City Drinking Water Ridiculed By Solon

Although Orange-Seminole Rep. E. P. (Sandy) Bassett was the guest of honor at last night's Seminole County Taxpayers Association meeting, it was his colleague Rep. Cecil Bothwell that brought on the applause with his critical comments regarding Sanford's city water.

Bothwell arrived late, even after dinner was served, but was given a glass of cool city water to wash out the road dust from Orange County by Mrs. Edna Norman, association secretary.

He grimaced as he returned the liquid to the long table surrounded by diners in a fit of laughter.
It was this same taxpayers group that backed efforts of Bassett and Bothwell to pass untidily legislation which would force the Florida water and sewer facilities under the state's Public Utilities Commission.

The taxpayers left no doubt last night the bill would be introduced again in the next session by Bassett, who promised to push the legislation the second time around.

Bassett, accompanied by his wife, Suzanne, gave a review of the just completed legislative session and advised that although his utility bill failed to become law, another bill affecting rates to out-of-city customers of municipally owned utilities would prevent excessive charges by the city.

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Mayor Moore said Monday night "it doesn't sound possible this community could have increased in area from 6.33 square miles to 8.83 square miles in 10 years with a housing increase of 512 units and still lose almost 2,000 people."

City Manager Knowles outlined the active city water accounts at 6,160 in January of 1970 as compared to 5,083 ten years ago. To further disprove the census contention that a resident loss occurred.

Bothwell, holding the glass in his left hand, looked at the dinner gathering at Moose Club, and observed "we must be the bravest people in Florida . . . we come together and drink Sanford water."

He indicated something would be done about the situation, but stated the city would have to cut back its rates effective July 1.

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Bill Collectors Target Of Probe

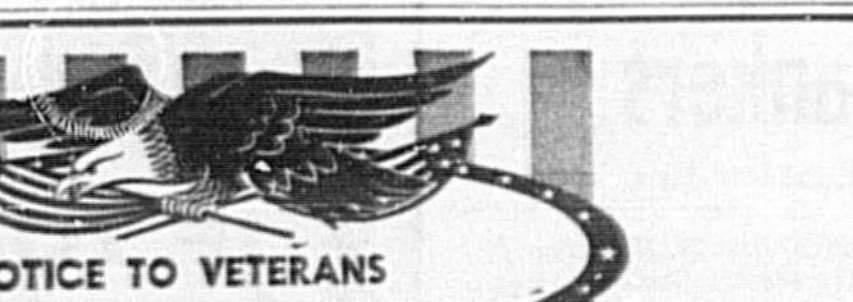

WASHINGTON (UPI) — "Hello, Mr. Jones, this is the International Corp. calling. Jim McSavage, the director of affi-davits here and I have something very important to discuss with you. Get a piece of paper and a pencil and I'll explain what this is all about..."
That is the start of a model telephone script for a bill collection agency. Its purpose is to convince debtors with overdue accounts that they face trouble if they don't pay up.
Charles H. Baron, who works for Community Legal Services, Inc., an anti-poverty agency in Philadelphia, showed it Tuesday to the National Commission on Consumer Finance.
The commission was created by Congress to undertake a six-month study on how to revise credit laws which, witnesses contend, now sanction harassment tactics, usually over the telephone. "The script he showed the commission is a sample of new terms which have a legal ring but which mean nothing. For example: 'Yesterday, Mr. Jones, the Ace Motor Co. came into these public offices and swore out an affidavit against you in the amount of \$136.43. This affidavit charges you with attempt to evade Ace Motors and directly refusing to pay this lawful obligation for \$136.43...'"
"This means that you will be served with these papers and a summons and that you will be sold out at public sale after judgement. But I am calling you first as a courtesy, to let you know that the only way this can be avoided is if the \$136.43 is in my office and on my desk no later than 5 p.m. tomorrow!"

