English Arrest Of Japanese Business Men Is Considered To Be "Atrocious"

Nippons Sidestep Request Of U. S.

Newspaper Ashai Says Country Will Act Just As It Pleases

TOKYO, Aug. 8. — (AP) — One hundred and twenty-six members of the Diet (parliament) today adopted a resolution urging the government to take "all available and effective measures to drive British influence from East Asia."

Britain's arrest of prominent Japanese business men in her empire were declared "purely retaliatory" and "unardonably atrocious acts."

Meanwhile newspapers said the government had sidestepped a request of the United States that Japan re-define her attitude towards French Indo-China and the Netherlands East Indies.

The government's attitude was tantamount to a rejection of the American request presented yesterday by United States Ambassador Grew. It was indicated.

The widely-known newspaper Ashai said Japan would hasten her outward policy "in silence and firm determination" to drive the British from East Asia.

The ambassador's call on Foreign Minister Matsuo was met with a "firm determination" to drive the British from East Asia.

The national newspaper Keihin described Grew's visit as "intervention" and another act of "American meddling" in the Far East.

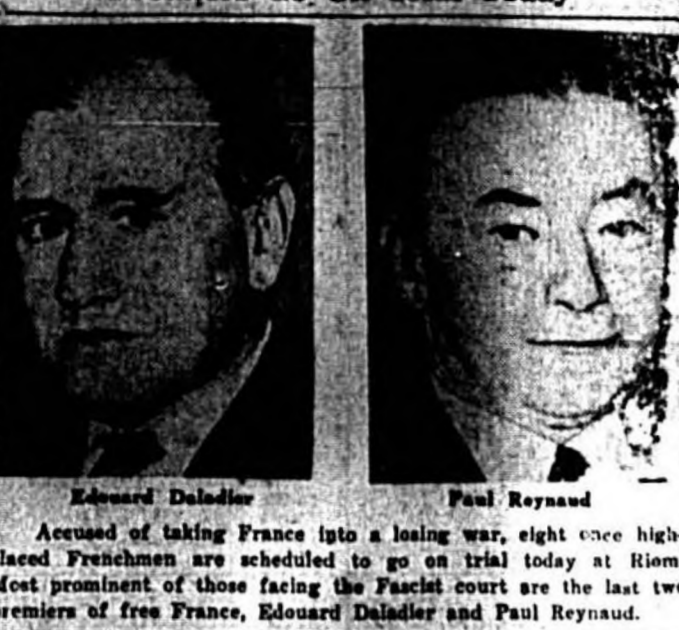
British-Japanese relations continued to deteriorate today when Japan made a number of moves for closer cooperation with Germany.

War Games To Start As Soon As Sky Clears

CAMP BEAUREGARD, La., Aug. 8. — (AP) — Bugged down in a sea of mud and rain, by-products of a tropical hurricane springing from the Gulf of Mexico, Southern National Guardsmen marked time yesterday awaiting clearing skies to begin getting into shape for next week's extensive war maneuvers.

Many of the nearly 50,000 Guardsmen and regular Army troops, scattered through the pine woods in training centers west of here and across the Sabine River, felt the full lash of the storm whipping up the river at a 75 to 90-mile an hour clip, but gradually abating.

San Francisco Bay Is Hub Of Mighty Defenses On Coast

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More "Cannon Fodder"

The fall of France was due, not to the superiority of German armament or the determination of Nazi soldiers, or to fifth column activities, or corrupt politics and crooked politicians, or to fascist minded leaders who rather admired German "efficiency" anyway, but to divorces and abortions as practiced by the French people during the past twenty years.

This at least is the conclusion reached by Jean Ybarnegaray, French Minister of Youth and the Family in the new Pétain government, who says that "we are going to make our 1940 defeat the prelude to one of the greatest victories which a people has ever won over itself," and who declares as her part in this mission "woman's place is in the home."

"The woman and mother of tomorrow," he says, "will be the artisans of our secret and magnificent victory when they will have found again their primary mission, which is to belong to the hearth, to have children, to raise them, and to live only to see that they become strong and useful men and women."

Pointing out that since 1920 French people have obtained 20,000 divorces annually, in addition to 5,000 free unions which in effect represent just that many broken unions, he says there have also been, since the World War, some 600,000 abortions, all of which taken together, resulted by 1939 in France having the lowest birth rate of any nation in the world.

