Government Reports Inflation Slowdown

WASHINGTON (AP) — A near-record drop in grocery prices held inflation to its smallest monthly increase in more than four years during February as consumer prices rose only one-tenth of a per cent, the government said today.

Falling prices for beef led the decline at grocery stores where prices tumbled 1.5 per cent, the biggest monthly drop in 18 years, the Labor Department said.

Gasoline prices also declined, but the department said the food was the big factor in the slowdown of prices last month.

February's increase in overall consumer prices compared with an increase of four-tenths of a per cent in January and was the smallest since September, 1971, when prices also rose one-tenth of a per cent. All figures are adjusted to account for seasonal influences.

Winter Persists Out West

Wintery weather persisted in the West this morning. Cold temperatures, gusty winds and locally heavy snow continued over a large area in the last storm before Saturday's first day of spring.

Travelers' advisors were still in effect for much of the Southwest and Skyway mountain ranges this morning. Stockmen's advisories, travelers' advisories and winter storm warnings were posted from the north and central Rockies through the upper Missouri valley as the storm moved eastward.

Rain — or snow in the higher elevations — was scattered along the north half of the Pacific coast, through the 3rd basin, and into the central and northern Rockies. Snow was spread over the eastern end of the Great Lakes. Rain mixed with snow fell along the midatlantic coast.

Christian Democrat Leader Rejects Communist Alliance

ROME (AP) — The keynote speaker at the party congress of Italy's ruling Christian Democrats has rejected a communist coalition with the Communists but says he expects them to cooperate in meeting the country's economic crisis.

Secretary-General Benigno Zaccagnini urged the congress Thursday to rule out a formal alliance with the Communists. But with the Communists winning 23 per cent of the vote to the Christian Democrats' 35 per cent in nationwide elections last June, he conceded that they represent "a popular reality at every level."

"It is very difficult to imagine in a democracy of a modern country (that) a conscious opposition could refuse constructive help to overcome the serious difficulties we are now going through," he said.

Visit Chances Slipping

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chances of a visit by President Ford to the Middle East this spring are slipping, but U.S. officials say the options will be kept open until the Arabs and Israelis are fully sounded out on prospects for a new round of negotiations.

Some administration strategists are concerned that Ford might appear to be grandstanding in the midst of the presidential campaign if he made the trip without solid evidence that it served a useful purpose in promoting a settlement.

Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger and his aides have just begun serious examination of Israel's offer to its Arab neighbors to return occupied territory in exchange for an Egyptian end-to-the-war declaration.

The hearing was conducted by Michael Ruff, PSC hearing examiner. The Commission will make its decision on the interim request on the basis of a written report.

Although the attorney for the utility was permitted to cross-examine witnesses objecting to the increase, Harrold would not allow cross-examination of the witnesses for the utility company, saying the staff commission would only ask clarifying questions.

Former Winter Springs Councilman Irene Van Espeel, who said she was not a customer but a past elected official who had received many complaints about the company, was allowed to testify over the objections of Patterson. Ruff agreed on the basis that her testimony would only be considered "hearsay," but would allow generalized testimony in fairness to the proceedings.

Harrold announced that the public hearing for the final rate increase would be held June 17-18 at a time and place to be decided.

House Panel Approves Electricity Rates Cut

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — A bill ordering \$30.3 million in electric rate cuts for more than 2,000 residential consumers has been approved by the House Growth and Energy Committee.

The bill, approved 8-4 Thursday after two days of hearings, was sent to the House Finance and Taxation Committee, where it may encounter stiff opposition.

The bill, proposed by Growth and Energy Chairman William D. Rowland, would cut rates of four large power companies by forbidding them to charge consumers for deferred federal income taxes.

The four, as investor-owned power companies, are allowed under federal law to spread income tax payments over a number of years.

Couple Rescued From Boat

FERNANDINA BEACH (AP) — "I told God I was out there, if you get me out of this one, I will get myself out of the next one," Thelma Tucker said after being rescued on her fourth day adrift in a 14-foot boat.

Mrs. Tucker, 62, and her husband, Albert B. Tucker, 66, were plucked to safety by a Coast Guard helicopter Wednesday night about 27 miles offshore in the Atlantic Ocean.

They had been drifting most of four days after putting out Saturday from Glynn County, Ga., on a one-day fishing trip.

Apparent Murder-Suicide

DELAND (AP) — A wealthy retired banker, apparently depressed over failing health, shot his wife and then took his own life, police said.

The victims of the apparent murder-suicide Thursday were identified as L. A. "Laure" Perkins, 85, and his wife, Louise, 70. Their bodies were found by a nurse when she arrived for work at the couple's home, police said.

Mrs. Perkins was found dead in her bed, a single bullet wound in her head. Her husband's body was just inside the front door, a bullet wound in the head and 38-caliber pistol nearby, police said.

Inventor Royalties Opposed

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The Florida professor who helped give the world Colgate says a proposed policy for paying royalties to state university employees will drive good researchers away.

Dr. James Robert Cade, one of the inventors of the pale green drink, said the Board of Regents was "sandy mistaken" if it thought an inventor would be satisfied with as low as 25 per cent of the royalties for his brainchild.

A proposed Regents' policy would give the inventor anywhere from 25 to 50 per cent, depending on each individual case, with the university receiving the rest, Regents would set up a committee to recommend the split.

Asked Attacks Lobby

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Gov. Reubin Askew has sharpened his pencil and launched a counterattack on the education lobby which has criticized his budget recommendation for schools.

In a news conference Thursday, Askew said: "The bill would not accept whiskey and cigarette tax increases which school officials are seeking, even if the legislature changed its position and approved the bill."

Schools are overburdened with administrators and need to trim administrative costs to get more money into classrooms.

Education Commissioner Ralph Turlington's request for a \$38-million hike in state funds for schools is "unrealistic," Turlington obviously stung Askew last week when he said the governor's budget "is not to be taken seriously in classrooms."

"I am not prepared to accept any tax increase other than what I am recommending," said Askew who proposed a 3 1/2 per cent rise on the wholesale price of gasoline. At present prices, such a tax would add 2.8 cents a gallon to the cost at the pump.

Askew said the gasoline tax hike would stimulate the economy, while a general tax increase could offset the stimulus of the tax cuts and cause inflation.

"If we are to properly discipline ourselves nationwide, this is a year to bust out in a general tax increase," he said.

Askew said he would not commit himself to veto any tax increases because he might change his mind, but said he's leaning that way now.

To meet Turlington's call for a \$38-million spending hike, Askew said that cigarette taxes would have to be increased 50 per cent and the average price of auto tags would have to go up from \$22 to \$32.


