Gun Control Bill Ready For LBJ

WASHINGTON (AP) — The strongest gun control bill ever to pass Congress is awaiting the signature of President Johnson who had sought an even tougher measure.

The bill before the President, compromise product of a House-Senate conference committee, bans the mail order sale of rifles, shotguns and ammunition.

Although it lacks provisions for registration of owners and licensing of firearms which Johnson pleaded for, he is expected to sign it. It is not certain when Congress will act on the bill that was given life by the deaths of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, was completed Thursday by the House.

Besides making it illegal to buy through the mail outside the state in which you live, the bill bans sales of firearms or ammunition to juveniles, fugitives,

Absentee Ballots Indicate

Further indications of a record vote in Seminole County in the Nov. 5 general elections can be seen by the office of Supervisor of Elections Camilla Bruce today.

With three weeks yet to go before election day, Mrs. Bruce's office already has received 1,139 mail requests for absentee ballots. Previous records were 1,335 in 1960.

Mrs. Bruce is currently processing the mail requests for absentee ballots. Absentee ballots will be available locally toward end of the week, she said.

Persons wishing to vote absentee may apply in person or by mail at either of Mrs. Bruce's offices at the courthouse or Seminole Plaza. However, ballots must be handled in the courthouse office.

Mrs. Bruce stresses that no one can pick up either a ballot or application at a polling place. A record 25,534 persons are qualified to vote in Seminole in the November elections.

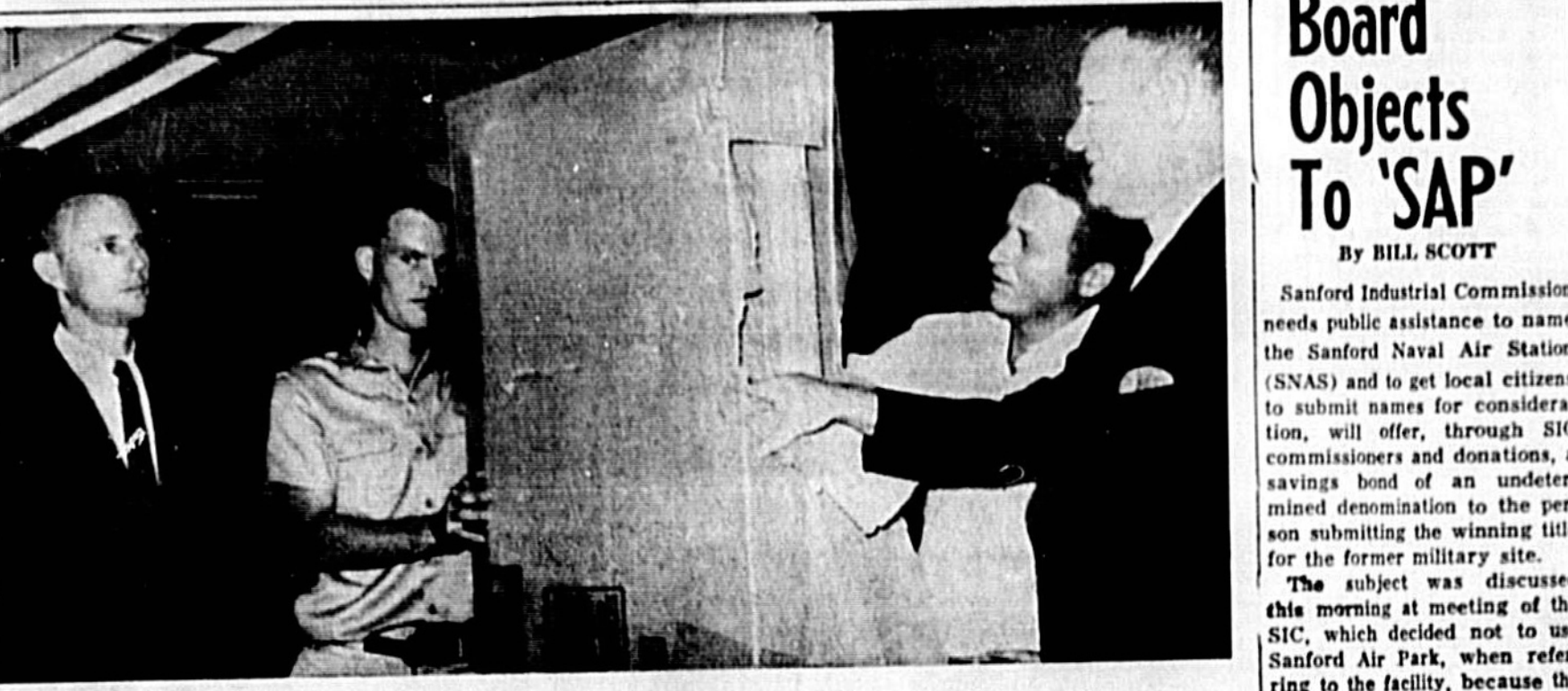
Sanford Herald poll several weeks ago indicated the county could look for an 88 per cent turnout of voters in the general election.

