For some time past the line has been losing money and the railroad commission has granted permission for its abandonment. Better rail facilities and good roads are responsible. Not Such A Vital Issue, After All

Although the Republicans and Democrats have written almost identical law enforcement planks into their platforms, there is little doubt but that prohibition will be the chief issue in the approaching national election. Any effort to sidetrack the question would only serve to magnify its importance, but such a possibility seems remote in view of the recent pronouncements of the Democratic standard bearer.

It's not our purpose here to discuss the merits or demerits of prohibition. All we are concerned with is the fact that the question is paramount at this time and will be paramount from now until November. The situation, however, affords an interesting comparison in a study of the most important issues of previous national elections. The Kansas City Star calls attention to the question and notes that "paramount" issues of national elections have faded with the passing years.

Thirty-two years ago when William Jennings Bryan was nominated for the first time, the big issue before the people was the free coinage of silver at the ratio of sixteen to one. Yet within the brief period of four years the issue had been changed. The free silver plank was rewritten into the Democratic platform but its importance was minimized while a new and paramount issue was made on the question of "imperialism." The Star recalls that if the campaign it was declared by the Democrats that if the United States continued in the Philippines, American Democratic government was doomed.

With all its importance at that time, the "imperialism" issue was forgotten in succeeding years and other questions took its place. The most interesting issue of recent campaigns was that of 1920 when the League of Nations, sponsored by Woodrow Wilson, was paraded before the country. The Republicans opposed the League, substituting therefor a promise of national co-operation outside the League. In another four years the World Court had shoved the League into the background and today we hear nothing more of it.

It seems then that every campaign has its issue, which is of little consequence after the campaign is over. The Great Commoner, who knew as much about national politics as any living man, used to say, "Every campaign must have an issue. If none exists, one must be created." The present presidential campaign apparently contains a very potent issue, but since the Democratic nominee is sworn to law enforcement and has no legislative power, we doubt very seriously if many Democrats of 1932 will remember what the 1928 issue was about.

Just Another Opportunity

We have heard it noised about for several days that Dr. John Harvey Kellogg, head of the Battle Creek Sanitarium, has been thinking about locating a branch of his Michigan institution in this city. But it also seems he is likewise thinking about locating it in a number of other Florida cities. To all who ask him to give their town a try, he simply says, "Make me a proposition."

This is something which we believe the Chamber of Commerce should get behind and get behind strong. The location of a sanitarium, of this character in our city would mean more to its future than almost anything else that could happen. It is something in the nature of a "new industry" which would adequately supplement our celery industry.

Anyone who doubts the immense value of such an institution to the community in which it is located, should write the Battle Creek Chamber of Commerce for its opinion as to the effect of the Battle Creek Sanitarium on Battle Creek prosperity. We believe that they will find that the enormous payrolls and the enormous disbursements for all sorts of health producing baths and equipment—the funds for which come almost entirely from outside capital—mean more to the city than any other industry in that thriving city.

But Dr. Kellogg will not bring his sanitarium here unless sufficient inducements are offered. Other Florida cities are already "making him propositions." They are making him real propositions, and they are not trying to catch him napping and then hook him, because they know that what may be lost in the immediate bargain will be more than made up by local expenditures in the future.

One proposition which we happen to know has been made him consists of a large hospital, already in use, model 1925, with some sixty rooms for private patients in addition to commodious wards, with forty rooms for private consultation, surgery cases, radium and x-ray treatments. This hospital is located on its own little private island, but within easy reach of an Atlantic beach where three hundred feet of ocean front property has also been offered Dr. Kellogg if he will bring his doctors and nurses there.

Similar propositions have been offered elsewhere. What has Sanford done? Dr. Kellogg is expected to make up his mind within thirty days.

Up to the time of going to press, we have heard no kick against our present jury system by George Remus of Cincinnati.

The Democratic party in its platform adopted at Houston declares that it "has always stood against special privilege and for common equality under the law."

With that declaration as a part of its plank on farm relief the party has incorporated in the platform a comprehensive discussion of the whole problem and presents to the farmers of the country a constructive program. The declaration should appeal not alone to farmers but to all thinking people, because the party has put far-sighted principles into practice. It was the author of the federal reserve system which brought order to the business world. It instituted the federal farm loan system. It passed measures which established the independence of labor. All these are worthy past deeds of the administration of Woodrow Wilson.

The Democratic party recognizes, "The problems of production differ as between agriculture and industry. Industrial production is largely under the human control while agricultural production, because of lack of co-ordination among the 6,500,000 individual farm units, and because of the influence of weather, pests and other causes, is largely beyond human control. The result is that a large crop frequently is produced on small acreage and a small crop on large acreage. Although this ancient statement of fundamental understanding goes to the crux of the question, the platform proceeds to say that "there is need of supplemental legislation for the control and orderly handling of agricultural surpluses in order that the price of the surplus may not determine the price of the whole crop." Inasmuch as labor has profited from collective bargaining, industry has benefited from tariffs and business generally from the reserve bank law, special attention must be given to the problems of the farmer.

The aviators and help them on their way, said a later dispatch from Natal. Immediately after word was flashed from Tours that the Italian seaplane was down there a caravan of motor cars set out for that place from Natal.

Following the long hours of suspense there was much rejoicing here over the news that the daring aviators had at last been found.

After hopping off at Genipabu Beach, 10 miles north of Natal last night the aviators did not fly at once in the direction of Rio. In fact, there was some doubt as to their intentions. The Italians said they were going to look for a better landing field and turned northward.

Governor Lamartine, who was attempting to keep in touch with the course of the flight, sent word to Rio at 3:50 A. M. (Brazilian Time) that he had not received any word from the Italian plane since it hopped off at Genipabu Beach.

The radio station on Cape North, which had been trying to get word from the aviators, reported that it had been unable to get any reply.

Meanwhile word had been received that the storm on the north-eastern coast had increased in violence.

At six o'clock this morning the Brazilian seaplane "Lactecore" hopped off at Natal to fly up and down the coast in search of the Italian machine.

A Brazilian sea-going tub, with the commander of the Natal port aboard, set out to comb the beaches.
