, but a feeling of guilt is in my heart because so much time passes without thought being given to God's goodness. Perhaps this Thanksgiving season will help us all to realize God's mercy at all times and respond by giving our lives to Him more fully.

Even when the cold winds of discontent chill our souls and discourage our most cherished hopes we can turn to the God of all seasons and know that He will hear and answer in the best way.

Today, we are inclined to be grateful only when our cup is running over with material comforts and goods but this was not the case when the first Thanksgiving was celebrated. When we turn our history pages back we find that a hard and bitterly cold winter preceded the first Thanksgiving. The people were lacking in food, clothing and shelter. This was not only an inconvenience but was so extreme that the Mayflower sailed back to England with only 55 of the original 102 people still living. The original group had included 18 wives

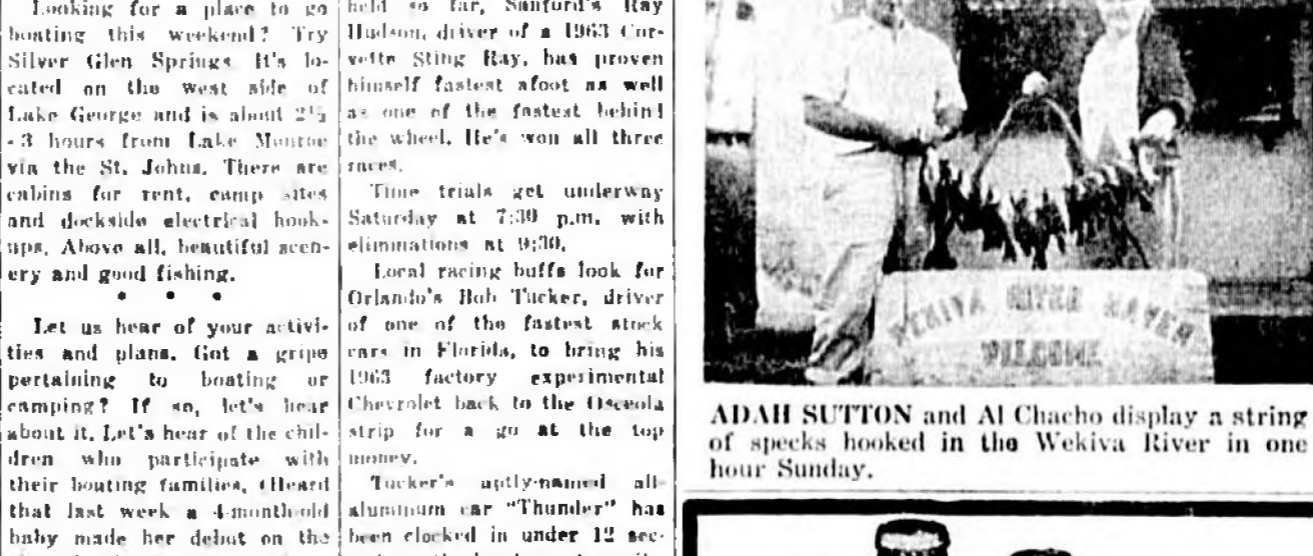

Hamemakers Corner

Thanksgiving Day exactly a century ago was a very special holiday where families gathered just as we do today. But, Thanksgiving 1963 was unique for the day had at last become a regular national holiday that would be celebrated every year from that date on. A permanent Thanksgiving day was the persistent dream of a New Hampshire lady Sarah Josepha Hale. A widowed lady with five children she was the editor of the first ladies magazine "Godey's Lady's Book." This was during Lincoln's reign and he proclaimed the last Thursday in November as a day of National Thanksgiving. So by her continued efforts and campaigning we still look forward to this special holiday every year.

From Washington, D. C., comes this recipe for a stuffing for that Thanksgiving Turkey.

APPLE, CORN BREAD AND BACON STUFFING

This is enough for a 4 to 5 lb. turkey.
1 1/2 cups diced day-old white bread, no crusts
2 cups crumbled cornbread or corn muffins
1/2 lb. sliced bacon
1 medium onion diced fine
4 tbsps. butter or margarine, melted
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. poultry seasoning
1/2 tsp. pepper

In a large bowl, combine white bread and cornbread. In a skillet, fry bacon, drain and crumble. Pour off all but two tablespoons of the bacon drippings. Add onion to skillet, saute until almost tender, add diced apples and continue to saute until both are tender. Add onion, apples and crumbled bacon to breadcrumb mixture. Add remaining ingredients and combine thoroughly.

Had a call requesting the VENISON ROAST recipe published sometime ago. Here it is.

1 4-lb. Venison roast (leg, loin or saddle)
1/2 lb sliced bacon
Juice of 2 lemons
1/2 lb. butter
1/4 cup worcestershire sauce

Venison is a lean roast and needs extra fat in cooking. Rub the roast with salt and pepper, wrap in bacon and roast at 275 degrees in slow oven for about 2 hours. Use an uncovered pan. Allow 25 minutes to the pound. Melt the butter and lemon juice and worcestershire sauce and baste frequently. When the meat is almost done increase the temperature of the oven to 450 degrees to brown the roast.

Have a request in for BREAD PUDDING

Have found several real good ones but I think the reader wanted a simple one.

5 slices day-old bread
2 tbsps. butter or oleo
1/2 cup moist raisins
1/4 tsp. cinnamon

Toast bread and spread with the butter while hot. Arrange toast in a buttered baking pan. Sprinkle with raisins. Stir salt and all but 2 tbsps. of the sugar into the eggs. Add milk and stir to mix well. Pour over the toast and let stand 10 minutes. Press toast lightly down into milk occasionally so it soaks up most of

the milk mixture. Mix chicken with remaining 2 cups sugar and sprinkle over top. Place dish directly on oven rack. Bake in a moderate oven 200 degrees about 20 minutes, or until knife inserted in center comes out clean and top is an appetizing brown. Serve warm or cold. Serves 6.