Now France is to encourage child bearing. "Every woman must know," Ybarnegaray says, "that the more children she has, the greater the aid she will receive and the more effective and powerful will be the protection accorded her. Henceforth thousands of social workers trained in maternity schools will go throughout the country, stopping in the smallest commune to teach young girls how to feed, clothe and care for a baby."

"The very young girl is a future mother," he concludes. "She will be called upon to produce only beautiful and healthy children."

While one is left to wonder what will be done if she produces a child that is not beautiful, the inference is conclusive that France has already begun the production of the "cannon fodder" of the future.

Decentralizing Industry

Speaking before a conference of farm leaders in Des Moines, Iowa, the other day, Wendell Willkie, presidential candidate, strongly advocated the decentralization of industry. "So that there may be brought back into these small towns American industrial plants to the end that medium-sized businesses may be encouraged to survive, thrive and prosper."

Particularly in connection with the defense program did Mr. Willkie recommend the establishment of small plants in hundreds of smaller cities throughout the nation. Such a program would have the additional advantage not only of promoting a more widespread condition of prosperity, but would also render more difficult the task of the enemy in the event of invasion.

"The development of aerial warfare during the past several years to the prominence which it now enjoys," comments the Palatka News, "makes it imperative that industry abandon its former tendency to congregate in densely settled regions and fan out over the nation, locating in smaller centers of population. That this condition exists in the British Isles has served the British well during the present war through preventing the paralyzing of industry through comparatively few bombing operations."

"The movement for the next few years for industry should be away from the densely populated east to the more sparsely settled regions in the Midwest and South. In fact, the census figures recently compiled indicates that there has been a drift from the larger cities in the past 10 years but this has been occasioned more by the drying up of industry there than by its removal to other parts. Emigrants from farm lands, in many instances, have returned to rural sections where food, at least, may be obtained from farming operations, rather than to continue in cities where jobs were non-existent and relief sketchy."

"Decentralization of industry may have the effect of raising costs although there are many factors which might offset longer freight hauls, such as labor conditions, climatic benefits and other advantages. But regardless of whether costs will be increased or not, the movement is one which must be taken as a matter of national defense. We might as well get it into our head that sooner or later this nation will be forced to repel a foe from the air."

"In this event, then, we would be decidedly at a disadvantage were our vital industries, and almost all industry is vital when war comes, located at a relatively few number of centers where enemy planes could blast them out of commission in short order. The task would be infinitely greater were such industries spread over the immense land area of the nation. The wisdom is apparent and in view of the lesson of the European war cannot be ignored."

