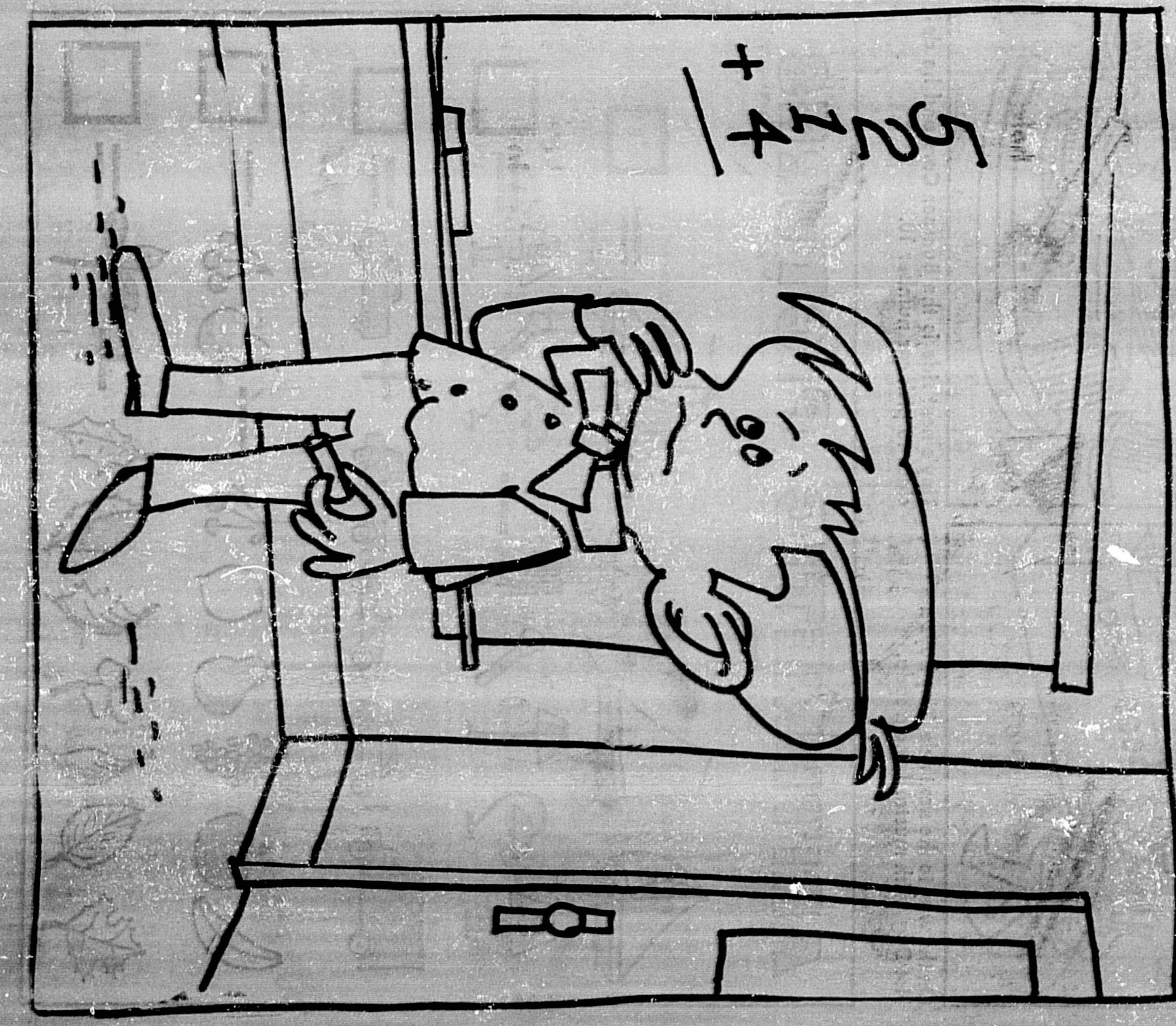

An investigation into a reported child molestation at Lake Mary is underway, according to records at the sheriff's office.

