Ribicoff, Percy Still Want Lance To Resign

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman and ranking minority member of the Senate committee investigating Bert Lance say they still believe the Carter administration's budget director should resign. Neither Sen. Abraham Ribicoff of Connecticut nor Charles Percy of Illinois has changed his mind after three days of testimony by Lance before the Senate Governmental Operations Committee.

Gas Vote: Carter Test

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter's energy program may get its toughest test when the Senate votes this week on the question of removing federal controls over natural gas prices. The administration favors continued federal regulation, but would permit the price per thousand cubic feet to rise from the present \$1.40 ceiling to \$1.75. But many members of Congress feel that controls should be lifted to encourage producers to search for new natural gas reserves.

'Discrimination' Brief

• Restricted commercial (CR) zone, which only permits service stations and liquor stores. These uses will be permitted in general commercial (C2) zone.

Ship's Crew Cleans, And Cleans, And...



Enough Sightseeing: It's Clean-Up Time

SEATTLE (AP) — Many joined the Coast Guard to see the world. Instead, the crew members of the \$52 million icebreaker Polar Star have spent more than a year gazing at the backside of a warehouse while tied to a dock in Seattle.
"Clean or not clean, you clean it," said Seaman Craig Barnes, 21, of Eugene, Ore. "The whole ship has been repainted, some parts more than once."
The Polar Star, the United States' largest icebreaker, was tied to a dock from July 1976 until last week with propeller problems. The Star's sister ship, the Polar Sea, has been tied to the same dock since March with similar propeller problems.
Now in drydock, the Coast Guard hopes the Polar Star will be ready to weigh anchor and start cracking ice in November.
All of the crew works on the ship during the day and at night one fourth of the crew is on board.
"A ship of this size and this complexity requires an elaborate maintenance and training program," said Capt. Robert Smith, who took command of the ship in June.
Hailed as the most powerful and sophisticated conventional icebreaker afloat, the Polar Star has suffered sinking fortunes since it was commissioned in January 1975. The vessel ran aground two days after commissioning and constant mechanical malfunctions allowed it to be at sea only six days out of the first three months in service.
Five months after commissioning, the Polar Star headed north for ice trials, during which the propeller problems were discovered. Two of the ship's driveshafts malfunctioned and it limped back to Seattle under escort.
With the shafts removed, the Polar Star has sat at dockside since July 1976.
"By no stretch on the imagination do we have a lemon," insists Smith. "Compared to past icebreakers, she's incredibly better. Up north, what she went through would have stopped another icebreaker cold."
Nevertheless some of the sailors have rented apartments, bought homes and set up all but permanent residence in Seattle with their families.
"It's almost like shore duty for most of them," said Chief Petty Officer Gary Moore, 28, of San Antonio, Tex.
"It's kind of embarrassing sitting at the dock and hard to justify our job," he said.

County Panel: Deci\$ions, Deci\$ions

A \$4.90 rate would be an increase of 26 per cent compared to the current \$3.80 rate. A \$6.90 rate would be a 28 per cent increase. At either the \$4.90 or the \$6.90 tax rate, the new budget calls for seven new county employees.
In addition, the new budget proposes eight new employees paid for with federal manpower program funds. The current number of each employee is 110.
But before commissioners can determine the tax rate, they must decide seven unresolved budget issues, which would require \$423,569 in county funds. The unresolved items are:
—\$320,000 for the eventual purchase of the Routinist building in downtown Sanford to provide additional county office space. The commissioners have voted to move the county's manpower office from cramped quarters in Seminole Plaza to the Routinist building and have agreed to lease 5,000 square feet in the building for \$1,200 a month. The commissioners are still negotiating a purchase price for the building.
—\$42,000 for Seminole Community Action, (SCA) a private, nonprofit anti-poverty agency. SCA officials have asked for the money so they can receive \$100,000 from the federal government. If the commission votes less than \$42,000, the federal allocation would be reduced. Commissioners Dick Williams and Harry Kwiatkowski have voted to spend \$20,000 for SCA, and Commissioner John Kintrough has voted not to fund the agency. Commissioners Bob French and Bill Kirchhoff have not announced their decision on funding for the agency but have requested additional information from SCA.
—\$33,262 to increase the county's self-insurance program.
—\$10,000 to increase the county employee hospitalization plan.
—\$2,500 to buy 10 voting machines for the county.
—\$2,127 to upgrade the salary classification of a utilities accounting clerk.
—\$10,500 for an addition to the public works building at the county's Five Points complex near the southern border of Sanford.
Last-minute revisions to estimates on non-property tax revenues and year-end cash balances have made an additional \$298,977 available at the \$6.90 tax rate level and \$147,725 available at the \$4.90 level.