Joint Request Refused By State

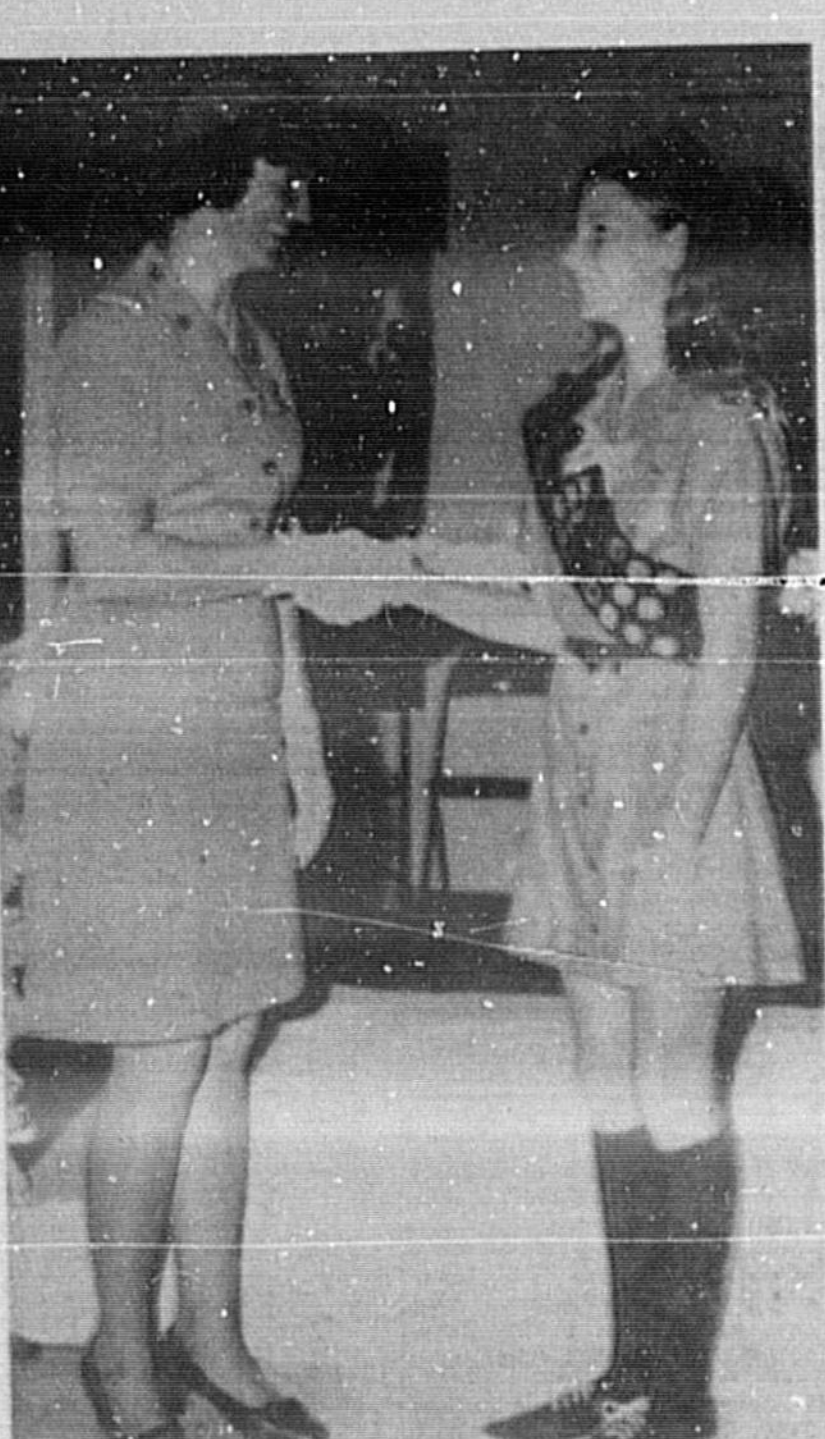
DeBarry Denied Highway Traffic Signal

DeBARRY — Joint request of seven DeBarry organizations for a traffic signal light at the Highbanks Road and Hwy 17-92 has been denied, according to a letter from C. A. (Bill) Bennett, Deland district engineer of the State Department of Transportation, to Earl Merrill, chairman of the DeBarry public affairs committee.
This letter states, "An analysis of our studies indicates the lack of minimum warrants required for a traffic signal. However, taking into account the 63 per cent of the motorists that did not execute a complete stop indicates that the vertical curve preceding the next approach may be the cause for their action. A flashing beacon is recommended to alert the minor street motorist of the ex-

