SANFORD - An Oviedo man will be sentenced Thursday for first-degree murder in the April 1987 death of his grandmother.

Roosevelt Walker, whose sentence will be pronounced unhis 33rd birthday, was scheduled to go on trial this week but pleaded no contest to the charge. before the trial began.

Judge O.H. Eaton accepted the plea and also denied Walker's motion to prevent the state from seeking the death penalty. The minimum mandatory sentence for first-degree murder is life imprisonment with no possibility of parole for 25 years. The maximum penalty is death. A no contest plea is tantamount to an admission of criminal guili but carries no civil liability.

Walker was accused of murdering his grandmother inher Oviedo home in the early morning of April 29, 1987. He



### Three injured in plane crash

PENSACOLA — A single-engine plane with three people aboard crashed and burned Monday while making practice landings at a rural sirfleid northwest of Pensacols.

The injured, two women and a man, received burns and incerations and were taken to West Plorida Hospital following the 1:30 p.m. CDT crash near Coastal Airport.

Judy Kenley, 57, of Pensacola, was listed in guarded condition. The others were identified as a 47-year-old man, also in guarded condition, and his 33-year-old wife, who was critical. Both are from Robertsdale, Ala.

The Coastal 185 was practicing landings when it crashed

The Cessna 185 was practicing landings when it crashed north of west Nine-Mile Road in the Beulah community, eight miles from Pensacola. All but the tail section of the plane burned after it crashed in a wooded area some 300 feet from the grass landing strip.

### Crack cocaine dealer gets life sentence

TALLAHASSEE - A Ft. Pierce man was sentenced to life imprisonment without parole Monday for distribution of crack

Ernest R. Staley, 30, had more than 600 grams of crack cocaine in his possession when he was arrested in June 1966 by the Tallahassee Police Department's special crack investigation squad. A federal jury found him guilty on June 1 of

possession charges and conspiracy to distribute crack.

His sentence is the first mandatory life sentence to be imposed in the Northern District of Florida, said U.S. Attorney

Attorneys for Staley argued during the three-hour sentencing hearing Monday that the sentencing guidelines are not constitutional and that the life sentence was unfair and unusually cruel punishment, because Staley had no prior criminal history.

### Actor charged with men's room holdup

FORT LAUDERDALE — Actor Alan Paley, who played the jury foreman in the movie "12 Angry Men" was jailed without bond on charges of trying to rob a golf cart executive at gunpoint in a hotel men's room.

Paley, 54, was shot in the stomach during the incident Aug. 7 and was admitted to Coral Springs Medical Center under police guard. He was released from the hospital Saturday and erred to the Broward County Jail, where he was still

being held without bond Monday on an armed robbery charge.
Paley used a police .38 to stick up a stranger wearing a Rolex atch and gold ring in the men's room of the Fort Lauderdal

Sheraton Execuport Hotel, police said.

The victim, 55-year-old William Donald of Fort Myers, said he was standing at the urinal when he realized Paley was standing beside him holding a revolver.

Donald fought back, wresting the gun from Paley and chasing him into the hotel lobby. He shot Paley in the stomach and fired two shots into Paley's fleeing car. Police later surrounded Paley's house, and he surrendered without a fight.

### Kennedy accused of helping GOP

MIAMI — Gerald Richman, who will face former city commissioner Rosario Kennedy in the Democratic runoff for the congressional seat left vacant by the death of Rep. Claude Pepper, claimed Monday his opponent campaigned for the Republican ticket during the 1988 presidential race.

The Kennedy campaign denied the charge, saying Kennedy was representing the city as a city commissioner when she appeared with GOP vice presidential candidate Dan Quayle during a Miami campaign appearance.

# Pro-choice groups boost membership

TAMPA - Florida's pro-choice fromps said the governor's call for a special session to abortion restrictions has boosted their membership and helped them avoid some of the dissent

that has split national groups.

National abortion rights leaders split on NOW's suggestion of a third political party. Some said their effectiveness could be hampered by the militant image of some feminists.

But in Florida, the first state to call a special session on abortion since the U.S. Supreme Court's Webster decision, organization leaders said idealistic differences over tactics and the feminist label have taken a back seat.

