# Eyes On Press: Not "B.B." Please!

rieading into the political stormy season of the national conventions where the Republican and Democratic candidates for the presidency will be nominated and platforms adopted, there is even more than the usual reasons for the public to be thankful for and appreciated of the American free press.

There are signs, however, that this institution-even with its constitutional supportis under attack which is not quite as obvious as the vindictive and divisive oratory of Vice-President Spiro T. Agnew.

Indeed, two news stories are almost contradictory and yet they serve a single purpose. One has to do with the conceping by the Secret Service of the reporters who will be accredited to the Democratic National Convention in Miami Beach next month. Acting quite properly within the confines of its official duties, the Standing Committee of Correspondents, elected by reporters who are accredited to the Senate and House press galleries, have protested.

"This (screening) might give the Secret Service an unprecedented veto of who will cover the convention and undermines the traditional authority of accreditation so long held by this committee."

It is also a matter of common sense to recognize that the publishers who are selecting the correspondents who will describe the conventions have always and will continue to do the

#### Buckling Up

During the first three months of its compulsory safety seat belt law deaths and injuries to drivers and front seat passengers declined by a dramatic 20 per cent in Victoria, Australia, the first governmental subdivision to require this safety practice.

There's no sense in waiting until the federal government requires either passive-restraint systems or starter interlocks that prevent the car from starting until the front belts are fastened to insist on safety belt use at state levels, For Motor Company President Lee A. Oacocca declares.

Present estimates are that the use of seat belts is saving 3,500 lives a year and that if lap belts were used universally, instead of the and alvise per cert use at present, 12,000 more lives would be saved.

Those are cold figures, and ones that the Alabama Legislature should consider strongly when it meets again. Many of those 12,000 lives could be Alabamians. - Birmingham (Ala.)

Of course there are those who do ask "flabby and dumb" questions. And there are those whose probing is just too sharp and just too revealing.

Stage managed TV appearances are not the answer to the right of the people to know and the right of the press to perform its constitutional duties free of harassment and control.

These weeks before the Democrats meet in outy and the Republicans in August are days when the press must be even more vigilant and even more presistent. Probing will be done. It will be welcome!

# Space Shuttle Role Farfetched?

The controversial U.S. space shuttle project has been called many things - unnecessary and too expensive by its foes, vital to the nation's space program and a taxpayers' bargain by its supporters. Now, however, comes an entirely new argument for the space shuttle as man's next great adventure after the 1973

Skylab series. It could become the carrier of huge satellites designed to capture solar energy and transmit it back to earth to help ease America's growing electric power shortage. Outlandish? It would seem so at first blush. But the man proposing this as a long-range approach to easing the power shortage did so in testimony before a congressional sub-

himself. If the opponents of this proposal by Rep. Mike McCormack. D-Wash., call it hot air, then they also must consider the fact that Goodyear-Acrospace, a division of Goodyear, is proposing a combination of hot air balloons and parachutes as a recovery system for the huge boosters which will send the shuttlecraft zooming into earth orbit perhaps by 1978. McCormack, chairman of the House Science and Astronautics Committee's task force on energy sources, was testifying before a Senate subcommittee considering National Science Foundation appropriations.

Yet there was McCormack testifying that the future hopes of helping to meet the nation's power needs through solar energy lie to a great extent in "the existence of either the space shuttle or an alternative low-cost transportation system for putting large payloads into space." Kennedy expressed some surprise and asked McCormack to elaborate.

"There is no question that solar energy depends ultimately on having a space shuttle program," the congressman replied. Then he explained that there is a long-range possibility of using "tremendously large" synchronous satellites to capture energy from the sun's rays. The chief thrust of McCormask's testimony was that this

country is headed for an energy crisis of "major proportions" unless an all-out, well-organized program is launched to avert it. Government and power company officials have been warning about this for the last three years. It was a strange proceeding, indeed, for Kennedy, without knowing beforehand what McCormack was about to propose,

had said in a statement opening the hearings that "it is right that we tackle our immediate problems with everything we have; nothing less can succeed." That, he added, includes finding new nonpolluting energy sources for a constantly growing population.

So McCormack's proposal that the space shuttle program may be a further step toward harnessing solar energy for power on earth is not so incredible as it sounds.