Previous high was 1960 when turnout was 87.87 per cent. In the last presidential election year, 1964, turnout in the county was 82.3 per cent.

Seminole has some 5,000 more registered voters eligible this year than in 1964 and some 11,000 more than in 1960.

UF Aiming For 78% Of Goal

College trustees requested President Earl Weldon to take whatever steps are necessary to get construction under way. The college officials, during a trip to Atlanta last week, were assured by the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare that federal funds allotted for the college construction would be forthcoming after the land was officially deeded to the college.

Next step, college officials say, will be a bid for first phase construction of the building and this is expected to be set for some time in November.

Weldon said the college is now scheduled to be built in three phases, but this would be broken down into several other phases before the school is completed.

Present schedule allows \$4.5 million in construction will be built in two phases and the remaining \$7.5 million will be built in a third phase.

College has utilized portable buildings since its beginning two years ago on property jointly used by SIC and county's vocational-technical school.

College was made independent of school board July 1 and is now under a trustee system with State Education Department affiliation.

School board Thursday withheld 40 acres from the college for "future delivery" and is also holding 30 acres of site for vocational school construction.

Junior College Building OK'd

Seminole Junior College permanent construction moved a step nearer when the SIC board of trustees approved a deed for the land for 100 acres of land from the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction.

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School Bonds Sale On

A group of school officials will leave this afternoon for New York where the actual sale of \$6.5 million of the \$10.3 million school bond issue passed by county voters last spring will be sold.

Heading the team will be Walter Teague, the local school system's financial officer, with other members being Mason Wharton, chairman of the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction; Kirk Gunby, fiscal agent; Douglas Stenstrom, school board attorney; and Roy Mann represents the Sanford Atlantic National Bank where the money from the sale of the bonds will be deposited until purchased. Purchase of the securities also will take place the same day.

The remainder of the bond issue, \$3.8 million, will be sold at a later date when the bond market hopefully will be more favorable.

In spite of the fact that more concerts have been booked for this season than ever before in its history, prices have been held at the same level as last year. Six spectacular attractions have been booked for the series.

City Ponders Condemnation

A public hearing to review a list of structures being considered for condemnation will highlight tonight's meeting of the Sanford City Commission.

Approximately 43 structures, some occupied, will be discussed at the session, which is expected to be lengthy.

Also on the agenda for discussion and consideration is the discontinuance of the city's service scheduled to commence here October 31.

Two items dealing with state legislators are also expected to be discussed and some action taken.

These include urban renewal legislation and establishment of an industrial improvement district for Sanford with local bonding authority sought.

This is in line with current city efforts to raise the ceiling of the city's bond issue to \$5 million to locate here, and at airport.

Also up for agency attention is a request of HUD for city inclusion of a rent supplement project as part of a workable program in reference to Palm Villa Gardens.