isting intersection."
Following a death from a traffic accident at this intersection, DeBarry organizations had asked for a trip-stop light or a standard traffic stop light to stop the speeding south-bound vehicles and permit the safe crossing of east and west traffic.
This request pointed out that the one at Enterprise Road and Deltona Boulevard, which will have an amber flashing "caution" light on highway 17-92 and a red "stop" light for Highbanks road traffic.
In a discussion with Clark on the decision to recommend a flashing beacon, Merrill said that the DOT engineer had pointed out that the installation would be such that it could easily be converted to a stop light when traffic conditions warranted. Clark further emphasized that the effectiveness of any protective measures would depend on the enforcement of governing traffic laws.
In an earlier conference of representatives of DeBarry organizations with County Commission Harris Saxton following the fatal traffic accident at Highbanks Road and Highway 17-92, Saxton expressed concern over the need for protection and promised the cooperation of the County Commission who must pay for the traffic light.

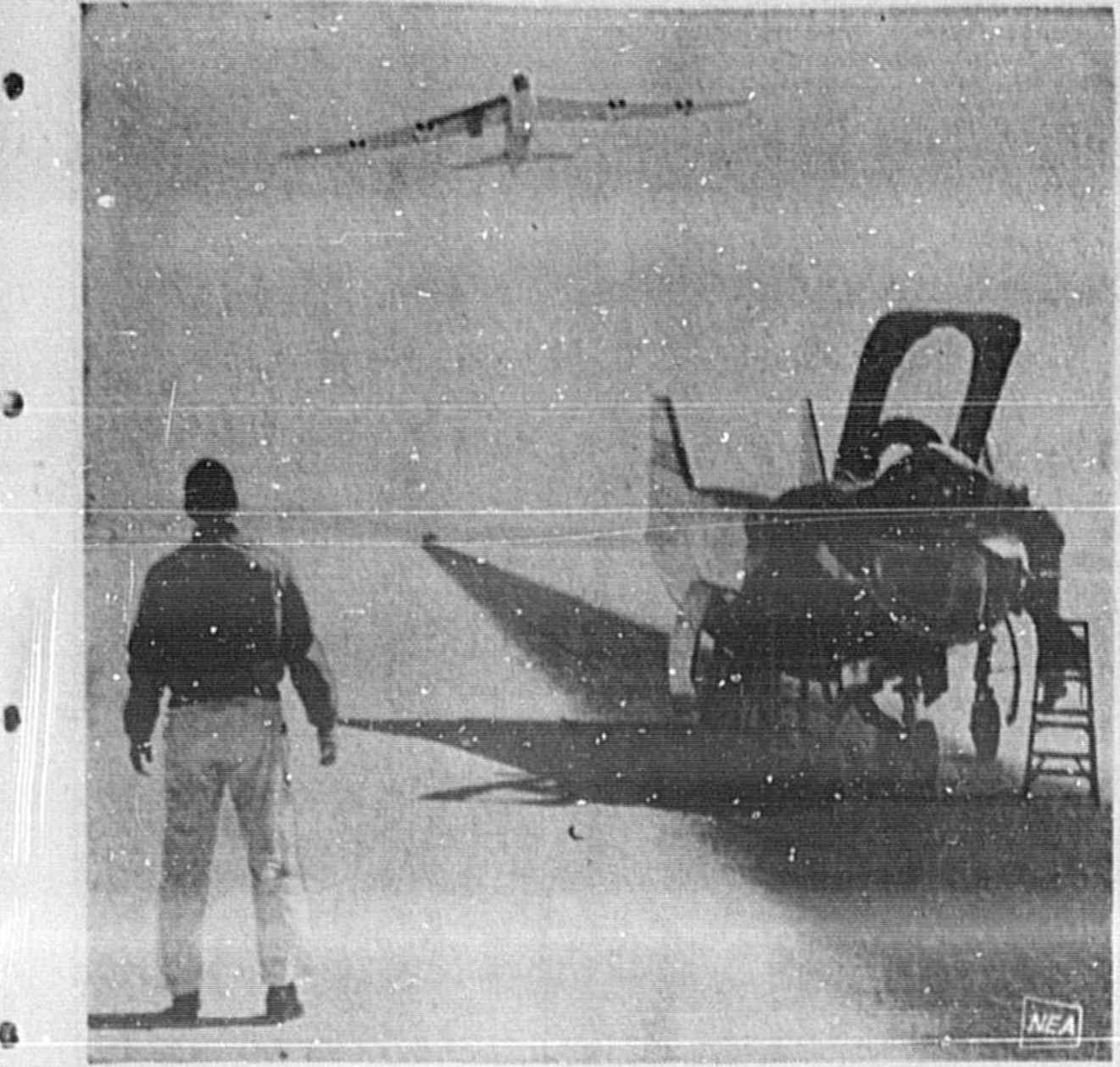

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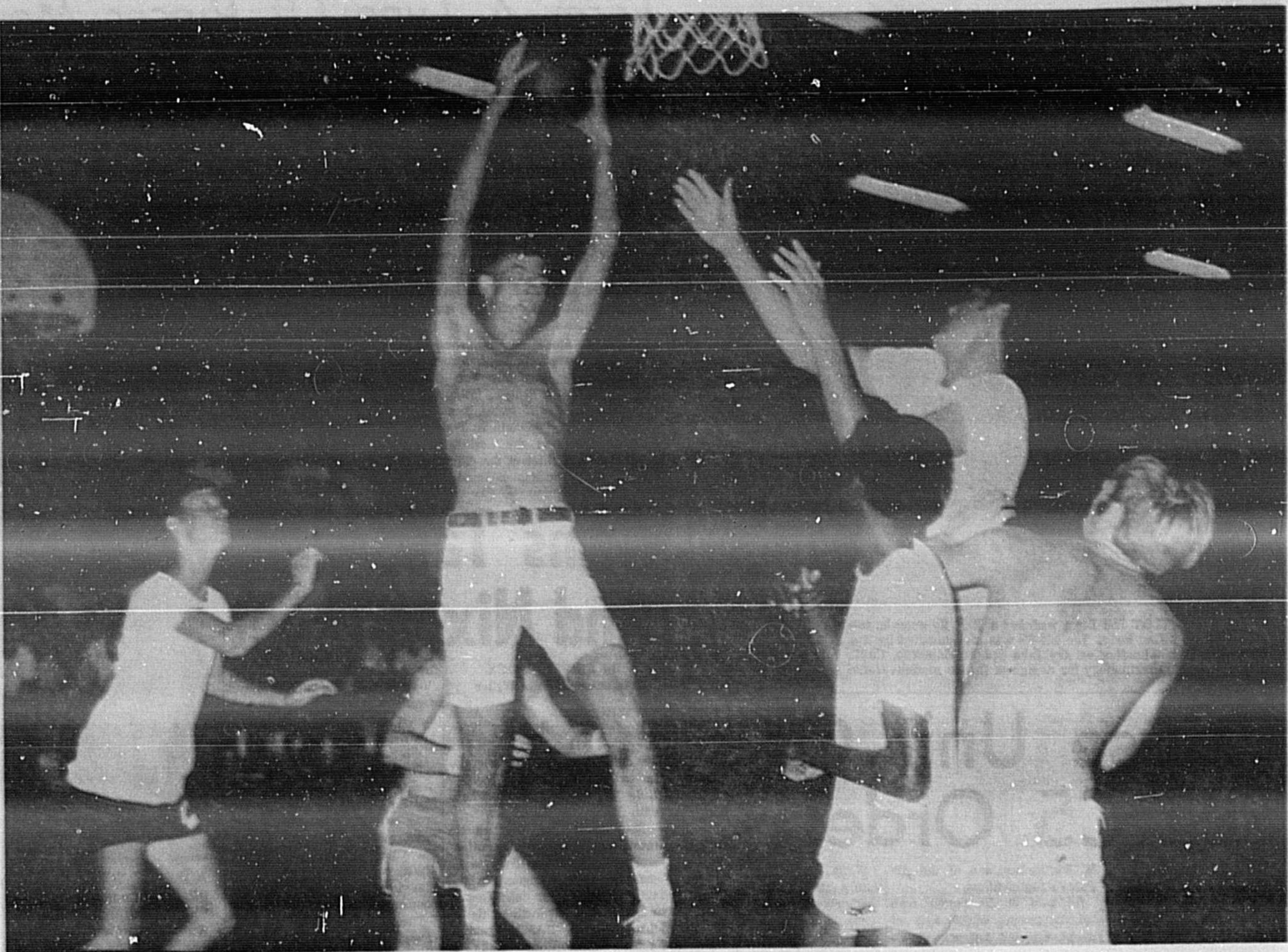