"The turf-war per se that we hear about is really on the national front, not here," said Marilyn Dougherty, president of the Florida Abortion Rights Ac-tion League. "And frankly, I'm not surprised at any differences. People in this fight have strong

"The abortion fight is like traveling between Florida and New York. If you're all there at the appointed hour, I don't think it matters how you got there."

State proponents claim nothing is going to divide a united front during October's special Florida legislative

The Florida House Committee on Health Care begins hearing testimony Monday from state officials regarding abortion and abortion rights.

In a matter of months, mem-

bership in NOW has reached heights reminiscent of days before the fall of the Equal Rights Amendment, more than 200,000 nationally and 20,000 in Florids.

The National Abortion Rights

The National Abortion Rights Action League, the Florida Abortion Rights Action League, the League of Women Voters and the National Women's Political Caucus also are basking in the heat of the argument.

The Florida Abortion Rights group, for instance, said its membership topped 11,000 last month up from about 7,500 a year ago.

The organizations have historically had differences in philoso-

Both the National Abortion Rights Action League and Planned Parenthood repri-manded NOW for the suggestion of a third political party, worried that such a move could tracture support for abortion rights.

But the executive director of the Florida Abortion Rights Action League said the natural competition between like organizations helps the fight for

"The stereotypical angry voter who wants to support abortion rights can now find a group to belong to, whether they want to march or simply practice 'condo' politics," said the league's Janis Compton-Carr.

# Pilot had spotless record, FAA says

ST. PETERSBURG - The pilot of a plane that crashed in the Gulf of Mexico, killing him the Gulf of Mexico, killing him and three teenage passengers, was a highly qualified aviator with an unblemished record in 22 years of flying, federal officials said as they began an investigation.

Eugene W. McKnight, a senior Civil Air Patrol pilot from Seminole, obtained his commercial pilot's license in April 1967 and had never before been involved in a crash or received.

involved in a crash or received any citations. Federal Aviation Administration records show.

McKnight, 43, was qualified to fly single-engine planes and multi-engine aircraft weighing up to 12,500 pounds, and FAA, spokeswoman Bobbie Mardis.

He had an instrument rating, which means he could fly by simply reading gauges and instruments, she said.

## Man accused of murder wants his children back

NEW PORT RICHEY - A man accused of killing his wife is struggling to gain custody of his two young daughters but the confession in which he all but adminitted guilt is standing in his way.

Jeffrey Crouch was charged with first-degree murder in the death of his wife Jeannie. but the charges were later dropped because of procedur-

Pasco County Circuit Judge Brandt Downey III must now decide whether Crouch, a shrimper, is a fit parent to raise his daughters. Julie. 7. and Jessica. 4. He plans to rule on temporary custody within two weeks.

"But yourself in my place," said Crouch, 33. "First my wife gets killed. Then they say I did it. Then I go to jail. Then I lose my kids. Then my lawyer gets the case dis-

missed ... and I still don't get my kids. I feel like I've really been ripped off."

Jeff and Jeannie Crouch left the girls with a babysitter Jan. 27, 1987 and went out for dinner. At a bar afterward. they drank several drinks and argued loudly, with Crouch accusing his wife of flirting with another man, the bartender and other patrons said.

The next morning, Jeannie Crouch's body was found on Green Key Beach west of New Port Richey. She had been strangled.

Crouch called police that evening and reported his wife was missing. He came to the police station, where detectives filed a report.

They grew suspicious:" wondering how Crouch knew details such as the fact that his wife's clothes were torn in the attack. Detectives turned on a tape recorder and read Crouch his rights.

confessed to the murder to two deputies. He later sought to have the confession thrown out, but Judge Eaton ruled it was legally obtained. A tape of the confession was played in court before Judge Eaton accepted the plea.

Walker told deputies he conspired with two other people to rob his grandmother. He said he let the two into his grandmother's house. He said the other people went into her bedroom and after Walker heard his grandmother scream. he went in and saw that she was dead. He told deputies he then ran from the house and hid.

At about 2:40 a.m., the Oviedo Fire Department responded to a report of a fire at Mrs. Graham's house. The roof over the bedroom caved in and firefighters were not informed until they arrived there might be someone inside the house.

Investigators later determined the fire had been started on the bed on which Mrs. Graham was laying, and spread to the walls and ceiling of the room.

An autopsy showed Mrs. Graham had been struck repeatedly with a blunt instrument, choked and stabbed.