## Rejects Transfer Hearing Set For Teacher

School Board will hear neglect of duty charges brought against a Matland school teacher by School Supt. John Angel at Tuesday's 7 p.m. board meeting.  
Katherine B. Pipkins, a former Lyman High English teacher who went to U.S. District Court to fight transfer to Crooms High School, is expected to be represented at the public hearing by her husband, Roger Pipkins, an Orlando attorney.  
The teacher is being an estimated \$33 a day for each day she fails to report for her new assignment. Angel suspended the woman after she failed to report to the desegregated all-ninth grade facility when or if U.S. District Court Judge George C. Young ruled in a Sept. 10 decision that the teacher must accept the reassignment, even if it is against her desire.  
Judge Young said in his decision, the School Board had not violated Mrs. Pipkins' civil rights in attempting to force her to accept the transfer to a school 29 miles farther than her former Lyman position.  
The teacher sought the court's help in preventing her employment termination, transfer to Crooms and loss of property. Judge Young dismissed the woman's court injunction without hearing the School Board's case, which would have been presented by Douglas Stinson, board attorney.  
The result of Tuesday's hearing could decide when or if Mrs. Pipkins will be allowed to teach in Seminole County schools.

## Ohioan Treks To Capital In Campaign For Jesus

It is the time of the year when many are out campaigning for the candidate of their choice. A campaigner is now making his way through north Florida and toward Washington, D.C. Candidate in the big next election of them all — Jesus.  
Gary Painter, a 25-year-old resident of Columbus, Ohio, is campaigning for God said to do it was the Lord. Who led me to choose drugs in particular.

In Sanford, Painter walked the streets, meeting young people and talking to them about drugs. Painter, who hopes to be officially ordained as a minister when he returns to his hometown in Ohio, wears his hair longer than usual with slight sideburns, so as to be able to talk with the teenagers casually. He wears a cross around his neck.  
Friday night, Painter attended a high school football game in Sanford, where he continued to witness to throngs of young people, taking their minds away from the games.

## United Fund Drive Begins Tuesday

Tuesday will mark the official start of this year's Seminole County United Fund Campaign. Again your neighbors will be asking you to fork over some money — or better yet, to pledge to give a certain amount a regular intervals during the year.  
The standard of giving is one hour's pay per month. And to make this giving easier for you, you will most likely be approached at your place of employment.  
The goal is \$60,000, mostly small for the amount of good that money is expected to do. But where does the money you give go? And how much overall will they get? Incidentally, it is possible to earmark your donation to a specific agency, if you desire.  
Here are the organizations, their goals, and the amount they receive at the completion of a successful drive:  
— Boy Scouts of America: \$8,500, to train boys in citizenship and their families' development and physical fitness.  
— Central Florida Sheltered Workshop: \$1,000, to serve men- tally, physically and emotionally handicapped children, and to evaluate potential, adjustment, pre-vocational training and work opportunities under sheltered conditions for age 16 over.  
— Girl Scouts of America: \$5,000, an informal educational high ideals of character, conduct, patriotism, and service. More than 1,000 Seminole County girls participate.  
— Children's Home Society of Florida: \$1,000, to provide proper names for infants and children through the state's oldest, largest, adoption agency. Affords new outlooks and confidence in the future for unwed mothers through counseling.  
— Good Samaritan Home: \$3,000, home for the aged in Sanford where those who are sick and aged, and those in distress may find love and shelter.  
— Red Cross: \$9,250; Disaster relief, first aid, life saving, water safety training. Sponsors Gray Ladies, reporting and financial assistance to servicemen and their families.  
— Salvation Army: \$15,000; provides physical, material, social, spiritual needs of local families, transients, unwed mothers, delinquent children and others who need assistance. Distributes food and toys at Christmas time.  
— Seminole County Nursing Home: \$900; gives professional nursing and physiotherapy service to the sick in their homes.  
— Seminole County Mental Health Association: \$2,000; brings national drive concerning mental illness into action in Seminole County. Conducts educational program on prevention and treatment of mental disorders.  
— USGI: \$300; services the religious, social and recreational needs of men and women in the Armed Forces with no financial aid from the Government — over 500 serving from Seminole County.  
Note that all of the agencies meet the standards of the United Fund agencies; that is, non profit, performs necessary program of health, character building or family services; and agrees to one campaign for all; issues an annual audited financial report and is willing to have their needs weighed against the needs of others.

Once a year, for one month, the collective conscience of Seminole County is given a chance to stand-up-and-account!