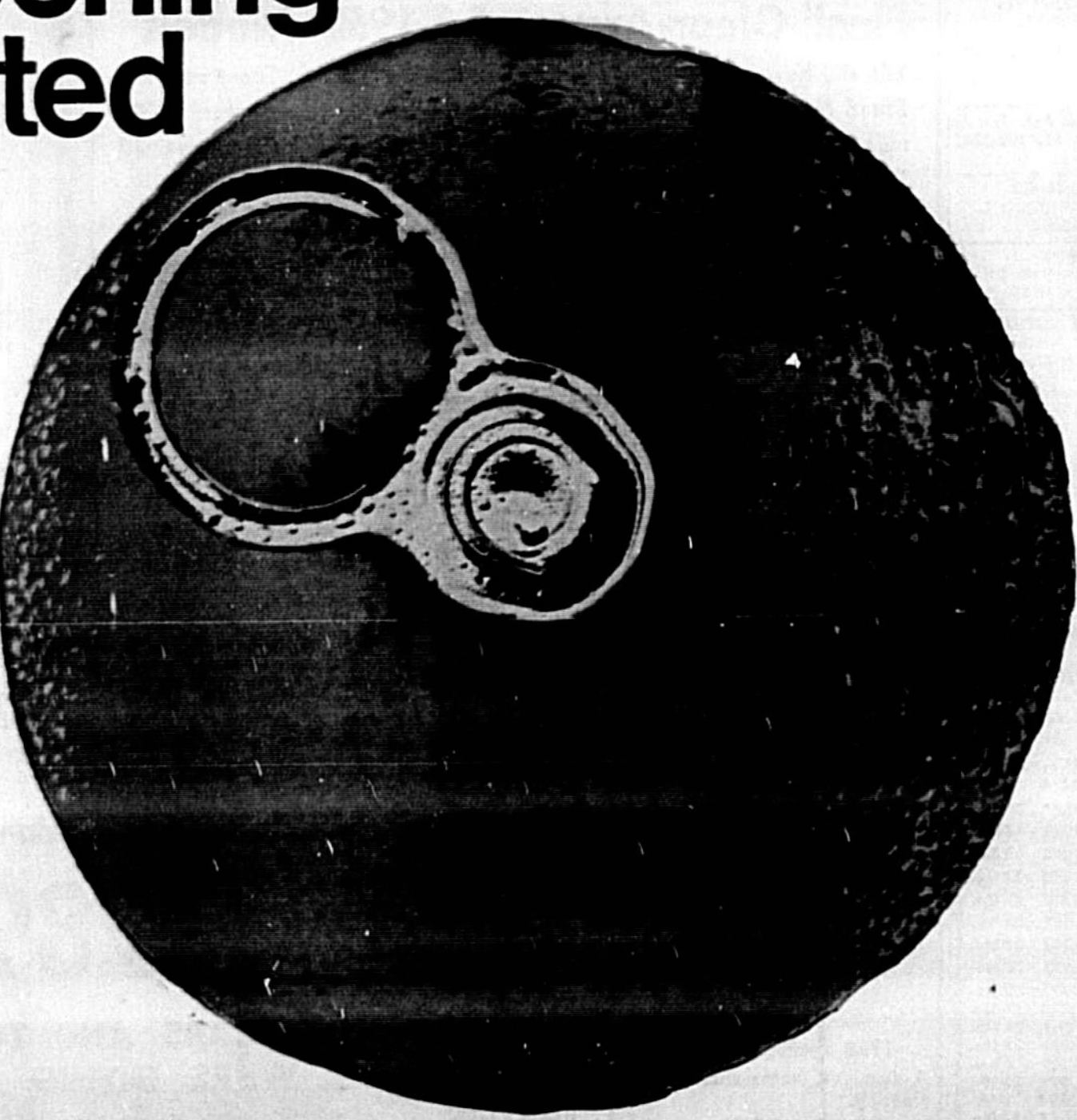
Mrs. H. L. Johnson was awarded a "one of its kind" meritorious award for her "untiring efforts to the cause of 4-H Clubs."

Starr Hurts Himself And GB Packers

Starr hurt himself and the Green Bay Packers by warming up the regular way. Maybe he should have tried Sonny Jurgensen's method.

Starr pulled a muscle in his right arm while warming up Sunday and then stood on the sidelines as the Packers lost 16-14 to the unbeaten Los Angeles Rams for their third defeat in five National Football League games.

Jurgensen, weakened by a severe cold, slept in a storage room for two hours before the game, then went out and threw 10 touchdown passes in leading the Washington Redskins to a 16-13 victory over Pittsburgh, 6-3.

