#### Budget review tonight

**LAKE MARY** — The city commission will review the proposed 1991 budget for the last time tonight before public hearings Sept. 6 and 20.

City Manager John Litton said the commission must decide if it wants to borrow or budget approximately one million dollars to fund water system improvements. It will consider other capital funding projects such as road improvements and acquiring the land owned by the Lake Mary Cemetery Association.

The meeting will be at 7 p.m. in City Hall, 100 W. Lake Mary Blvd.

#### Elderly victim loses \$9,000

**FERN PARK** — An 85-year-old Casselberry woman Wednesday lost \$9,000 in the classic "piggy bank" scam in Fern Park.

The woman told Seminole County sheriff's deputies two women approached her in the parking lot of K-Mart, Fern Park, and told her they had found an envelope containing \$9,000. They offered her a cut of the money, but the woman was told that she would have to put up a \$9,000 fee in advance to pay for a lawyer to legally split the money between the three women.

The woman withdrew \$9,000 from her Longwood bank account and handed it over to the two women. The victim hasn't seen her money or the suspects since.

Sgt. Jerry Hansen said this is a scheme centered often, especially with vulnerable, elderly victims. Many attempts to con victims fail and go unreported. But sometimes as in this case the victims lose their savings.

#### Texas water not good enough?

**SAN ANTONIO** — Video tape footage of U.S. troops in the Middle East drinking bottles of French mineral water was used by Texas battling executive Rick Scoville to talk.

"I have been conscientiously watching the news every night to stay abreast of the current situation over there," Scoville, president of Arvida Water Inc., wrote in a letter to Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas.

"To my dismay, I saw our American troops drinking Evian water, which is imported from France."

But that will change. Arvida marketing director Maureen Murray said Tuesday that Arvida will provide at least 17,000 gallons of water to the U.S. troops stationed in the Middle East since Iraq's Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait.

U.S. soldiers have been told to drink six gallons of water a day while on duty in the desert.

# Water tax coming?

**GAINESVILLE** — A state commission debated Wednesday whether to recommend levying a state tax on water, an unprecedented step that some see as the only way to protect vital groundwater supplies from development.

"If people really think it's important enough to do, we're going to have to come up with a way to fund it," said Diane Donnelly, an environmental specialist assisting the Florida Bluebell Commission. "This tax may be a good way, but I'm sure there'll be others we'll look at."

Florida traditionally has treated water like air. No one owns it, and it's free. Residents' monthly water bills cover only the costs of pumping, treating and piping the water to their homes.

The tax discussed during a Bluebell Commission meeting at the University of Florida could amount to less than a penny per 10,000 gallons, but it would still place a price tag for the first time on a fluid that is one of the necessities of life.

Last December, Gov. Bob Martinez's own Water Resource Commission recommended a water tax to help pay for projects such as desalination. See Water, Page 5A

## Amnesty ends with 2,000 reporting illegal cable TV

**SANFORD** — CableVision of Central Florida estimates as many as 2,000 cable subscribers in Seminole County have taken advantage of the company's month-long amnesty period by reporting that their television sets were illegally hooked up to cable systems.

Jim Foster, vice president of marketing for CableVision, said, "Out of our entire coverage area, which stretches from Homestead

Spring to Melbourne, we've had an estimated 19,943 people report illegal hookups so far during the first three weeks. In Orlando, we've had 4,759 illegal hookups reported."

On July 30, State Attorneys Norm Wolfinger, of Seminole and Brevard counties, and Lawson Lamar, of Orange and Osceola counties, took the lead in announcing that stealing cable is a crime. State attorneys from other districts also joined forces in an effort to inform citizens statewide. See Amnesty, Page 5A

## School bus system off to smooth start

**SANFORD** — Wayne Epps, principal of Seminole High School, said he's never seen the transportation of his students run so smoothly.

Joan Walker, executive secretary to Supt. Bob Hughes, said she didn't get a single complaint about the transportation department yesterday. She said that "never happened" on the first day of school.

Last August, the school year got off to a bumpy start as bus drivers with picket signs paraded in front of the school district building and the transportation headquarters protesting what they said was the poor quality of their department's administration.

"Last year was last year," said Jerry Klein, the transportation department's newly-hired director. "We're concentrating on getting the buses off on time and making sure all the bugs are out of the routes as quickly as possible."

Klein added that he thought the year started off on the right foot yesterday when every one of his 253 bus drivers arrived at work on time and went straight to their routes.

He added that he has instituted a new policy that will insure that continues to happen.

Bus boys are put on a board where the drivers can post items up as they arrive in the morning. Buses not picked up by the time the year is scheduled to begin are gathered

up and immediately assigned to a substitute driver.

"No bus will leave late," Klein promised.

Bus route numbers are now displayed on the windows of the bus so that there is no confusion if a bus is taken out of commission.

"Students don't look for the bus number which might change from one day to the next. They look for their route number," Klein explained.

"To make our job easier, too." See Buses, Page 5A


**SANFORD** — The Volunteer Center of Seminole County has named both a carpenter and a manager as its first Volunteer of the Year for 1990.

## State to hold expressway purse strings

**SANFORD** — The Seminole County Expressway Authority will play a strong role in construction of the 15-mile tollroad, but the state will hold the purse strings, expressway director Gerald Britton said Wednesday.

Construction is to begin in August 1991.

Britton is in negotiations with Florida Department of Transportation officials to allow SCEA to act as "project manager" for the construction of the Seminole County Expressway. DOT officials have pledged to reach an agreement for a contract with SCEA by Sept. 1. An emergency SCEA meeting may be called Aug. 23 to approve the contract.

When the state approved a \$1.1 billion tollroad construction program this year, the state listed the Seminole expressway as a top project. But DOT rules and regulations threatened to push back construction of the \$510 million road from a hoped-for Dec. 1990 completion date to June 1994.

After hearings before the Florida Transportation Commission Aug. 5, DOT officials agreed to allow SCEA to act as their agent and streamline the construction process. The See Expressway, Page 5A

## Gainesville named to U.S. top 20

Twenty Florida cities were listed Wednesday in Money Magazine's annual survey of the 300 best places to live, with Gainesville ranking highest among those in the Sunshine State.

Orlando plummeted in this year's ranking. Bremerton, Wash., topped the 1990 list and eight of the top 10 were in the Pacific Northwest or California.

The bottom five were all in the Northeast, which has suffered from economic stagnation and depressed housing prices.

Gainesville was No. 13 on the list, the highest ranking for a Florida city. It moved up from No. 53 in last year's poll.

"All of us who moved here figured that out a long time ago," said Gainesville Mayor Courtland Coffer. "We attribute it to a fine citizenry. They've really done a fine job volunteering for many activities that make our town a better place."

He cited the city's new library, the University of Florida, the abundance of green spaces and recent improvements in recreational facilities as things that make Gainesville a pleasant place to live.