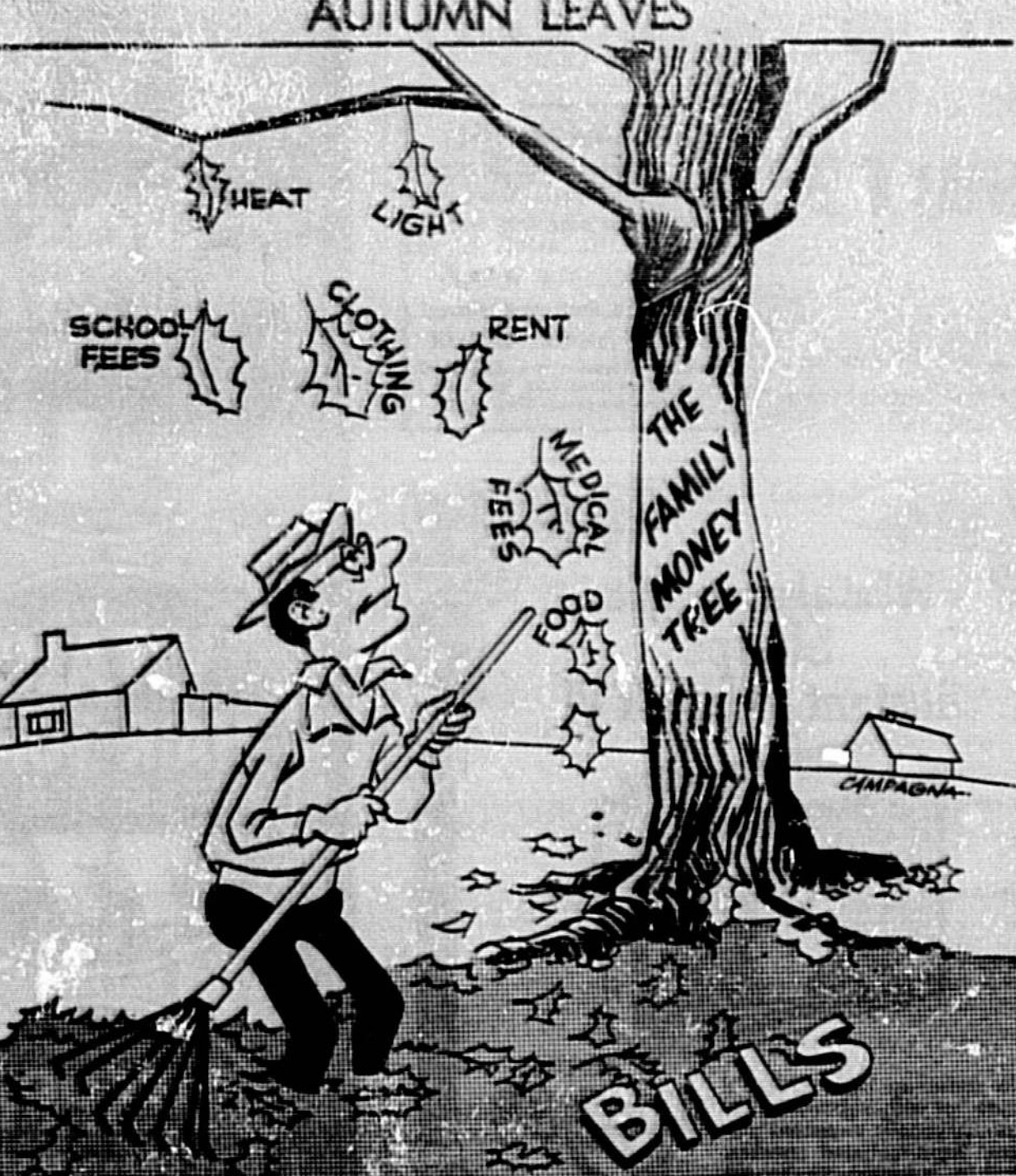

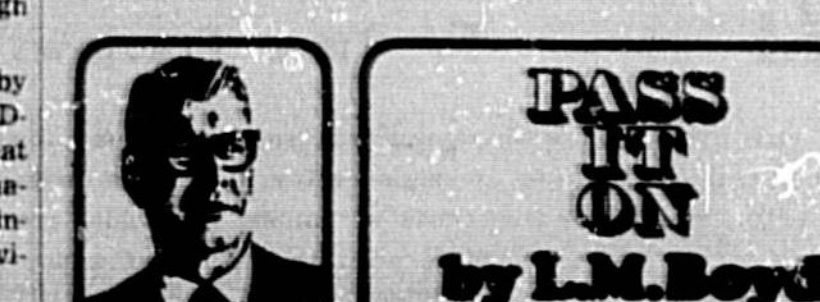

## Anti-Crime Bill OK Seen

WASHINGTON (AP) — Under heavy pressure from the administration and the House Republican leadership a Judiciary subcommittee moved today toward expected approval of a tough anti-crime bill.