Political Notebook Governors Don't Have Much Effect

WASHINGTON (NEA)

In the changing politics of 1972, the many governors in this country are often seen in a confusing blur. Neither their strengths nor their weaknesses are understood. Right now, look for a moment at the Democratic cov ernors. They are 30 in number, and a good share of them have been very much in the national news.

Starting long months ago, quite a sizable batch en dorsed the presidential candidacy of Sen. Edmund Muse kie. In that period, the general reaction of public figures and observers was that this was a considerable coup. though some people felt the endorsement tactic reached beyond the point of overkill.

When Democratic party primary voting began and Muskie turned up a loser, the judgment was quick The word from many sources was that it doesn't do any good for a candidate to have the governors with him if he isn't organized at the grass roots and can't identify well with the issues which are bothering the people.

Some high-placed associates, however, did not agree. Said one aide when the Maine senator was taking his "Let's face it. The governors are just about the only

thing we've got going for us these days. Without them we'd be even worse off than we are." Yet that view didn't make much of a dent as Sen George McGovern rose out of nowhere and bolted toward the Democratic presidential nomination, riding the waves of voter protest and relying upon a superior organization

Then, suddenly, a strange thing happened. The gov-ernors got back into the bright light. The anti-McGovern nent in the Democratic party is, of course, sub stantial. The governors, widely judged to be useless for Muskie if not a drag on him, were briefly seen as the very fellows who could put it all together and stop Mc Govern. The theory seemed to be that they can't help you but they sure can hurt you.

Well, naturally that little flurry didn't last long. At the Houston national governors' conference, I made the same fast spin around the Democratic circuit that many observers did. Unhappy though most governors were, they knew they couldn't halt McGovern, and only a handful wanted to try. It would have been like putting thumb tacks in the roadway to stop a tank.

This time, though, some of Muskie's backers were not so kind. They thought the governors' complaints about McGovern came a bit late. The theme was, where were you when we needed you and the song was strikingly dif-

Time was in the Democratic party when just a handful could settle everything. And the Republicans. remembering the governors' big role in Gen. Dwight Eisenhower's 1952 nomination, fondled that dream for years. In fact, they never since have been able to join

A lot of these governors in the two parties are pretty able men, in their own realms. Many run their states well, and take a good deal of heat. They get thrown around, and often kicked out. But presidential politics really isn't their bag.

### Justice Leaning Over Backwards

It was a white man, Yale University president Kingman Brewster, who averred that a black man cannot get a fair trial in the United States. The statement was made shortly before Black Panther Bobby Seale was found innocent of the murder of fellow Panther, Alex Rackley (who remains one black man in imerica still waiting for justice).

It was a black man, Ohio Supreme Court Justice Lloyd Brown, who charged that equal protection under the law doesn't apply to black people. Despite all the platitudes to the contrary, the judge told delegates to a conference of the all-black National Bar Association, the law is the black man's enemy in the United States. This charge was made the day before a nonblack jury found black militant and avowed Communist Angela Davis innocent of all counts of kidnaping, murder and conspiracy in the April 7, 1970, courtroom breakout attempt in Marin County, Calif., in which Judge Harold J. Haley and three convicts abducting him were killed. If intelligent men like a university professor and a state supreme court justice can believe such things, we can hardly expect any better from the ideological idiots who constantly rant about racist and fascist America. Even Miss Davis herself said her opinion about the American

system of justice was unchanged. "The fact that I was acquitted doesn't mean I had a fair trial," she said after the verdict. "A fair trial would have been no trial at all."



Small Buses Needed

Layer reported that he attended a meeting conducted by the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council and the development division of the Urban Mass Transportation Administration. A report was made on progress to date on the application for a technical study grant by Council increasing moneys for services to the elderly, with HUD also assisting. Discussion indicated that smaller buses are also needed to get commuters from outlying areas to the major transportation lines. The thought was that smaller systems are less costly to operate.

Pollution Control Officer Langley Adair reported that the county sanitarian had been instructed to post signs around the perimeter of Lake Howell declaring it to be polluted. David Groves, resident who owns lots Lot 13 in Palm Park adjacent to the Forest Lake Academy airport, was told by Zoning Driector Robert Brown and the Board of Commissioners that he is illegally operating a commercial gasoline business on the property.

Groves had originally applied for permission to place the gasoline pumps on the property to service his plane. It has since been established that he is also supplying fuel to the airport planes, which is a zoning violation. He was instructed to request a zoning change to CX which is necessary to legalize the operation.