What Palm Beach was ranked lowest among the Florida cities at No. 241, dropping from 187th

were last year. Two Florida cities — Naples and Panama City — made the list for the first time.

All the other Florida cities moved up on the list.

Money asked a representative sampling of subscribers to rate the importance of such regional characteristics as weather, crime, clean air, taxes, medical care, housing appreciation, cultural attractions and transportation.

"Interest in the local environment figured significantly this year and a low crime rate was the second most important consideration," the report said. "High marks were given to areas with the least cyclical economies."

The magazine then collected that data for cities on the Census Bureau's 350 largest metropolitan areas and called the Portland, Ore., consulting firm Fast Forward to award points to each based on how well its Census profile met the expectations of the subscriber survey.

# Violent crime rises in Florida

## Cabinet to consider spending freeze

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Bob Martinez and the Florida Cabinet are expected to consider a state hiring, travel and purchasing freeze as a way of meeting rising expenses caused by the crisis in the Middle East.

The governor and Cabinet are scheduled to meet next week, and the freeze will be on the agenda. Higher travel and fuel costs are working with lower-than-expected state revenues to squeeze the state budget.

The freeze has been suggested by state budget chief Patricia Woodworth. It's to be a stopgap measure until the Cabinet can decide later in the month about more permanent spending cuts.

## Six million voters registered

TALLAHASSEE — Nearly 6 million Floridians are registered to vote with two weeks left before the Sept. 4 primary, just 150,000 shy of the record number who signed up to vote in the 1988 presidential election.

Figures released by Secretary of State Jim Smith list 3.1 million Democrats and 2.4 million Republicans, with over 416,000 signed up as independents or members of minor parties.

State Registrar Director Dot Joyce predicts a 33 percent turnout in the primary, which features the heated race between Bill Clinton and Lawton Chiles for the Democratic nomination. Gov. Bob Martinez is challenged for re-nomination as a Republican by state Sen. Marlene Woodson-Howard of Bradenton and several fringe candidates.

## Court halts welfare chief's subpoena

JACKSONVILLE — A state appeals court had temporarily knocked down an attempt by a judge to subpoena state welfare chief Gregory Coler to talk about problems with juvenile psychiatric care.

Circuit Judge Alban Brooks subpoenaed Coler last month to testify next Monday on why the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services has no room for juveniles in its psychiatric facilities. But Florida's 1st District Court of Appeal delayed the order Wednesday, telling Brooks he has 30 days to show why Coler has to show up.

Brooks has said he's tired of hearing that HRS does not have money to provide long-term treatment to troubled youth. But Brooks said the court does not have the authority to force Coler into court.

## Waters' leads life

ORLANDO — The trouble-plagued "Jaws" attraction at the new Universal Studios theme park was shut down for the rest of the year so it can be overhauled.

The "Jaws" ride, along with the Earthquake and King Kong attractions, has failed regularly since the Universal park opened in early June. This week, Universal filed a lawsuit against the designer of the rides, accusing it of using shoddy workmanship and poor design.

Universal has been giving 3-for-1 tickets since opening the park to make up for the problems. The lawsuit said the ride problems have cost Universal a lot of money.

Ride designers, Ride & Show Engineering Inc. of San Dimas, Calif., dispute the allegation and say they may file their own counter-suit against Universal.

## Utilities to ask for increases

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's two largest electricity producers plan to ask the Public Service Commission for rate changes this week as the state enters the fall season.

It was only a couple of weeks ago that Florida Power & Light and Florida Power Corp. were talking about lowering their rates. But both utilities now say they will ask the Florida Public Service Commission for fuel cost increases in time for colder fall and winter weather.

The utilities say they will not make any money off the higher rates. They just want to pass along the higher cost for fuel fuels since long-lagged Kuwait.

Each company wants an increase that would add about 20 cents to the average residential electric bill. But a larger increase could be requested if fuel costs continue to rise.

The two companies combined serve about 4.5 million people in Florida.

## Pilots withdraw from creditors group

The pilots' union of Eastern Airlines Wednesday quit the bankrupt carrier's creditors committee, protesting what it called "unscrupulous legal maneuvering" by other creditors.

The Air Line Pilots Association withdrew just prior to a hearing on Eastern's efforts to have the both the pilots' and mechanics' unions removed from the committee over alleged leaks of confidential information.

Eastern has accused the unions of using confidential information from the committee in a campaign to persuade travel agents not to book passengers on the financially beleaguered carrier.

## Armed suspect: It's only a drill

OCALA — A jeweler walked into her store in disguise and with a loaded gun Wednesday, then unwrapped herself and said it was a drill, but police said otherwise and charged her with three felonies.

Joyce Compton of Ocala, assistant manager at Gems and Jewels, was in the Marion County jail Wednesday evening, charged with aggravated assault, attempted armed robbery and possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony.

Ferguson said police believed Compton began the robbery attempt intending to carry it out but changed her mind mid-heist. He said even though she stole nothing, a crime was still committed. She was arrested shortly after the 9 a.m. robbery attempt, said police Capt. Vance Ferguson.

The total amount reported stolen was \$690,888,454. The amount recovered was \$210,097,696.

There were 3,608 forcible sex offenses reported, a decline of 0.4 percent. A total of 35,347 robberies were reported, a 1.5 percent increase; 43,375 aggravated assaults, up 8.3 percent; 133,428 burglaries, down 6.3 percent; and 285,626 larcenies including pocket picking, purse snatching, shoplifting and thefts from coin machines, buildings and vehicles, a decrease of 3.4 percent.

More reported gains in the war against drug users. Reported sales of cocaine declined by 13 percent, and possession of cocaine declined by 26.9 percent. However,

offenses involving marijuana sales were up 18.7 percent, and possession of that drug was up by 9.9 percent. Motor vehicle thefts were up 3 percent, to 50,998. Nineteen bribery offenses were reported, the same as for the first six months of 1990, and 1,940 cases of embezzlement, a 31.9 percent decline. Con games were up by about 10 percent. There were three cases of welfare fraud reported, compared to 4 for the same period last year. Total arrests were 342,536, including 38,654 juveniles and 58,553 women.

## Candidate slammed for using religion

PENSACOLA — A Jewish candidate for a circuit judgeship in northwest Florida blasted his opponent Wednesday for allegedly raising religion as an issue in the race.

Charles Kahn Jr., criticized letters that had purportedly been sent to households in Escambia, Santa Rosa and Oklawaha counties concerning the race for the 1st Judicial Circuit Court, Group 15.

The letters endorse Kenneth B. Bell as the best candidate because of his "Christian conservative world view" as compared to Kahn's "secularism." Kahn said he would like to run the campaign "based solely on the issue of qualifications and experience" and not religion.

