

Hospital Has New System To Detect Breast Cancer

Joy Lambert and Becky Wigham, both radiologic technicians at Seminole Memorial Hospital, have an important message for Seminole County women. In essence, it is this: when breast cancer is diagnosed and treated early, 85 per cent of patients will survive to live five years or more.

Seminole Memorial Hospital now has what the two women term "the most modern and accurate means of detecting breast cancer available." It is the Xeroradiography 125 System — a long name for a rather plain looking machine which quickly and painlessly "photographs" the internal breast tissue. So detailed are the pictures it produces that they show cancer growths and other foreign bodies as small as one millimeter in size.

The machine is rented by the hospital. During the first six weeks of being in use, it has already helped in the detection of a number of cases of breast cancer.

According to the radiologic technicians, about 10 women undergo the xeroradiography testing each week, and on the average, one woman with breast cancer is detected every two or three weeks.

The cost per patient of the Xeroradiography treatment is \$39.

The Xeroradiography system, developed by the Xerox Company, is particularly relevant in detecting change in breast shape and size and picking up the presence of cancer tissue in women with large breasts that are difficult to examine; women with a family history of breast cancer; women who have undergone a mastectomy operation; women with a chronic cystic disease and women who have detected a lump in their breast during breast self examination.

In order to inform the public that the machine is now installed

at the hospital, and to impress upon women the importance of detecting cancer early, Ms. Lambert and Ms. Wigham have been talking to women's groups in churches, clubs and businesses throughout the county. One of their most recent presentations was at the luncheon meeting of the Sanford Rotary Club; they hoped the men attending would carry the good news to their wives, mothers, sisters or daughters.

Ms. Wigham begins the presentation by reciting statistics. Not many, but her audience gets the shocking message.

One in every 15 American women will develop breast cancer in her lifetime. Last year, a total of 88,000 American women developed the dread disease, and 33,600 died from it.

Breast cancer is the leading cause of death in women aged 40 to 44. It is second in all other age groups.

The American Cancer Society projects that 20 per cent of female deaths this year will be the result of breast cancer. Breast cancer is the most common kind of cancer in women.

Not only do Ms. Lambert and Ms. Wigham tell of the advantages of the Xeroradiography system — that it is 95.6 per cent accurate; delivers less radiation than other X-ray techniques; gives an easier, clearer reading and an immediate reading; and processes the pictures automatically without a use of a dark room. But they also talk and show a film on the importance of breast self examination.

"Simple breast self examination means monthly peace of mind," said Ms. Lambert. The film, which clearly depicts the methods of breast self examination, is available for use by any organization which would like to share its vital message with women in Seminole County. Ms. Lambert and Ms. Wigham are eager to make their presentation on breast cancer to as many women as possible. They may be contacted through the hospital.

PARIS — Anybody who declared that a white or formal wedding no longer interested young couples would have had to eat his words after visiting the first "Salon du Mariage" recently held here.

The organizers based their efforts on statistics revealing 400,000 marriages were performed last year in France. They dreamed up an emporium of just about everything related to a wedding, plus a display of dreamy wedding dresses.

The salon proved an immense success. Over 10,000 people came, despite the absence of advance publicity. Admission was free and visitors were greeted by a bevy of pretty young hostesses who led the way to the bar where a glass of champagne and a piece of wedding cake were offered.

On show a young couple could see all the things that could be loosely connected with the "happiest day" of their lives.

From caterer to house agent, from honeymoon cruises to house furnishings, from table decorations to furniture (ranging from Louis XV pieces to more modern ideas), a book store, a florist, a bank, a legal advisor, a display of wedding rings, and, finally, a booth run by the representative of a well-known marriage bureau — for the timid soul. The book store provided a choice of cookbooks, hints on homemaking and a solemn volume on contraception.

At the salon we learned the cost of an average wedding usually comes to about \$5,000. There were four fashion shows a day run by the three leading wedding-dress specialists in Paris — Aurore, Pronuptia and Cerec. Their models range in price from \$100 to \$1,000 and up, and offered a dazzling procession of romantic, ethereal wedding dresses for every type. According to reports, brides still favor a train of sorts, while veils vary from the brief shoulder length to yards and yards of fluttering net or a widebrimmed picture hat.

Pure white still is the favorite even though a mod bride might choose to be married in a daytime dress.

