Mrs. Ruth Boutwell and Mrs. Mable Brown demonstrated making planters from oil cans using plaster of Paris.

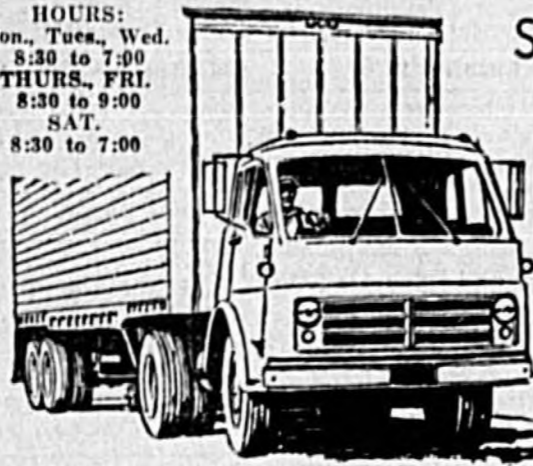

Forgers Hit Sanford Bank For \$25,000

School's Safety Is Questioned

FBI Searches For Members Of Ring

The FBI has launched a widespread search on the Southeast for members of a forgery ring which recently hit the Sanford Atlantic Bank for \$25,000, the Herald learned today.

The forgery was not generally known in the Sanford area until questioned by the Herald. Executive Vice President Roy Mann said that "on Feb. 6 a check for \$25,000 was presented to our exchange teller with a letter of instruction asking him to prepare five cashier checks."

Mann said that three of the checks were made payable to prominent people in town. The vice president added that before the checks were issued "we tried to contact the supposed drawer of the check and were informed he was out of town for the day."

Jet Crashes At Edge of Idlewild

NEW YORK (UPI)—A Chicago-bound jet airliner crashed into a swamp and burned at the edge of Idlewild Airport today seconds after takeoff.

One unconfirmed report received by the U. S. Coast Guard said 95 persons were believed to be aboard the plane, American Airlines Flight.

A Coast Guard helicopter reported "no survivors are in sight."

Airport emergency crews were joined by police and city firemen in a massive rescue effort on the edge of New York City where the borough of Queens touches Jamaica Bay and the Atlantic Ocean.

The accident happened at 10:07 a. m. EST, an hour before astronaut John H. Glenn was due to arrive at LaGuardia Airport which lies across Long Island from Idlewild.

2 Compacts Solve Parking Problem

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI)—Two compact cars parked in the same meter space have created a problem for Jackson Municipal Court Judge James L. Spencer.

A patrolman this week tagged both vehicles with "double parking" tickets, although they were within the allotted space and the meter time had not expired.

The owners told the judge the purpose of the meters was to help solve the traffic problem and that they were "just trying to help out by using half the space."

Spencer says there are two theories: "Some say if the motorist rents for an hour he can subvert any part, unless say it's the first man there and the other man is trespassing."

436 Bids To Be Let This Month

Hearing Held On 4 Laning Of Highway

Bids on a two-mile stretch of SR 436 will be let sometime this month, J. H. Hanna, assistant State Road Department District Engineer reported Wednesday afternoon.

Hanna told the Herald of SRD plans after a public hearing was held on the four lane project in the courthouse. The project stretches from Hwy. 17-92 to a point south of Red Bug Rd.

At the hearing County Engineer Carlton Billas urged Hanna of the need for acceleration lanes for southbound traffic at Red Bug Rd. and Winter Park Drive.

Bliss called the plans "excellent" while County Commission Chairman, J. C. Hutchison stressed the need of the road which was the No. 1 road priority of the commission in 1961.

Commissioner James P. Avery emphasized future cut-off lanes into South Seminole High School turning it a "dangerous situation" unless the lanes are included in the plans.

The Herald also learned that Howard Monteth has declined to serve as road appraiser for the project and an Orlando man, Jim Bettis, has been asked to serve with John Sauls.

Both Monteth and Sauls were appointed by Circuit Judge Volla Williams to appraise right of way last week.