"I abhor the fact that it is playing a central role in my opponent's campaign," Kahn said. "I am so sure to do with my qualifications to serve than does my race."

Bell, who claimed he had no knowledge of the content of the letters before they were mailed out, issued a statement in which he said Kahn and his associates are known for "distortion of facts and character assassination."

"I did not write the letter. It is simply Mr. McHenry expressing his views to people that attend his church."

# Glass beads found in shuttle fuel tank may be leak cause

WASHINGTON — Tiny glass beads that somehow got into a fuel line are believed to have caused a hydrogen leak that grounded the space shuttle Columbia in May, a NASA official said Wednesday.

Workers discovered between 100 and 200 glass beads between one-thousandth and three-thousandths of an inch in diameter inside a piece of equipment found leaking on the shuttle, said William Lenoir, associate administrator for space flight.

The beads were found about two weeks ago when the leaky piece of equipment, a so-called "disconnect" assembly used to mate the shuttle to an external tank, was sent to the Parker Hannifin Corp. in Irvine, Calif., where it was made, Lenoir said.

The beads could have gotten between a shaft in the disconnect assembly and a seal that prevents the hydrogen fuel from leaking, causing the problem, Lenoir said.

Officials are uncertain how the beads could have gotten into the disconnect assembly but were working with the company to find out, he said.

The only clue so far was that the beads were used at the company for other purposes when the disconnect was made in 1989, he said. The beads are used for a variety of manufacturing processes, he said.

"There's not much question in our minds that that's implicated in why the external tank disconnect shaft seals leak. We've been unable to find de-

finitively how they got there," he said.

"In a way that's good news because that says, 'Hey there's some external something contamination that led to the leak.' And we just need to make sure we don't have that (in the future)," he said.

The shuttle Columbia, which has been fitted with a new disconnect mechanism, is scheduled to blast off from the Kennedy Space Center in Florida on Sept. 1 for a nine-day astronomy mission that was postponed by the leak in May.

"We've done everything we could think to do to increase the probability of launching," Lenoir said. The shuttle Atlantis, which was grounded by a hydrogen leak in July that resulted from an unrelated problem, is currently undergoing repairs.

# Magellan loses contact with earth again

Engineers beamed emergency commands to the Magellan Venus mapper Wednesday in a bid to reestablish contact after the probe's signal suddenly faded Tuesday and was lost for the second time in a week.

In what NASA Administrator Richard Truly described as a possible "spacecraft emergency of the highest order," Magellan's \$551 million mission to map the hidden surface of Venus was on hold as engineers transmitted commands "in the blind," hoping to contact the errant probe 149 million miles from Earth.

"It could be extremely serious and I'm very concerned about it because the teams out there (at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory) don't understand it," Truly said in an interview with United Press International. "The problem appears to be different from the loss of contact with the spacecraft a few days ago."

If contact cannot be restored, NASA would be faced with its worst failure since the Challenger disaster, outspending marso-capping problems with the Hubble Space Telescope, leaks that grounded

the shuttle fleet and concern over the feasibility of the agency's planned \$37 billion space station.

"A loss of Magellan would be a severe blow," Truly said. "It certainly would set us back. (But) I can assure you that nobody... has anywhere near given up on it."

JPL experiment representative Steve Wall said the way Magellan's signal faded from view Tuesday indicated the spacecraft turned its antenna away from Earth for some reason and "we do not believe that anything like a massive failure occurred. We are very hopeful we will be able to do something."

Spacecraft engineer David Oberman said the mood among ground controllers was a mixture of "optimism, determination and just a little concern."

## Fourth dolphin dies at EPCOT Center

LAKE BUENA VISTA — Disney, going through its own version of a dolphin die-off, suffered the fourth porpoise death at EPCOT Center in five years.

Preliminary necropsy results indicate Katie, age 12, died earlier this week because of a lung illness exacerbated by "normal dolphin play," said Disney spokesman John Dreyer.

Katie was the fourth EPCOT Center dolphin to die in five years. She and the other five, which were captured for Disney in 1986, were placed on display in 1986 when the Living Seas exhibit opened.

Disney has permits from the National Marine Fisheries Service to capture eight more dolphins

from the Gulf of Mexico before the end of 1991, but because of a mysterious dolphin die-off this winter, the agency has halted all dolphin captures there.

More than 200 dolphins stranded themselves along beaches in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and the Florida Panhandle from January to May.

Because the agency is still trying to determine what caused the strandings, the national fisheries service has not allowed any dolphin captures in the Gulf this year, said Jeffrey Brown, fishery biologist with the National Marine Fisheries Service in St. Petersburg.

Disney has 30 days to issue a report on the dolphin's death to the national fisheries service.

## Jurisdiction challenged in Iran-Contra civil trial

MIAMI — Jurors in an Iran-Contra civil suit deliberated for a second day Wednesday while defense lawyers challenged the court's jurisdiction over claims arising from a failed mission to drop supplies to Nicaraguan rebels.

Cargo handler Eugene Hasenfus, 49, of Marinette, Wis., and the family of co-pilot Wallace "Buz" Sawyer, of Magnolia, Ark., who was killed in the mission, sued former Air Force Maj. Gen. Richard Secord and Southern Air Transport of Miami, owners of the chartered cargo plane.

Hasenfus sought payment for expenses incurred after the plane was shot down in October 1986 and he was captured, tried and sentenced to 30 years in prison by the Sandinistas. He was subsequently pardoned

after spending three months in a Nicaraguan jail.

Sawyer's wife and two children sought death benefits.

The case went to the six-member jury Tuesday after five weeks of testimony. The panel deliberated for 6 1/2 hours Tuesday, then resumed at 9:45 a.m. Wednesday.

The jury was barred from awarding punitive damages or awards for mental anguish. That left them to decide whether Hasenfus and Sawyer had a valid contract with the defendants, and if so, whether terms of the contract had been met.

But defense lawyers said the case may no longer meet the criteria for federal court cases. Judge C. Clyde Atkins scheduled a 3 p.m. hearing Wednesday to hear their arguments, outside the jury's presence.



### Constitutional coup

The dismissal recently of Benazir Bhutto as Pakistan's prime minister by President Ghulam Ishaq Khan was done within the country's constitutional framework. Yet it is generously smudged with the fingerprints of Pakistan's military.

Bhutto won election in a popular landslide in November 1985. Pakistan's first democratic election in 13 years. She promised social and economic reforms and an end to corruption; she failed on all points. Indeed, she tolerated corruption and nepotism, feuded with her political opponents and seemed obsessed with restoring the good name of her father, Zulfikar Ali Bhutto, who was overthrown as prime minister in a 1977 military coup and was later hanged by his successor, Gen. Muhammad Zia ul-Haq.