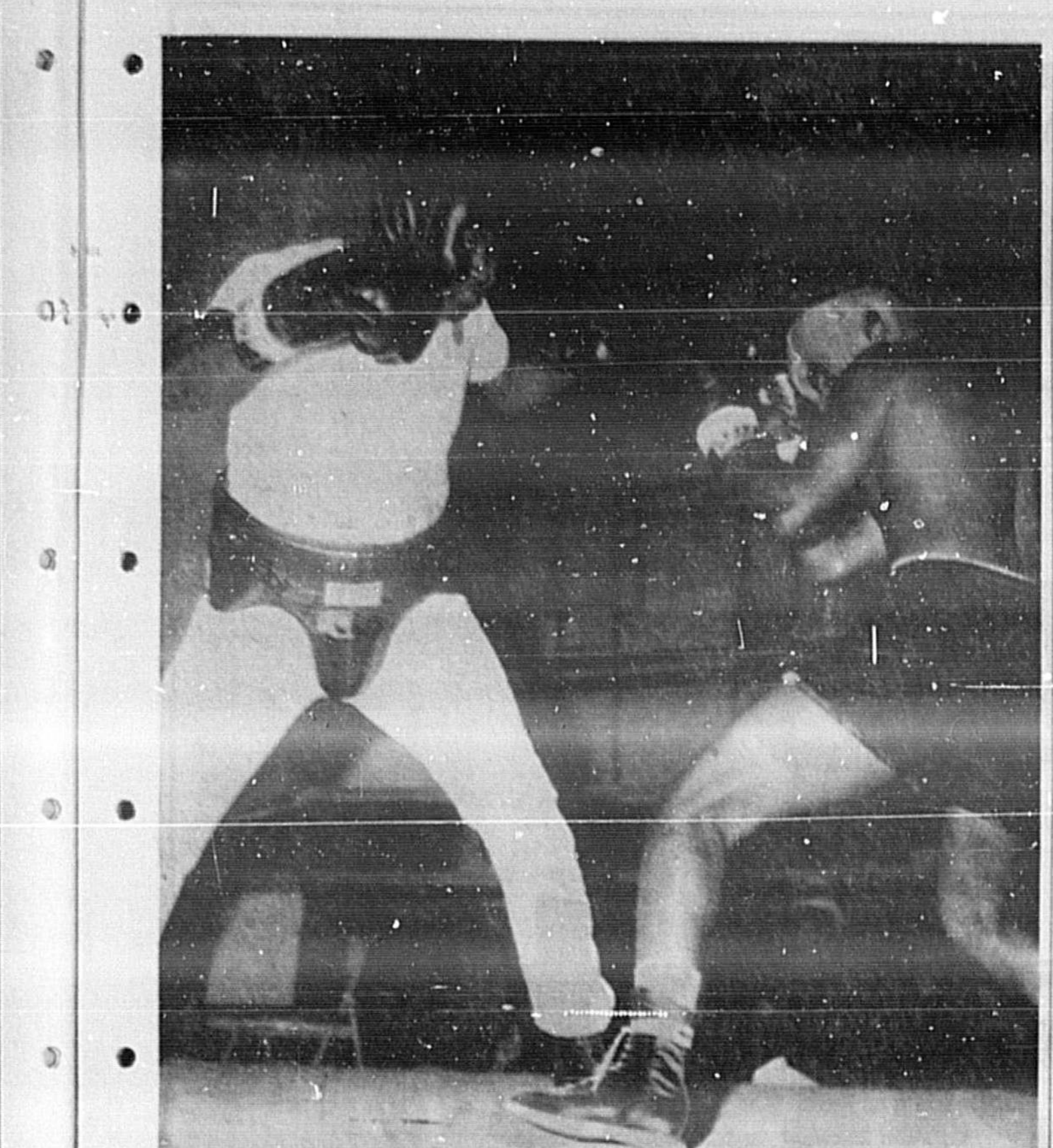

 A combination of canned sweet cherries, ice cream and gelatin dessert. Chill in individual glasses or merely follow recipe but chill all ingredients in an attractive serving dish.
FLUFFY CHERRY FLIPS
 1 (1-pound) can or jar dark or light sweet cherries
 1 (8-ounce) package cherry gelatin
 1/2 cup hot cherry syrup
 1/4 cup port wine or grape juice
 1 (10-ounce) bottle ginger ale
 1 (8-ounce) package lemon gelatin
 1 cup hot water
 1 pint vanilla ice cream
 1/4 cup sliced almonds, toasted
 If cherries are unspiced, drain and pit, reserving syrup. Dissolve cherry gelatin in 1/2 cup hot cherry syrup. Add port wine or grape juice. Carefully add ginger ale, pouring down side of bowl to preserve flavor. Chill until partially thickened. Fold in orange sections and spoon into dessert glasses, filling each halfway. Chill. Dissolve lemon gelatin in hot water. Stir in remaining cherry syrup (about 1/2-cup). Spoon vanilla ice cream gradually into gelatin. Fold in cherries and almonds. Chill until thickened enough to hold shape. Spoon over cherry gelatin, piling high in glasses for pretty effect. Refrigerate at least 30 minutes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Too many fresh fish? The Orientals have a way with fish and a very impressive meal can be prepared with great simplicity using available fish and fresh coconuts. Don't knock the coconut until you try it. First chill peppers do not appeal to everyone but if you wish to try the following use less peppers. For hot food lovers add more. Strangely enough, this beautiful concoction is called Fish Curry in Bangkok and no curry is used. Forge ahead!