Crash Severs Power Line

Residences of the Lake Mary area were plunged into darkness about 8 p. m. Wednesday when a car driven by William Lee Huggins, 20 of Apopka, traveling at a high rate of speed, went out of control on the old Lake Mary Rd. and traveled 350 yards, after leaving the highway, taking down a portion of fence and fence posts, a power pole and striking the A. C. Lee residence.

Following closely behind him, a second car, driven by Glenn Mann, 38 of Sanford, also went out of control, left the road and traveled for 150 yards, narrowly missed a power pole and plowed through underbrush along the railroad tracks.

Neither man suffered injuries, apparently, according to Trooper Bill Stringfield of the FHP who arrested both men and charged them with reckless driving.

Mack Cleveland Seeks Re-Election

State Rep. Mack Cleveland Jr. today announced that he will seek re-election as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the House of Representatives in Group 1.

Cleveland, serving his fifth term in the house, is a member of the powerful finance and taxation committee as well as five other committees in the legislature.

He is a member of the education, constitutional amendment, citrus, pension and retirement and two judiciary committees.

Prominent local attorney, Cleveland was county attorney here for a number of years and is a member of the Kiwanis Club, Chamber of Commerce, Masons, Elks, Bahá Shrine Temple, American Legion, Veteran of Foreign Wars and member of the Civil Service Board.

Cleveland also saw war service with the Air Corps in the Pacific Theater during World War II.

In making his announcement, Cleveland said "I appreciate the privilege of serving Seminole County in the legislature and believe with the length of service and experience I have acquired, will better serve and assist the civic, county and municipal leaders of the county."

He added that he hoped to work for a more unified economic development and educational expansion of the county.

Test Announcement Due In Day Or Two

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Administration sources said today that President Kennedy has decided to resume U. S. nuclear tests in the atmosphere and plans to make the announcement in a day or two.

Kennedy reluctantly concluded, these sources said, that renewal of atmospheric tests was necessary for the security of the United States and the free world.

The President was said to have based his decision on the results of an exhaustive analysis of the apparent gains made by Russia in its massive series of air tests last fall.

Officials said plans called for the President to inform the world of his decision on a radio-television broadcast, possibly Friday night.

He was expected to emphasize that Russia's action in breaking a three-year moratorium on atmospheric tests left him no choice but to order another series of U. S. experiments.

At the same time, the President was expected to underline U. S. willingness to halt tests whenever Russia agrees to a workable test ban with adequate inspection and control arrangements.

Kennedy's decision was based on a long scientific study of the massive test series of over 50 atmospheric explosions set off by the Soviet Union last year.

The White House attempted to keep a tight secrecy lid on the timing of the President's decision which undoubtedly will add to diplomatic stresses between the United States and the Soviet Union.

An 18-nation disarmament conference is scheduled to open at Geneva March 14, in any case, Kennedy has said there would be no testing at the British-owned Christmas Island in the Central Pacific before the Geneva meeting begins.

Freeze Racks 15 States

By United Press International The March lion's first roar today sent sub-zero chills into parts of 15 states and threatened severe crop damage as far south as the Gulf Coast.

By midnight the U. S. Weather Bureau reported 80 per cent of the nation had temperatures at or below freezing. However, the cold helped ease the floods in Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, West Virginia, Tennessee and Arkansas which had driven nearly 4,000 persons from their homes.

In Chicago a 72-year-old record for March 1 had fallen by 2 a. m. today. Bismarck, N. D., broke an 83-year-old record today, the second new mark in as many days. By midnight the temperature was already 6 degrees below the previous mark at Wichita Falls, Tex.

New cold records also were set at Midland, Tex., Detroit, Mich., Fargo, N. D., Rochester and Minneapolis, Minn., Madison, Wis., and Lansing, Mich.

Attorney Rules For Mrs. Bennett

Mayor Carl Stoddard of Casselberry informed the Herald today that Attorney Richard Ervin has ruled that Mrs. Hope Bennett is still a legal member of the board of aldermen of the Town of Casselberry.

