"\$600,000," she said. Ricci and Arnold said they do not know of any other funds that might be made available.

Karen Coleman, Seminole County school's administrative trustee acting as the superintendent's designee to parent groups, said a new elementary school costs about \$8 million.

"I wish I could weave a magic wand and turn that \$206,000 into \$8 million," she said.

She, too, urged the parents not to fight among themselves.

"The only thing to be gained by divisiveness is nothing," she said. Mrs. Coleman told the school board an expressed feeling among some parents that the administration is not willing to communicate and is not interested in parent input.

"I feel people say 'We'd like to do more.' That's not the real friends," she said. "Everyone in this room wants to do more or we wouldn't be here."

"Parents are more involved in Seminole County schools than ever before. Superintendent Bob Hughes has probably done more in communicating with the public than any other superintendent in the history of Seminole County."

"My friends, if you take those newspapers and cut out all the education articles then shake them they are not much left. It wasn't always that way."

Mr. Coleman said pupil crowding is not unique to Rosenwald. "Seminole County is the fastest growing county in the state," she said. "We've gained 10,000 students since 1970. We do have a housing problem."

Parent Mary Lou Waggoner agreed. "We don't have our dream," she said. "When we first came to Rosenwald we envisioned a beautiful new facility with a gymnasium and swimming pool," she said. "But my local elementary school, there is no great shake. They're delighted if they had \$425,000 for an addition."

"But, let's face it. Our kids aren't in the school for only three years like they are at Milne," said another parent.

Another parent asked Arnold if state money was to be the only source of relief for Rosenwald. "What about the county? Doesn't the county think they owe us anything?"

Arnold said the county has no more allocated at this time for facility construction at Rosenwald.

## Mickey, Minnie And Pals Settle Labor Dispute

### Orlando (UPI) — A tentative agreement between Walt Disney World and members of the Service Trades Council union kept Mickey Mouse and his pals on the picket line.

Union negotiators agreed unanimously Sunday to accept an agreement that would end the agreement calling for undisclosed increased wages and benefits for the 8,000 employees represented by the union, said Walt Disney spokesman Charles Ridgway.

Workers represented by the union include those who perform as Mickey Mouse and other Disney characters. The union also represents warehouse workers, mechanics and boat operators.

The agreement was reached just hours before the midnight strike deadline. Negotiators returned to the bargaining table Sunday after extending the original deadline of midnight Saturday by 24 hours.

## Hijacked Plane Back Home

MIAMI (UPI) — A Capital Air DC-8 that was hijacked to Cuba by a man claiming to have a gasoline bomb left Havana early today en route to Miami, where worried relatives and friends waited anxiously.

The jetliner, with 210 passengers and 20 crew members aboard, departed Miami at 5:28 a.m. for the 35-minute trip to Miami. The plane spent more than eight hours in Havana where the mechanic repaired a jammed emergency door.

Flight 236 from San Juan, Puerto Rico, to Miami and then to Chicago was hijacked at 7 p.m. Sunday and landed safely at Havana's Jose Marti Airport at 8:27 p.m. the FBI said.

No injuries were reported. It was the first domestic hijacking since February 1982.

A passenger reported the hijacker, who was taken into custody in Havana, said he was upset because he could not fly.

## 2 Bodies Still Missing

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Navy and civilian divers set up a giant crane on the St. Johns River today to remove the wreckage of a transport plane that crashed and killed 14 people. Two bodies still were missing.

Divers searched the swift, muddy river Sunday until the current forced them out.

The plane was set up to pull the four pieces of the C-119 into reach of a helicopter crane from the river and tow them for the bodies of the last two victims.

The plane, en route to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, with 15 people aboard, caught fire moments after takeoff Saturday and plunged into the river 125 yards short of the runway making a desperate attempt to return to the Jacksonville Naval Air Station.

The cause of the crash has not been determined.

