### Yankees Still Are A Big Menace In Spite Of Losses

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—They're still the Yankees, still the team to beat, even though the military services have claimed a handful of their stars.

Three-fourths of the New York infield, two outfielders and the club's most experienced pitcher are gone, all but one of them wearing the garb of Uncle Sam. Some clubs haven't lost so many key players and there's been a bit of popping off about the American league pennant going to the Indians or the Browns this year. But the Yankees will remind you they were country mile ahead of the field at the 1942 finish, and so can slip quite a bit and still be right up in the thick of the flag race.

Phil (Scooter) Rizzuto, shortstop; Buddy Hassett, first base, and Robert (Red) Rolfe, third base, won't be around. Scooter and Buddy are in the service and Rolfe is basketball and baseball coach at Yale, his playing days behind him.

Gone, too, are Tommy Henrich and George (Twinkletoes) Selkirk from the outfield and big Rufus the Red Ruffing, for long years the champion of the chunking corps. Henrich was the first to go, late last season, while Ruffing entered the service a few weeks ago.

But as long as those three guys named Joe—DIMAGGIO, GORDON and MCCARTHY—are around, the Yankees will be tough. And this trio will be on deck, although there has been some talk that DIMAGGIO might enter service.

The infield will be built around the veterans, Joe Gordon at second and Frankie Crosetti at third base, capable of steadying the newcomers. Three-fourths of the Newark infield—George Stinweis, 2b; Bill Johnson, ss, and Henry Majecki, 3b—are on hand and the Yankees shortstop will be selected from this trio. Chances are, too, that one of them may wind up at third in place of the aging Crosetti, who will be out for 12 of the most arduous months he has passed an umpire in the last World Series. The veteran Bill Knickerbocker, obtained from the A's, will be on deck, too.

Stinweis, a long hitter, batted .268 but made his chief reputation as a base stealer when he swiped 23 to set a new loop record. Johnson hit .291, while Majecki led the International league with .345 and was voted the most valuable player.

First base apparently will be handled by Nick Etten, who came from the Phils in a trade for Ed Levy and Allen Gettel. However, trials at the initial sack may be given Gerald Priddy, Oscar Gimes, from Cleveland, and pitcher John Lindner.

With the acquisition of Roy Weatherly from Cleveland, the Yankees should have the fastest outfield in the majors. DIMAGGIO and Charles Keller round out the picket line with Tuck Stainback, Russ Derry and Bud Metheny from Newark also available. The word is that Keller is a corner.

Ruffing is the only pitcher around at World Series time who won't be back. There'll be Lefty Gomez, Alvin Karpis, John Linnell, Spud Chandler, Hank Borowy, Ernie Bonham, Marius Russo, Marvin Breuser, Johnny Murphy and Turner. Of these Russo should be of much more value than a year ago when he was sidelined with an arm injury.

Two of the best pitching prospects from the minors are Tom

Byrne, the Newark lefty who led his league with 17 wins and four losses, and batted .325 in 64 games, and Charles Wenzloff, a right-hander with a 21-10 record at Kansas City, only American association twirler to win 20 games.

Five recalled players also fit into the pitching puzzle—catchers Ed Kears from Seattle, Ken Sears from Kansas City and Aaron Robinson from Newark, and right-handed pitchers Mike Mize from Newark and Rinaldo Ardisola from Kansas City.

Robinson probably will be kept to spell the veteran Bill Dickey and Rolfe Henzley, and replace Buddy Rosar who, with outfielder Roy Cullenbine, was sent to Cleveland in exchange for Weatherly and Grimes.

Overall, the pitching appears about as good as last year, the power is available, and the Yankees would look a long time before they lapsed better looking recruits. Maybe the Yankees won't win but they're still the team to beat.

## German Forces In Russia Are Facing Black Sea Dunkirk

### Sea-Borne Attempts Of Transports To Escape From Crimean Peninsula Fail

Axis troops by tens of thousands were apparently on the verge of a "Black Sea Dunkirk" today and some reports declared Russian warplanes and ships were already smashing at German transports as the invaders attempted a sea-borne escape from the Caucasus to the Crimean Peninsula.

Latest Soviet dispatches said reports of 500,000 Axis troops were on the verge of being gulf apart by a Russian column driving toward the Sea of Azov. Red armies were reported only 80 miles from Rostov, whose fall would cut off the land escape corridor.

Other Soviet troops were reportedly to have captured Zolotuhino, 22 miles north of Krasnodar, putting the Russians back on the line where Hitler launched the German offensive which ended in the Stalingrad catastrophe.

An earlier triumphant special communication reported the capture of the main Caucasian railway station at Krasnodar, in smashing victories on a 400-mile southern front.

