Sanford Annexation Slips Through

The Seminole County Commission on Tuesday night discovered an annexation oversight regarding property at Country Club Road and 25th Street in Sanford, but the commission still had the last word

in the fate of the zoning of the parcel. Richard Fleischmann and Patrick Zeuli first came to the commission a year ago asking to put a convenience store on the agriculturally zoned site, but the commission denied a request to rezone the

property to commercial.

The property owners then had the land annexed into the city of Sanford last September. County Attorney Nikki Clayton Indicated the annexation running down an adjacent road or extending into was illegal, but said that due to an oversight the unincorporated land.

county failed to note the annexation and lost any chance of appealing it after a 30-day limit on appeals expired.

The commission didn't discover the annexation until Tuesday, when the property owners asked for a waiver to a two-year waiting period for any resoning of annexed property.

Florida law says that any property annexed into a city cannot change density through rezoning for a two-year period without the consent of the county.

The law also says that annexations must be contiguous and can't be tied into the city simply by

The only tie the property has to Sanford is part of the plot on 25th Street, which is part of an old strip annexation of Mayfair Villas done several years ago prior to the state Legislature's outlawing such

The commission, however, followed the recommendations of the county staff Tuesday in denying the request for waiver of the two-year waiting period. Congregate Living Center Plan Withdrawn

Herald Stall Writer An expected showdown between residents in the Little Lake Georgia Estates area in southern Seminole County and developers who planned to build an adult congregate living center in the area failed to materialize at Tuesday's County Commission meeting when the developers withdrew their plans.

Developers Jordan M. Carlucci and Charles N. Millican had been turned down by the county Board of Adjustment Feb. 15, in their request for special exception to construct a \$20 million adult retirement center at the northeast corner of Dean and McCullough

The center was expected to house about 700 residents and 120 and 140 staff members. But Commission Chairman Robert Sturm informed a large group of protesting homeowners who showed up for the appeal hearing that the developers had sent a letter Tuesday afternoon withdrawing their request to build on the site.

Sturm informed the audience he had received a letter late Tuesday afternoon from Carlucci, vice president of Equity Development Systems Inc., saying the developers had decided to withdraw their appeal for a special exception on the grounds they didn't want retired residents of the congregate living center moving into a hostile neighborhood.

Residents in the area had mounted a strong protest against the proposed project, saying the retirement village would have an adverse impact on their neighborhood and cause problems with traffic in the area.

On the basis of the letter of withdrawal, the commission had three alternatives in resolving the matter. It could have accepted the withdrawal outright, voted to uphold the Feb. 15 Board of Adjustment ruling, or waived the letter of withdrawal and held a public hearing on the matter.

Sturm informed the homeowners he had had a telephone conversation with Carlucci on Tuesday afternoon and informed the developer of the options the commission had in

3 City Commissioners Approve Of Warning To Lounge

Three Sanford city commissioners said today that city police officers acted properly by warning the owner of a Park Drive restaurant-lounge that the lounge could be violating city law with its special shows. And the commissioners were disconcerted that the owner blames the community for his failing business.

And even though Bob Beske, owner of Molly Magee's, said he erred by failing to invite city officials to view a performance of a male dancers' group before the police warning, all three said they would not have attended if they had been invited.

City police officers, with the blessing of the City Commission, warned Beske on Tuesday that male dancers attired in bikinis might violate a city ordinance.

City Manager W.E. "Pete" Knowles told the commission Monday night that he would order the code enforced at Molly Magee's unless he were instructed otherwise by the commission. None of the five commissioners objected.

Knowles said the city administration could lift the restaurant-lounge's occupational license if the performers, whom he described as "male strippers" performed there again and if future shows involved topless female dancers. Police Chief Ben Butler said an informant had told police about the shows.

When police officers talked to Beake on Tuesday morning, he

agreed to stop the shows. The city code prohibits any nude or semi-nude dancing or "display" in Sanford at establishments where alcoholic

beverages are served. Beske said the male dancers did not strip, but danced in bikinis. He denied that he had planned to use female strippers in a show. And he said that since police say the male dancers

violate the law, he won't use them any more. He said he was angry with himself for not having the foresight to invite the commission to review the male dancers and a lingerie show featuring female models. But Mayor Lee P. Moore and Commissioners David Farr

and Ned Yancey said they would not have attended the show if they had been invited.