Mrs. Bennett, whose resignation was to have become effective Feb. 28, withdrew her resignation after Mayor Stoddard had appointed L. E. Woodham to fill out her term, subject to approval of the board of aldermen.

To clarify the resulting confusion, the town attorney Kenneth McIntosh requested a ruling from the attorney general.

Lights Sought By Lake Hayes

Residents and property owners of the Lake Hayes area south of Oviedo have formed a neighborhood committee which will have its first undertaking the problem of getting street lights for the area.

All persons interested in the project are asked to attend a meeting at the Oviedo City Hall at 7:30 p. m. today at which time a representative of Florida Power Corp. will be present to explain steps for securing the lights and to answer questions.

Organizers of the committee, which also will elect a president and a secretary at Thursday's meeting, have asked that a representative from each home and property owner in the area attend to push for the street lights which will be "a great asset and add to everyone's safety."

The plaster on one of the ceilings in a classroom at Sanford Junior High School crumbled this morning slightly injuring two youngsters, it happened at approximately 9:30 a. m. at about the same time the Herald managing editor was questioning school officials about the unsafe conditions at the building located on French Ave.

Two of the youngsters scratched in the mishap were identified as Jim Marks and Scott Higgins.

They returned to class immediately after the accident. School Principal Hugh Carlton said that the plaster just fell. "There was no warning," he added.

Administrative assistant Walter Trague told the Herald that the cause of the mishap was due to "bad plastering from old leaks."

At the same time Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee said he will ask the County School Board next week to appropriate funds for fire escapes at the Sanford Junior High School to eliminate the "hazardous conditions for 1,050 students."

Milwee said that the "ob-

solete bathroom at the school will be torn down this summer and that the lunchroom would be renovated as "soon as it is feasible."

In 1960, the state survey team reported that the open stairways at the school and "no fire escapes" make it a hazardous condition for students.

The survey team also called attention to the obsolete bathroom, inadequate lunchroom and the 16 sub-standard classrooms.

"In general the plant is in a bad state of repair and will require extensive renovation in order to be returned to satisfactory functional condition," the survey team reported.

Fire Chief Mack Cleveland, Sr., said today he plans to make a fire inspection of the school in the near future. He said he recommended fire escapes be placed around the school two years ago.

A committee has been appointed to make sure that equipment and course content is in line with modern industrial practice. They will continue to supervise the course after it opens.

Major Drive Planned By Catholics On Red Threat

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The National Catholic Welfare Conference (NCWC) today launched a major educational campaign to steer American Catholics away from extreme right wing organizations and "restore sanity on the Communist problem."

As a first step in the campaign, the NCWC published

an 80-page booklet by Fr. John F. Cronin, S.S., assistant director of its Social Action Department. Entitled "Communism: Threat to Freedom," it is designed for use as a study guide in Catholic schools and parishes across the nation.

It contradicts many of the charges which have been made by extreme right groups, including the assertion that Protestant churches are heavily infiltrated with Reds.

Fr. Cronin told a news conference that the booklet was written at the request of several bishops who are concerned about reports that a "sizeable number of Catholics" are being attracted to such groups as the John Birch Society.

He said the main point made by the booklet is that the Communist threat to freedom now is "almost exclusively external" and that "those who concentrate on the menace of internal subversion are fighting the wrong war at the wrong time."

Not Negative, GOP Declares

WASHINGTON (UPI)—House Republicans today brandished overwhelming GOP support of a major administration-backed bill as the first trophy of their campaign to prove they are not "always negative."

A total of 145 Republicans joined 209 Democrats Wednesday to pass a \$263 million bill designed to retain up to 410,000 jobless and inexperienced Americans in the next two years.

Only 22 Republicans, compared to 40 Democrats voted against the bill. President Kennedy put first on his list of legislative requests in the 1962 State of the Union address.

The outcome brought House Republican Leader Charles A. Halleck, Ind., to his feet to proclaim that the GOP had "effectively refuted the unfounded accusation that our position is always negative."

It gave substance to reports that Republicans are worried about persistent Democratic charges that GOP congressmen are against every new idea, regardless of merit.