The victory lifted the Redskins above the 500 mark at 2-2 and moved them to within a game of the New York Giants in the Capital Division. The Giants, 4-1, fell out of a first-place tie with Dallas by being upset 24-21 by Atlanta, 14, while the Cowboys were trouncing Philadelphia, 6-3, 34-14.

Los Angeles, by boosting its record to 5-6, kept pace in the Coastal Division with the Baltimore Colts who smashed San Francisco, 17-14.

In other NFL action, Detroit moved into a tie for the Central Division lead at 3-2 with Minnesota by downing Chicago, 14-28. Minnesota was upset by New Orleans 20-17 and St. Louis beat Cleveland 27-21.

In the American Football League Sunday, Denver upset the New York Jets 21-13. San Diego surprised Oakland 23-14. Kansas City topped Cincinnati 13-3 and Houston blanked Boston 16-0. Buffalo and Miami tied 14-14 Saturday night.

Purdue meets Wake Forest Saturday in what must be regarded as a breather for the Boilermakers—one-two punch of quarterback Mike Phipps and halfback Leroy Keyes.

The Phipps-Keyes combination had their problems against Ohio State, however. Keyes, an All-American and Heisman Trophy candidate, managed only 19 yards on seven carries, and Phipps hit only 10 of 28 passes.

The play of Buckeye sophomore cornerback John Sato was described by Hayes as "top notch" world. Sato intercepted Phipps twice for big losses and helped provide the pass coverage that kept the ball out of Keyes' hands most of the day.

Richard J. Veranes, former business manager in Cuba, now living in Sanford, was guest speaker for a recent meeting of the Young Republican Club. For three years before Castro took over Cuba, Veranes was an advisor to the Secretary of Labor, representing management in labor relations. In the United States, he was coordinator of Alpha '66, the revolutionary organization making marine and air raids on Cuba, until the United States put a stop to the action. For about 15 years before the Castro takeover, he took an active part in warning the people in Cuba about the danger of Communism taking over some day. Today, he is active as purchasing director of Southern Fiber Glass Products Inc., of Sanford, manufacturers of the "Cobia" boat. Veranes told the group that 25 years ago Cuba had the same symptoms of riots, demonstrations, civil rights, and a war in Vietnam as these United States. There also was a civil war between white and colored in Cuba 25 years ago. Cuba was an experiment of the Communist, with the main target the United States, he stated. Russia set up Cuba as the pigeon. "Your freedom is at stake," he said. "You should consider yourself very lucky to have freedom of speech."

He had a plant in Cuba which printed Time Magazine, among others. One day members of the Mafia came in with machine guns, and simply took over the plant. There were 378 employees here. "But," he stated, "it was quiet as saying the plant had been given, a donation to the state, and a big ceremony was held in this occasion." "There are many Communist spies at work in your United States," he stated, "they are in your schools, universities. Your freedom is at stake," he again stressed. "Be sure to go to the polls this November, this is your choice," he urged. Veranes also made the statement that "the war in Vietnam has to be won. You can't just walk from it."

But if you try to fight these desperate men, they would just as soon shoot you, as they are practically dead in being found out, so it just does not make any difference."