The bill, moved along by Chairman Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., to head off a GOP threat to force action, is aimed primarily at organized crime and includes stiff anti-bombing provisions.

With law and order a major campaign issue this year, members of both parties are anxious to get on record against crime. The GOP-sponsored discharge threat was first made Thursday, causing Celler to go along with the bill favored by the Republicans and many Democrats and abandon his effort to make scientific changes.

The result is a bill closely paralleling the version passed 78 to 1 last January by the Senate. A major difference is the addition of a new section aimed at the use of explosives in terror bombings.

The bill requires manufacturers, dealers and importers of explosives to be licensed by the federal government. It also bars sales to persons under 21, helium, drug addicts, and anyone who is a resident of the state in which the purchase is made, or a contiguous state.

Although a final decision on penalties has not been made, tentative approval has been given to the death penalty for anyone convicted of a bombing in which a death occurs.

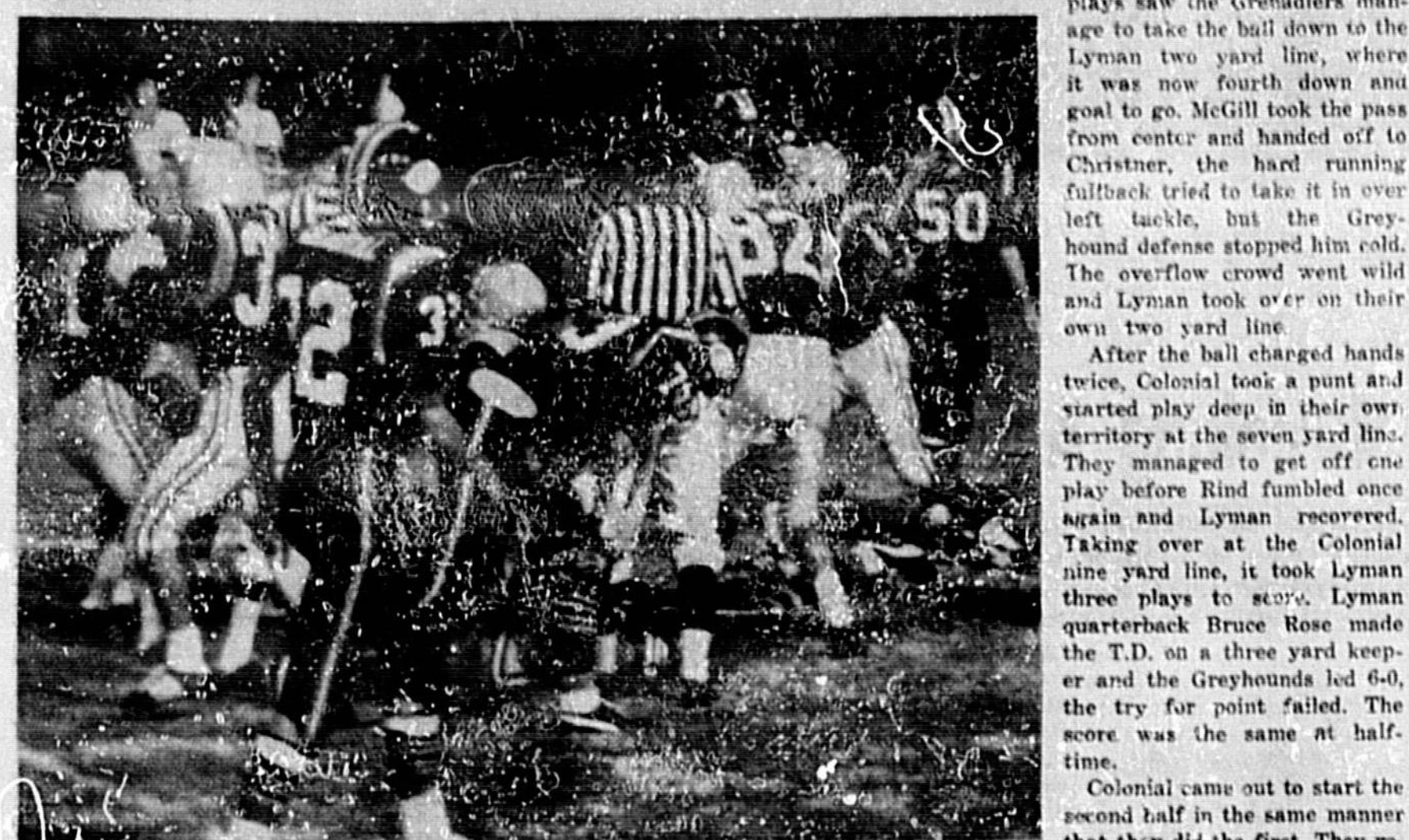

