Strategists of World War experience pointed out that, except for lack of preparedness, the Germans could have broken through the French lines and captured Paris in September or October.

Firemen Disclaim Sending Letters Okeying Candidate

WEST PALM BEACH, May 16.—(UPI)—The Florida State Firemen's Association, ending its three-day convention here Tuesday, disclaimed responsibility for letters numbers and were mailed from Sanford on May 9 under the name of the association, and purporting to be the group's official endorsement of one political candidate and in opposition to his opponent.

Cleveland of Sanford, second vice president; and Mrs. Bert Taylor, Tampa, vice president, and Mrs. Harry Gleason, Miami, treasurer. Mrs. L. Taylor, Vero Beach, was named second vice president, and Mrs. P. P. Fielding, Tampa, secretary.
