Mexico is not solely responsible for the establishment and operation of them. That is a blot that rests in large part on the record of Americans.

Heavy tribute is paid the officials here by the American owners of the establishments, gambling halls, saloons and other dens. The hundreds of fallen women, most of them Americans, also pay their tribute to corrupt officials. The whole thing, in short, is a striking combination of Mexican laxity and American greed.

The "clean-up" campaign that is on here now is the strangest clean-up campaign the world ever saw. At this moment it consists chiefly in the collection of heavier graft by the government from those who are engaged in illicit occupations.

200 Are Waiting
It will reach its climax of hypocrisy in a few days when a huge frame building now under construction on a side street is completed. That building is of great extent, and into it will be moved all the inmates of the countless dens and dives on Sec-

informed that Tia Juana has put its house in order.

More than 200 American women are now waiting in San Diego for the opening of this resort. It will be one of the largest institutions of its own terrible kind in the entire world.

For a few days after the Petest outrage the American saloon and dive owners were worried lest the city be really closed. But now they are at ease again.

"It will be only a few days now until business will be better than usual," one told me. "We knew that officials here wouldn't do anything, and we didn't really believe that the American government could do anything."

Heading for Home

In the evening long strings of automobiles wind their way out of town and across the plain to the international line and the road to San Diego and the north. They carry back loads of tourists, "suckers," and the like headed home after a day of what passes for amusement.

Later, when the tourists have left, other autos head north over the line into the United States. They carry men who own and operate the unspakable dives here—carry them back to their homes in the United States.

Amundsen to Wed Childhood Sweetheart If His Proposed Flight to North Pole Succeeds

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 23.—One more trip to the Arctic and—if it is successful—Roald Amundsen, famous Norwegian explorer will marry and settle down to a quiet home life in his native land.

If you would know why, go back about 40 years and take a peek into a little school room of Oslo—then known as Christiania—Norway. Taking his sweetheart by the hand Roald, a 14-year old youngster, led her to a far corner of the room where stood a globe of the world.

"Some day I am going to discover the north and south poles. Then I am coming back and marry you," he said.

And, with school-girl faith, his sweetheart promised to wait.

Having passed the halfway mark of the long road to his goal by discovering the south pole in 1911, Amundsen is about to realize the rest of his school-boy dream. He will take off from King's Bay in a huge dirigible May 1, bound for the Arctic.

His is confident that on this trip he will discover the north pole. Then he will return to marry the sweetheart of 40 years ago whose name he refuses to reveal—but who, he admits, is still waiting.

"And then the polar regions will be forgotten," says the man who has spent the best years of his life among the icebergs of the Arctic and Antarctic oceans.

"We will buy a small home somewhere on the outskirts of Oslo and live there quietly."

"But of course, that's only on condition I find the north pole. I will never quit until it has been discovered, and these trips into unknown regions are not for married men."

Amundsen started his long career of ice-bound journey in 1897

when he sailed with the Belgian Antarctic expedition. It failed to discover the south pole and the expedition returned home two years later.

"For several years after that I made trips to the Arctic and secured my master's certificate," says Amundsen. "Then in 1911, we sailed for the south pole again. It was on this trip—my second one—that we discovered the pole."

"According to our present plans, we will cover 2100 miles on our trip this spring. Our dirigible, the *Norde*, is about one-third the size of the *Shenandoah*. I don't think there is any doubt that we will discover the pole on this trip. "Then we will continue flying straight over to Alaska, searching for a continent believed to lie between the pole and North America."

Two Die In Orlando Automobile Mishap

ORLANDO, Fla., Feb. 24 (AP)—William F. Mays, 25, of Orlando and Viola Libby, 22, of West Pownal, Maine, were instantly killed late last night when a front axle of the roadster driven by Mays broke, causing the car to turn over a number of times, finally crashing into a post.

Miss Libby's chest was crushed, neck broken, and spine twisted; Mays' back was broken between the shoulders and his chest crushed. Skid marks on the road showed that Mays had applied the brakes and skidded over 20 feet. Their bodies were found mangled together, in the seat of the car about half an hour after the accident.