A more potent threat to Rostov was reported in the Wednesday edition of the Communist Central Press. ## 57 Persons From Here Employed By Babcock Factory

### Workers Were Trained At A Local Defense Production School

Bringing back to Sanford a payroll estimated at over \$1,000 a week, 57 employees of the Babcock Airplane Company of the Land, commute daily to and from work here according to Alex B. Johnson, director of the Sanford School for War Production Workers. All these employees, he added, received their training in aircraft woodworking at the school.

The daytime class is conducted from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. by Carl Moss, former mechanic of the Florida Power and Light Company, and a cabinet maker.

The night class from 4:00 P.M. to midnight is conducted by A. W. Tracy, former furniture manufacturer. The furniture business in New England was demolished by the hurricane of 1937, Mr. Tracy stated.

Prior to taking up teaching here, he stated that he had been manufacturing wooden canals for use of men at the Orlando Air Station, to be used to prevent athlete foot infection when taking showers.

That women, and especially the older women are taking up aircraft woodworking, is evident in Mr. Tracy's night class where two grandmothers study. Mrs. Joy Bailey, who after 18 years of service, gave up her work at the Seminole High School cafeteria for this purpose, and Mrs. Maybelle Brooks.

## Income Tax Returns Can Be Figured In Six Easy Steps

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4. (Special)—The Federal Treasury is offering again this year to people whose 1942 income was \$3,000 or less, a simplified income tax form which may be filled out in five minutes or less. This is known as Form 1040-A. It may be used by any taxpayer whose \$3,000 or less income came wholly from wages or salary, dividends, interest or annuities.

Last year when this time-saver was first introduced, over 10,000,000 individual income tax returns were filed on it. Treasury officials revealed today. People who had previously spent hours working over the regular report-form were enthusiastic about the ease and speed with which they could now complete their annual income return.

This year, with an estimated 12,000,000 new taxpayers filing for the first time, the Bureau of Internal Revenue confidently expects that nearly 20,000,000 taxpayers will benefit from the short-cut way, saving in the aggregate millions of hours of time and numbing headaches.

The simplified Form 1040-A is also said to be a boon to the Internal Revenue Bureau, for it greatly reduces the amount of time previously spent with so many millions of taxpayers in answering questions and helping them make out their returns.

A glance at the picture above shows how quick and simple Form 1040-A makes this income tax filing job. There are only six things for Mr. and Mrs. Taxpayer to do: write down their names, address and occupation, the names (Continued On Page Two)

## Heavy Blows To Axis In Mediterranean Pave Way For New African Offensive

While giant R.A.F. bombers, perhaps 300 strong, blasted Hamburg overnight and British listed 16 planes missing in the Mediterranean, the Allies took a toll of at least 14 Axis ships. British submarines accounted for nine supply vessels and an anti-submarine ship and Allied warplanes sunk four others off the coast of Tunisia.

With these blows paving the way for a heavy land assault in North Africa, the German Italian defense line was tested once for weak spots. The British captured a hill in the bitterly contested Point Du Fahs sector 45 miles below Tunis, and the American force which captured Sened was reported today to have taken an Italian general prisoner.

The British eighth army appeared to be massing for the next attack in the correlated square. Allied bombers attacked Sicily, the Port of Gales and other enemy positions last night.

In the Southwest Pacific the star powerful United States and sparring for position, naval officials said last night, and there are indications that the war's biggest naval struggle may be imminent.

The reported operations are underway, through the area, between ships and ships, planes and planes, ships and planes, and on the basis of reports received at the Navy Department today there has been no concentration of the fighting at any one spot in the Solomons area.

It is not a pitched battle but there are widespread attacks on both sides," said one spokesman. He added that he would describe as a major action a conflict of Guadalcanal, upon which they started many months ago to build an airfield only to lose it to invading American forces.

In ground battling on Guadalcanal, the Navy reported Wednesday, American troops continued to advance to the west. They have reached and crossed the Hungei River, half a mile east of Tassafaronga, which is ten miles away from Henderson Airfield. In that advance stiff enemy resistance was overcome and 90 Japanese were killed.

