Major Earthquake Hits Province Of Indonesia

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — A major earthquake hit the Indonesian province of Irian today for the second time within five months, missionaries in the provincial capital reported.

There was no immediate word on the extent of the damage or whether there were any casualties.

It was the 11th major earthquake reported in the world this year.

Reprisals Expected In Ireland

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — Protestant leaders predict a new wave of assassinations, street shooting and bombing by the Irish Republican Army in reprisal for the murder of IRA leader Maire Drumm in a Roman Catholic hospital. The 55-year-old grandmother known to British troops as "Grandma Vescom" for her fiery rhetoric was shot Thursday night by three men who walked into Belfast's Mater Hospital where she was recovering from eye surgery. The assassins escaped. An IRA spokesman said the killing was the work of the Ulster Defense Association, a Protestant guerrilla army.

Station Aide Hit, Robber Gets \$4

Sheriff's detectives today were looking for a man who robbed a service station attendant of \$4 using strongarm tactics and another man who fled the robbery scene in a stolen truck.

Detective Sgt. George Hagood said investigators haven't been able to connect the two men and apparently the truck driver was a "victim" of circumstance.

Hagood reported that a man drove a station wagon into the Exxon service station at SR-24 and 14 about 3 a.m. and assaulted the attendant, taking \$4, the only money the attendant had.

As the robber was leaving the scene in the station wagon, Hagood said, a 1976 International truck pulled into the station. The attendant told the truck driver that he'd have to wait a minute while he called police to report the robbery.

Hagood said the truck driver, believed to have been accompanied by a woman and child, hurriedly re-entered the truck and then smashed it into the station canopy.

Bush Named Knowles Aide

Sanford City Manager Warren E. Knowles said today Allen Bush of Sanford has been named assistant to the city manager, replacing Sam Achley who is leaving Sanford to become city manager at Holly Hill.

Bush, 32, is presently a planner for the city of Winter Springs. Knowles said Bush has prior experience as an administrative assistant at Seminole Community College and was assistant city manager at Pinellas Park.

Bush, who resides at 2800 Park Ave., with his wife and one child, is expected to take his new \$12,000-a-year post "in about two weeks," Knowles said.

Knowles said in the interim he hopes Bush can phase out his work at Winter Springs and also spend some time with Achley in reviewing the duties of the Sanford city manager's assistant.

Achley became city personnel director in July 1975 and a few months later was appointed assistant to Knowles by the city commission.

Achley is scheduled to begin his new duties at Holly Hill on Nov. 23 and is leaving Sanford on Nov. 19, Knowles said.

Griffith Rejects Longwood Post

The Longwood City Council, at what had been posted as a work session, Thursday night offered the job of public works director to Edgar Griffith, currently refuse superintendent with the City of Sanford.

Salary for the position was set at \$18,500.

Griffith turned down the job today, according to Councilman Parker Anderson. Reportedly, a major reason for Griffith rejecting the position is that a city official told him by telephone today that he could expect no increase in salary for the first year. The governing body discussed last night the probability of increasing the salary in the next few months after Griffith had proved himself on the job.

The former public works director, Ralph Fisher, who had been a city employee for 11 years, was paid a salary of \$11,500.

Interviewed for the second time last night, Griffith said he would have to give the City of Sanford two weeks notice. He said he was aware that he would be on call 24 hours a day and presently lives seven miles from the city.

He has 23 men working under him now and was told his department in Longwood would have eight to 12 men.

Griffith was promoted to Sanford refuse superintendent Oct. 8 in a move that was hotly discussed by city commissioners and City Manager Warren Knowles.

Commissioner Julian Stenstrom complained about Griffith's appointment and was criticized for ignoring the city's established channels for dealing with employe grievances. Stenstrom was accused of interfering in Griffith's appointment because Virgil Smith — whom Stenstrom described as "a personal friend" — was not given an opportunity to apply for the job.

City Manager Warren Knowles is investigating the situation, which arose while he was on an extended vacation, and has not yet reported his findings to the commission.

The job offer to Griffith was a 2-1 decision with Council Chairman J.E. Grant casting the only negative vote. Councilman Gerard O'Connell was absent.

Grant favored the appointment of Donald Parnell, superintendent of Sanford's water department.

Another candidate for the public works position, Tommy Jackson, present foreman in the department, was promoted to assistant public works director at a salary of \$9,750. His current salary is \$8,320.

Notice of the meeting was posted on the city hall bulletin board as a work session. Official actions are not taken at work sessions.

However, when the group began its discussions, Councilman Parker Anderson referred to the minutes of a previous meeting and insisted that the session was a special meeting and thus action could be taken.

Florida Economic Report Predicts Sluggish Recovery

Refuge Gets More Wetlands

MIAMI (AP) — The federal government, at a cost of \$1.3 million, has added 2,940 acres of coastal wetlands and mangrove islands to the Great White Heron National Wildlife Refuge in the lower Florida Keys. The purchase, completed Thursday by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, expands the refuge by more than 30 per cent. The refuge is an important feeding ground for the state's wading birds and is also a wintering home for many other bird species.