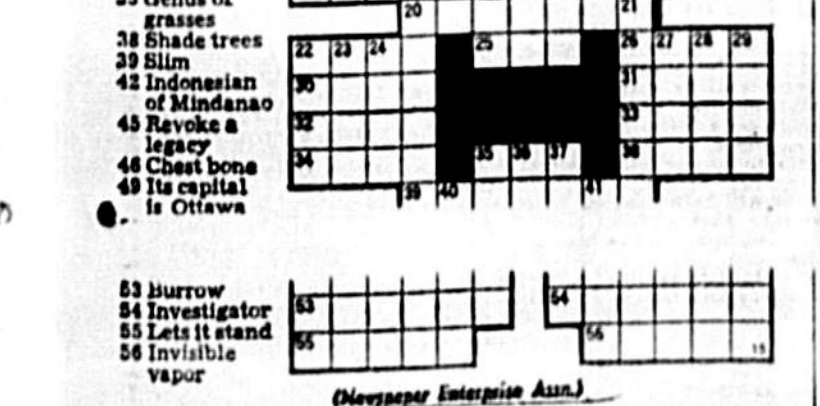
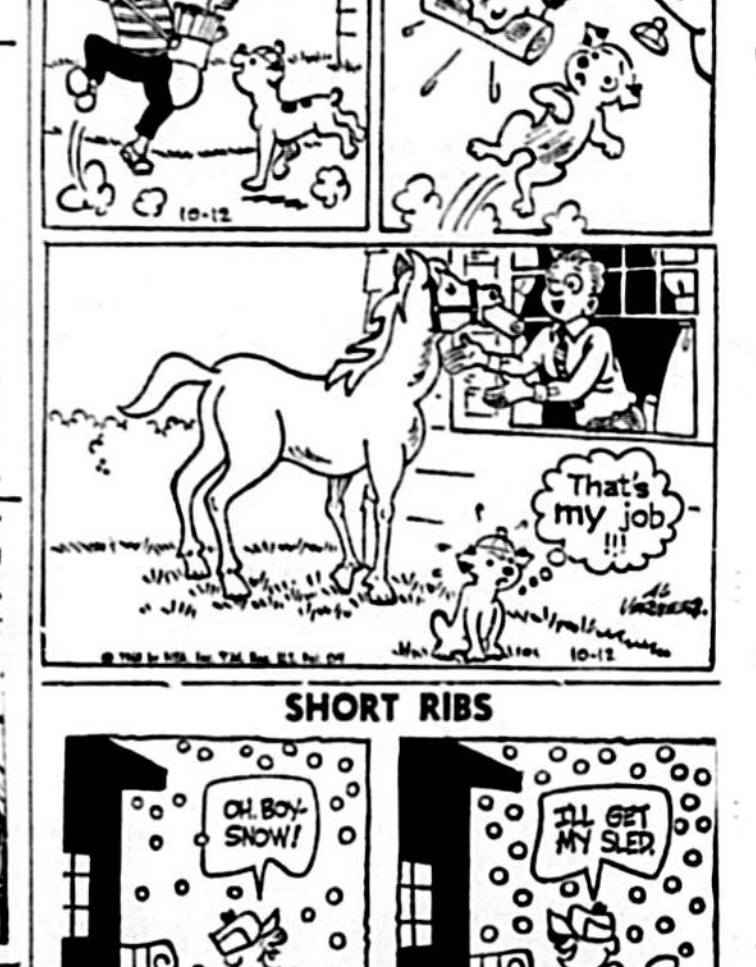
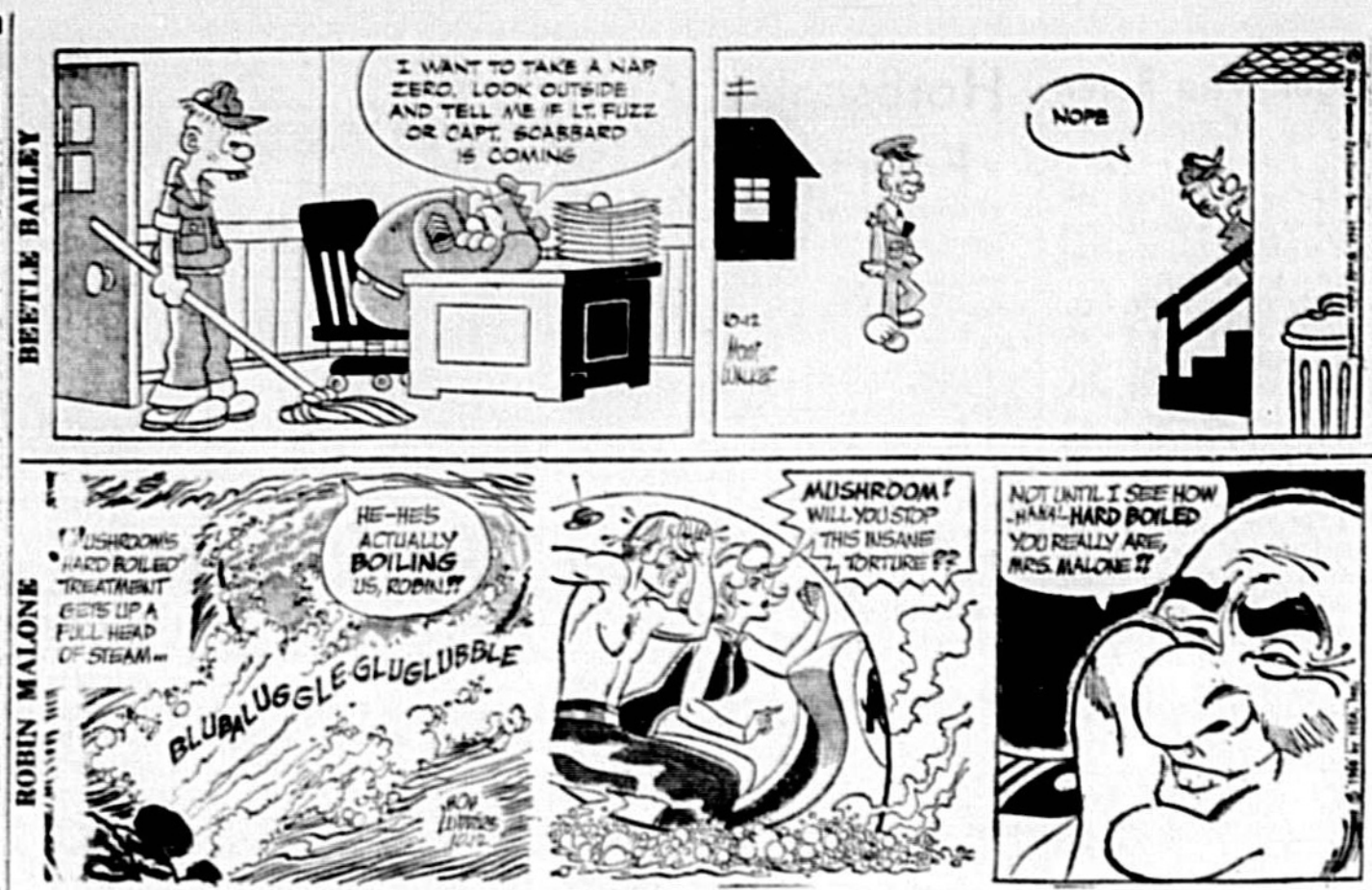