What thrill can I get out of seeing someone walk around in his shorts?" said Moore. "That isn't my cup of tea."

Yancey said: "I don't go for such as that." And Farr said, "It's not the kind of thing I would have wanted to go see." Fart said it wasn't up to him to determine whether the dancing was lewd. "I think the proper authorities to make a decision of whether the establishment was complying with our laws is the investigative division of the police department. It's

their business," he said. None of the three had any criticism for the Police Depart-

ment's warning to Beske or the use of an informant. Farr said, "The way I heard it, the confidential informant told the police there might be a topless show. The police acted on that information. The informant didn't decide whether there was a violation of city law or not. No decision, to my knowledge, has been made that there was a violation." Moore said, "The way I understand the city law is that a violation can be anything that offends the sensibilities of the community. The law says certain parts of the body cannot be exposed. If rear ends are being shown, that is something that is not supposed to be done."

Yancey said, "When the Police Department is involved in anything of that nature, there has to be some suspicion."

Farr lashed out at Beske's complaint that the Sanford community is not supporting his business to help make it a

"Mr. Beske is blaming Sanford and its residents for his own failure to provide good service and good food at reasonable prices," Farr said.

Yancey said, "There seem to be quite a few restaurantlounges doing business in Sanford, I don't think the physical attributes of males and females contribute to good dining."

Moore said he almost had to agree with Beske's assessment of whether the Sanford community supports restaurantlounges. He said he and his wife don't frequent lounges,

Sanford Man Killed In DeBary Car Crash

Herald Stall Writer A Sanford man is dead, an Orange City man is injured and a three-year-old boy is seriously hurt following two separate automobile accidents Monday.

Richard Kim Ouellette, 25, of 704 Mattie Street, died at 11 p.m. Tuesday after his car reportedly crashed into a vehicle driven by James Paul Wilson, 30, of Orange City, Monday, according to the Florida Highway Patrol.

Florida Hospital-Orlando officials said

Ouellette died as a result of multiple fractures suffered in the crash which occurred at 9:40 p.m. on State Road 15, about 656 feet north of Barwick Road in DeBary (Volusta County).

Wilson is listed in satisfactory condition at Seminole Memorial Hospital where he is being treated for an open fracture and dislocation of his left elbow, hospital officials said.

According to state troopers, Ouellette was traveling south along State Road 15

Indians Go On The Warpath Over Regional Center

ANADARKO, Okla. (UP1) - Sherry have not ruled out Oklahoma City, while spending most of last week in Sisson has heard the threats for years, and believes the Bureau of Indian Affairs is crying wolf when it mentions moving its area offices out of town.

But the situation might be different this time for Sisson, manager of the Anadarko Chamber of Commerce, and other residents of the community that proclaims itself the "Indian Capital of the Nation."

The BIA has decided to consolidate its 12 area offices around the country into six regional centers. The change means area offices in Anadarko and Muskogee will be replaced by a six-state regional center in Oklahoma.

BIA officials initially picked Oklahoma City as the site for the center, which will serve educational, social and administrative needs for Indians in Oklahoma, Kaness, Louisiana, Massissippi, North Carolina and Florida.

They recently have been hinting it might be moved to Anadarko because of cheaper rent and the existing offices, but

Muskogee or Tulsa as a regional site.

That apparent indecision about where to locate the center, a choice originally scheduled for announcement in mid-March, has led to intense last-minute lobbying by tribal leaders and community representatives from the Muskogee and Anadarko areas.

Muskogee Mayor Coleman Fite and civic leaders met with BIA Deputy Assistant Secretary John Fritz Friday, hoping to convince him the center should be located in their city.

Anadarko Mayor Ed Otey also has talked with government officials, and civic leaders recently met with members of the Oklahoma congressional delegation

The Creek Nation, based in Okmulgee, has sent a letter to Watt asking that the center be located in Muskages, or anyplace except Anadarko.

Wichita tribal president Newton Lamar, whose tribe's headquarters is in Anadarko, visited with BIA officials Washington.

And Oklahoma congressmen, while not openly lobbying for one site or another, are hoping the regional center is placed in a location where it can best serve their constituents.

