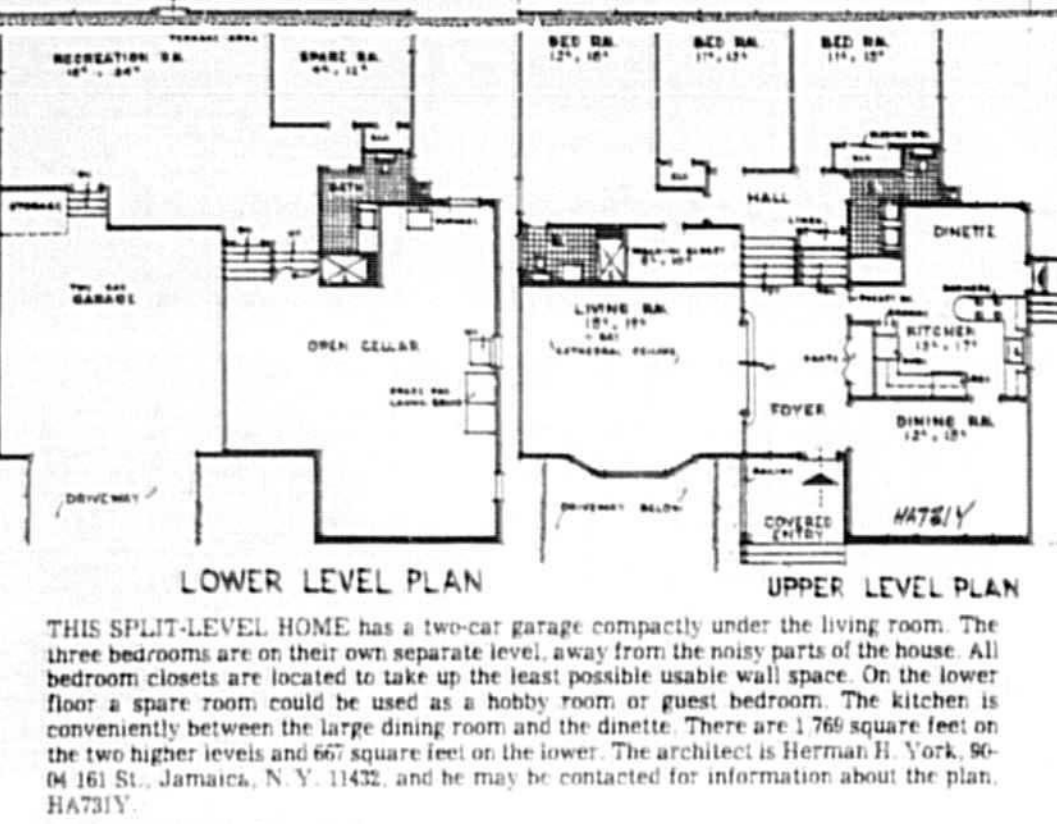

Here's the Answer

By ANDY LANG, AP Newswriter. There is a section of a cold water pipe in your house that leaks. You have patched it three times now. It lasts a few weeks, then leaks again. I would like to replace that part of the pipe. I did a similar repair some years ago, but remember that I had a very difficult time trying to get the new piece of pipe to fit. Can you help me? By the way, it's ordinary galvanized pipe, not copper or brass.

Actually, this is a job for a plumber. However, if the regulations in your community do not forbid replacement, you can try it yourself. First, shut off the water. Then, cut the pipe with a hacksaw anywhere from 4 to 6 inches from a joint. Unscrew the short length of this pipe, using two pipe wrenches. One for holding the pipe steady. Then unscrew the long length from the other joint.

Just finished varnishing a table top. There are many tiny, almost invisible bubbles on it. What caused this? What can I do?

It appears that you stirred the varnish, either before or while using it. Varnish should not be shaken or stirred. Sand down the surface, not to the bare wood but just enough to remove the bubbles. Revarnish.

12 Persons Lose Lives
Agnes Topples Poles And Lines

By RICH OPPEL and TOM RAUM
APALACHICOLA, Fla. (AP)—Having claimed 12 lives and scores of injured, Hurricane Agnes picked up her pace Monday morning as she bore down on Florida's Panhandle coast.

The National Hurricane Center in Miami said the center of the storm was expected to strike near here some time this morning. Bearing sustained winds of 85 m.p.h. and gusts in excess of 100, Agnes, the season's first hurricane, was pushing seas up to 8 feet before it.

Several tornadoes, apparently spawned by the hurricane, blasted into the town of Oklawaha, Fla., early today, ravaging several mobile home parks and killing at least three people.