No other suspects in the case have been arrested.

in the county in exchange for first-response fire service in unincorporated enclaves. Longwood, Altamonte Springs and Winter Springs already are using the system, County Manager Ken Hooper said.
Shea said the system will give

the city more channels and more capabilities. Once the city is on line, he said, every city officer in the field will have the ability to talk to any sheriff's deputy or fire unit in the county.

The city will spend \$135,000 for a device used by the U.S. Army to digitally protect microwave messages transmitted through the system, Shea said. The voice protection has

not yet been broken, he said. although most 800-megahurz systems can be descrambled.

Under the new system, Shea said, each city officer will have a personal radio for immediate access to airwaves during an emergency. Every car will have a backup radio, he said.

Shea said he expects the city to be switched over to the new system by November, with Jan. 15 as the latest possible date.

# Sanford wants housing

City reconsiders split from county community development program

SANPOND — The city should ppeal Seminole County's depial I monics acceled to keep the city's community development office in operation, a city com-missioner said last night.

In making that appeal, Com-missioner A.A. McClanahan id, the city should reconsider its decision to opt out of the county's Community Developent Block Grant (CDBG) pro-

McClanakan urged Mayor Bettye Smith to appeal the Seminole County Commission's July 26 realiseation of \$170,000 from housing rehabilitation in Sanford to a paving project in rural Alterna ural Altamonte Springs. After discussion, Smith

directed City Manager Frank

directed City Mininger Frank Fation to request a chance to discuss the matter with the Seminote County Commission.

"Our program really hinged on that money to a large degree." McClanahan said. "....It was money allocated to Sanford. We thought we were home free." McClanahan said the city should "personal consider spins"

should "seriously consider going back to the county" to get CDBG money needed to keep city housing rehabilitation and

drainage programs going. San-ford range too low in criteria for judging small cities' program heations for the city to bank on those monies, he said, com-pared to its top ranking in 1985 when it first applied for CDBG

Charles Rowe, director of the city community development office said the city ranks 104th of 238 Florida cities eligible for small cities grants in community-wide need, one of three

criteria for the grants.
The city decided to drop out of the county's program in order to apply for funds through a program for small cities. Sanford received 9650,000 in CDBG monies through the small cities' program during 1985, then received about \$705,000 over

three years through Seminole County

"I don't think we have a small prayer," McClanahan said. "There isn't that much out

The city community development office has enough money to fund projects through March. Rowe said during an interview

In later discussion, Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said the commission should deny Seminale County's request to sign an agreement terminating the \$170,000 allocation.

"Why sign it if it is a fait accompli?" Eckstein asked.

McClanahan said the city should not sign the agreement until an appeal of the county's decision is appealed.

## Homeowners threaten suit over recreation fees

LONGWOOD — Residents of the Hidden Oaks Estates subdivision want a minimum refund of \$4,800 from the city to dress up a small recreation area in their neighborhood.

They say they were taxed twice for recreation in 1986 but never got anything for it, and one member of the homeowner's one member of the homeowner sassociation has threatened to

sue for the money.

Mayor Hank Hardy said at a worksession last night that he needs to listen to the 1986 commission meeting tapes and seek legal counsel before deciding whether the money the residents seek is public or

"I can't make, a decision that would wind the city up in a lawsuit. The commission will make a decision one way or another," Hardy said.

According to a February 1986 memorandum from City Planner Chris Nagle, Hidden Oaks' developer. Centex Homes of Florida Inc., Oriando, proposed a neighborhood park which was "inadequate." Nagle had re-commended a 1½-to-2-acre park, but Centex proposed a

15-acre park. As a result, the commission decided that a "\$200 recreational impact fee per lot" was to be paid by Centex. The fee was included in the cost of a home. For 99 lots, the amount collected by the city would have been \$19,800. Three months later. impact fees went into effect in Longwood, which meant an additional \$250 per lot collected from the developer. That fee was carmarked for parks and recre-

ation, as well as police. fire, and

drainage, Nagle said. In the meantime, the city struck a deal with Centex to pay for a costly drainage system to maintain the level of West Lake. Centex would be credited \$15,000 from the initial \$200 recreation fee as the city's share of that project, which cost about \$30,000, according to city officials

Hidden Oaks Estates homeowners say even if \$15,000 was credited toward the drainage system, that still leaves a balance of \$4,800 - \$19,800 minus \$15,000 - in city coffers which they say is owed them. And they want that refund to add to the approximate 1/2-acre aite with a dock which Centex contributed for the neighborhood's recreation.