The New Directory Assistance Plan Begins September 20, 1977.

On September 20, 1977 the new plan regarding calls for Directory Assistance goes into effect. The plan provides an allowance of six calls a month from each customer line without charge. For each call in excess of the allowance, a charge of 15¢ will apply. Two numbers may be requested on each call, so in effect 12 numbers may be requested without charge.
Savings passed on to customers.
The cost savings from the lower volume of calls which are anticipated are being passed on to customers. As a result of these savings, plus the revenues from those who will use the service the most, the new monthly rates for basic local service are 60¢ less per line than would otherwise be required.
Most customers not charged.
This allowance is designed to provide for occasions when numbers are not listed in the directory, when numbers in the directory may be difficult to find, and when numbers cannot be located for other reasons. Studies show that the majority of Florida customers make two or fewer calls to local Directory Assistance each month, so the six-call allowance means that most customers will not be affected. In other areas where similar plans are in effect, an average of 95% of the customers are not billed as a result of extra calls to Directory Assistance.
With this Plan, the customers who choose to call Directory Assistance frequently will pay their share of the expense of providing this service.
No charge on some calls.
No charge will apply on calls to Directory Assistance from handicapped customers who are unable to use the directory. Certificates required for this exemption may be obtained from any Southern Bell Business Office. No charge will apply to calls from coin phones and from hotel, motel, or hospital rooms. Also, no charge will apply on calls to Long Distance Directory Assistance (555-1212) outside your own Area Code.
HERE'S HOW IT WORKS.
Beginning Sept. 20, 1977 when you call for Directory Assistance, your number will be recorded for billing purposes—whether an operator asks for your number or not—and you will be billed 15¢ for each call in excess of the six-call allowance. Two numbers may be requested on each call, so in effect 12 numbers may be requested without charge.
Look in the book and save.
Most numbers are listed in the telephone directory (about 8 of 10 numbers requested from Directory Assistance are listed in the directory). Just call your Southern Bell Business Office if you need a directory, and when you need information, please look in the phone book before you call Directory Assistance. And chances are, you won't be affected by this change.
The allowance for FLEX trunks and constant directory station is six calls per month. Other contract stations are allowed one call per month station per month without charge.

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — State coffers are \$144 million richer than last year thanks to an economic recovery which is being led by Southwest Florida, according to a new study of the state's sales tax.
State revenue from the four cent tax on nearly every consumer dollar (except for food and medicine) totaled \$1.4 billion in the fiscal year ending in June — an 11.5 percent jump over the previous year.