## Surgical Cures For Obesity Dangerous

BOSTON (UPI) — Obese patients who resort to surgery to lose weight risk life-threatening side effects, with the operation often leading to strokes, kidney damage and severe vitamin deficiencies, reports warned today.

The operation that is small intestine so fast is not digested, allowing patients to eat as much as they want, must be reversed in some cases because of serious complications, a study reported in the New England Journal of Medicine.

Doctors stopped short of saying the "aerosol long-term health hazard" was warranted reversing the surgery that puts 90 percent of the small intestine out of operation, but cautions that 10 percent bypass no longer be performed.

An accompanying editorial also warned against another procedure that recently has become popular in which the stomach is stapled shut, leaving only 30 percent of its normal capacity.

Stomach stapling has been used to treat obesity and is unexplained neurological problems, said Dr. David H. Alpers of the Washington University School of Medicine.

"The surgery may do more harm than good," he said, without having tried standard methods of obesity treatment, such as dieting and exercise, and for therapeutic reasons.

Some candidates for surgical procedures are those who are unable to lose weight for an ailment for which they are unwilling to accept any response, he said.

Researchers from the University of Florida and the College of Medicine at the University of Iowa reported that 100 patients who had the intestinal bypass, "remedy" had been inoperably benefited five years later, another study.

But the study, and 20 percent were deemed surgical failures, meaning death or reversal of the operation.

"The real life-threatening problem is liver disease and injury to the liver that results in cirrhosis, like that of an alcoholic," said Dr. Edward R. Woodward, who led the researchers.

"Half of them don't even know they have it because the only way you can tell is biopsy — putting a needle into the liver."

Patients who have had the surgery should be regularly tested for liver and kidney disease, as well as vitamin and mineral deficiencies, he said.

As many as 100,000 operations have been performed, Woodward estimated, and up to 25 percent have been reversed, often replaced with stomach stapling.

Obesity is five times more prevalent in women than men. About 8 percent of U.S. adult women are more than double their ideal weight.

Leaving How To Think

By now the pattern is familiar. Test scores of students measuring more sophisticated skills, and those measuring simple, rote skills, are up, while those of the high school seniors and those measuring more sophisticated skills, particularly the ability to reason, stay down.

Thus, it was again the other day with the results of the latest test of mathematics for 12th graders, the latest test of mathematics of Educational Progress, a federally-funded testing program designed to provide periodic evaluations of how well the nation's students are doing.

The new results indicated that the math skills of 9- and 13-year-olds were higher than they had been in 1978, while those of 17-year-olds stayed the same. Further analysis also indicated that students did well on "routine" work, while those of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, called "step functions" and lower on those that require thinking, estimation, and analogies.

The phenomenon is not limited to mathematics. Similar patterns have been recorded in English, where, as in math, they appear to be "basics" and on upgrading the skills of students who have been doing below-average work. Those efforts have apparently paid off — scores of minority students, for example, are up — but only at the expense of more sophisticated skills and, to some extent, of rote memorization.

"The back-to-basics movement," said Willoughby, "has missed the whole point. Thinking is what we're emphasizing on the basics."

The message here is obvious. Indeed, it has become obvious from the beginning of the latest back-to-basics drive — lessons of rote memorization and manipulate numbers isn't enough if there is no ability to understand and evaluate the meaning of sentences and paragraphs and mathematical statements.

The more sophisticated skills become implemented. Encouraging students to think has always been more difficult for the schools, not because thinking is more difficult but because people who think are themselves sometimes more difficult. They require more intelligence, patience and energy not only from their teachers but from their parents and community.

On the NAEP math test, students with calculators were asked the following: "An Army bus holds 36 soldiers. If 128 soldiers are being loaded to the training site, how many buses are needed?" Only a small percentage got it right. The answer, of course, is 32.

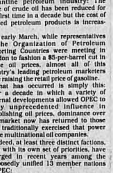

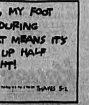
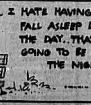