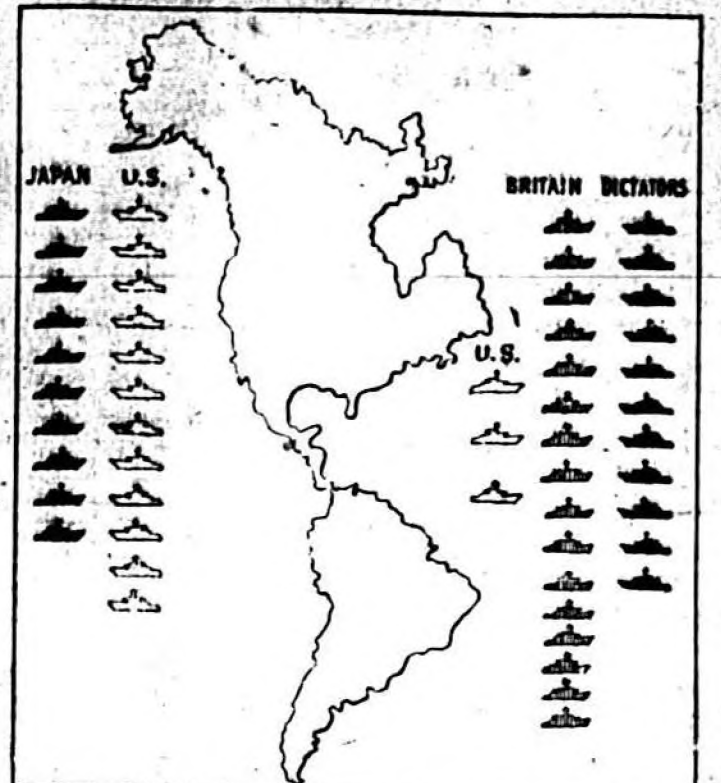

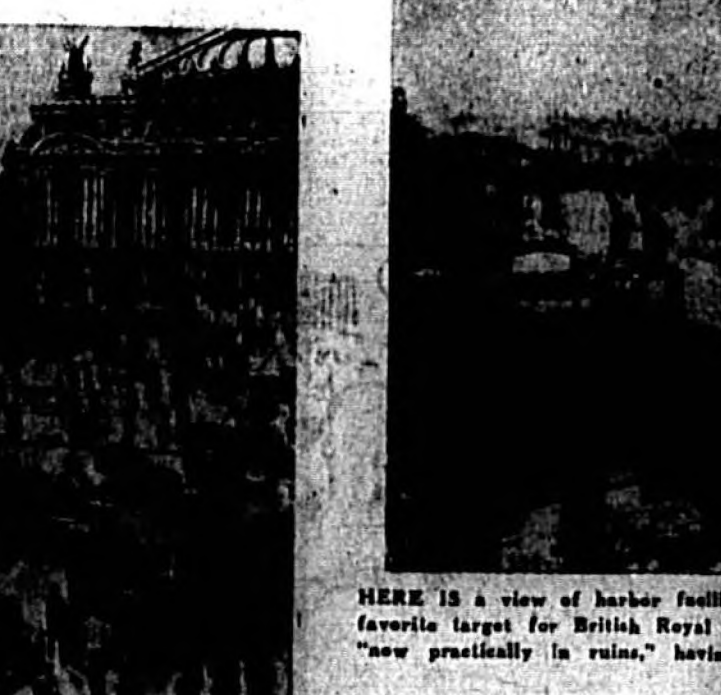

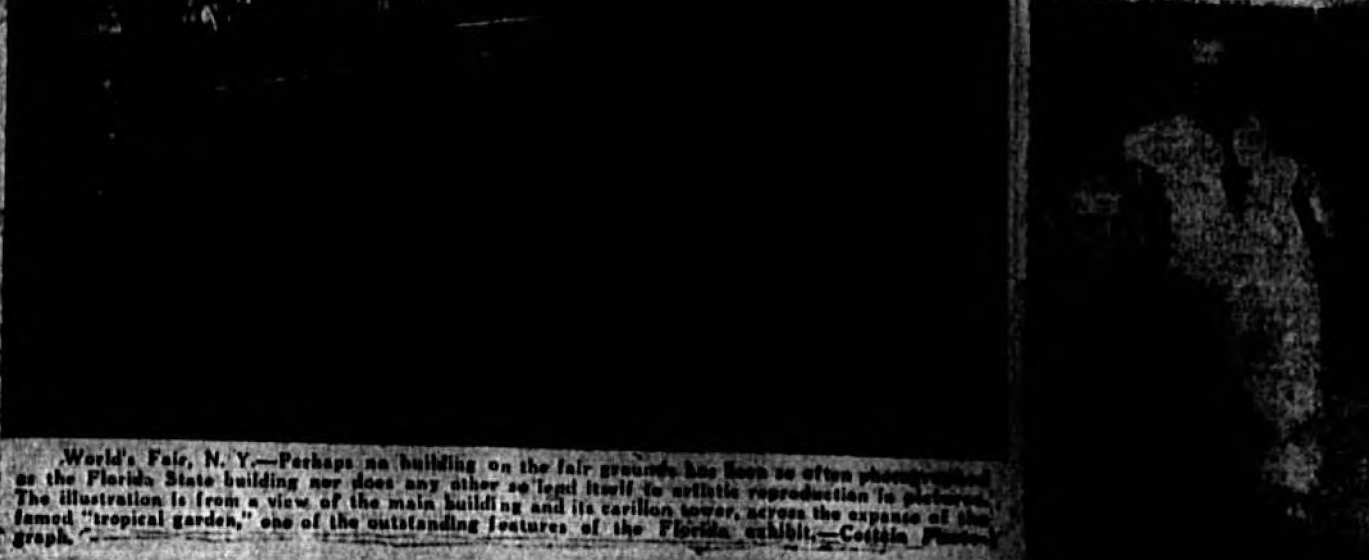

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Forecasters Ready To Inaugurate 5-Day Predictions

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Aug. 1.—(AP)—Even the weather may be enlisted by Uncle Sam in his program of national defense, forecasters of national defense.