Local police said the extent of personal and property damage was impossible to determine immediately. "Everytime I turn around there's more calls about dead or injured," said police dispatcher Mike Mars.

Ambulances were rushed to the lakeside town from neighboring communities and at 4:30 a.m. EDT a spokesman for Oklawaha General Hospital said a "tentative count" there showed four were dead, 15 had been admitted and 12 were undergoing treatment.

The hurricane center said the threat of more tornadoes would hang over the state this morning.

On Sunday another tornado, also attributed to the hurricane, killed a woman in La Belle, Fla.

The storm claimed seven lives as she raked past the western tip of Cuba on her way up the Gulf of Mexico.

More than 1,500 persons were evacuated during the night on the Gulf Coast, hundreds of miles south of here, from the Venice area and keys off Sarasota, civil defense officials reported.

But some residents of the Florida Panhandle refused to leave their homes and places of business.

Ernie Braun, manager of Alligator Point marina, remarked: "I don't run. If my number is up, it's up."

A number of boat owners were anxiously tying their boats to pilings, docks that were rocked by stiff winds.

"If it gets bad enough, I'll just jump into one of those big boats out there—I'll be a lot safer there than on land," said Braun.

A lawyer from Tallahassee who owns one of the boats at Braun's marina, Elliott Messer, said he did not want to be "any-

Because the developer was not present, according to Mrs. Moore, the matter will appear on again Tuesday's agenda of the County Commission for action.

Mrs. Moore said the proposed apartment complex would back up against property on Linden Road where attractive Britany-two homes are located and that an open drainage ditch is being considered by the apartment builder.

A survey of nine apartment complexes in an approximately one and a quarter mile semi-circle (not including those in nearby Orange County or the proposed Green Meadows) revealed the astounding figure of over 2,000 apartment units completed or under construction, Mrs. Moore stated.

Kenneth Dyer, manager of Florida Power branch office at Longwood, said nothing major occurred except a few trees fallen over lines. Power was out in some of their areas some 3½ hours.

Arthur Mackey, of Florida Power and Light Corporation, said power failures, most of which were repaired by mid-day, were in the western section of Sanford-Lech Arber-Paola and Idylwild. And in Ravenna Park, a power pole broke. Power in some areas was off from one to three hours.

According to area police departments, Winter Springs (North Orlando) seemed hardest hit by the storm. Police Chief Walter Bachelor said Hacienda Village suffered 90 per cent of the problems there, with an estimated \$1,000 in damages to a trailer, which lost its roof. In addition, the pump at the lift station in the mobile home park was burned out, when power was restored, due to its being underwater. Some of the roads, prepared by developers for paving, were washed out.

None of the trees blown down were blocking streets today.

Sanford Police Chief Ben Butler stayed at police headquarters until after 11 last night answering some 25 to 30 calls concerning power lines being down. An emergency generator was put into operation to provide power to the security section of the station.

The story was the same in Longwood, Casselberry, Oblique and Altamonte Springs, where the various police departments reported trees were down over power lines. Electrical power was restored in all instances and lines repaired.

No vehicle accidents were attributed in the cities to the storm.

Town Is Deserted In Face Of Storm

APALACHICOLA, Fla. (AP)—This small fishing and resort town darkened today as the oncoming winds of Hurricane Agnes downed poles and power lines and swept a rising tide across its beaches and into its streets. Shortly after dawn the last of the community's famed shrimp fleet struggled out of Apalachicola Bay and up the river of the same name to safety, completing an exodus of boats and people that began Sunday.

"The boats were going by all day, one after the other, like a regular armada," said a local official.

About 65 residents huddled in the center of town, families sitting on blankets around the walls while their children played on the floor.

"We're just trying to make sure everyone is comfortable," said Stan Sgt. Oswald Johnson. "We are giving them Army blankets and we are giving them coffee."

Trees shook violently in gales as Agnes bore down on Apalachicola, on the far western edge of the big bend created by Florida's curve around the Gulf of Mexico. Stores were boarded up in the center of town and only a few cars moved cautiously through the wet streets, ignoring the wildly swinging and non-working traffic lights.

About a dozen residents clustered anxiously around a Weather Service bureau above the Post Office, watching the course of the storm. On the waterfront Coast Guardsmen fought a losing battle with mops and pails against water that was rising steadily to engulf their station.

"The tide has risen five feet since 3 a.m.," said Coast Guardsman Miller Pierce. "Now we are just trying to keep people off the street."



Developer Proffers Civic Center Funds