BANGKOK CURRY
 1 fresh coconut
 1/2 teaspoon fresh pepper
 1/2 teaspoon sugar
 1 red chili pepper
 3 green chili peppers
 3 green onions
 parsley and pimento for garnish
 2 pounds fish fillets, boned
 Juice of one lemon
 1 piece of ginger or a dash of ground ginger
 cooking oil or butter
 1 ripe avocado
 Open coconut by punching three holes in the eye. Carefully drain off the milk — save every drop. Split coconut and scrape as much meat as possible from the shell. Add enough water to the coconut milk to make one cup. Place coconut meat and milk over low heat until just warm. Squeeze coconut with clean hands to extract as much milk as possible and to release the oils. Wash and dry the fish and rub with salt and pepper. Cut into bite sized pieces and place in a bowl. Marinate with the lemon juice, sugar, fresh ground pepper and coconut mixture for one hour. Chop the chili peppers and saute in hot oil or butter, stirring quickly. Add a dash of salt and two tablespoons water and pour into a small pretty dish. Set aside.
 Add fish to hot skillet and very quickly stir just until fish begins to sizzle. Add marinated cover and cook over low heat about 10 or 15 minutes or until fish is fork tender.
 Serve in a pretty bowl with the vegetables sprinkled over the dish, adding a little very finely chopped fresh parsley and a few shreds of pimento. Serve the hot chili's beside the fish dish. A large bowl of fluffy steamed rice and a shredded salad with vinegar, sugar and water and a little salt combined, makes a colorful meal.