Compensation Abuses Cited

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Workmen's compensation insurance, which has soared in price the past year, is being treated by videscale abuses which are costing insurers millions of dollars, one official warns. And many of those abuses were prompted by attorneys, C.C. Offer Choice In Problem-Solving Feather, Jackson Vie For School Board

The school board race in District 2 of Seminole County offers voters a choice between two candidates with diverse backgrounds, experience and points of view on the proper approach to handling problems in the local school system. Incumbent Robert G. (Bud) Feather grew up as an only child in West Virginia, then moved to Gainesville during his high school years and later attended the University of Florida. Now a self-employed real estate broker, Feather said he ran for the school board in 1972 after finding that flaws in the Seminole school system made it difficult to sell real estate.

Challenger Francis Coleman Jackson holds the promise of a fresh approach to dealing with school problems. A native of Ebro, Ala., Mrs. Jackson was the eldest of 10 girls and four of her sisters now teach in Seminole County, as she herself did for three years. Mrs. Jackson attended Savannah State College in Georgia and earned her teaching credentials at Florida Technological University.

The function of the school board is to establish policy. Asked how she would determine whether board policy was being carried out, Mrs. Jackson answered, "Through the PTA, teachers, principals, the administration, the countywide advisory committee and local school advisory committees. I would follow up with school visitation, by holding conferences with principals, teachers and administrators, by meeting with and establishing a working relationship with the countywide advisory committee," Mrs. Jackson said.

"The reason for having a policy," responded Feather, "is to insure that no matter what the subject matter might be, it deal fairly with, and be in the best interest of, the county's students. Anything contrary to that... is brought to the board for a hearing. That's one of the main reasons there are public school board meetings. What sort of follow-up procedure I used would depend upon the type of policy in question."

On whether changes should be instituted in the area of a school principal's qualifications, assignments, evaluations or autonomy, Feather favored new procedures in three of the four categories. "Qualifications, no," Feather said. "Several years ago the board instituted a principal-training program which, based on the performance of our many new principals, has proved to be effective. Assignments, yes. But you'll hear about these possible changes at upcoming board meetings."

"Evaluations, yes," he continued. "For instance, the state's new Statewide Assessment Program instituted this year will show how each school performs. Autonomy, yes. One change lacking piece is that the board has established a Curriculum Advisory

Committee which has attacked the problem of articulation." Mrs. Jackson, on the other hand, feels that no real changes are required.

"A principal will qualify by going back to school or through inservice training to meet changes," she said. "Reassignment of principals will not make an action good faith (if this is the reason for the reassignment). Evaluations of principals should include at least one teacher from his or her school who has been chosen by the faculty. Otherwise I think evaluation of principals is adequate."

Both candidates agreed that leveling tests should be used as instruments to guarantee that certain basic concepts are being taught at all levels in every school.

"This is the only tool I know," said Mrs. Jackson, "that could be used to know what concepts are being taught and what concepts the child has obtained."

"One of my strongest desires," Feather declared, "is to establish a thorough CTSB (Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills) testing program, and we have made much headway, as evidenced by the amount budgeted for this program this year. And next year we'll be able to save taxpayers' dollars by having them graded in our own data processing center."

With respect to the usefulness of school advisory committees and the manner in which the Countywide School Advisory Committee can assist the Seminole school board, both hopefuls asserted that school advisory committees are "of great value."

"The main reason our schools rate among the best in the state is because of our parents' interest and dedication," Feather said. "And these committees give them organized input into the board. I have found the Countywide School Advisory Committee to be the most reliable, non-biased information source, and I use this information to try and make decisions which are in the best interest of the county as a whole."

Mrs. Jackson said she felt the countywide advisory committee was something which "should be kept."

"But," she stressed, "there has to be a working relationship between the board and the committee. The people who make up this committee have a lot to offer the board. Board members should devote an adequate amount of time to the committee so

they can function and serve the needs for which it was formed." The non-partisan outsiders were asked to specifically consider how, as board members, they could make the best use of a \$1 million "no-strings-attached" gift to the Seminole school system.

"I'll be given \$1 million, no strings attached," Mrs. Jackson replied, "I would take the money to conduct a study to implement the 'best' program ever of teaching our children the basic three 'Rs.' A perfect back-to-basics curriculum."

"Assuming that the \$1 million gift is a one-time-only contribution," said Feather, "it could not be put into any type of substantial continuing program, because there is no assurance that the taxpayers would want to use as a capital outlay item, say, like in a consolidated administration building in the center of the county."

"If you can get someone to donate the money," Feather concluded, "I'll make the motion to name the building after him."