Bob Wright, executive vice president of the Muskogee Chamber of Commerce, said his town would be best able to host the center.

"There is ample room here," he said. The commercial rates are higher in Oklahoma City, and Anadarko would have to expand.

"It is economically unfeasible to move it to either Oklahoma City or Anadarko. It can be operated much cheaper in Muskogee. Sisson disagrees, saying the most cost-

'Overkill'— Fact Or Myth?

The many thousands of Americans who pardespated recently in the Ground Zero anti-nuclear observances provided ample proof of the beightened level of public anxiety of at the nuclear arms race. An even more telling measure is the popular support shown in public opinion polis for a bilateral nuclear freeze.

Clearly, growing numbers of ordinary citizens are at least uneasy if not alarmed at the prospect of a continuing arms race in which both the Soviet Union and the United States will acquire more and more nuclear weapons.

Just as clearly, this wave of anxiety is being encouraged by organizations and individuals on the political left, including remnants of the old anti-Vietnam coalition, who are seeking to exploit the nuclear weapons issue for their own ends.

But it would be foolish and wrong to assume that the nuclear freeze movement is nothing more than the product a left-wing agitation and propaganda. Its adherents include lots of people whose personal politics are anything but left or even liberal. Any movement endorsed by evangelist Billy Graham and conservative columnist James Jackson Kilpatrick can hardly be described as left-wing.

Moreover, public discussion and debate of nuclear arms issues ought to be encouraged in a country where public opinion ultimately exercises a veto over defense and foreign policies.

For that discussion and debate to be constructive, it is essential that it rise above the level of polemics and propaganda. Ground Zero activities did provide some opportunity for opponents of the nuclear freeze movement to be heard. Still, it is probably fair to say that most Ground Zero audiences across the country heard only one side of the nuclear freeze debate.

That this was so is doubly unfortunate given the general level of ignorance about nuclear weapons, doctrine, and strategy. Films showing the horrors of Hiroshima do not add much to an understanding of what it takes to prevent nuclear war or to keep the Soviet Union from exploiting its emerging nuclear superiority in ways that extend Moscow's grasp.

Unfortunately, this message is not going to get through to citizens unless the Reagan administration and those who support its effort to strengthen the American nuclear deterrent try harder to counter a protest that seems both logical and popular.

Why 1S it necessary for the United States to build more nuclear weapons than it already has? Is the notion of "overkill" a fact, or a dangerous myth? Can it really be true that the Reagan administration is proposing to spend \$180 billion over the next five years just so that, should doomsday ever arrive. Russlan rubble can be made to bounce one more time?

This newspaper believes strongly that the danger of nuclear war or Soviet nuclear blackmail has increased significantly in recent years. Preventing both requires that the American nuclear deterrent be strengthened in specific ways that will reduce this country's present vulnerability to a disarming Soviet first strike.

Agreeing to a nuclear freeze now would stop the defense programs essential to strengthening the nation's nuclear deterrent, surely the most reliable insurance against nuclear war or nuclear intimidation.

But unless the facts that justify the Reagan administration's strategic modernization program get through to the good and concerned citizens now signing up in the nuclear freeze movement, strategic modernization will be cut short and this country's peril will increase accordingly.

Every day is "Older American" Day at the Serier Citizens Multi-purpose Center at Secret Lake Park in Casselberry. Built with a federal grant and operated and kept open by the City of Casselberry, it serves the entire county

According to Valerie Barber, manager for the multipurpose center there are 400 senior citizens registered for the congregate meals served there throughout the week and from 125 to 150 are fed each day. To be eligible for meals a person must be over 80 years of age and a permanent resident. Those who don't have their own transportation and are unable to get around have the highest eligibility.

Every third Monday the Visiting Nurses Association offers blood pressure tests at the center and on the third Tuesday the Health Department gives tests for blood pressure, glaucoma, tuberculosis and diabetes. There are dances, sewing clames, shuffleboard, bumper pool, an exercise program, square dance classes and other activities.

There is an active RSVP program at the center and volunteer hosts and hostesses are available to give information and make visitors feel at home, said Valerie.

"So many people come down here to retire and they don't know anyone and are no longer involved in their previous activities so they are

lonely," said Valerie. "New people come in here every day of the year. Many tell me This is just what I needed to get me out of the house. The rich have their resorts and country clubs and the poor are eligible for services and benefits others are not, but the center gives the middle class a place they can come to and meet others and get involved in activities."