Tradition Still Rules For Rings

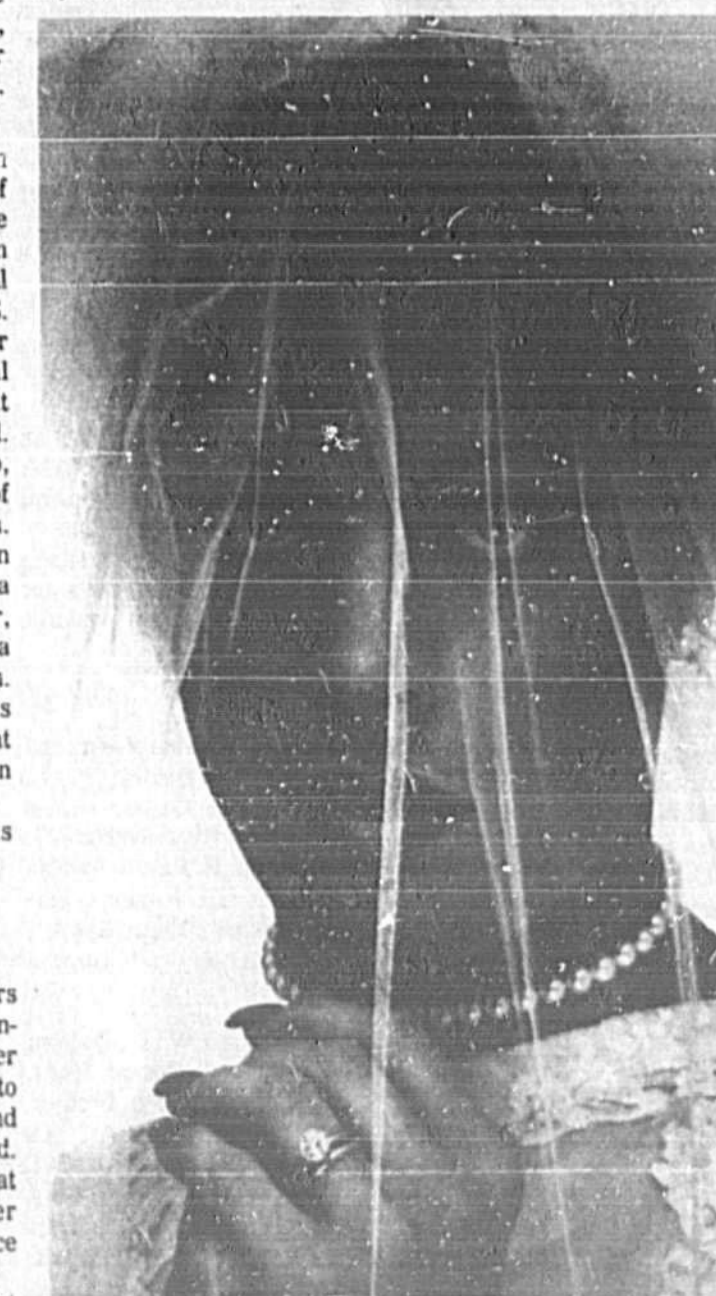
There's one place tradition still reigns — on the third finger of the left hand for the woman about to say "I do."