Today, city officials disagree about whose money it is. Most say it belongs to the city for

public, not private, recreation and should therefore not be returned.

Centex President Andy Hennigan said last week during a telephone interview that the fee was supposed to go to "the benefit of all the parks in the area.

The homeowners argue the commission never made it clear how the money would be spent.

City Administrator Michael Abels said the money should remain in the city's coffers. He said the deal to credit Centex \$15,000 was an "up front" one. "whether you agree with it or don't agree with it."

Bob Pitino of the Hidden Oaks Homeowners Association called the fees "double taxation."

'We don't want to go to court either, but we do have a right to ask for the whole \$19.800." Pitino told the commission.



## Reform worse than disease

President Bush has a proposal to reform the nation's federal campaign finance laws. He wants to abolish "non-ideological" political action committees, whose \$160 million war chest "overshadows the great parties of Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln." He also wants congressmen and senators to give back excess campaign contributions afte each election cycle.

Democrats have their own ideas in this area. Thye want a ceiling on the amount any candidate — challenger or incumbent — can spend in an election. Takpayer-financing of campaigns also wouldn't be a bad idea, they believe.

Both of these proposals, and the many others floating around, have troubling con-sequences that could seriously backfire to the detriment of the political process. The ral problem is not so much the process of financing our elections (though it could certainly stand some improvements), but the fact that the politicians give moneyed interests such as enormous incentive to contribute

heavily to campaigns.

The odd Bush distinction between "special interest" PACs and "ideological" PACs will be shredded beyond recognition the moment it is shoeved out into the arena of mortal political combat. Is the Committee on Politi-cal Education (COPE), organized labor's long-standing policical action committee, an "ideological" or "special interest" PAC? The lawsuits would be endless and any attempt to ban PACs would probably be held un-

constitutional in any case:

It also would be pointless. We live in a free society, and any attempt to keep money from influencing the political process is doomed to fail. Cut it off in one area, and it will only surface somewhere else: "independent" expenditures, voter registration drives, etc. This sort of shadowy expenditures negates the one main advantage the current system has - everything is at least disclosed, and the or her representatives.


The idea for returning campaign contributions isn't much better. As Larry Sabato, the astute University of Virginia political scien-tist, points out, politicians would simply return the money to the original contributors who, with a wink and a nod, would simply "contribute" again a few months later. Such a proposal is nothing more than a recipe for a circular paper-shuffling operation.

One would think that the experience with

spending ceilings is presidential campaigns would have crude members of Congtess of expending this idea. In the lowa caucuses and New Hampshire primaries last year, can-didates evaded the spending limits in those states by renting cars and hotel rooms in neighborning states and other creative accounting techniques. This sort of legal cheating only further undermines public esteem for the political system.

The track record of campaign finance reform is not encouraging. Congress went on a binge of reform in the years immediately after Watergate. Individual contributions were severely limited. This had the effect of creating the PAC monster in the first place and biasing the system heavily in favor of incumbents.

Until members of Congress decide to stop handing out favors or, more likely, voters support candidates who advertise they are not for sale to special interests, the current system, imperfect as it is, is probably the best we can hope for.

# Bias sways Congress on gains tax

Congress recessed having done what it does best: pledge billions in public money to bail out a failing industry whose trouble stems in part from previous political indulgence.

Yes, the savings and loan industry, with its federally insured deposits and small legion of consetted crooks, was rescued with a promise of

\$159 billion in long-term aid.

This is the political process at its most predictable, a noisy act of deliverance in which the unlucky, incompetent or shamelessly greedy are saved from ruin just before they hit the wall.

But what, you might ask, of the millions of Americans who are neither unlucky nor incom-

petent? What did Congress do for them this

The equally predictable answer: nothing.

Worse than nothing, actually. House leaders insulted thrifty, workaday Americans by denouncing a proposal to lower the capital-gains tax or index the tax to inflation. Then they over which social class would benefit most from such changes in the tax code.

According to the reigning dogma of liberalism, policies benefiting the wealthy are intrinsically bad. In this cramped, zero-sum world.

bad. In this cramped, zero-sum world, a family that boosts its income overnight by \$20,000 does so at someone else's expense. Wealth is not

created, the dogma implies. It is stolen.