Easy Buffet For Busy Weekends

 An easy buffet when week-end entertaining becomes too pressured includes store-bought finger-lickin' good chicken and homemade pineapple pudding and buttermilk biscuits.
 Start with a hot tomato bouillon served in coffee cups or mugs and add a salad and coffee. Most will want the recipe for your pudding and biscuits, one so common to good southern cooks that most never bothered to write down ingredients.
HOT TOMATO BOUILLON
 Mix 1 can tomato soup, 1 can chicken or beef bouillon, 1 can water. Heat in saucepan, adding few drops Tabasco just before serving. Makes 4 servings.
PINEAPPLE PUDDING
 1 (No. 2 can) crushed pineapple
 3 tablespoons flour
 3 eggs
 1 1/2 tablespoons butter
 2 tablespoons sugar
 1 teaspoon salt
 Juice of 1 lemon
 Heat oven to 350 degrees and grease 1-quart baking dish. Spoon off a little pineapple juice and mix this with flour until smooth. Beat eggs until light and fluffy, add pineapple and remaining pineapple juice, smooth flour paste, melted butter and other ingredients. Pour into baking dish and bake 45 to 60 minutes. Makes 4 servings.
COL. SANDERS' BISCUITS
 2 cups flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 1 heaping tablespoon shortening
 1 cup buttermilk
 Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Sift flour, salt baking powder together. Cut in shortening, add milk, mix and roll out on floured board to about 1/2-inch thickness. Cut out biscuits and place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake about 10 minutes. Makes 12 to 15 biscuits.
 When company comes there's one dish-stuffed mushrooms—that adds real interest to a main course. So here's an Italian-style version you may be interested to try. We found the recipe worked well and mushrooms were deliciously flavored.
ITALIAN STYLE STUFFED MUSHROOMS
 1/2 pound (about 15) medium-size fresh mushrooms
 3 teaspoons olive oil
 1 tablespoon minced onion
 1/4 cup finely chopped Parmesan cheese
 1 tablespoon catchup
 2 tablespoons fine soft bread crumbs
 1 teaspoon butter
 Rinse mushrooms under cold water and pat dry. Remove stems; chop enough stems to make 1/2-cup. Bruise caps lightly with 2 teaspoons of the oil.
 In a 8-inch skillet heat remaining 1 teaspoon oil; add chopped mushroom stems and onion; cook gently until golden. Stir in salami, Parmesan and catchup. Spoon mixture into mushroom cavities.
 In the skillet melt the butter; mix in crumbs. Sprinkle over tops of mushrooms.
 Arrange stuffed mushrooms in a shallow baking pan. Bake in a preheated 425-degree oven until hot through—8 to 8 minutes. Serve at once.
 Makes 3 or 6 servings.
SUNDAY SUPPER
 Chocolate pudding is used in this easy-to-make dessert.
 Chef's Salad
 Chocolate Nut Pie
 Iced Beverage
CHOCOLATE NUT PIE
 1/2 cup butter
 2 squares (each 1 oz) semi sweet chocolate
 1 1/4 cups graham cracker crumbs
 1/4 cup sugar
 1/2 cup whole blanched almonds 1 package (4 oz) chocolate pudding and pie filling
 In a saucepan over low heat, stirring constantly, melt butter and chocolate; toss with crumbs and sugar in a 9-inch pie plate; press against bottom and sides of plate to form a crust. Bake in a medium oven for 10 minutes. Chop almonds medium-fine; sprinkle half into baked shell. Prepare pudding as package directs; add remaining crumbs to the shell. Cool 5 minutes, stirring often, then pour into shell. Sprinkle with remaining almonds. Chill. Makes 8 to 9 servings.

