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The Profits Of War

If the United States becomes embroiled in another war, there will be no wartime profiteers, and no profits of war, not if President Roosevelt, other Administration officials and Congress have their way about it, and it appears pretty likely that they will.

When war comes the interesting, even though gruesome, details of troop activities at the front, of casualty lists, and so forth, make important news for the newspapers.

During the last great war, some five million young men, ordinarily engaged in agricultural or industrial occupations, were conscripted and sent to training camps, perhaps to France.

As we understand the proposed legislation, it would levy a 98 percent tax on the profits of war. Would this tax apply to the profits which cotton growers make on the sale of their cotton to munition factories?

The Fat And The Lean

From Treasury department figures, the United States News digs up the information that there were 78,776 corporations, filing income tax returns in 1932, which reported profits, but there were 418,954 which showed losses.

These losses, the United States News explains, represent money paid out in wages and salaries over and above actual income. They represent money paid out in interest on borrowings, reserves set aside for depreciation, bad debts, losses on sales, taxes, and so forth.