Zia himself was killed in a mysterious plane crash two years ago, but has become more popular in death than during his 11 years of iron-fisted rule. It was one of his close associates, President Khan, who dismissed Bhutto, named one of her bitterest opponents, Ghulam Mustafa Jatoi, as caretaker prime minister and gave him emergency powers pending new elections in October.

There's more than personal rivalry in these events. Bhutto is a woman, and a Westernized one in a male-dominated, traditional Muslim society. Thus her enemies include fundamentalist Muslims who accused her of trying to Westernize and secularize a nation founded on religious grounds.

And her favoritism toward ethnic Sindhis in her home province exacerbated bloody ethnic clashes there that she failed to quell.

Pakistan's military could have been expected to support a military government that now pretends to be a democracy. Bhutto's Pakistan People's Party (PPP) had lost seven of nine recent by-elections and might well have lost the next general election. Her successor's initial pledge that she and the PPP will be able to compete in new elections was almost immediately countermanded when Jatoi put Bhutto, her husband and 30 of her political allies on a list of persons prohibited from leaving the country, and vowed to investigate corporations under her regime presumably before the elections.

Pakistan is a major U.S. aid recipient, and its military has been the conduit for massive assistance to Afghan rebels based in Pakistan. With the ending of the Cold War, Washington and Moscow are moving toward a settlement over Afghanistan that could end the need for further U.S. aid to the rebels. That would reduce the need for U.S. arms aid to a country whose strategic importance may diminish and whose path to democracy seems to be permanently blocked by those who lack confidence that it can ever work.

## Look who's fighting the war for U.S.

In theory, everything should be going wrong for the U.S. Navy.

After all, our high-tech ships, now in the Near East, are being manned by the crisis cohort of the American population. Many of them are the alleged kids of chaos: minorities, broken homes, high-school dropouts or graduates from schools that don't teach much.

We supposedly know all about them: They can't read well, write well, or do math well. They can't find Brazil on a map. Of course, they can't compete with those Japanese and German kids.

And yet, there they are with Dan Rather on the flight deck of the carrier Independence, near the Straits of Hormuz, doing what they're supposed to be doing. "I'm trained, and I'm ready to do it, sir," they say. Grinning, they say, "I've been sleeping fine, Mr. Rather. In fact, almost too well." And, of course, always to the camera, "Hi, Mom and Dad."

The cutaway shots of those dumb kids at work show them at some of the everyday tasks of the modern Navy: with radar, sonar, radios, consoles and keeping up the electronic guidance systems in an environment choking with fine desert sands. Many of these chucks are working 16- and 20-hour days. In the engine room, the temperature can get up to 140 degrees.

Too bad. Uncompetitive.

Capt. James Stark, now at the Pentagon, recently commanded the guided-missile cruiser

USS Leahy in the Persian Gulf. "These are typically blue-collar, middle-class, middle-American kids," he says. "They've joined the Navy to see the world, or learn a trade, or for patriotic reasons, or to get away from home, or from girlfriends. A lot of them have problems. In high school, the way to be one of the guys was to screw up."

But not as in the Navy, says Stark: "On a ship if they screw up, the guys turn against them.... They're great. We have the best Navy ever. They didn't come into the Navy to stay out


of an Army draft, the way it was before the all-volunteer service."

Somebody else has noticed. Soviet Marshal Sergei Akhromeyev, recently visited U.S. military bases. After watching U.S. enlisted men, in their crisp dress, yee-hawing everything that moved, telling him they were in service to defend their country, and then go tooling off in a red convertible, Akhromeyev said, "I wish I had people like that in my army."

The Navy today is 31 percent black, 11 percent Hispanic, and with plenty of others. On the Leahy, there were Filipino, Korean, Vietnamese, Samoan, Jordanian and — ha! — Iraqi.

They get along pretty well. They're doing some things our high schools don't do. There are spot drug tests. Flunk the test and you're out of there. If recruits don't back it on ship, out of there. But there is also some Tender Loving Care. "There's more TLC," says Cmdr. Jo Dee Jacob, the Navy Fellow at the American Enterprise Institute. "A lot of these guys never had anyone to go to," she says. "Now, their chief, as tough as he might be, often becomes a father figure when they have problems."

Obviously, it can't work: low-tech kids in high-tech jobs. Hasn't the Navy been to all the double-dome seminars?

## American cars aren't cutting it

WASHINGTON — What is the matter with this picture?

It is a full-page advertisement in national magazines, featuring a list of the top 10 cars in an "initial quality" survey of 1990 models. The survey involved more than 35,000 new-car buyers and disclosed owner-reported problems during the first 90 days. Here is the list:

2	Mercedes-Benz	Germany

This is, believe it or not, an advertisement for Buick. The big print says "Buick. The only American car-line to rank in the top 10 in quality. But then, quality has never been foreign at Buick."

So it has come to this: an American corporation's brand is that it has been broken by six, four foreign competitors.

We have all seen something like this at the end of many college football or basketball games. The winning player and their fans, each with one flag and one chant, "We're Number One!" Both teams cry in unison, and the games may be determined by the advertisement, but at least it is better than chanting, "We're Number One!"

A recent magazine story in the New York Times provided some, if somewhat, reasons for not buying an American car. Various American companies involved in producing an excellent automobile in all their products.

"America," began a voice, intended to be ominous, "is far from over now. It's December and the price leader's going to get the big Christmas sale in Michigan Center. On the cheap Japanese cars." The commercial buying Japanese cars. "The commercial buying Japanese cars with two words printed in large letters on a black screen: 'Enough Already.'"

Does that change references to Buick/Buick Center make you crawl with nationalistic indignation and want to buy into your Buick/Buick Toyota and think that to buy a Pontiac? It is supposed to. It has been run by the Pontiac dealers of the New York metropolitan area.

Is that the best way to sell American cars — just change the subject? Talk and about transportation but not cars? (The Japanese have bought 51 percent of Buick/Buick Center.) The promise of the ad is that red-blooded Americans should be driven mad with indignation by the fact that a Buick of

Manhattan real estate could bear the name of a Japanese emperor rather than an American rubber baron.

The premise is unattractive, but the commercial may be effective. During a recent month when the commercial was run, Pontiac sales in the metropolitan region were the same as in the same month one year ago, despite a steep decline in Buick sales elsewhere in the Northeast.

Oldsmobile dealers in New York have tried to sell cars with the pitch that Buick, stripping Americans can't fit comfortably into cars designed by, or for, designers: "That's why our car is built for our size families, not theirs."

It is pathetic that American products are sold that way. What has gone wrong? Lots, but let's start with America's increasingly ardent and selective intolerance.

Americans are fierce at stamping out smoking in elevators, and censorious toward anyone caught being insufficiently risk-averse regarding cholesterol. Would that Americans were equally impatient and censorious about lax standards ("We're Number One") that are producing pandemic obesity in everything from cars to art to second-graders' homework.