Coffee Triggers Extra Heartbeats

DEAR DR. LAMB — I read your column about the lady who had paroxysmal tachycardia. I have it too and I'm 34 years old and a mother of two. I felt just as bad as she did until I quit drinking coffee and all kinds of caffeine. Even though I only drank two cups of coffee I guess my heart just couldn't handle any kind of caffeine anymore. Since I have stopped I feel just great (I feel like I am born again). If she would try that it could make all the difference to her.

DEAR READER — I have mentioned several times in the column that coffee can stimulate extra beats of the heart, flip-flops and other problems of irregularity of the heart, as regular readers know. Your letter makes an important point. Some people are more sensitive to caffeine than others. One or two cups of coffee have little effect at all on some people. Other people are not so lucky. Yes, anyone who has irregularity of the heart should avoid coffee, tea, colas, chocolate and cocoa. Also they should avoid anything that causes indigestion or acid stomach. Cigarettes should also be avoided. All of these can cause susceptible people to have attacks.

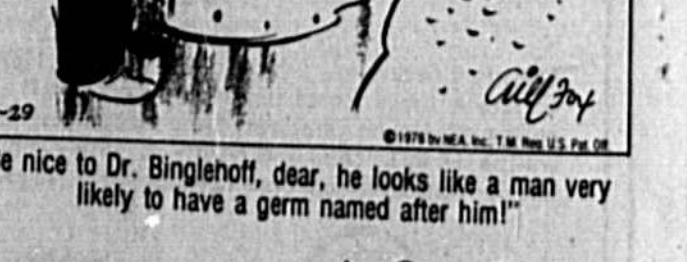

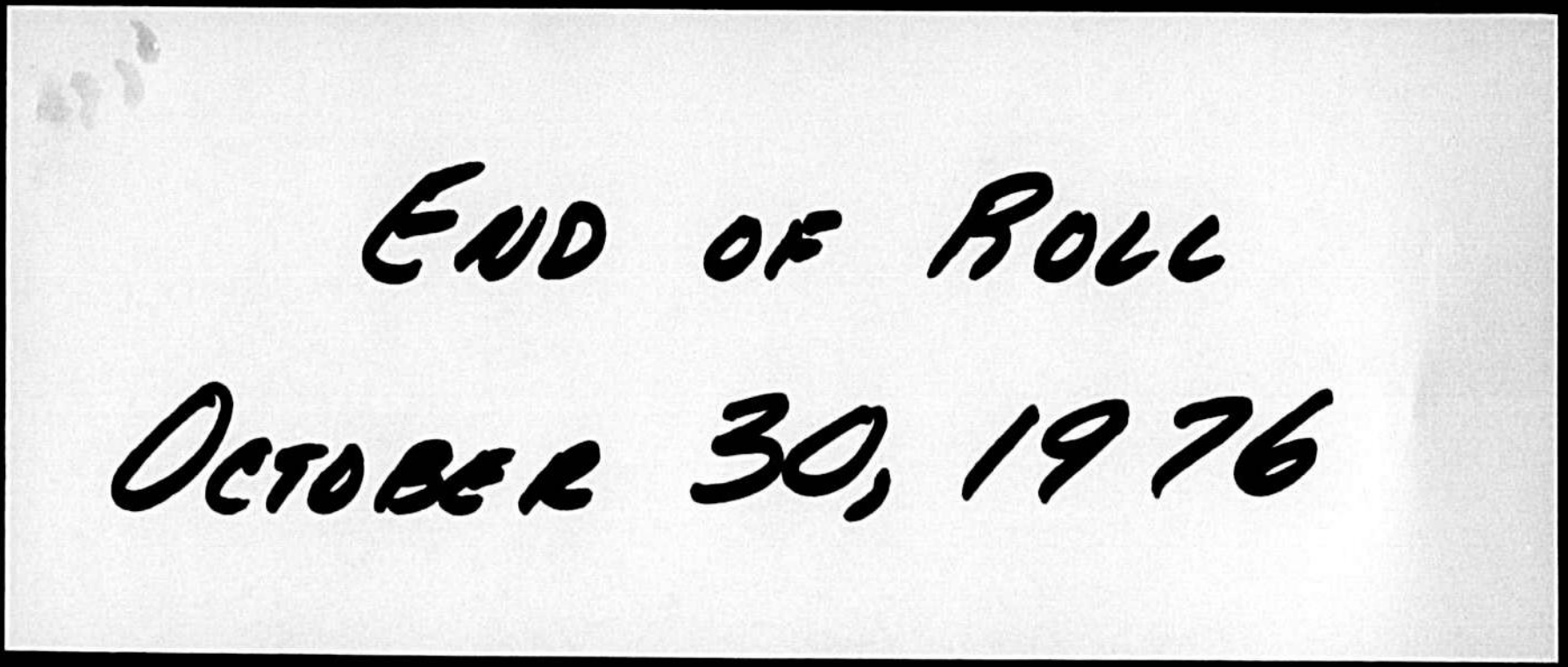
