

Dogma Vs. Truth

Government studies have been made at just about every phase of American life and culture. No one will ever know how much these studies have cest taxpayers. But, one thing about them is obvious. The country seldom profits from the vast store of factual information they contain. As an illustration, there has been a running debate for years concerning promotion and advertising. The more virulent consumer protectors consider these facets of the marketplace a needless burden on the consumer's pocketbook. With respect to trading stamps, for instance, they are guided more by anticapitalistic dogma than by fact. There is no recognition of the virtues of high-volume, mass-retail distribution which depends for its existence upon promotion and advertising in a competitive free market.

In this area, as in many others, the facts are easily available—in government studies that show the cost-benefit ratio to consumer in the matter of trading stamps. The United States Department of Agriculture, some years ago, after a three-year study, concluded that, ... average prices paid by consumers in stamp stores increased by six tenths of one per cent more than non-stamp stores - a difference equal to about 30 per cent of the average merchandise value of stamps." The Department further noted that the merchandise value of redecmed stamps was several times greater than the fractional price differential it found between stamp and non-stamp stores.

In spite of these easily available facts, the debate over promotion and advertising continues. It appears that those who persist in their attacks on these features of the free market are more concerned with ideology and with changing to fit their own theories the well tried and proven practices of the marketplace than with the protection of consumers.