Dr. C. G. Rosby, of the United States weather bureau, said today details were completed for inaugurating Aug. 16 a new "five-day-forecast" system that has been in preparation since 1936 by the bureau and the department of agriculture with the co-operation of Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

And—in an interview—he added: "It is rather evident, even to the layman, that means of forecasting the general trend of the weather as much as five days in advance would be important to any defense program because of the knowledge it might contribute to flying conditions and other matters."

On that basis, it is quite likely that additional funds will be furnished by those in charge of national defense to push the forecasting project further.

The new system, servicing every weather bureau station in the nation, will entail dissemination of weather data based on daily charts for the preceding five days in each period. Codified information will be sent bureau by bureau.

A minimum of five per cent must be collected if the certificate is redeemed at any time within the first three months after a tax sale.

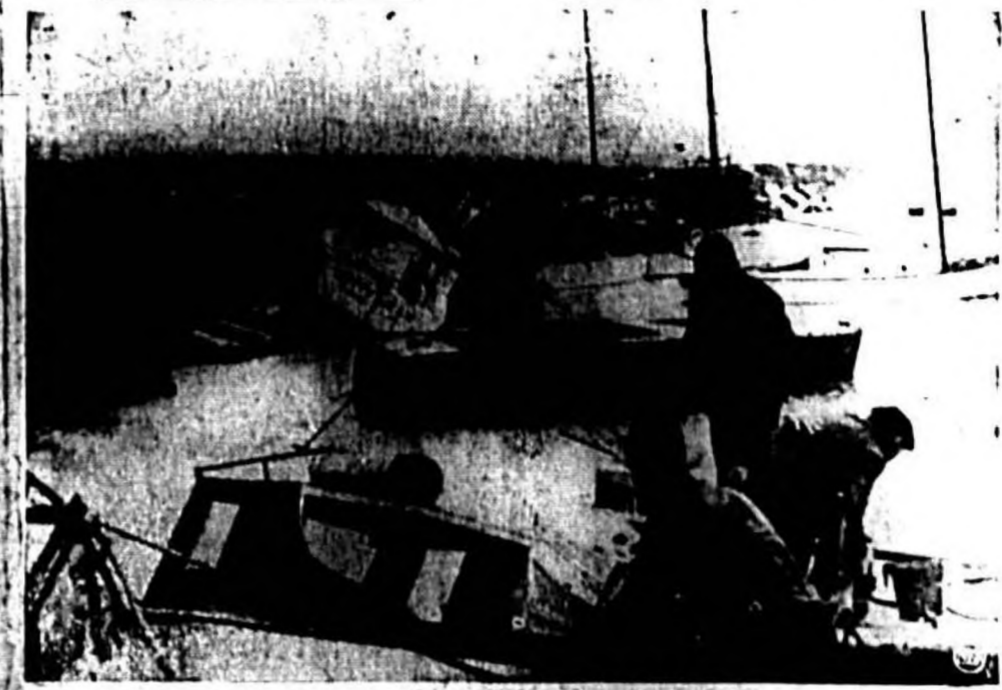

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The government, striving to achieve the 50,000 airplane goal set by President Roosevelt has agreed to loan manufacturers \$150,000,000 to \$200,000,000 for construction of about six new airplane factories, Federal Loan Administrator Jones revealed yesterday.

Jones told the House banking and currency committee that the loan program had made "informal but definite" commitments for such loans. The commitments resulted from discussions with the advisory defense production committee chief, William S. Knudsen, he said.

Jones explained \$7,000,000 of \$2,000,000 had been earmarked for the Packard Motor Company for expanding plant facilities to handle the Rolls Royce airplane engine control refused by Henry Ford because of the 9000 motors were ordered by Great Britain. He said the balance would be loaned to the nation's leading airplane factories.

He made the disclosure while testifying before the House committee on the defense production bill that would permit the RFC to make a new note issue to handle national defense loans.

Jones told the committee that "bank's are still pretty uncertain about defense contracts." He believed the RFC would have a "good deal more of business."

The RFC had been following a policy of "paying" to any manufacturer willing for a loan to be made on defense contracts up if the borrower met the contract when we work out the details," he said.

He said that between \$700,000,000 and \$800,000,000 of national defense loans had been committed. He had not expected the amount to be so high.

On another defense front, Treasury Secretary Morgenthau revealed that British tank orders were awaiting United States arms officials on tank contracts and that the government was "very anxious" to get the information on the British tank orders.