The center is also available to Seminole County residents for a modest fee for reception, weddings and family parties.

A "35 Alive" Driving Course will be held Friday and Saturday at the multipurpose center under the sponsorship of the South Seminole Chapter of the American Association of Retired

Seniors are not rusting out in Central Florida. Besides volunteering time and talent, they are involved in many of the community college programs. More than 5,000 seniors were enrolled in continuing education programs offered at area institutions of higher learning in 1981.

A Plea From **Parents**

WASHINGTON (NEA) - Recently Camille Bellof Atlanta, Stanley and Julie Patz of New York City and Reverend John Walsh of Hollywood, Fla., came to Capitol Hill to tell Congress of their common tragady.

All were the parents of missing children. They think that the federal government can do something to help the thousands of parents who are suffering similar tragedles.

These parents - and a number of members of Congress - want the federal government to establish and maintain a comprehensive national computer registry of missing children. A similar registry already exists for stolen automobiles.

But the Reagan administration is on record as opposing this proposal in the name of holding down the size, scope and cost of government.

Some 1.8 million children leave home each year, about 150,000 of them under mysterious circumstances. Many become the victims of serious crime.

Adam Walsh was 6 years old when he disappeared last July from the shopping mall where he had gone with his mother. Etan Patz was 6 when he disappeared on his way to school one morning in 1979, and Yusuf Bell was 9 when he disappeared on his way to the store one afternoon in that same year.

Adam Walsh and Yusul Bell were found dead some weeks after they had vanished; the latter was one of the stain Atlanta blacks. Elan Patz remains missing.

The FBI's National Crime Information Center maintains a file of missing persons. But only about 10 percent of all missing children end up on this list, in part because local police departments have not been required to report disappearances. And even this limited file is jeopardized by budget cuts.

Legislation to establish the new national computer network of missing children has been introduced by Sen. Paula Hawkins, R-Fla., and Rep. Paul Simon, D-III.

Their bill would require that missing children be listed in the registry if they were suffering from a physical or mental disability, if the circumstances indicated that their disappearance was involuntary or if they were under the local age of emancipation when they vanished.

Parents whose missing children qualified under any of these categories would be permitted to list them in the registry if local law-enforcement officials falled to do so.

The proposed computer registry also would contain data-including dental information - on all unidentified bodies so that they might be matched with those reported missing.

The importance of that provision was emphasized by Dr. Ronald Wright of the Dade County (Miami) medical examiner's office at hearings before the House Judiciary subcommittee that is considering the legislation.

Wright testified that his effice had not yet been able to identify the remains of two children found in his Florida county in 1961. Nationwide, some 2,000 bodies are found but not identified each year.

"Without a central national data bank 1 have no way of telling who these children might be," said Wright.

"It is hard to imagine a more exciting astronomical discovery or one that would have greater impact on human perceptions than the detection of extraterrestrial intelligence," said the 21-member Astronomy Survey Committee of the National Academy of Sciences.

The panel says the chemical elements which make up our bodies were created billions of years ago in the hot interiors of remote stars that died with cataclysmic explosions that scattered atoms throughout the universe.

Thus everything in the solar system, from rocks to trees to human being, contains atoms from distant corners of the galaxy.

The reasoning is that planets tray well have condensed around other stars, providing Earth-like environments capable of serving as the breeding grounds for living things from the same kind of atoms.

The only hope for the foresceable future of detecting life outside of the solar system is to hope that civilizations at least as advanced as Earth's would be trasmitting radio signals that could be heard here just as Earth's radio and television signals of the last half century are going out into the galaxy.

Several searches for extraterrestrial signals have already been undertaken and the results have been negative. But the committee says the rate of improvement of communications technology has been so rapid that each search has been far more sensitive than its predecessors.

Administration had been supporting a small program to support radio searchers for life elsewhere, but Congress killed the program last year, A total of \$3.6 million had been spent between 1975 and 1961.

The Soviet Union has been more persistent in similar searchers for extraterrestrial intelligence.

The questions of whether life has developed eisewhere, and whether it has evolved into a communicative intelligence go far beyond astronomy, the committee said.