"We need more power at the plate, especially more long ball hitting," explained Keane. "Oliver hit 40 home runs last year and you can't keep a hitter like that on the bench. He'll get a chance to platoon with White at first base."

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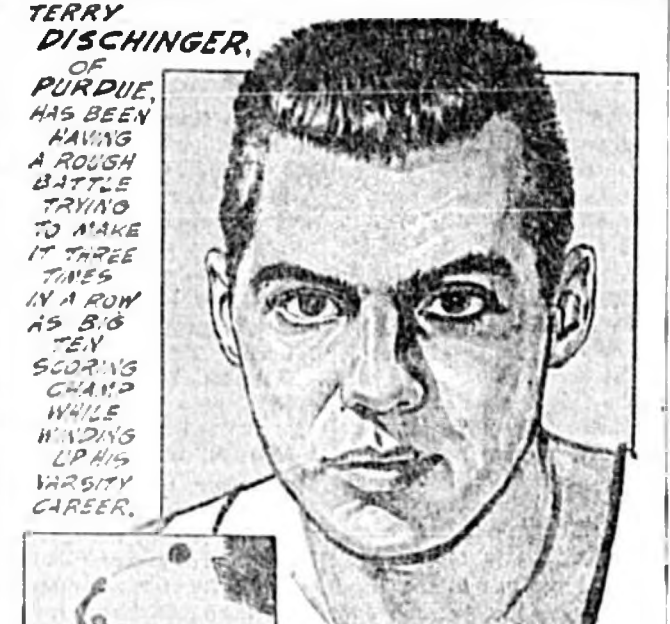
Hunt Denies He Used AFL As 'Leverage'

A Question Of Survival

It is heartening to see the City back up the Downtown Merchants divisions on the need for a survey of the entire downtown area.

We agree with Sonny Powell who told the City Commission Monday night that it was not a question of improving the downtown section but of "survival."

Such a survey of the downtown area should contain many elements.

- 1—An appraisal of public reaction to downtown Sanford;
- 2—The opinion of downtown shoppers of the area;
- 3—The reaction of downtown stores owners and businessmen to general business conditions, to local retail sales, and their view of future outlook for the downtown area.

Other needs include:
A diagnosis of the anatomy of downtown which would include a land use survey; a survey of assessed values of downtown properties and

a survey of tax rates in the downtown area.

A study of trends in retail sales in downtown and of retail sales in the communities in the area that compete with it for business.

A market area analysis that will indicate what total retail sales could be if Sanford's downtown area were to compete with maximum efficiency with neighboring shopping area.

Among the recommendations which we feel are a must would be a general cleanup, painting, and minor repairs of key structures;

A block-by-block program for demolition of eyesore structures, for conversion of non-revenue properties for retail purposes, for major re-design of store fronts; and an overall plan for relocation of major stores and for the creation of a new downtown area.

If we can accomplish these steps . . . Then Sanford can very well take its place among other communities with an exciting vital downtown area.

U.S. Committed

(UPI)—Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy effectively put to rest any doubts about U. S. determination to support South Viet Nam against Communist aggression. He said in Saigon:

"We are going to win in Viet Nam. We will remain until we do."

Since then, the question has not been whether, but how much more deeply the United States is likely to become involved.

Over the weekend, Red China herself added fuel to the debate.

The Communist Chinese demanded international consultation on the "serious danger of war" developing as a result of increased U. S. military aid to the South Vietnamese regime of President Ngo Dinh Diem.

It charged that "armed U. S. imperialist intervention and aggression . . . seriously affects the security of China and the peace of Asia."

Despite obvious comparisons to the situation which existed during the Korean War in the fall of 1950, it seemed that, for the moment at least, the Red Chinese were engaging in propaganda.

The view was shared by at least one prominent Southeast Asia neutralist who has maintained friendly relations both with the United States and Red China. He is Cambodian Prince Norodom Bihanouk.