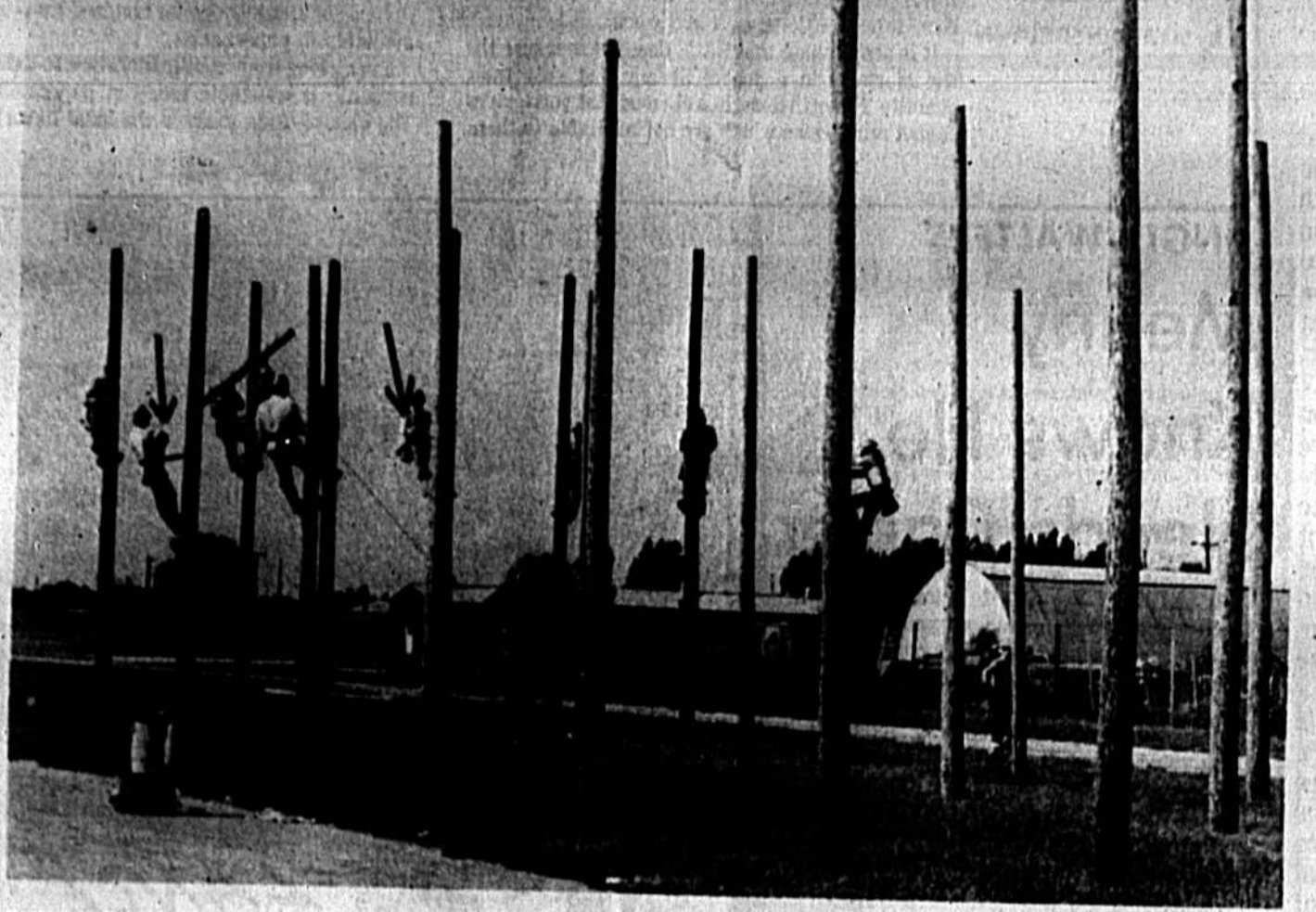

Floridians To Be Selected For Solar Test

CAPE CANAVERAL (AP) — Some time later this month, a computer will randomly select 1,500 names from a list of 1,000 Floridians who have applied for \$400 grants to install solar hot-water heaters in their homes.
It's part of a nationwide program to get solar energy technology into more American homes.
"We see this program as a means of upgrading the solar equipment that is available in Florida," says Thomas Hill, director of the federal solar grant initiative program in Florida. "We're hoping that a lot of manufacturers in Florida will get qualified."
The grants, to be announced the week of Sept. 26, are part of an 11-state program being conducted by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in hopes of popularizing home solar water heating.
Although the response to the program was good in Florida, some grants will have to go begging in seven of the other states in the program. Officials in Pennsylvania say they've received fewer than 1,000 applications for the 2,000 grants available in that state. "My guess is that the average guy on the street has heard a little about solar energy," said David Moore, HUD program manager. "He thinks it's a good idea, but he doesn't think it here yet."
Moore says response in Florida was understandably better because the state has 40 years of experience with solar energy systems.
"You have a lot of experience with it; the state Legislature requires all new homes to be fitted with plumbing for solar water heating systems and you have one of the most active state-wide organizations involved in testing and certification," the Florida Solar Research Center at Cape Canaveral.