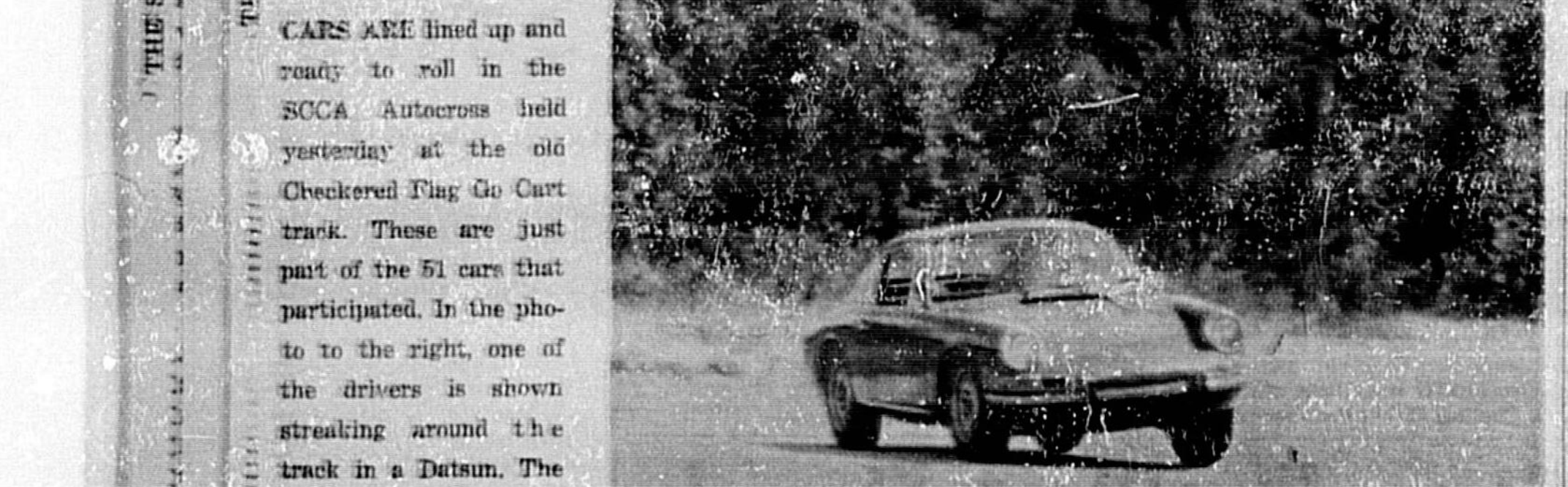

# Here's A Fast And Easy Way To Make A Large Bundle Of Money

By JOHN VAN GILSON

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—There's a fast and easy way to make a large bundle of money. The only catch is that you've got to wait a few years.

Next time there is a state election announce to the world that you are a candidate. Fly to Tallahassee and pay your qualification fee—\$1,000 for governor, \$200 for other offices, and pay for the legalities.

Scrutinize conditions but don't spend any money. Make sure you've got your financial records on time.

Take your couple of thousand votes on Election Day. Concede defeat to your defeated opponent. Buckle your contributions and go home.

Say you've won. You're asked to contribute \$5,000 to your gubernatorial campaign. You've made \$10,000 profit minus the \$1,000 you invested in your qualification.

Transfered? Of course. But perfectly legal.

And it will probably take a noncontingent like the age of a line here before anybody does anything about it.

"My personal feeling is there are no private contributions," said House elections committee chairman Bill Andrews, D-Gainesville. "I don't think they should be allowed to the state."