Never mind that a large percentage of Americans own homes and so would gratefully

benefit from a broad-based cut in the capital gains tax.
And ignore the fact
that many elderly
Americans would benefit, too — re-tirees who carefully liquidate their modest stock holdings in order to maintain a comfort-able standard of liv-

No, the thought that the wealthy might make out best of all is just too much for many Democrats. And so they dismiss the proposal out of

Fortunately, not all Democrats agree, which is why a reduction in the capital-gains tax is still not out of the question. As Rep. Michael Andrews, D-Texas, wisely noted in a recent letter

House leaders

insulted thrifty, workaday Americans

to The Wall Street Journal. "The real issues have nothing to do with privilege or partisanship. The real issues are economic, and they are important: growth in America's pro-

ductivity, strengthening our ability to compete for expanding world markets, and the creation of new jobs and opportunities for our workers."

A number of dynamic countries, including Hong Kong, Singapore, South Korea, Taiwan and West Germany, impose no tax at all on long-term capital gains. Japan taxes such earnings at a mere 5 percent. Even Sweden imposes a far lower tax on investment gains than does the United States.

Does Congress wish to improve America's competitive potential, or does it prefer pandering

to resentments against the wealthy?

Do a majority of House members care that the capital cost of investment is far higher here than

Americans must be encouraged to save and invest, as well as to risk their resources occasionally in ventures that (in Andrews' apt phrase) "may fail, but when successful can

produce the jobs and exports of the future."

It is always fun to bash the rich. Usually it is harmless. But sometimes, unfortunately, it prevents us from focusing on an issue of pivotal consequence.

# Living the simple life in Maine

CASCO BAY, Maine — Visitors have flown in this morning. We are awakened by the noises of two of these transients, seagulls tap-dancing on the roof of the cottage. When their dance is over, they scream their self-satisfaction and leave to cruise the rest of the cove.

I get up slowly, crawl down the length of the bed alcove and reach for the shorts and T-shirt that hang on the wall pegs. I fall into them like an old familiar chiar. They have been waiting for me since last summer and the summer

There is one style up here: Maine. It only changes with the water. There is nothing to mix or match. The shoes are relics of earlier musseling ventures on the rocks. The one appropriate accessory is an old baseball cap that is unquestionably a fashion "don't."

We come here to slow up and pare down. There are no travel guides and trip tiks and express checks in our summer plans. We choose to rid ourselves of clutter for a while, to slough off the chores and obligations, the people and things that must be dealt with, the choices and decisions that confront us with their urgency. We want to get life down to a four-room cottage on an island. To simplify.

Wasn't that what Thoreau wrote when he built his home at Walden Pond?

I look up his words in the tattered book on the shelf. "Our life is frittered away by detail...Simplify, simplify." His retreat from "details" opened the spaces of his life. And so

Our vacation is defined in part by what we do not have. These are things that the island does not have: a traffic light, a movie theater, a burglar alarm, a bank machine, a Benetton. Thesea are the things that the cottage does not have: bedroom doors, pantyhose, cloth napkins, neckties, videotapes.

We are not roughing it by Walden standards. There is electricty and running water in the cottage: a shower of sorts is rigged up to the tub. One of the "staples" of our diet is lobster, the luxurious shedders and hardshells from our neighbor's traps. And this year we improved tife kitchen with a newfangled addition: a plastic trash can.

But here we have happily limited our options the way we limit the items on our dinner menu. We cannot dash out for tacos or frozen yogurt. We can't debate the allure of sushi or pesto sauce. Indeed we chuckle over the Gourmet magazine recipes that call for

We are just a boat ride away from the mall culture of mainland America. But the waters form a protective barrier against consuming.

The loss of access, the downsizing of our home, our community, our lives, defines this time out. Simplify. Simplify.

A few weeks ago, a friend who has been a Moscow correspondent told me what she will miss about her family's time in that capital: the absence of choices. After all her letters describing the shortages and hassles, I laughed. But I also understood.