Chocolate Dream Cake

Ingenious cooks have done various things with cake mix. They have added flavored gelatin dessert, pudding and pie mix and frosting mix and have come up with interesting combinations.

Now comes a new get-together: cake mix plus whipped topping mix plus coarsely grated semi-sweet chocolate. The whipped topping mix, added to the dry cake mix straight from the envelope without whipping, helps make a cake that has extra volume, good keeping quality and tender texture. The baked cake is given a Branded Chocolate Glaze—one of the most delicious glazes we've ever sampled.

CHOCOLATE FLECK DREAM CAKE

1 package (3-layer size) yellow, white or devil's food cake mix
1 envelope whipped topping mix (no, right from envelope without whipping)
4 eggs
1 cup cold tap water
1 square (1 oz) semi-sweet chocolate, coarsely grated
Branded Chocolate Glaze, see recipe

Into large bowl of electric mixer, turn the cake mix, whipped topping mix, eggs, and water; blend until moistened. Beat at medium speed for 4 minutes. Blend in grated chocolate. Turn into greased and floured 10-inch Bundt or tube pan.

Bake in preheated 350-degree oven until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean—40 minutes for Bundt pan or 45 to 50 minutes for tube pan. Cool in pan placed on wire rack for 15 minutes. With spatula, loosen from sides and center tube, and gently remove cake. Finish cooling on rack; spread with glaze.

BRANDED CHOCOLATE GLAZE

1 square (1 oz) semi-sweet chocolate
1/4 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup unsifted confectioner's sugar
2 tablespoons (about) brandy

In a small saucepan over low heat, melt chocolate with butter, stirring constantly until smooth. Remove from heat. Gradually add sugar alternately with brandy. Stir until mixture is of glaze consistency. While glaze is still warm, spread over cake. Makes about 1 cup.

Wheat-germ fans, and we know lots of them, are always thinking up new ways to add this nutritious food to family dishes. Here's one of the latest of these that we're trying: It's an excellent combination of rolled fish fillets stuffed with a bread-and-wheat-germ dressing. A sauce for the stuffed fillets is made from frozen cream of shrimp soup, light cream and canned tomato wedges. Would eating!

FISH ROLLS WITH WHEAT GERM STUFFING

1 1/2 cup butter or margarine
3/4 cup finely chopped celery
1/4 cup thinly sliced scallion (green onion)
1 can (4 oz) sliced mushrooms drained
1 cup soft bread cubes (3/4 inch)
1 cup wheat germ
1/4 teaspoon Italian herb seasoning
1 egg, slightly beaten
8 sole fillets (about 3 pounds)
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 can (10 oz) frozen cream of shrimp soup, thawed
1/4 cup light cream
1 can (8 oz) tomato wedges, well drained (1/4 cup)
In a 10-inch skillet over moderately low heat, melt butter. Add celery, scallion and mushrooms, and cook until celery is tender. Remove from heat. Add bread cubes, wheat germ, 1/4 teaspoon of the salt, herb seasoning and eggs; toss lightly.

Sprinkle remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt over fish. Spread 1/4 equal amount of stuffing over each fish fillet. Roll up and secure with toothpicks or small metal skewers. Place rolls, stuffing side up, in shallow 13 1/2-quart glass baking dish (9 by 9 by 1 1/2 inches) or similar utensil. Drizzle with lemon juice. Mix together soup, cream and tomato wedges. Pour around fish rolls.

Bake in preheated 350-degree oven until fish flakes easily and sauce is hot—about 15 minutes. Makes 8 servings.