"We did consider it in the last session," Andrews recalled, and at that time it was the feeling of the majority of the committee that there should be a change should be made.

He said the question is not just whether or not candidates can keep surplus contributions after an election.

"This issue is not that simple," Andrews said. "If the candidate can't keep it, what do you do with it?"

Anyway, he said, a candidate is not going to get contributions unless he can prove to the voters he gives them as seriously running for office.

"I don't get contributions just because I become a candidate," Andrews said. "I have to work hard for them. A lot of times candidates can't get money even when they demonstrate they're serious."

Financial reports filed by the 16 defeated candidates in the Sept. 6 primary show all had surpluses as of the election week—but only two have submitted final reports.

A number of the candidates actually will have deficits when they submit the final reports required within 45 days after the election.

Stan Tall, laser in the Democratic Secretary of State primary, showed a surplus of \$1,060.01, but he said he will have a deficit of \$5,000 to \$7,000 in his final report.

"There were expenditures that will still be coming in for a while, telephone bills, salaries, travel," he said.

An advocate of election reform in his campaign, Tall said he was sure that candidates should do with their campaign surpluses.

"In the past people like (former Sen. George) Donnelly," he returned the money on a "pro-ata basis," he said. "Several candidates have pocketed it. I know (Gov. Harris) Bryant did in 1960, of course Bryant spent a good deal of his own money in the preceding one, two, three years."

One of the two defeated candidates who has submitted final reports did pocket the skinny surplus from his public Service Commission race. Al A. Lister closed his campaign account by writing a \$75 check to himself.

Defeated Republican candidate for state Treasurer-Insurance Commissioner Tom Johnson closed this books with a \$11,114.41 surplus. He did not

discuss what happened to the money.

The largest apparent surplus—both expected to be greatly reduced, according to the candidate, in subsequent reports—was G. Harold Carswell's, \$35,765 and Howard Williams' \$5,147, both defeated.

Williams and Carswell said the surplus will be whittled to nothing—even to deficits when financial reports come in.

Carswell said if there is any surplus he will donate it to charity.

John Matthews, 59, and L. A. "Skip" Barlow, 54, were defeated for the personally. Other notable surpluses, listed by county, were:

Governor—Chuck Hall, \$6,339; Schler, \$7,294; and George Secretary of State—J. L. \$183.

Wide Area—McMahon, \$2,061. Attorney General—William Matthews, \$58.

## Blackburn Draws 8 Years In Jail

Longtime central Florida gambling figure Harlan Blackburn drew a total of eight years in prison and \$5,000 in fines Monday for using interstate telephone facilities in gambling operations.

Federal Judge George C. Young handed down the sentences on two counts of interstate gambling. Blackburn was convicted by a federal jury in Jacksonville last month.

Blackburn's attorney filed notice of appeal and Blackburn remained free on bond.

In Seminole County Circuit Court James B. Cain presided as charged to buying and receiving stolen property.

Cain, 40, of 221 S.W. 2nd Avenue, Sanford, was arrested at the Coachman Motel on Feb. 27 when a large cache of guns was confiscated by law enforcement officials. Cain was charged with the Coachman. The charge of plea from not guilty to guilty as charged came after the state rested its case.

In direct testimony, Assistant State Attorney Fred Leone elicited the statement from Special Agent Frank Troy, of the Florida Bureau of Enforcement, that, acting as an undercover agent, he met with Cain on Feb. 25 and the purchase of the guns was discussed. At a later date a sale price of \$2,000 was agreed upon.

The guns were cached in a closet in room 24 of the motel.

Earlier a motion to quash by defense attorney Roger Berry was denied by Circuit Judge Roger Dymen, who has ordered a pre-sentence investigation for possible probation or prison sentence.

## Port Firm Will Hire Local Aides \$5 Million Yearly Steel Sales Seen

Port Development Steel Company (PESCO) will open an office and warehouse facility at the Port of Sanford, it was announced by George Harter, Seminole County Port Authority (SCOPA) vice chairman, at a directors meeting last night.

The steel firm, first port occupant, anticipates \$5 million in sales for steel in the Central Florida market during the first year of operation here, according to Allen Gordon, PESCO president.

Gordon, quoted at Port Lauderdale, stated that "All but two or three key executives" at the \$500,000 complex "would be hired locally."