In her world, there is no consuming to be done, no lawn to be mowed, no extra rooms to

be cared for, no lessons to be chauffeured. For a Western family, this temporary loss can feel like more. More time. More togetherness. Up here, I wonder

how many American lives, freer and richer, are frittered away by detail. The extra rooms that demand cleaning. the lawns that demand attention. How many family lives are scattered over aisles and miles of choices that become demanding necessities. Places to get to. prices to pay, things to want. How much

culture of mainland America. easier it seems in our four-room cottage to live

We are just a boat ride away

from the mall

Is this summer talk? Island life is not easier for the teen-agers who take a boat to school for those who get sick on a winter's night. The pace of our life here has as much to do with leaving work as with leaving the mails and the makeup.

But these are the days we store up. Days when there are mackerel in the cove and raspberries on the bushes and hours in the

They will stay there all winter, permanently hanging in our minds like old clothes on the wooden pegs, carrying another image of life, another message. Simplify. Simplify.

WASHINGTON - President Bush played a wild card in the grim poker game over the life of hostage Joseph Cicippio. The dramatic story can now be told of how Cicippio's execution was stayed.

In a recent exclusive interview, the president tipped us off how he might handle his first terrorist crisis. "I believe that under the

new leadership, the Soviets will cooper-ate. ..." he told us. "This should be tested."

That's exactly what Bush did. Secretary of State James Baker met informally in Paris with Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard et-Iranian relations had been warming up, so Baker asked Shevardnadze to use his influence to defuse the hostage sit-

uation. agreed to carry a secret note from the United States to

Tehran asking Iran's new leaders to intervene with the terrorists. The Soviet foreign minister not only delivered the note personally, but added his voice to the request. In response, Iran's newly elected president,

Hashemi Rafsanjani, formed a committee of four to handle the assignment, including himself. The other three were Iran's spiritual guide Ali Khameinei, Prime Minister Hossein Musavi and Chief Justice Abdul Ardebili.

The policy committee decided to apply quiet pressure on the terrorists. Foreign Minister Ali Akbar Velayati and an aide. Hossein Sheikholeslam, were ordered to contact the terrorists. When Cicippio's life was on the line, they succeeded in persuading his captors to postpone his execution.

Velayati and Sheikholeslam have continued to keep in close contact with the terrorists. But the question overhanging the crisis is how much clout Iran's new regime has with the terrorists. Here is some background gathered from confidential documents and sources:

In June 1982, the late Ayatollah Khomeini began recruiting and training terrorists in Lebanon. Several terrorist groups were formed, and their loyalty now varies. They operate under various names but take direction from a super-secret command unit called the Council of Lebanon.

The council receives orders from Iran and distributes Iranian arms and cash to the terrorist groups. In the past, the terrorist operations were directed by Ali Akbar Mohtashami, an uncompromising hardliner who was the Iranian ambassador to Syria and is now minister of interior.

In the power struggle that followed Khomeini's death, Mohtashami lost out to the more moderate Rafsanjani. Though Mohtashami has now been squeezed out of the policy-making circle, he still has tremendous clout. So it remains to be seen whether the terrorists will listen to Rafsanjani or Mohtashami.

Bush, meanwhile, has been using a cautious approach. In the interview, he told us that he would use force to rescue the hostages if he felt "that the odds were reasonably good that they would be saved."

He also declared. "If the fingerprints of state-sponsored terrorism are found on hostage-taking, that state should be expected to pay a price.'

So, after the terrorists' latest threats, Bush activated a 1985 contingency plan for bombing terrorist strongholds in Lebanon's Bekaa Valley. He also ordered the necessary military forces to assemble in the Mediterranean to implement the plan.

Meanwhile, his back-channel diplomacy got

### Judge questions use of DNA testing

NEW YORK — A legal decision that questions the validity of genetic tests in a murder trial could lead to the reopening of scores of criminal and paternity cases nationwide, some legal

The ruling Monday by Acting Justice Gerald Sheindlin of state Supreme Court was believed to be the first major challenge to DNA "fingerprinting." The technique is used to identify individuals as the source of blood, amon, hair or skin

based on analysis of the genetic material DNA found in cells.

Sheindlin ruled DNA tests could be used to show that blood found on a murder suspect's wristwatch was not his, but could not be used to show the blood was that of the victim.

The judge, basing his ruling on testimony in a 12-week pretrial hearing, found the DNA test used to identify the blood

The testing laboratory failed in several major respects to use the generally accepted scientific techniques and experiments for obtaining reliable results, within a reasonable degree of certainty." Sheindiln wrote.