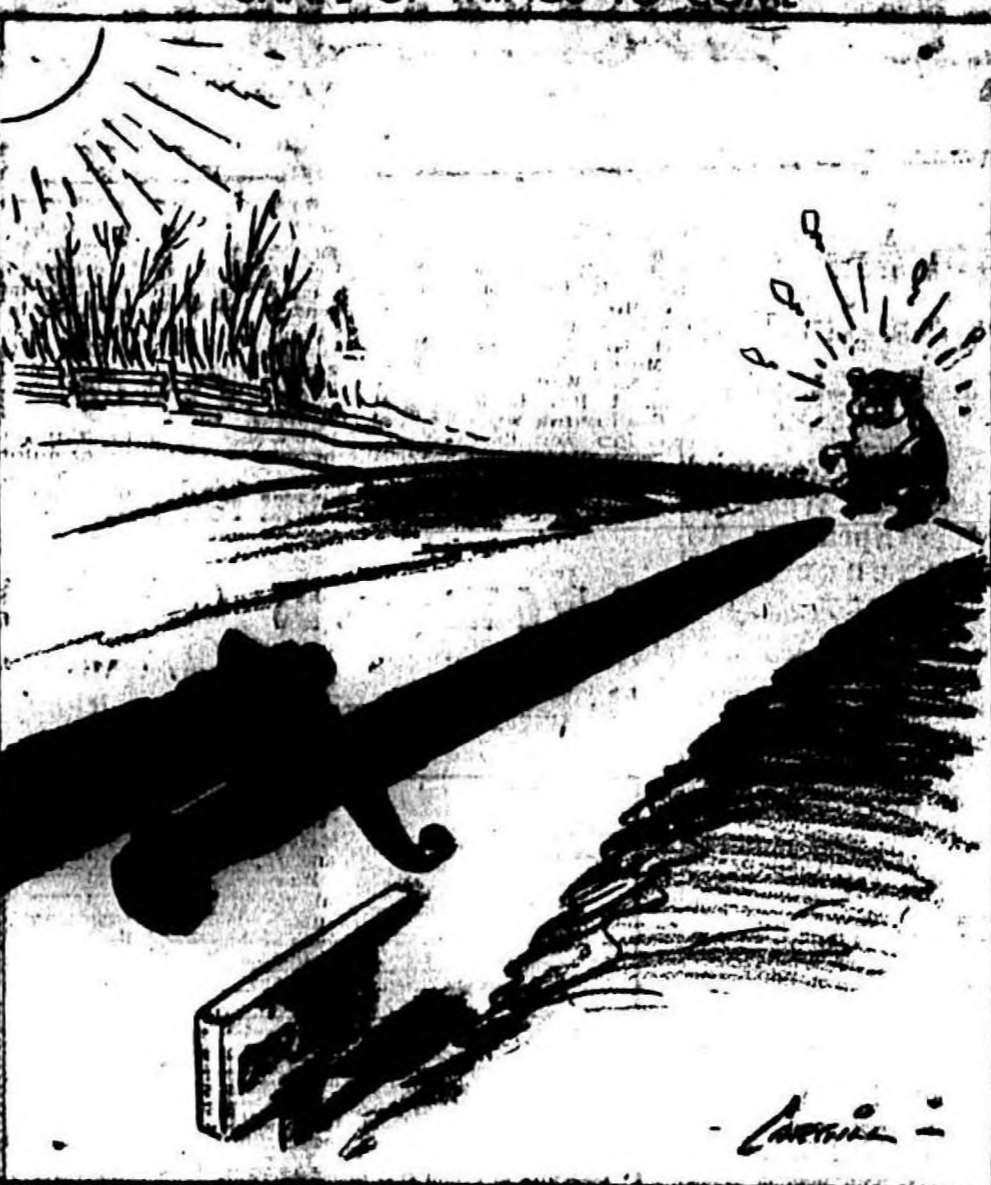

## Heaviest Burden In History On Taxpayers

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—The idea of turning back the calendar and taxing 1942 individual incomes at the much softer rates on 1943 income can be placed on the congressional agenda if how to put collections on a current basis. But a concerned warned the taxpaying public that, regardless of what happens, he should shoulder this year the biggest burden in American history.

### Army Physicians Tell Soldiers How To Drink

#### Suggest Highballs Instead Of Cocktails: Food With Drinks

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4, (AP)—Soldiers who drink were told today that if they must bend the bow, they should sip "never drink liquor straight or directly from the bottle."

You remember the old whistles about the governor of North Carolina remarking to the governor of South Carolina that "it's a long time between drinks?"

Well, Maj. Merrill Moore and Capt. G. Allan Chalmers of the Army Medical Corps say, in effect, "the longer the better."

"Make one drink last a long time," the doctors advised soldiers in an article in the Military Surgeon, adding that it's a good idea for civilians to do likewise.

The experienced drinker, the gentleman, if you like, is the man who can make a few drinks last all evening.

Here's how: "Choose tall drinks like highballs rather than concentrated ones like cocktails," they suggest. "The tall drink with its charged water helps to cushion the shock of alcohol on the system."