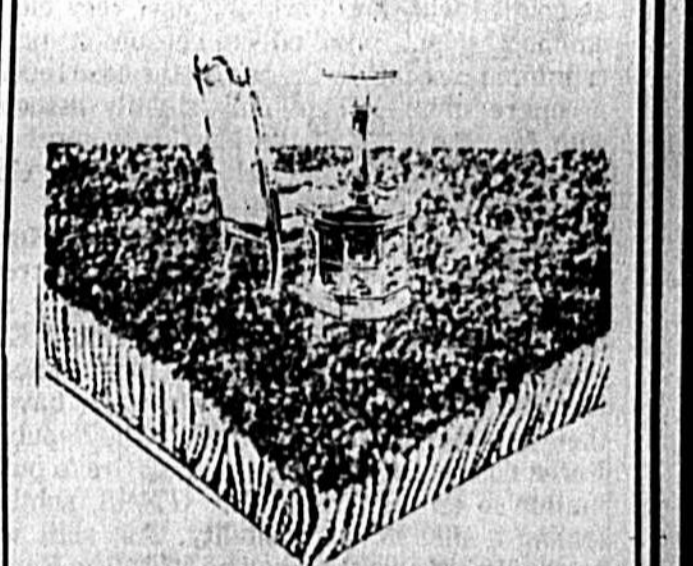

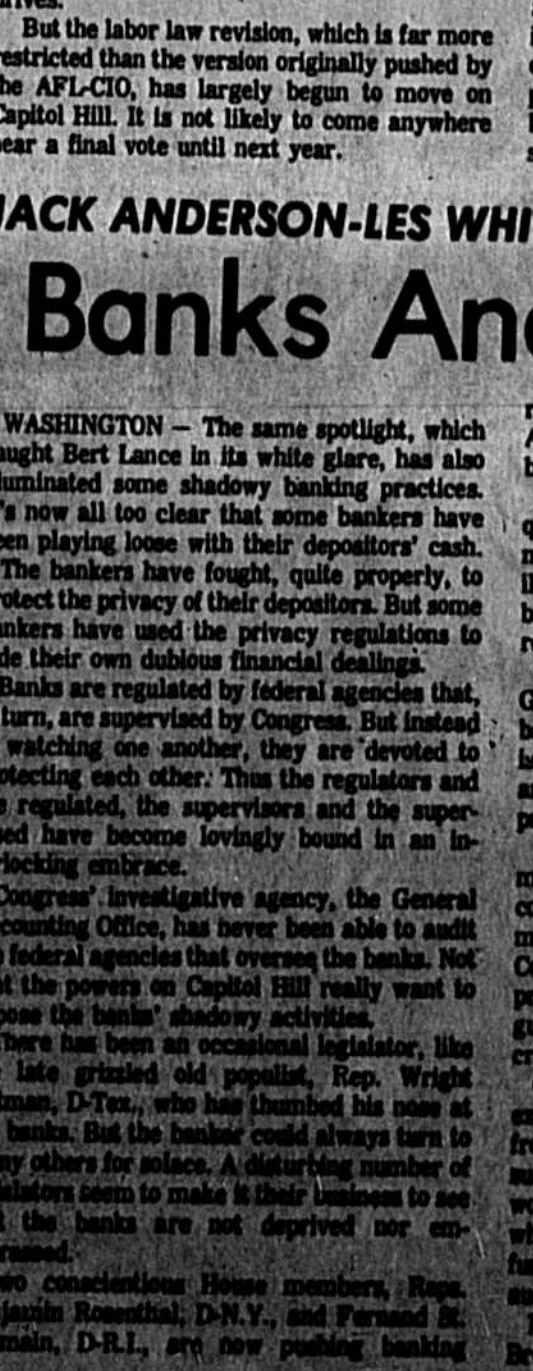