If Americans want to worry about the right rules, they should worry about the Buick ad in the context of this fact: Military assets are declining relative to economic performance as an index of national power and stature. We are spending our money into Lockheed, and Buick Lockheed have figured prominently in recent "initial quality" surveys.

Lockheed was ranked second among all models, foreign and domestic, in 1989 but in 1990 fell to sixth. However, because it still ranked higher than any other car made by General Motors, Ford or Chrysler, Buick has advertised Lockheed as "the first-built American car."

Do advertisers not understand that potential buyers understand the role of that modifier — the adjective "American"? It says, loud and clear, "Don't expect us to measure up to the big boys — the Europeans."

## Nepal leader is a ray of hope

WASHINGTON — Before the people of Nepal pushed him into the office of prime minister last April, Krishna Prasad Bhattarai was an aging ex-juggler living on the charity of his nephew in a small apartment in Kathmandu.

Bhattarai, 65, now sleeps in a guarded mansion and is chauffeured to his office each day where he steps over the hide of a Bengal tiger to reach his massive hand-carved desk.

As the new prime minister of this Himalayan nation, Bhattarai is paid 6,119 rupees a month, about \$244. He gives 6,000 to his nephew and keeps the change, about 65. "I am a frugal man," he says, and smiles.

He is also revered throughout Nepal as a man with an unbreakable spirit — the people's champion and an opposition leader for more than 30 years. Two kings have tried to silence him by jailing him for 15 years without ever charging him with a crime. What pulled Bhattarai through? "My obsession with the freedom of man," he said.

Our associate Jim Lynch traveled in Nepal recently and met with Bhattarai. The new prime minister chuckled about the twist of fate that put him in power. Nepal's King Birendra was forced by growing opposition among his people in April to fire his appointed prime minister and let opposition leaders form an interim government and appoint their own prime minister, Bhattarai. The king is now promising multiparty elections within a year. Nepal has not had an election in 31 years.

Bhattarai looks like he has reached the stage in his life where he would rather bounce a grandchild on his knee. Instead, he is working 12-hour days trying to pull an impoverished nation from the grasp of a monarch.

He carries the added burden of his people's expectations and their belief that he is a miracle worker. Nepal is wedged between two giants with bad tempers — China and India. It is one of the poorest nations in the world and one torn by political factions, including a rising Communist Party. Despite the challenges, Bhattarai does not look worried. He has a serene easy smile. He explained the history of the democratic movement in Nepal and drew a parallel with the growing awareness of human rights, which he maintains was fostered by the United States. He credits the Voice of America, the U.S. government's radio broadcast, for inspiring the April uprising in Nepal forcing the king to relinquish the constitution. When Bhattarai took the job, he said the king blundered that he would be loyal to the people, not the crown.

Now Bhattarai says he must be his own toughest critic and will watch for the slightest sign of selfishness in himself. "Man is a most unreliable creature," he said.

Soon after he took office, Bhattarai had dinner with the new U.S. ambassador to Nepal, Julia Chang Block. They formed a mutual admiration society. Block blames Bhattarai to Mahatma Gandhi. "My family man was there like him but in the end," she said, "Bhattarai is a gifted center with a lot to say, and his stage has finally arrived. He will speak before the United Nations General Assembly this fall, and he can't contain his smile at the thought of addressing leaders of the world."

Asked whom he thinks are the great world leaders today, Bhattarai grinned and said, "I think many of the world's great leaders are still unknown."

that these people illegally connected to cable television will face a maximum punishment of a \$1,000 fine, and/or a year in jail.

Roster said there were "approximately 35,000 residents illegally connected to service at the beginning of the campaign." He said that many illegal connections resulted in a loss of about \$10 million a year to his company alone. Other cable companies are suffering losses as well because of the illegal activity.

Some newcomers to the area may have purchased a home where cable was already hooked up illegally, while others may have done their own rewiring. Roster reported that they have found some of the most elaborate hookups imaginable. "One illegal activity we've found," he said, "is people pricing a cable installer and promising life-time cable hookups for only \$100.

Many of these bogus installers probably worked for some other cable company at one time, and now a way to make a few dollars." Roster cautioned that if found, both the party receiving the hookup and the installer would be subject to criminal charges.

During the month of August, however, no explanations are required. Homeowners were asked to simply phone CableVision and report the situation, at which time CV would either disconnect the service, or arrange for legal hookups.

Roster expects to see the heaviest amount of illegal hookup reports during the last few days of this month.

CableVision would not reveal the amount of money paid for their "Amnesty Days" advertising campaign other than to say it was "substantial."

CableVision's amnesty period ends next Aug. 31.

The Iraqi News Agency released details Tuesday and Wednesday of Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz and two envoys of U.N. Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar, during which Aziz chastised the Security Council for becoming an "American instrument."

Aziz urged the Security Council to show a "willingness to establish peace" by beginning discussions on two initiatives launched by Saddam since his Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait led to the buildup of a multinational force in the gulf, INA reported.

Aziz also told the U.N. envoys that Iraq assured the "safety and good treatment" of thousands of foreigners held in Iraq and Kuwait, but cautioned "their fate would be linked with the intentions of the U.S. administration."

Meanwhile, ABC television cited a "very, very accurate" source in Iraq as saying "start-

ing tomorrow morning, all the foreign embassies in Kuwait will be surrounded by Iraqi troops."

"We do not hear a Friday deadline to close their offices and transfer to Baghdad. The embassies will be closed. They will not allow anyone to leave the embassies or to go into the embassies," said the report, adding it was not clear whether the troops would prevent food from going in.

Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney said Thursday morning the United States was prepared to fight if provoked.

"In fact there is provocation, he (Saddam) would launch an attack on upon the United States or U.S. forces in the area, we

clearly have a wide range of responses available," Cheney said. "The president will make the decision on how we respond."

"We don't recognize the Iraqi annexation of Kuwait and I think most of us are determined to keep our embassies open," he said.

Cheney estimated Baghdad now has 180,000 to 200,000 soldiers and 1,000 Iraqi tanks "posted on the northern border of Saudi Arabia," a major supplier of oil to the United States and now host to tens of thousands of U.S. forces deployed to confront the Iraqi buildup.

Rush Wednesday further expanded the U.S. military

commitment by calling up about 40,000 reservists to implement forces already dispatched to the Persian Gulf.

Meanwhile, Kuwait's government-in-exile announced Thursday it would bankroll part of America's military expenses to counter the Iraqi occupation of the emirate through a massive land, sea and air operation costing Washington about \$20 million a day.

"We will do anything," said Kuwaiti Foreign Minister Saad al-Abdullah al-Sabah in a news conference in Taif, Saudi Arabia. "We will give not only our money, our funds, but our blood."

## Kuwaitis vow to fight Iraqis

—AUDI ARABIA — Kuwaitis who fled their nation are forming a liberation army to lead any military effort to force out Iraqi occupation forces, Kuwait's crown prince said today.