Bihanouk has reasons for special concern since his nation borders both South Viet Nam and Laos. Any Red Chinese drive Southward either through Laos or North Viet Nam would be bound to have disastrous results on his

own country. Last October he had this to say:

"It would be possible for the United States to interfere militarily in South Viet Nam because North Viet Nam is interfering in South Viet Nam. But I advised my American friends not to send troops to Laos because you can be sure that there the Chinese would intervene, too."

Until most recently the Communist guerrillas in South Viet Nam have been doing very well by themselves, aided by a Soviet air-lift and North Viet Nam's recruiting and training program.

It has been speculated further that Moscow-trained North Vietnamese leader Ho Chi-Minh may be reluctant to call in the Red Chinese. He has remained conspicuously neutral in the current Moscow-Peking quarrel.

The United States has been careful to emphasize that U. S. forces in South Viet Nam are non-combatant, entrusted primarily with the training of Vietnamese troops even though instructed to shoot back if fired upon.

These forces, however, far outnumber those permitted under the Geneva accord setting North and South Vietnamese borders and thus supply Red China with a propaganda tool.

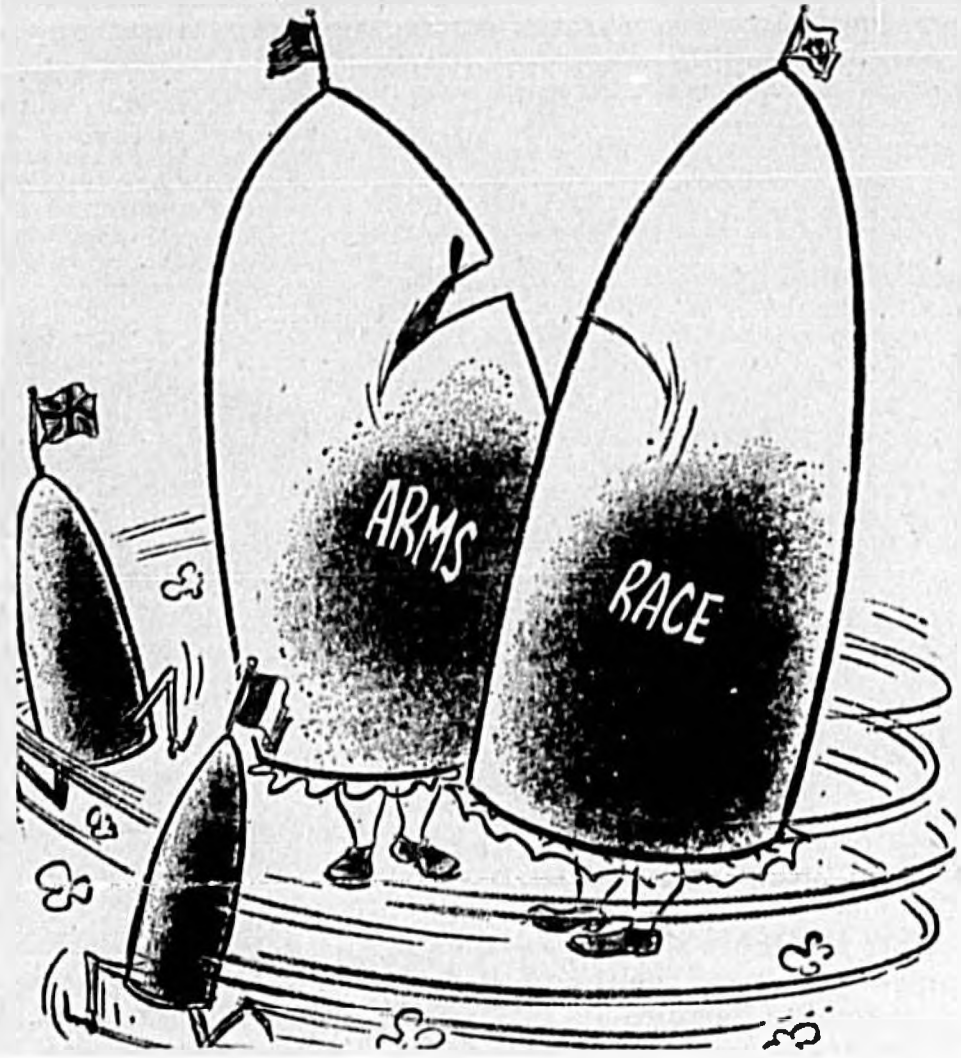

Dick West Says:

Spreading It Thin

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The success of the astronauts is not by any means the only technological breakthrough our nation has achieved in recent months.