They also listed the oft-repeated advice that one should always eat before and while drinking because "food in the stomach—especially milk, cream, butter and meat—slows up the rate at which alcohol is absorbed into the system."

Declaring the problem of "the soldier who drinks too much" is often mishandled, Moore and Chalmers said, the chronic alcoholic in the Army should be treated as a physiologically and psychologically sick man rather than being punished temporarily or discharged from service.

"Encourage him to find and use substitutes for liquor," they suggested to officers who might be

frayed with the problem of the two-flated drinker. "Anything else can do. He should be encouraged to say, 'Make mine ginger-ale,' or 'tomato juice,' or 'milk' or anything else that contains no alcohol whatever."

They said the chronic drunk needs to have his self confidence restored. They explained that if officers can teach a man of this type how to do anything in which he will be better than some of the other men—whether it is doing the manual of arms, playing checkers, or pitching horseshoes—one temptation to drink is being removed.

Handling the chronic drinker and steering him to the ginger-ale stand is primarily the job of junior officers, the doctors said, but they added that the cooperation of non-commissioned personnel should be obtained in keeping men in the ranks from becoming, hardies.

Particularly the first sergeant, they declared.

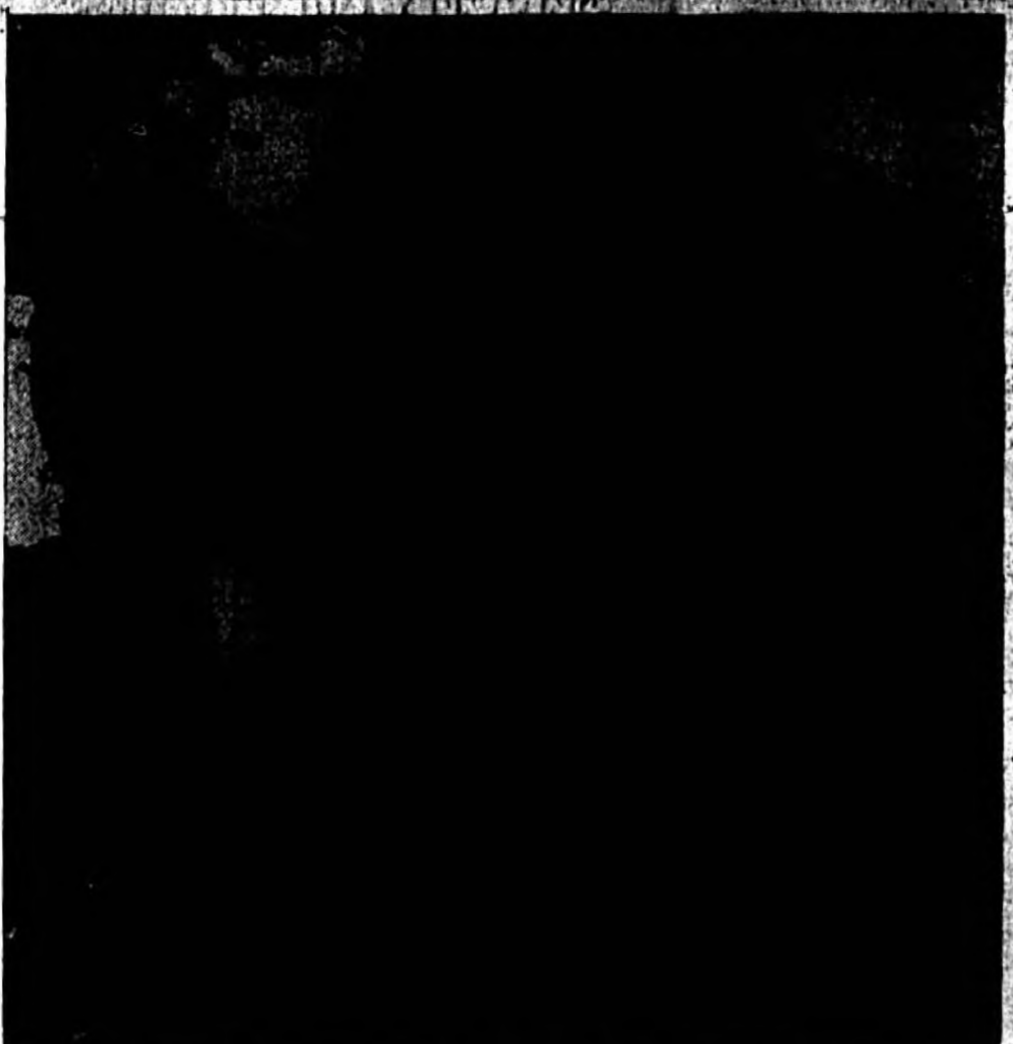