Steel for use in construction and light manufacturing will be brought by barge from European and other overseas mills, with the first shipments to Sanford starting in about 60 days.

Distribution from Sanford will be by truck, rail, barge or whatever means is best, according to the individual needs of a client.

Part of Sanford is PESCO's first inland location. It has two other Florida facilities at Port Lauderdale and Tampa, both sea ports.

James Ryan, administrator, disclosed during last night's meeting that Gulfstream Shipping Corporation, a terminal and dock-working firm, expects to contact the authority next week to negotiate for stevedores (loading and unloading barge) rights at the port.

Ryan stated the barge facility is 88 per cent completed with only the access road and parking lots to be finished.

Revealing that because of the penalty clause, the port contractor, Weiss and Company, had accumulated in excess of \$20,000 in liquidated damage claims due to the delay in not having the facility completed in time, Ryan asked three directors consider occupancy of the facility within the next two or three weeks to stop the penalties.

On a motion by Henry Schuchman, member, the authority voted to accept after parking is completed and with the approval of U.S. Economic Development Authority (EDA) and port engineers.



### Port Authority Approves Move To Paulucci Bldg.

Seminole County Port Authority (SCOPA) at last night's meeting moved to vacate the present port offices at the Roumlat Building in favor of a suite in the Paulucci Building.

The move, which is expected within the next two months, will mean an increase in rental costs to \$200 monthly from the present \$125 now paid for three weeks ago on Lake Monroe, was below the bridge near the Florida Power and Light Company plant.

Ernest W. Wright, authority member moved to direct James Ryan, port administrator, to negotiate a lease to the new office.

No reason for the move was discussed at last night's meeting.

### Another Candidate

The second candidate filing for Sanford City Commission seat in the December election is Dennis H. Brumathan, 409 Laurel Drive, a resident of this city for the past nine years.

Brumathan is presently an employe at the Naval Training Center in Orlando.

Earlier, Earl Higginbotham had filed for this seat. According to Henry Tamm, city finance officer and clerk, reminded that the deadline for filing is Nov. 18.

## New Osteen Bridge Gains Support

The Matland-South Seminole Chamber of Commerce has thrown its support behind the county-wide effort to replace the ancient Osteen Bridge on State Road 415 over the St. Johns River.

G. Fritz Gale, Chamber president, has received assurances of action from Gov. Claude Kirk, Edward A. Mueller, secretary of the State Department of Transportation, and C. A. Benedict, district engineer at Deland.

The Chamber forwarded a resolution citing the antiquated nature of the bridge, the gaps and requesting construction of a new high level bridge and access. The resolution also requested the project be included in the 1971-72 budget.

Mueller's response to Gale reads, in part:

"We are now in the planning stage for the project, to establish design criteria for the proposed new structure. Preparation of plans for the roadway approaches is underway. (Continued on Page 2 Col. 2)

## Road Improvements To Cost \$600,000

Bids for road improvements estimated to cost nearly \$600,000 will be opened within a week by the State Department of Transportation in Tallahassee. It was reported at noon today by C. A. (Bill) Benedict, district engineer at Deland.

His report confirmed a statement by Robert Parker at the County Commission meeting this morning that bids were to be opened for improvements to East SR 46 and SR 426 between Geneva and Oviedo.

Parker said he was informed of the bid opening while attending meetings in Deland relative to drainage problems at Prairie Lake.

Benedict said that \$297,000 has been budgeted for widening and resurfacing 6.6 miles of SR 426, extending between Geneva and Oviedo. He said further that \$300,000 has been budgeted for resurfacing SR 46 east from Mellonville Avenue in Sanford for 14.5 miles east to Lake Harney bridge.

Drummond also requested a study of the northeast corner of Lake Howell Road and SR 426, which he said is a blind corner necessitating cars having to pull out on to SR 426 in order to see oncoming traffic.

Commissioner Sidney Viblen Jr. told the board that he had been approached by residents of Grapeville Avenue relative to the reducing the speed limit from the present 40 mph to 25 mph. He said two children had been killed on this road in which many school children travel.

Chairman John Alexander reported that the matter had been reviewed by the board five or six months ago and the report did not reflect any basis for reducing the speed limit.

Viblen also questioned action taken on a requested center line survey on SR 35A from SR 46 to Highway 17-92. He said that this is the "poorest surveyed road in the county and badly in need of emergency maintenance." Each was requested to give a status report on the center line survey.