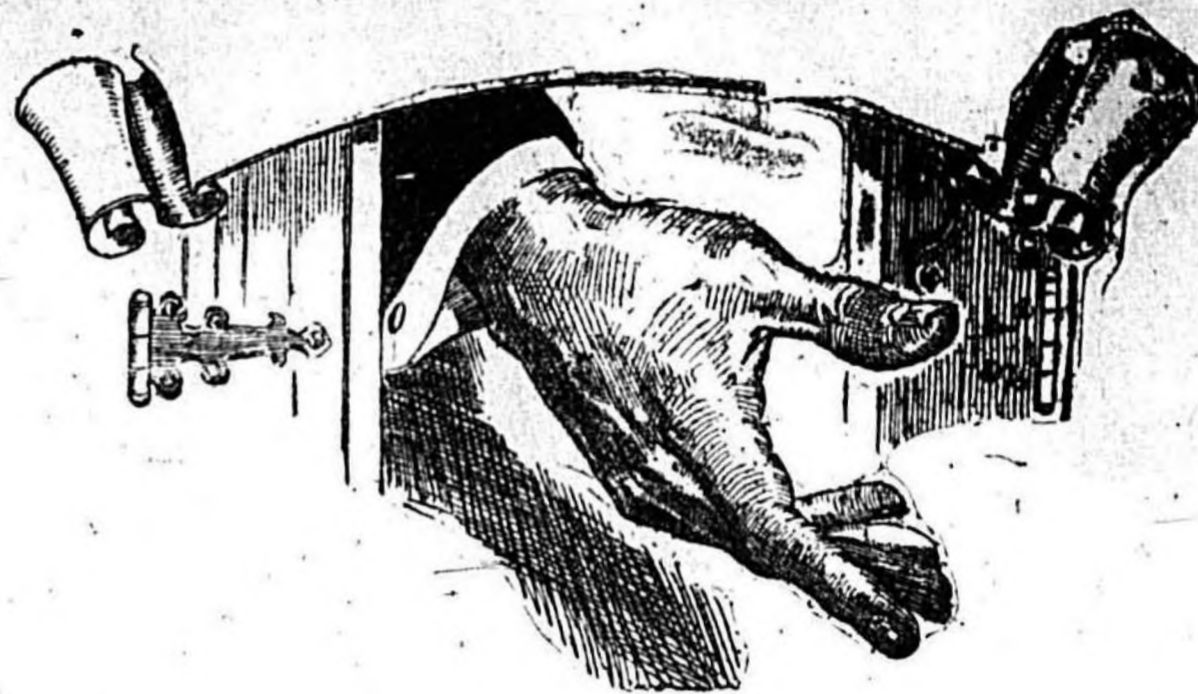

President Pleased With Progress Of Present Congress

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—(AP)—President Coolidge believes the present Congress has about established a record for expeditious legislation and he hopes that as a result an adjournment will be possible in good season.

An outline of the President's views, given out today at the White House, disclosed that he is particularly interested now in the

tax, appropriation and aviation bills as well as in proposed farm and railroad legislation but is satisfied with the progress by Congress in the treatment of those measures.

The President is anxious that the recommendations of his air board be adequately cared for in a legislative way and remain opposed to legislation which would go beyond those recommendations.

It is his contention that the United States should have a good air service but should exercise caution to prevent the building of military aviation to a point where it might be carried to the extreme or become competitive in theory, thereby opposing the race between nations for competitive air power projects.