### Hair dryers recalled

WASHINGTON — The government announced the voluntary recall of 250,000 hand-held hair dryers that can cause electrocution when immersed in water in the off position, and warned that another 80 million dryers already sold pose the

In the announcement Monday, the Consumer Product Safety Commission said accidents involving the devices kill about 17 people a year — more than half of them children under 10.

"Children often use these devices for bath-time play," said Anne Graham, acting CPSC chairwoman. "One acenario we have seen involves one or more children left unattended in a bathtub when a parent leaves momentarily. Too often the parent returns to find that a child has brought a hair dryer into the tub, electrocuting one or both of the children."

The 250,000 hair dryers being recalled were sold after the adoption in October 1967 of a voluntary industry standard requiring devices that prevent electrocution when the dryers are immersed in water while turned off.

### Deaths of Congressmen mourned

WASHINGTON - The deaths of Reps. Mickey Leland. D-Texas, and Larkin Smith, R-Miss., in separate airplane crashes marked "a very sad week" for Congress, where lawmakers remembered the lives of their two colleagues.

The few legislators who were in Washington on Monday during the summer break for Congress had kind words for the veteran lawmaker Leland, who died along with 15 other people in Ethiopia, and the freshman Smith, who was killed in southern Mississippi.

"This has been a very, very sad week for the House of Representatives and the Congress," said House Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash., who called the loss of two colleagues in a single week "a heavy blow."

House Republican leader Bob Michel of Illinois said Leland and Smith "exemplified the highest standards of government service and reminded us all of the truly high caliber of individual we have serving our country today."

Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., said, "We lost two members from opposite ends of the ideological spectrum who were both putting themselves at some risk to do their jobs."



### Poland tries to form government

WARSAW, Poland - Embattled Prime Minister Gen. Czeslaw Kiszczak said he may propose that the leader of a minor Communist-allied party take over his post, while Solidarity said Lech Walesa is being considered as a candidate to head a new government.

In Moscow, the Soviets warned that the Solidarity founder's possible bid to form a ruling coalition that would exclude Polish Communist Party leaders from key posts could cause "a protracted governmental crisis" in the Warsaw Pact nation.

Pravda, the official newspaper of the Soviet Communist Party, accused Walesa of adding to the difficulties faced by Kiszczak, saying Walesa's proposal "runs counter to universally established principles of parliamentary democracy."

Kiszczak made his nationally televised announcement after a meeting between Walesa and leaders of two key communistallied parties failed to take place. The Democratic and Peasants' parties had been prepared to discuss a possible Solidarity coalition.

The two parties said the talks with Walesa had not broken down, but it was not immediately clear why the meeting was

Kiszczak, the former interior minister, has been prime minister since Aug. 2 but with no Cabinet.

### Hard line broadcast in Iran

ATHENS, Greece — Iran set tough new conditions for talks on freeing Western hostages held in Lebanon, and the nation's new spiritual leader said U.S-Iran relations would remain frozen as long as Washington continues to support Israel.

The remarks Monday by spiritual leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, reported by Tehran radio, appeared aimed at allaying hard-liners' fears that Iran may be heading toward rapprochement with Washington.

Khamenei, elected Iran's spiritual leader following Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeint's death June 3, was believed to support the pragmatist camp of newly elected President Akbar Hashemi-Rafsanjani, who 10 days ago offered to help solve the hostage crisis in Lebanon.

Last week Rafsanjani disclosed through aides that he would hold indirect negotiations with Washington through a third country, probably Pakistan, but made it clear his intentions were to secure the release of Iranian assets held in the United States since the late 1970s.

Khamenei's remarks apparently ruled out direct talks with the United States, but not indirect negotiations.

### Paper apologises to Japanese leader

TOKYO - Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu won a victory against Japan's recently emboldened scandal-sheet press when the newspaper that started a rumor he had fathered an illegitimate child retracted the claim with a full apology.

"We would like to make an apology to the party concerned for the troubles we caused by our inappropriate expressions on the report concerning Mr. Toshiki Kaifu," the Nagoya Times said in a front-page retraction Monday.

## Rep. Smith mourned

NEW AUGUSTA, Miss. — Shortly before first-term Congressman Larkin Smith took off on a fatal flight over south Mississippi, he discussed with a colleague the death of Rep. Mickey Leland in a plane crash in Africa.