Equally notable, in my opinion, is an accomplishment reported by H. J. Holtzclaw, director of the Bureau of Printing and Engraving, in testimony made public this week by a House appropriations subcommittee.

Holtzclaw modestly revealed that the bureau has "reached the epitome of success" in measuring the thickness of postage stamp glue.

The glue, he said, is now being checked by "beta ray gage equipment" to make certain that just the right amount of the stuff is applied to the back of a stamp.

And what is the right amount? The subcommittee didn't solicit this vital information, nor did Holtzclaw volunteer it, but I learned through independent inquiry that the glue is smeared on exactly .0007-inch thick.

This epitome does not mean, however, that ultimate perfection has been achieved in all aspects of stamp gum. My own experience indicates that stamps still stick to each other better than they do to envelopes.

But, as Holtzclaw pointed out, that may be partly my fault. He noted that some people "have a tendency to lick too much of the gum," thereby diminishing its adhesive qualities.

What we need, then, is some beta ray equipment in our saliva glands to measure the proper amount of moisture. That would not help people

who have a tendency to lick the wrong side of the stamps.

Stamp gum might be made more sticky than it is were it not for the fact that the bureau must use ingredients that have been approved by the Food and Drug Administration.

The main ingredient is dextrin, a vegetable extract. It is mixed, 64 parts of dextrin to 36 parts of water, in 200-gallon vats, and then is piped to the stamp presses.

Contrary to what you and I might have suspected, the bureau's aim is to make the glue as nearly tasteless as possible.

Holtzclaw said he had rejected many proposals to enhance the taste by adding artificial flavoring, such as maple, strawberry, grapefruit and tangerine.

His stand against flavored stamps was endorsed by Rep. John R. Pillion, R-N. Y., who said certain parties "would like to use even the glue for advertising purposes, giving a flavor like orange or Schiltz beer."

Personally, I think beer-flavored glue would out-epitomize the thickness epitome. I mean, what could be finer than to invite your friends in for a stamp-licking party?

LONDON (UPI)—Antony Armstrong-Jones took his seat in the House of Lords today and won a smiling tribute from Princess Margaret for his solo debut in the pomp and circumstance of British nobility.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—With another presidential message on health care for the aged going to Congress soon, a look at the Kerr-Mills Act medical care plans now in effect is in order.

—One who was the bill of Rep. Alms J. Forand, D-R. I., to handle the problem through Social Security. This was not unlike the proposal which President Kennedy sent to Congress a year ago, except that the Forand bill would have included coverage for surgical expenses, which the Kennedy plan leaves out.

—In opposition to the Forand bill, President Eisenhower put forward a plan for federal-state assistance to all people 65 and over who had less than \$2,500 a year fixed income.

The House Ways and Means Committee held 13 weeks of hearings on these conflicting proposals and finally came up with a compromise sponsored by Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D-Okla., and Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark. Congress broadened the Eisenhower proposal to cover heavy medical expenses.

It provided nothing for people whose savings might be wiped out by catastrophic illnesses.

The states were given authority to fix the rates and lengths of payments and handle the administration. The federal government pays half the costs in states participating that have average or above average per capita income. In states that have below average per capita income the federal government pays more, up to 80 per cent of the total costs.

If all the states had adopted the Kerr-Mills plan, it is estimated that federal and state costs of this program would be about \$650 million a year. The big problem is state financing.

West Virginia is already reported in trouble on keeping up its payments. If payments of states offering the lowest and shortest benefits were raised to a national average, total costs of the program would be about \$1 billion a year.

