

#### **Gas Vote: Carter Test**

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter's energy program may get its toughest test when the Senate votes this week on the question of removing federal controls over natural gas prices. The administration favors continued federal regulation, but would permit the price per thousand cubic feet to rise from the present \$1.46 ceiling to \$1.75. But many members of Congress feel that controls should be lifted to encourage producers to search for new natural gas reserves.





### Tongsun Park And The Congressmen

Attorney General Griffin Bell now has revealed the federal grand jury charges against Tongsun Park, the Korean businessman charged with buying congressional influence. And so it is upon Mr. Park that the eyes naturally train, because of the 36 felony counts against him, as well as upor the South Korean government, which for the first time is charged with having choreographed Mr. Park's movements in Washington.

Those who would like attention directed only on Mr. Park and the South Korean government are easy to identify congressmen once too closely associated with Mr. Park and now very close to embarrassment, if not ethical censure or outright criminal prosecution. Or, as was the case recently, a congressman perhaps only slightly associated with Mr. Park but at the least very much concerned for congressional reputation, House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill.

Mr. O'Neill was agitated by South Korea's ndifference to the suggestion that it return longsun Park for prosecution to this country, more agitated, in fact, than by his own House Ethics Committee's almost timeless indifference to identifying those congressmen who might have had their palms greased by Mr. Park. "The Republic of Korea does not seem to share our desire to put this matter to an end," said Mr. O'Neill, subtly effecting a shift of responsibility. This shift would have been obvious to all had he said: The Republic of Korea does not seem to desire to put this matter to an end. But no: Mr. O'Neill required a sly transition, after which he could point blame as he pleased: "Records of obvious relevance to this investigation and the important knowledge of Korean nationals are being withheld" - withheld by the Koreans, of course. And so: "The attitude being taken by the Republic of Korea can only strain its relations with the United States."

Mr. O'Neill thus relaxed the pressure on the various congressional committees investigating "Koreagate." After all, the public now will infer, only the Koreans truly know what might have passed and why between Mr. Park and so many as congressmen are pleading no knowledge anyway of Mr. Park's Korean connection, the Koreans appear all the more to be the only knowledgeable ones, and the pressure relaxes further.

One wearies of saying what Mr. O'Neill and the relevant congressional committees ought to do, merely because what ought to be done in this whole sorry affair has rarely been done. Neither a speedy inquiry, nor much congressional cooperation, nor even much cooperation from the Justice Depart-

What now ought to be done? Mr. O'Neill ough to cast his spotlight unceasingly into the House of tepresentatives as well as across the Pacific. What the Koreans do (although of course they

ought to cough up Tongsun Park) is up to them. But what Mr. O'Neill and his House, and for that matter the Senate, do, is not up to them, unless they wish to sink even lower in the public eye.



The idea of using paperback books in school libraries was presented recently to the Seminole County League of Women Voters, who will consider the idea and approach the school board with details on its cost and effectiveness.

The League heard a presentation by Marilyn Garrett, FTU library science instructor, saying use of paperbacks in school libraries not only saves money, but raises the reading level of students because "students who will not read hardbound books will read paperbacks."

The idea has some merit, partly because it is projected as possibly saving the county a quarter of a million dollars in the addition of books required to meet accreditation standards of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. By MARYLIN SHEDDAN

used only for hardbound books.

It also offered reviews on more books for children (and teachers) available in paperback.