Smith's plane "dropped off" the radar about five minutes after takeoff from Hattiesburg around 9:20 p.m. CDT Sunday, Officials said the weather was good at the time.

"I don't know what happened to the plane," Montgomery said. "There was not a cloud in the sky, it was clear as a bell."

Sheriff's deputies began searching at 10:15 p.m. and were joined by a helicopter from the Harrison County Sheriff's Department. Law enforcement agencies across southern Mississippi also joined the search, along with the Mississippi Civil Air Patrol and U.S. customs agents.

The White House expressed sympathy to Smith's wife and daughter through spokesman Mariin Fitzwater.

# Oregon set to start NFL lottery game

PORTLAND. Ore. - Oregon will officially begin a lottery game based on picking the winners in NFL football games Sept. 6, and state officials think it could be expanded to other sports.

"We've talked about (adding) other professional aports, but we'll see how this goes first," Lottery Director Jim Davey said during a press conference to introduce the new "Sports Action" game Monday.

"I am not philosophically opposed to betting on college sports," he added. Dr. Jim Heath, a professor of history and assistant

to the president at Portland State University, said while he's glad to accept revenue from the game, he would oppose any attempts to permit betting on

'We would prefer that the money come from a

different source." Heath said, "but we welcome the money.

Heath said he believed Oregonians would come out against any attempts to permit betting on collegiate

games. "It would be a flat bad idea to expand (betting) to college teams." Heath said. "The moral issue is a very real thing to a lot of people and I think there would be greater opposition to including college

games. Davey said he has been in contact with NFL officials, and was sending the league copies of its advertisements to show that Oregon was not intruding on the NFL's copyright or doing anything to tarnish the league's image.

"I don't think we're going to destroy the image they're trying to maintain." Davey said. "I can't see where we are infringing on any of the legal rights of the NFL.

# Smoking, birth control may make blood clots

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 30-year-old female and have been on birth-control pills since I was 18. I smoke a pack and a half to two packs of cigarettes per week. I'm concerned about all the reports regarding birth control and cancer. I would value your opinion.

**ACROSS** DEAR READER: If you have an annual gynecological exami-nation, including Pap smears, I 7 Most sec 13 Chicken don't believe you have to worry about developing a problem with cancer from birth-control pills. Current reports linking the pill

I'm more concerned about blood clots. Several studies have shown that smokers who take oral contraceptives have a much higher incidence of blood clots in the leg veins (thrombophicbitis). These clots can migrate to the lungs (pulmonary embolism). Because of this dangerous consequence, many gynecologists refuse to prescribe birth-control pills to women who smoke. I hink you ought to get off the cigarettes.

Many experts advise women to discontinue birth-control pills if the contraceptive has been taken for several years. They reason that it is prudent for a woman periodically to experience her own natural cycles, without the effects of the synthetic hormones, especially if she is cager to start a family in the future. You should ask your gynecologist about this. He or she may choose to stop prescribing the pill. Or the specialist might wish to change you to a lower dosage. In any case, I urge you to discuss this with your physician.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My sister has been diagnosed with Shy-Drager syndrome. We've been told there is no cure. Do you have any information on this apparently rare disease?

DEAR READER: Shy-Drager

syndrome is an exceedingly rare neurological ailment characterized by widespread nerve malfunction: tremors, difficulty walking, inappropriately low blood pressure when standing, incontinence, decreased sweating and breathing trouble.



West jumped pre-emptively to three hearts. Pre-emptive jump raises of overcalls are a way of making life miserable for the opposition. (To show a strong hand in support of partner, you must cue-bid an opponent's suit.) Although three hearts would not make. North bid three spades. South wisely passed. West led a low heart. Declarer won dummy's ace and played the queen of spades. West took the ace and switched to the 10 of clubs. He did not know his partner had only four hearts.

a second round of the suit. East played low and declarer won the king. Declarer played a spade to dummy's jack and then back to the spade king. He led the queen of diamonds, finessing. East took the king and placed the nine of hearts on the table. West could figure that one out. He overtook with the 10 and led another club to set the contract. Nothing is easy about this deal, but declarer would have succeeded at trick one by making a simple little play of ducking the opening lead. East would have to win the trick. He could not attack clubs. since he held the ace. West would come on lead only once, with the spade ace, to lead a club. That would not be enough. and the contract would make.