This is only half of the story. For, so far, only 24 of the 50 states are operating under the Kerr-Mills bill.

Only four—Hawaii, Massachusetts, New York, North Dakota—offer five-point coverage of hospitalization, nursing home care, prescribed drugs, doctors and dentist services. Georgia and Iowa have adopted plans but have no

money to finance them. New Mexico withdrew its plan for lack of funds. Connecticut and Vermont have adopted plans but have not put them into effect. That leaves 21 states with no plan in force and no benefits being paid their oldsters.

Latest figures available—for November 1961—show that 71,653 people were receiving medical care benefits. The costs run \$15 million a month or \$180 million a year.

There are now 18 million Americans 65 and older. About 16 million of them are covered by the federal government Old Age and Survivors Insurance or Railroad Retirement Insurance plans, so they have some assured income.

The three million aged not covered and not on public assistance provide the big problem.

There is no accurate measure of how much unfilled need there is for medical services to the aged. One assumption frequently heard is that few people in America really needing medical care get turned away by doctors or hospitals. But how their bills are finally paid is not known. And how many people needing medical care postpone it, or get it at the sacrifice of their children's savings or grandchildren's education is unknown.

President Kennedy sent his original program on health care for the aged to Congress a year ago. He insisted it was not "socialized medicine" but a program for prepayment of health care costs with free choice of doctor and hospital.

Last year the President's proposals were incorporated in legislation introduced by Sen. Clinton Anderson, D-N. Mex., and Rep. Cecil R. King, D-Calif. House Ways and Means Committee held two weeks of hearings on this King-Anderson bill in August. This legis-

lation is still before Congress. It will be summer before the Committee can take it up again, with any new ideas the President may have in his coming message.

Democratic leaders declare this is the most important domestic issue before Congress this year. And they want it passed as an achievement to present the voters in the November election.