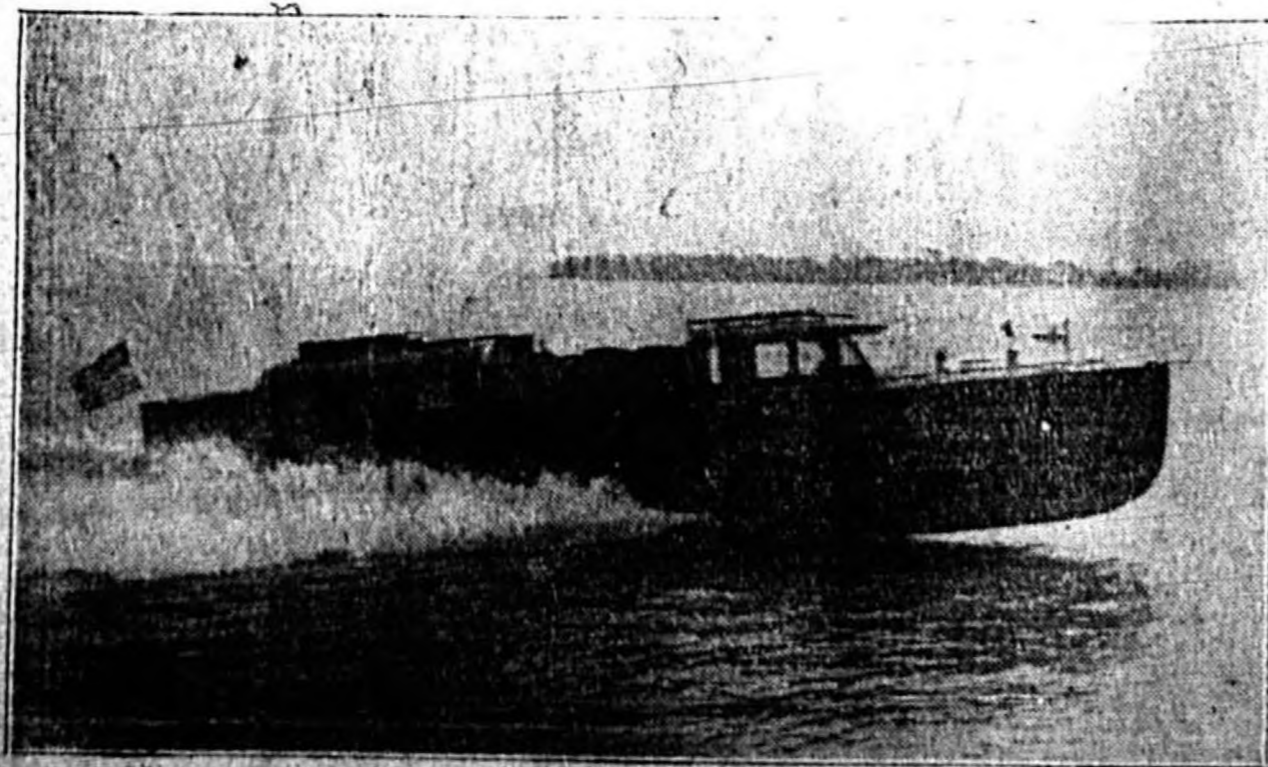

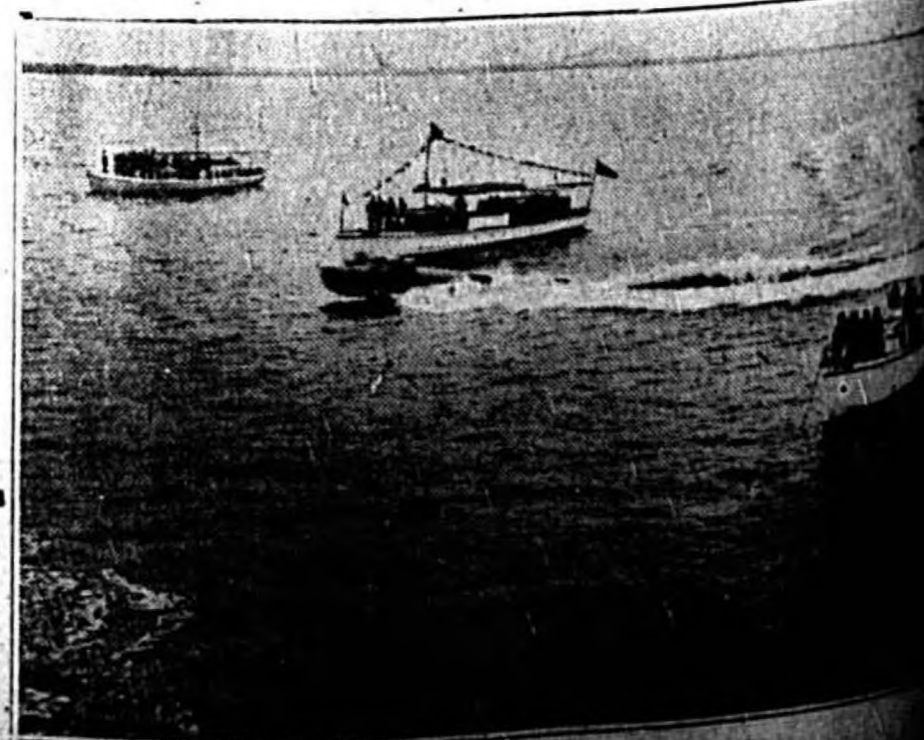

REVENUE BILL IS NOW READY FOR COOLIDGE'S OKEY

Senate Passes On Compromise Bill Late Wednesday Afternoon; Total Cut Is Forty-Million Over Last Estimate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—(AP)—The House today passed the revenue bill proposing tax reduction of \$287,000,000 this year awaited today only the signature of President Coolidge, who was expected to approve the measure.

Senate approval late yesterday by a vote of 61 to 10 on the compromise reached in the conference with the House, completed the enactment of its first and probably most important piece of legislation this session.

The total amount of reduction goes almost \$300 beyond the amount indicated by Secretary Mellon outside the signature of President Coolidge, who was expected to approve the measure.

The widespread slashes in taxes will become effective in most instances immediately upon enactment of the measure and income tax payers would have their assessment cut by more than \$200,000,000 with the reduced rates effective on first payments for this year, which are due Mar. 15.

More than 2,300,000 of the approximately 7,000,000 federal tax payers would be relieved of all taxation through the proposed increases in personal exemptions from \$1,000 to \$1,500 for single persons and from \$2,500 to \$3,500 for married persons.

The principal fight developed over the inheritance tax which the Senate voted to repeal but which was kept on the bill by the House, which modified the rates, in contrast to the two previous reduction bills voted since the war, almost complete agreement was reached between the warring leaders on the vital income tax schedules.

Retainers of the Maharaja subsequently killed Bawla and married the girl's beauty.

There have been reports that the government intended to force the Maharaja's abdication because of the affair.

Three Southern States Are Visited By Heavy Rains and Terrific Winds

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 25.—(AP)—Torrential rains and tornado-like wind storms swept parts of Tennessee, Arkansas and Mississippi last night, causing one death, injuries to several others and property damage estimated in thousands of dollars.

Telephone poles were blown down and dwellings demolished by the terrific winds.

A 12-year-old negro girl was killed and several other negroes and two white men were injured at Jennie, Ark., where a wind storm played havoc with the little town. Several houses were demolished. Gulfport, Miss., reported the heaviest rain of the year. The main business streets were flooded for more than an hour.

Several other towns in the three states were hit by the storm, but due to partially crippled communication, the extent of damage done could not be learned early today.