"Yet astronomers, who are in a sense commissioned by the public to keep an eye on the universe, feel bound to ask them and noint

out how we might begin to try to answer them. "It is for these reasons that the committee recommends that in the 1960s an astronomical search for extraterrestrial intelligence be initiated as a long-term effort."

The recommendation was one of many made after a two-year study of the directions astronomers should take in the decade of the

The panel, headed by Dr. George B. Field, director of the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics, suggested that a search in the microwave region of the radio spectrum might be appropriate to begin the program.

"Since the chance for a successful detection in the next decade is guite uncertain and may be arnail. It should be understood that the SETI (search for extraterrestrial intelligence) effort is to be undertaken on a long-term, evolutionary basis."

What earns the old story new headlines are reports that Argentina may be diverting material from its nuclear power program to produce plutonium, the basic material of weapons. The possibility has brought expressions of displeasure from Washington and an Argentine response reaffirming the country's "right" to develop its own weapons.

For a number of reasons Argentina is not the most natural of potential American partners in the hemisphere.

Part of it is history, Similar to the United States in that both countries have been blessed with natural resources and developed vizorous heterogenous populations from a variety of ethnic strains, Argentina has never, however, been able to make it work quite right.

What should be a rich country is much of the time in a state of economic collapse. In recent years it has suffered from one of the world's highest rates of inflation. It's easy to be a millionaire in Argentina today. The central bank late last year began issuing million-neso notes, worth less than \$100.

Politically, periods of democratic civilian rule have been followed by military takeovers. In recent years, the first has usually meant terrorism and the second repression. Under either, the country remains inherently unstable.

Part of the Argentine problem is also very much of the present. The junta currently in power has had one of the poorer human-rights records around. Further, it has been active in exporting its ideas on orderly government.

When U.N. Diplomats Become Clowns

WASHINGTON - Barnum & Bailey have met their match: The greatest clown show on earth is now located at the United Nations complex on the east side of Manhattan.

The place is populated with delegates from many lands - diplomats by the dozens, puffed up with pride and protocol. An uninlended slight to the dignity of a delegation may be interpreted as a deliberate attack on the national honor,

In this atmosphere of continually wounded sensitivities, the world's most experienced, supposedly unruffled diplomats sometimes have their small-boy tantrums. Take the recent case of the speakers' sign-up list.

It might not seem to matter much which country address the General Assembly first, last or anywhere in between, But to a U.N. ambassador engaged more in ceremony than substance, the timing of his address is important. The first speakers are considered most prestigious.

For reasons now lost in the 37-year history of the august body, the Brazilian delegate traditionally spoke first. Second place was

given to the United States as host nation and principal financial backer. The 155 other delegations signed up for speaking slots on a day chosen by the U.N. Secretariat, with a certain amount of diplomatic horsetrading to get advantageous positions on the list.

But this year the secretariat had a new ringmaster for the speakers, a Russian named Guennadi Yevstaf'lev. He decided it would be fairer to award the coveted debate positions on a first come, first served basis.

The formal sign-up, or inscription, was to take place at 9:30 a.m. on April 12, Easter Monday. A formal pronouncement to that effect was posted on April 8.
But word leaked out to some delegations

that at one minute next midnight on April 13, a security guard on the 36th floor of the U.N. building would hand out numbered tickets that could be traded in at 9:30 for the most desirable time slots.

Like fans lining up for unreserved World Series tickets, delegation members showed up to stake out their positions neveral hours in

"Numero Uno was Romania, whose delegate reportedly showed up at 10 a.m. Easter morning to be sure to get the number one slot," a confidential State Department document reported, adding:

"As other delegates arrived during the course of the day, an informal gentlemen's agreement was worked out: namely, to keep a list on which delegates could sign the name of their country and the time of their arrival, thereby obviating the need to physically stand in line for hours."

The State Department account, which was confirmed from other sources by my associate Lucette Lagnado, said this impromplu arrangement worked fine all through Easter Sunday, until about 11 p.m., when the Syrian ambassador arrived in his

Later, the two educators concluded they had somehow entered into the memory of Marie Antoinette on her last day in the gardens in 1789 more than 100 years earlier before the French Revolution swept her away.

To capture the extraordinary moment, the two women wrote letters to each other setting down exactly what they had seen. Ten years