"We will be reorganizing, rearming, re-equipping with necessary arms to take part as an advance team in liberating our country," Prince Saad Abdullah al-Sabah said. "We Kuwaitis will

never submit or surrender to threats or to aggression or to occupation."

Prince Abdullah, the No. 2 official in the ousted Kuwaiti government, met with reporters at a hotel where he and other Kuwaiti officials have set up temporary headquarters.

Abdullah declared that "the Kuwaiti government is alive and well" and implored world leaders to tighten the economic and political sanctions against Iraq.

"We in Kuwait and our brothers in this vital part of the world are fully convinced that it is quite necessary that we should cooperate together to fight and to struggle, by all means available to us, to free Kuwait," he said.

Abdullah said he is convinced Iraq was planning to attack Saudi Arabia next to gain control of its oil and other riches.

The resistance movement, he said, "is growing day by day."

plants and the re-use of treated sewage water.

Martinez asked Chase-Manhattan Bank to study the proposal and report back in December. The Hubert Commission report is due in February.

The Legislature created the commission last year to study whether tax incentives should be extended to landowners to pro-

serve the state's "high water recharge" land — areas where rainfall seeps easily through the ground into the underlying aquifers.

Some 80 percent of the water used in Florida comes from the aquifers.

However, county officials fear such tax incentives could end up starving local governments, which rely on property taxes.

"Yes, you want to protect the water resource, but you also want to protect your citizens' pocketbooks," said Pasco County Commissioner Ann Hildebrand. "As far as I'm concerned, it's a state program. The state should pay for it."

A water tax could help make up the difference, said Donnelly.

"The ultimate decision that has to be made is whether the cost of protecting the bluebelt land outweighs the benefit," said Peter Hubbell, chairman of the 15-member commission. "The cost might be considerable, it

might not be worth it." Every acre of land that can absorb 10 inches of rain a year puts roughly 430,000 gallons in the ground-water system, Donnelly said.

But Florida's open lands are slowly being swept away by development. Concrete and asphalt divert rainfall into storm drains and streams, preventing it from seeping into the ground.

Between 1973 and 1984, roughly 5.5 percent of Florida's agricultural land was lost to development, according to state records. Experts say the devastating freezes that swept through Florida citrus groves during the past decade are partially to blame.

planned completion is now July 1993, seven months later than SCEA's target date but still seven months earlier than DOT could build the road.

Brinton said under the proposed agreement SCEA would oversee land purchases for the road and oversee the construction program. SCEA would also hire consultants and inspection engineers to oversee the construction with each advance from DOT.

But DOT will direct the construction company bidding and approval process, Brinton said. DOT will also issue checks to SCEA to buy land and pay contractors, he said. Brinton said if land can be purchased for appraised value, DOT will issue a check for the purchase amount and SCEA officials will close the purchase in 90 days.

But if the purchase price exceeds the appraised value of the land, SCEA would be required to conduct a formal review of the price, then DOT would review SCEA's recommended price for up to five days before issuing the check, Brinton said. The process is slower than SCEA methods, which include begin condemnation proceedings to gain title to the land.

Under DOT requirements, SCEA would not be able to advertise construction bids until all land for the expressway is purchased, Brinton said.

Brinton said DOT officials will try to speed the land purchase process by making about \$15 million available by late September to allow SCEA to begin buying land. Bond revenue will be available in January under the current schedule, Brinton said.

### German unification date set

BONN, West Germany — The East German Parliament Thursday set the date of German unification at Oct. 3. The major West German political parties welcomed the decision, which will formally end 45 years of division.

Although the date has no special significance for Germans, the month of October marks the first anniversary of the pro-democracy demonstrations that brought down East Germany's Socialist leadership, paving the way to German unification.

The decision, passed by an overwhelming majority of deputies, is subject to the conclusion of negotiations on the external and internal aspects of unification and the establishment of five federal states in East Germany.

Once the conditions are met, the decision will be binding as the West German constitution provides for the accession of former German states to the Federal Republic of Germany — now still West Germany.

### Efforts to curb factional fighting

KATIBI, South Africa — Rival black factions clashed for a 10th day in townships near Johannesburg, leaving the death toll to more than 500 and prompting the African National Congress to call its members to drop guns talks between Nelson Mandela and Zulu leader Mangosuthu Buthe.

As migrant Zulu workers arrived with weapons, some had to be repatriated through King's Woodhouse, setting fire to houses and clashing with communist residents. President Frederik de Klerk appealed to Mandela and Buthe to meet.

"It is of decisive importance that this sporting take place as soon as possible," de Klerk said in a statement.

He said he had been informed that high-level delegations from both sides "will meet shortly" in an effort to arrange a meeting between the two black leaders.

### Quake shake central Japan

TOKYO — Three earthquakes, each registering at least 5 on the Richter scale, jolted central Japan Thursday morning and disrupted rail traffic for hours, officials said.

No damage or injury resulted from the series of fast-paced quakes, the National Public Safety Agency said.

The first and strongest in the group of earthquakes registered 5.3 on the Richter scale and shook the Tokyo metropolitan area at 6:47 a.m., the Meteorological Agency said.

### China, U.S. stage new Romeo and Juliet

BEIJING — China's national ballet, in one of the few cooperative U.S.-China cultural endeavors this year, is preparing to stage an original production of "Romeo and Juliet" with an American choreographer and musical adviser.

The ballet's opening Sept. 2 will mark the second time this year that Norman Walker, a professor of dance at Adelphi University in New York, will work the Central Ballet of China as choreographer.

Walker, who has been in Beijing for several weeks, has designed a new version of Prokofiev's ballet based on the Shakespearean tragedy and said he tailored it to the talents of the Chinese dancers.

# Buckets pose new threat

WASHINGTON — An 11-month-old boy, newly diapered, was briefly left alone with a teddy bear on the bedroom floor of his suburban home last month. Moments later, the toddler was found upside down in a 5-gallon bucket of soapy water. He died a short time later.

In Madras, Calif., a mother is awaiting trial on a felony charge of reckless endangerment in connection with a similar accident last November that left her 4 1/2-month-old son dead.

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, these are not isolated incidents.

Every other week somewhere in the United States, a child left unattended falls head first into a bucket of water and drowns, commission head Jacqueline Jones-Smith told reporters Wednesday.

"This is one of the most latent and widespread risks in recent commission experience," Jones-Smith said. "Who would suspect that infants or toddlers could pull themselves up and into a 5-gallon bucket without tipping the bucket over? But it has happened, and unfortunately, our data show that will probably happen about eight more times in 1988 unless something is done."

In all, more than 185 such deaths have been reported to the commission since 1980, she said. By comparison, about 300 children drown each year in residential swimming pools.

The children who died in bucket drownings usually ranged in age from 8 to 18 months, though some victims were as young as 4 months and as old as 2 years.