For hunter widows who see the men bringing in the "Turkey" (like mine did) here is a ROAST WILD TURKEY recipe put out by the Florida Department of Agriculture.

Set oven at 325 degrees. Time: 20 to 25 minutes per pound, or until tender
1 wild turkey, 8 to 10 lbs. dressed weight
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/2 chopped onion or onion flakes
1/2 chopped pimento, if desired

- Any one of these is much harder to find than an attractive looking woman. Yet these are the qualities that make a woman attractive, not just to look at, but to be with.

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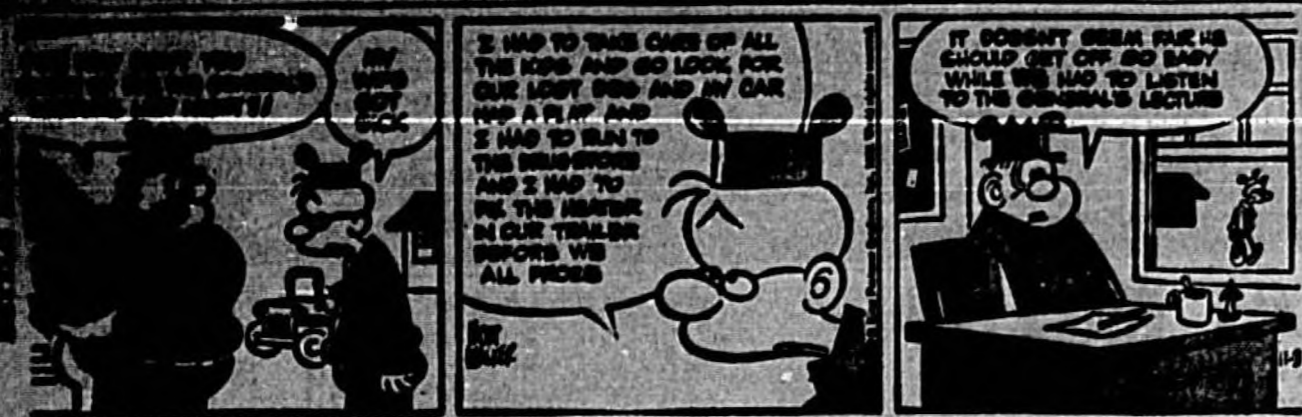

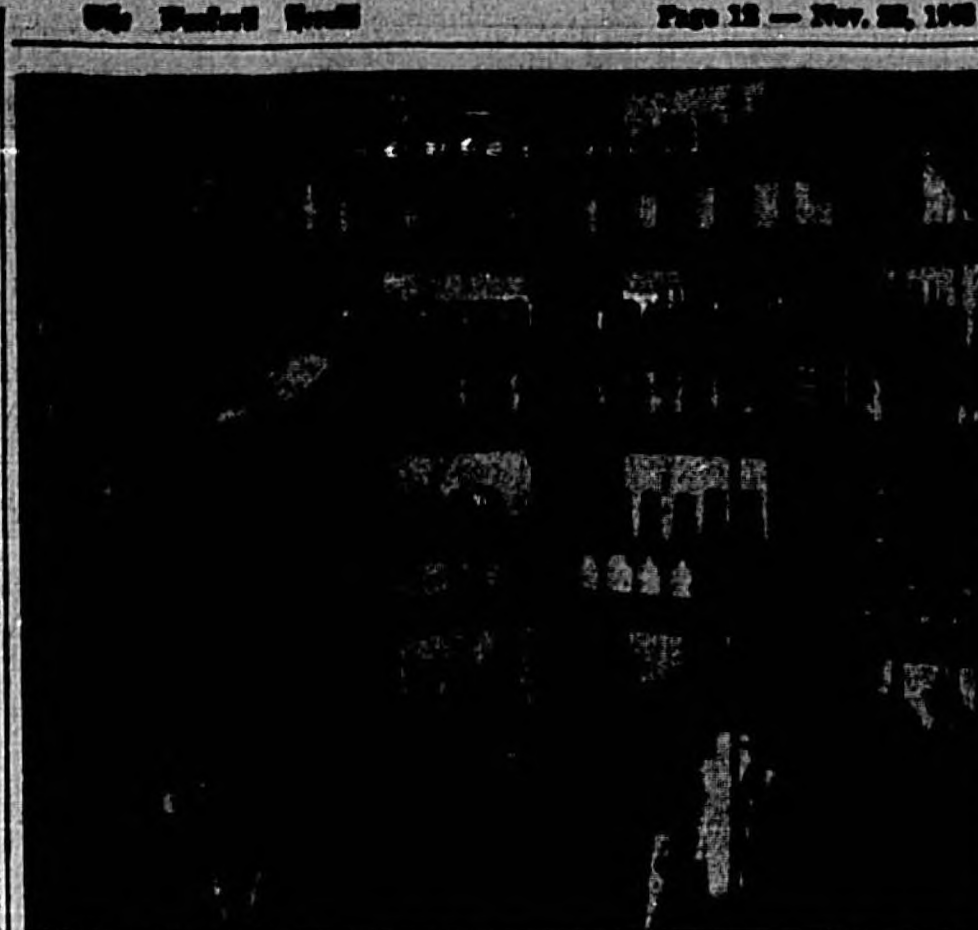
