Walker left Dale, Wales, Saturday in a 30-foot sloop for the 3.500-mile crossing to the United States. She figures the trip will take about six weeks,

Now a Miami housewife Mrs. Bert Bilheimer, the first woman solo sailor said Sunday, "I took all that time because knew I'd never get a chance to make that trip again."

"My boat was named the Felicity Ann. I didn't call it after me-it already had that name when I bought it," she said. Mrs. Billheimer sailed from England to Morocco to the Canary Islands to Dominique and then up through the West Indies to Miami. The crossing from the Canaries to Domingue took 63 days because "I was becalmed for three weeks," she

Confidence Vote Given To Krider

An offer by John Krider, manager of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, to pay for a complete audit of the Chamber's billboard advertising account was turned down by Chamber directors this morning at their quarterly meeting. John Fitzpatrick said he believes an audit "is not necessary." The Chamber's finance committee was requested to conduct an accounting of the books to establish how much of the money had been spent.

> Krider asked for authorization to have the audit conducted and offered to pay for it out of his pocket. Krider said that he is of the opinion his integrity was challenged by a memo from Sanford City Manager Warren E. (Pete) Knowles to the Sanford City Commission recommending that a Chamber request for an additional \$1,200 for billboard advertising to promote Sanford be turned down. The memo accused the Chamber of Commerce of diverting part of \$7,200 from an account for billboard advertising to "other purposes without an account or approval from

Knowles memo of May 28 was not released to the press or discussed by the city commissioners at their meeting. A copy of the memo was procured by The Herald from another source. The memo said that not all of the funds allocated by the city for the signs had been used and since they were not returned to the city "must have been used for other purposes." At the May 28 meeting of the City Commission Julian Stenstrom said that since all funds gathered

by the Chamber for the signs were placed in a separate account it would be impossible for the money to be shifted without being accounted for.