Nearly all the cases reported to the commission involved standard 5-gallon plastic buckets that had been tipped over their original contents, such as paint, and were brought home to be used for household chores.

In a typical accident, a curious toddler reaches into the bucket to play in the water or drops a toy in the container and tries to retrieve the object, then leans over too far and falls in head first.

Because children of this age are top-heavy and only about twice the height of the average 14-inch-wide bucket, the container does not tip over and toddlers cannot work themselves free.

# Greenhouse debate heats up

WASHINGTON — Two leading atmospheric scientists rebutted claims the sun's natural fluctuations will offset global warming from man-made greenhouse gases and argued for immediate steps to curb such pollution.

Last year, in a report that found favor in the Bush administration, scientists with the prestigious Marshall Institute in Washington downplayed the threat of global warming from pollution. One contention was that the sun's output of energy is expected to decline early next century, resulting in substantial natural cooling and possibly making efforts to reduce greenhouse gases "unnecessary or even harmful."

Now, James Hansen and Andrew Lacis of the NASA Goddard Institute for Space Studies in New York have disputed that scenario, saying their calculations show natural swings in solar radiation could not counteract greenhouse warming.

The greenhouse effect occurs when carbon dioxide and other gases act like the glass windows of a greenhouse, trapping heat in Earth's atmosphere and preventing it from escaping back into space.

Some scientists think worldwide temperatures will increase as a result of greater concentrations of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases from man-made sources like car exhaust.

Whether the Earth actually is warming — and when possible resulting problems like droughts or rising sea levels might occur — is a matter of controversy, although most records show global temperatures have risen about 1 degree Fahrenheit over the past 100 years. Uncertainties include the impact of oceans, clouds, volcanoes and the sun.

In an article published in the Journal of Science, Hansen and Lacis said the sun's energy output would have to fall at least 2 percent to counter the warming they expect to occur by 2050 if emissions of greenhouse gases continue to rise at their current pace.

"There is no evidence for such a decrease (in solar energy)," the researchers wrote, noting ground-based observations of the sun's diameter suggest its energy output has varied only 0.3 percent or 0.3 percent over the past 275 years. A 2 percent decline would also be "30 times larger" than the changes measured by spacecraft over the

past 11 years, the researchers said Wednesday.

Robert Jastrow, co-author of the Marshall report and professor of earth sciences at Dartmouth University in Hanover, N.H., called Hansen's article "very interesting" but "completely contradictory" to what his team's analysis found.

Jastrow, founder and former director of the Goddard space studies institute, called past studies linking the sun's diameter to its energy output "totally flawed" because they did not properly correct for how changes in atmospheric thickness affect ground-based observations.

In addition, he said diameter measurements probably are not sensitive enough to pick up fluctuations as small as 2 percent in energy output. Ronald Gilliland, a solar physicist at NASA's Space Telescope Institute in Baltimore, has estimated a change in solar radiation of up to 10 percent could occur without any de-

crease in energy output.



# Too many blood cells identify this disorder

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My brother has been diagnosed with a myeloproliferative disorder and has been told he is terminal. There are no cancer cells in his bone marrow. He's getting transfused every five weeks, and his doctor indicates the shock from a transplant would kill him. Is there anything we can do?

clude fatigue, weakness, easy bruising, fever, pallor and weight loss. Chronic myelocytic leukemia is treated with anti-cancer drugs such as busulfan and cyclophosphamide. The prognosis is poor, and treatment is directed toward palliation (prolonging life).

**DEAR READER:** The myeloproliferative disorders are characterized by an overabundance of certain blood cells. In general, the disorders are classified into four categories: polycythemia vera, myelofibrosis, chronic myelocytic leukemia and primary thrombocythemia.

Polycythemia vera is a disease marked by too many red blood cells. This excess causes the blood to be too thick and viscous, causing weakness, easy bleeding, a ruddy complexion, headache, visual disturbances and a tendency to the formation of blood clots within the veins. Polycythemia is easily diagnosed by blood tests and can be readily treated with blood-letting or special drugs to reduce the formation of red blood cells.

Myelofibrosis results from scarring of the bone marrow, leading to anemia and the presence of extraordinarily young white blood cells in the bloodstream. It causes weakness, weight loss and malaise (feeling unwell). The bone marrow is unable to manufacture a sufficient quantity of blood cells, so transfusions and drugs to stimulate blood-cell production are necessary. The affliction is serious, and, because its cause is unknown, no specific therapy is available.

Chronic myelocytic leukemia is often a stage of myelofibrosis. Occurring primarily in adults, it is a malignant transformation of myelocytes, the cells that normally turn into mature infection-fighters (leukocytes) in the bloodstream. Symptoms in-

Answer to Previous Puzzle

Declarer played in poor luck in today's deal. He ducked the first two hearts, winning the third round with his ace. Then he decided to play for split spade honors. So he led the 10 of spades from his hand and let it go. East won the jack and returned a diamond. Perhaps declarer should have simply played low and taken his medicine, but he now placed the diamond king with West, and he certainly did not intend to settle for down one when West might also hold the spade king. So he crossed with his ace and played the queen of spades. East won the king and played back a diamond to West's king. West cashed his long heart, and declarer was two away. This deal presents a problem with no clear answers. It's possible after winning the third heart that declarer should

play a club to dummy's ace and a low diamond back to his queen. If that queen wins, declarer still does not have nine tricks, but with the king of diamonds in the East hand, he has a winning play that is close to certain. He can cash out the club suit ending in his hand and then play the 10 of spades, riding it to whatever East may hold. If East does hold the K-J of spades, he can win a trick but is then forced either to lead away from the diamond king or to come back a spade into declarer's strength. Declarer's actual play was fine. He would make his game whenever West held either one or both of the spade honors. That's a good percentage play. To describe this deal in medical terms, I might say the operation was successful, but the patient died.

# Cable's wife worried about fares


(EDITOR'S NOTE: Abby is on a two-week vacation. Following is a selection of some of her favorite past letters.)

# California's education loss may be felt by entire nation

One victim of California Gov. George Deukmejian's recent budget blue-lining was something called the California Assessment Program, an innovative approach to gauging student and school progress. Its loss may be felt more across the nation than in California.

The program serves as a national model because it involves a statewide switch from the old, multiple-choice models of testing student knowledge to assessment of their performance. California is the only large state that has aligned what is taught in schools with how students and schools are assessed; the idea is to have teaching and assessment reinforce each other. Other states are developing similar programs but California has led the way.

California's Department of Education, under Superintendent of Public Instruction Bill Honig, understands the relationship between what is taught and how it is assessed.

"One of the hallmarks of the effort to improve schools has been accountability," as Honig told the Los Angeles Times recently. The CAP tests, he said, "focus attention on where schools needed improvement. Without it, you're flying blind."

