GREATEST MASONRY SCHOOL OF INSTRUCTION IN ENTIRE HISTORY OF LOCAL LODGE

MASONS IN ATTENDANCE FROM KEY WEST TO PENSACOLA

MUCH INTEREST

Grand Lodge Committee on Work is in Charge of the Classes

Since its organization some fifty years ago, Sanford Lodge, No. 62, Free and Accepted Masons, is having its greatest school of instruction.

Beginning yesterday morning at 10 o'clock the Grand Lodge Committee on Work, composed of Marcus Endel, chairman, of Jacksonville, familiarly known as the "Grand Old Man of Masonry"; Walter L. Scott, of Sebring, and T. Hunter Long, of Pensacola, enrolled Masons from all points in Florida, ranging from Pensacola to Key West, in the several classes being instructed at this school.

The entire day yesterday was devoted to instruction in the Entered Apprentice degree, and the degree conferred on actual candidates. Last night the committee occupying the Masonic stations in the Lodge and conducting the work.

James R. Lennox Accused of Fraud On War Veterans

PHOENIX, Ariz., Oct. 25.—James R. Lennox, former United States commissioner at Sentinel, Arizona, was taken into custody at Indianapolis, Ind., yesterday in an indictment charging "conspiracy in an alleged 'soldiers' land fraud in which former service men and disabled soldiers were alleged to have lost approximately \$2,500,000, according to word received here by federal officials. Approximately 500 former service men from many different states who filed on alleged worthless desert lands in south-western Arizona during 1920 under the belief that the government was to reclaim the land for the benefit of former service men were the victims of the alleged fraud.

Lennox is charged in the indictment with having demanded and received excessive funds while acting in his capacity as United States commissioner and with having made false certificates and acknowledgments in the capacity of United States commissioner.

Frank M. Jordan, of Tucson, Arizona, was placed under arrest and is now out on bond on an indictment charging him with being an associate and accomplice of Lennox.

WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO DO REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS?

The biennial election is near, when beside the naming of a number of officials, Florida electors are to vote for or against four proposed changes in the Constitution, which is so aged and already amended so many times that it is a man's job for even a trained and astute lawyer who has made a special study of Florida history and legislative procedure to follow it. But had it not been amended from time to time, many of those who now enjoy the privileges of citizenship in this great state, would not be here.

A constitution drafted and adopted more than thirty-five years ago could hardly be expected to conform in all respects to the needs and customs of this day and time, for there has been marvelous progress in the scientific and inventive world during the years intervening. In 1885 there were no automobiles, telephones, and electric light, and for that matter, no wireless telegraphy, no radiophone communication, no moving pictures, and no aerial travel.

It is expected to vote for an amendment to Article VII, relating to the judiciary. This would permit appointment by the governor of additional judges in county courts. The amendment may be apparent. As popular business, litigation and crime increase, and if justice is to be expected without delay, it is necessary to provide for disposing of cases in a reasonably prompt manner. The mills of justice grind entirely too slow in county courts, and the amendment would bring some relief.

We expect to vote for an amendment to Article XXI, relating to the time of term of county commissioners. It is proposed to hold the election for county commissioners at the same time as the election for the governor and the legislature. It is believed that this will result in a more prompt election of these officers.

After all, it is merely a question of dates, and the constitution is determined by the voters, who elect them.

SAYS GREAT BRITAIN MUST PAY ITS DEBT TO UNITED STATES

LONDON, Oct. 25.—"I will support any party and any government that pursues the policy of peace, economy and steady progress, neither revolutionary nor reactionary, and does so efficiently," former Prime Minister Lloyd George told the coalition liberal members of parliament at a meeting today. In another part of his speech he made the declaration "Great Britain must pay America all her debts."

Unity of action between Great Britain and the United States was urged by Lloyd George. "I am for the League of Nations but I do not support the League as well as the small, the League will be a good and necessary thing to do," he said.

Mr. George also stated that the United Kingdom must meet its obligations to the United States.

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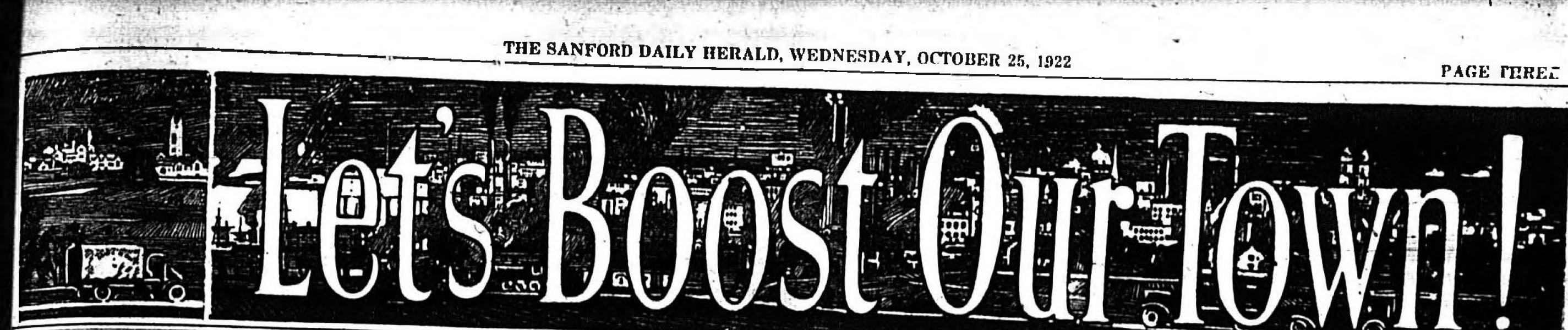

Basin That Fires Bullets New and Frightful Weapon of War is Operated Without the Aid of Any Explosive.

Can you imagine a gun which makes neither noise nor smoke, uses no explosive, is worked entirely by a pistol engine, and can shoot 1,200 rounds a minute at ranges up to 2,000 yards?

Such a weapon is being tested by the British military authorities. It works on the principle of centrifugal force—the same force that flings mud into your fork when you are eating on a wet day, or causes giant fly wheels in factories to burst suddenly into hundreds of fragments.

Anything that is placed upon a revolving wheel is carried to its edge and then hurled off.

The new gun consists of a metal basin in which are placed a quantity of round steel bullets. As the basin is whirled at enormous speed by a pistol engine, the bullets are carried to an extensive scale in Java, which will export this year about 4,000,000 pounds of the leaves.