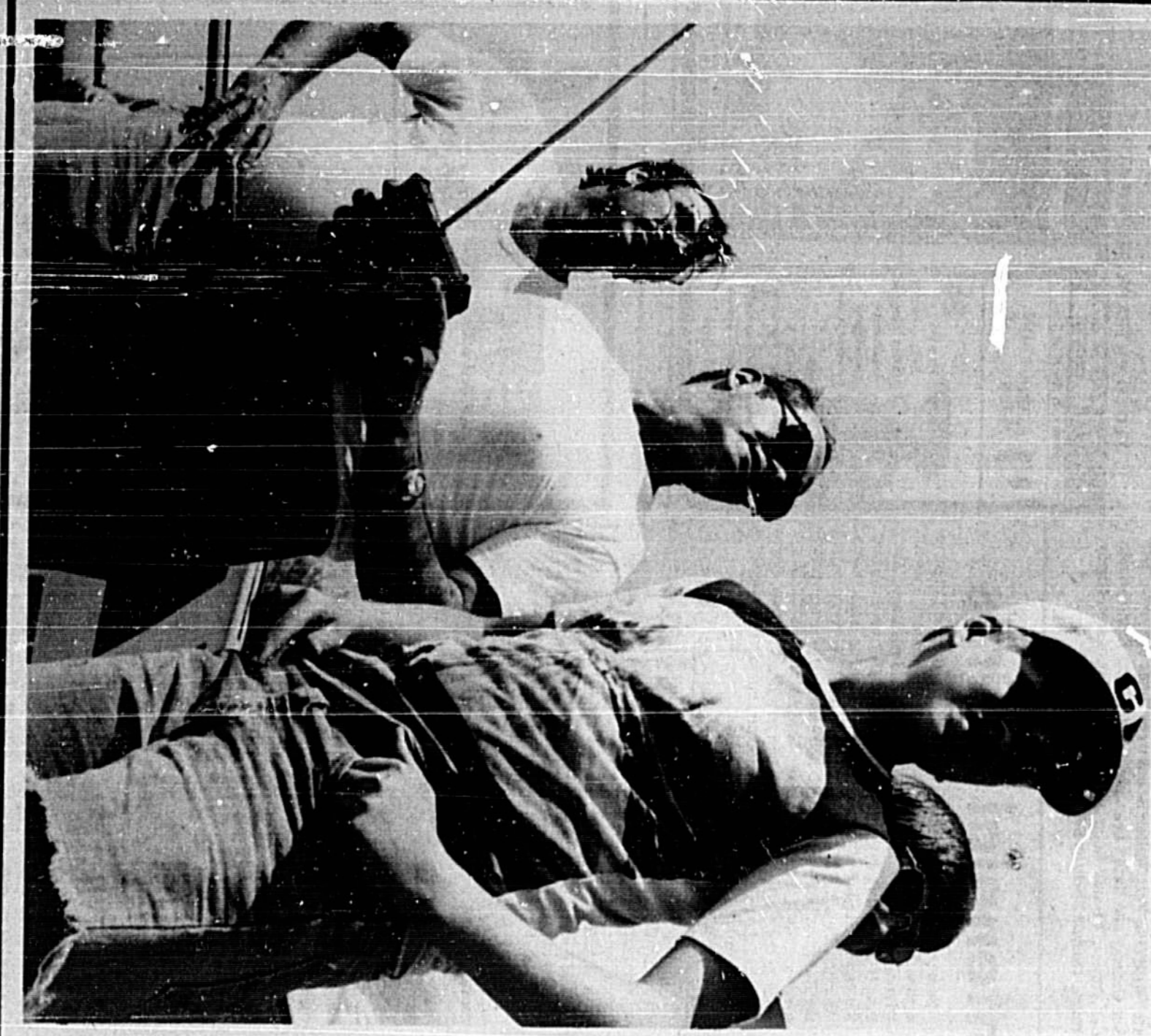

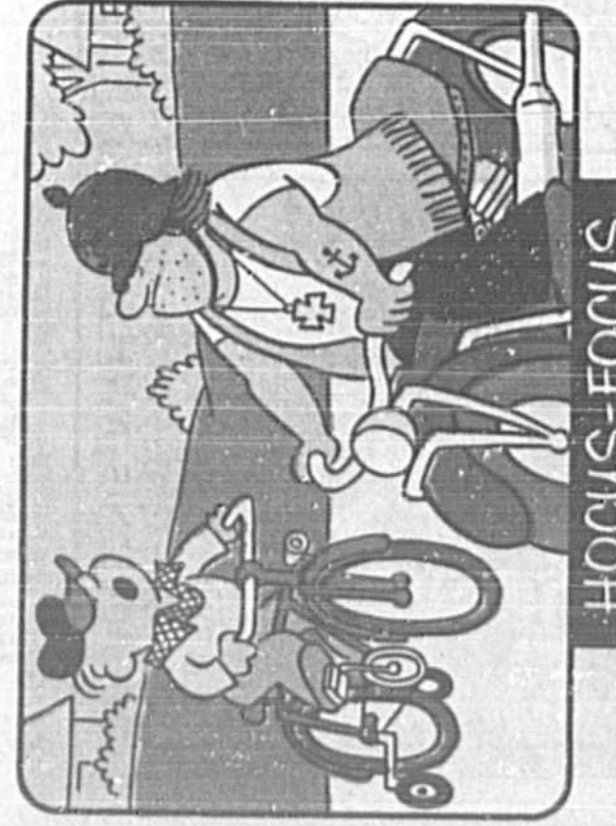