Educational assessment is too often regarded as a psychometric issue — a matter of numbers and statistics. But how we measure is how we teach. Test by multiple-choice and you get multiple-choice teaching; strings of facts memorized only until the test and unconnected to ideas.

CAP testing started to replace the old, standardized achievement tests in 1973. Michael Kirst, a Stanford professor of education and former president

of the California State Board of Education, said recently that the old tests "tended to produce a Lake Wobegon effect — all the children in every school district turned out to be above average."

Under CAP assessments, teaching is influenced in the direction of concepts, problem-solving, thinking — the goals of California's curriculum frameworks. The test-publishing industry has people so brainwashed that the public believes only so-called "objective tests" can give an accurate picture of student achievement. But CAP has proved them wrong.

CAP scores are arrived at by consensus. Experts perform the statistical manipulations that translate raw scores into scaled scores, weighted for the relative difficulty of each assignment and report the scores on the scale already established for other CAP tests. The program's methods are validated by some of the most reputable U.S. psychometricians, acting as consultants to the CAP director and staff.

The CAP writing assessment has changed the way writing is taught in California schools. Standard writing assignments used to be corrected for grammar, usage and spelling. Now California students are prepared for the eighth- and 10th-grade CAP writing assessment by practicing many different kinds of real-world writing: reports, evaluations, solutions to problems, speculation about causes

and effects, observations, interpretations and discussions of a controversial issue, among others.

The writing program is structured so that a student has an equal chance of being asked to write on any of 45 topics in these writing modes. It is that feature — the impossibility of predicting what kind of writing any student will be asked to produce — that gives the writing assessment its power in supporting the writing curriculum. From the teacher's point of view, the curriculum and the assessment both require the teaching of all the kinds of writing: Preparation for the assessment is also good teaching. The combination of curriculum and assessment has had greater impact on instruction statewide than any other program.

In an evaluation of the writing assessment, the Center for the Study of Writing found that 94 percent of California teachers assigned a greater variety of writing tasks than they did before the assessment, and 78 percent said that they assigned more writing. In one year alone, the percentage of students who wrote 11 or more papers in a six-week period jumped from 22 percent to 53 percent.

CAP began to work toward a similar effect in mathematics with the first open-ended mathematics questions in the 10th-grade assessment in 1980. These questions ask students not to remember an algorithm

## Mack leads defense PAC fund

### Rep. McCollum placed way down long listing

TALLAHASSEE — U.S. Sen. Connie Mack, a Republican with four years left in his freshman term, leads Florida's congressional delegation with \$163,500 in campaign gifts from defense industry political action committees.

U.S. Rep. Bill McCollum, R-Winter Park, who represents much of Seminole County, was placed 344th with \$8,300.

Mack ranked 13th among his 100 Senate colleagues in contributions from defense industry PACs, including those of the top defense contractors, their parent firms and subsidiaries or corporate siblings.

U.S. Sen. Bob Graham, a Democrat who faces re-election in two years, has collected \$68,100 from defense PACs. He ranked 46th in the Senate for such contributions.

Two Florida delegates to the U.S. House of Representatives ranked among the top 30 beneficiaries of contributions from military contractors and related firms to congressmen or congressional candidates.

They were U.S. Rep. Bill Young, a Republican from Treasure Island, who ranked 15th with \$69,450; and U.S. Rep. Sam Gibbons, a Tampa Democrat whose \$74,464 ranked him 30th.

The figures represent contributions to U.S. Senate and U.S. House campaigns by PACs sponsored by the 100 largest Department of Defense prime contractors in the last fiscal year, 1980.

Figures cover all gifts to candidates during and since their last elections.

U.S. Rep. Andy Ireland, a Republican from

Winter Haven, ranked 56th with \$66,800. U.S. Rep. Earl Hutto, a Panama City Democrat, drew \$65,945 in defense industry gifts, to rank 60th.

U.S. Rep. Dante Fascell, a Democrat from Miami, ranked 122nd with \$47,600 in defense PAC contributions. Next came U.S. Rep. Bill LeMay, a North Miami Beach Democrat, at 157th place with \$30,900.

U.S. Rep. Harry Johnston, a Democrat from West Palm Beach, was in 182nd place with \$26,950. He was followed in 197th place by U.S. Rep. Clay Shaw, a Fort Lauderdale Republican, with \$24,950. U.S. Rep. Ileana Ros-Lehtinen, a Republican from Miami in her first re-election bid, was ranked 195th with \$24,150.

U.S. Rep. Mike Bilirakis, Republican from Palm Harbor, got \$23,750 to rank number 208. U.S. Rep. Bill Grant of Madison, who switched to the GOP since his last re-election campaign, was ranked 209th with \$23,574.

U.S. Rep. Porter Goss, Republican from Sanford, was ranked 244th with \$18,800. He was followed by U.S. Rep. Tom Lewis, a Republican from North Palm Beach, with \$18,681, ranking 248th.

Ranked 263rd was U.S. Rep. Charlie Bennett, a Democrat from Jacksonville, with \$18,150. In 273rd place came U.S. Rep. Larry Smith, a Democrat from Hollywood, with \$16,150.

U.S. Rep. Cliff Stearns, an Ocala Republican, was in 307th place with \$13,350.

U.S. Rep. Craig James, Republican from Deland, placed 380th with \$8,400.

Among the candidates in the District 11 seat being vacated by U.S. Rep. Bill Nelson of Melbourne, Republican William Tolby attracted \$7,300 in defense industry PACs, for a ranking of 371. Democrat Jim Bacchus drew \$4,000, for a ranking of 410th.

## Site of Malcolm X's slaying to be saved

NEW YORK — The site of Malcolm X's assassination will be preserved as a museum and memorial to the black leader under a deal reached Wednesday allowing Columbia University to build a biotechnology center in half of the historic building.

Columbia originally had wanted to tear down the entire Auden Ballroom in Washington Heights, where Malcolm X was slain 25 years ago.

But it was forced to compromise because of pressure from the community, with a citywide coalition of black activists charging the university's plan would be a desecration of his memory.

After weeks of debate, city officials on the Board of Estimate finally reached agreement on the \$37.5 million project in a lengthy session that ended at 1:15 a.m.

The deal calls for preserving details of the ballroom's decorative terra cotta facade and some 50 percent of its interior, including the entire stage where Malcolm X was assassinated, to provide space for a memorial and museum and a community health center.

The rest of the building will house Columbia's biomedical research center, which is required to make a special effort to train and employ minorities.

The project will be paid for through a combination of funds from Columbia, the state and the city.

Mayor David Dinkins had found himself at odds with many black community groups because he sided with Columbia, which argued it would prove too costly to save the ballroom.

Dinkins said the center, which always was to contain some form of memorial, would generate jobs and boost the development of the economically depressed neighborhood.