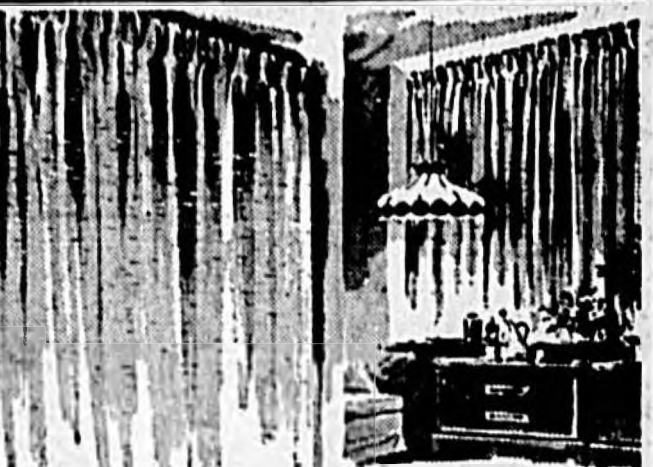

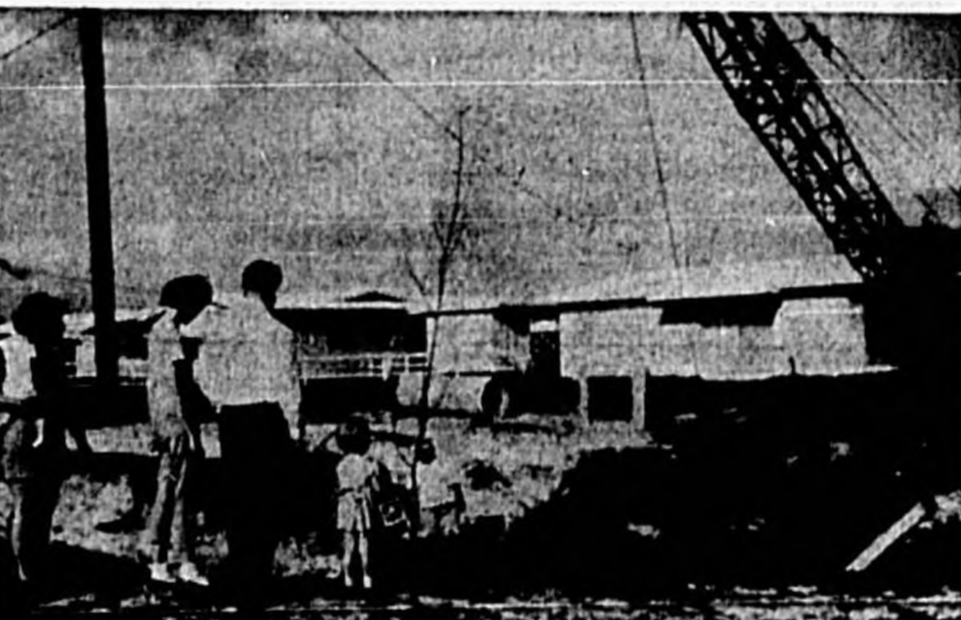

Burmese Army Seizes Power

RANGOON, Burma (UPI)—A bloodless army coup last night toppled the Burmese government of Premier U Nu. Army Commander Gen. Ne Win assumed supreme power and issued an order today asking the nation to remain calm and carry on all functions normally. He told government workers to continue at their jobs. The army said Nu and all of the members of his cabinet were placed in house arrest at 2 a. m. today by soldiers who surrounded their homes. Gen. Ne Win said the army had been forced to act because of a steadily deteriorating economic and political situation in Burma. He said matters had been going from bad to worse. He called on the people to support the coup. Businessmen and conservative politicians have argued for some time that Nu's economic policies were pushing Burma relentlessly toward the brink of communism.

BERLIN (UPI)—The East German Communists today barred the U. S. commandant in Berlin from entering East Berlin, in retaliation for American restrictions on the Soviet commandant. A U. S. spokesman said the Communist move was meaningless because Maj. Gen. Albert Watson II had no intention of trying to enter East Berlin until the East Germans lift restrictions on his civilian political aides. The East Germans barred Watson on orders from the Russians. According to the spokesman, the liaison officer said Soviet commandant Col. A. V. Solovoyev asked the East Germans to bar Watson because of an American ban on Solovoyev from the U. S. sector.

But it may take as long as a year to find out what happened in those two minutes Thursday when American Airlines Jetliner Flight 1 bound non-stop for Los Angeles, plunged into the murky, shallow waters of Jamaica Bay, killing all on board. It was the worst single plane crash in U. S. commercial aviation history.

Lake Hayes Residents Seek Lights

The Lake Hayes Assn. met Thursday night at the Oviedo Town Hall to discuss the installation of lights in the Lake Hayes community, an unincorporated section some two miles south of Oviedo. The meeting was an organizational one in which the association was formed and officers and directors elected. Representatives from 19 of the 30 families which live in the area attended and heard a proposal and recommendations by representatives of the Florida Power Corp. to install lights in the community. Representing the power company were Robert Johnson from the Winter Park office and William Sadler from the St. Petersburg headquarters. They recommended that mercury vapor lights be installed, as they provide better lighting and fewer are required than the old type. Cost of the mercury lights would be higher than the old ones, the power men explained, but the difference in the number of lights required would greatly offset the higher cost. The mercury lights would cost \$2.75 per light per month or \$33 per year. The old type lights would cost \$18 per light per year, they said. The total cost of mercury lights would be \$95 per month. All families in the community will be contacted next week and another meeting will be held next Thursday night at the Oviedo town hall to decide on the installation. Under the power company's proposal the association would be billed for the lights and the company would sign a five-year contract with the association. The association elected Ralph Neely, president; Tony Daniels, secretary; and Leonard Falk, treasurer. Directors are Monroe Parsons and P. M. Smithson.

EST, he will announce that the United States must resume testing because of the Russian test series last fall and the absence of an effective test ban.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon said Thursday Republicans should get out of the John Birch Society—or the group's founder, Robert Welch, should quit. Nixon predicted that Welch would never quit and pointed out that the Blue Book, which sets forth the principles of the society, gives him "totalitarian powers."