Three Named To SIC Board

Sanford City Commission last night filled two vacancies and created another position on the Sanford Industrial Commission, raising the membership of the industry-hunting agency to a total of eight.

Named to fill present vacancies on the commission were Clifford McKibbin and Scott Burns; and to occupy an eighth spot the city fathers named Lee Moore, who was a charter member of the SIC at its inception over a year ago.

Moore, it was felt, would fill a commission desire to have representation on the board. William Hutchison, city attorney, was directed to change city ordinance to raise SIC membership to eight.

Bending to public pressure, the city commission authorized a change in the disputed sign ordinance. Hutchison to amend existing zoning law forbidding political signs on private property without a license.

Commission decided after discussion to allow signs on private property 60 days before an election but must be removed within 30 days after election is over. Amended law would not go into effect until after November elections, the commission said.

In a kind action, the city fathers passed with one dissenting vote by Commissioner M. L. Raborn Jr. a request from A. K. Shoemaker Jr., contractor, to purchase lot 3 of the Lake Monroe Industrial Park at \$7,500 and acquire a one-year option on lot 4 of the city-owned property located on French Avenue at Seminole Boulevard.

Raborn objected to Shoemaker's request on grounds that property, which was formerly a land fill, was to be used for new industries moving here and to give employment to local people.

Commissioner Earl Higginbotham replied this did not preclude existing industry or other uses.

Moore was elected to the board of the Sanford Industrial Commission. He is a resident of Sanford and has been in the construction business for many years.

Moore is a member of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce and has been active in many community organizations.

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City Pushes Urban Renewal

Sanford City Commission at regular meeting last night showed continued interest in urban renewal legislation and industrial bonds.

Regarding the legislation for urban development, the commission approved an effort to have a previous bill requesting state legislative delegation to introduce urban renewal legislation for submission.

End of month of October when local funeral homes have stated they will discontinue ambulance service in the county will bring no real crisis to Seminole. "We will guarantee service until a solution can be found," representatives of Herndon Ambulance Service assured the Board of County Commissioners this morning.

Bessner said the hospital board has been looking into the operation of ambulance services by other hospitals.
