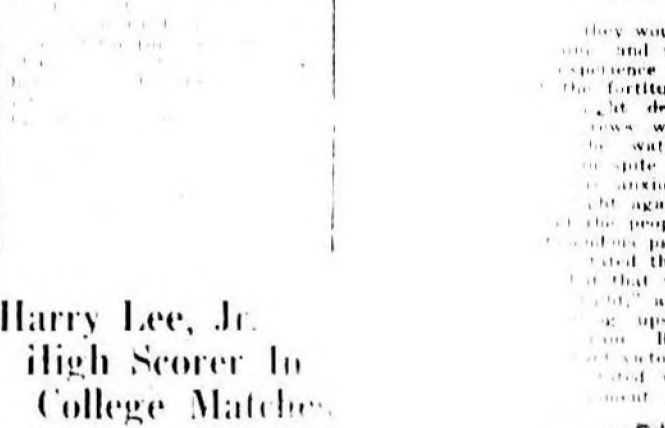

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### Streamlined Ball May Stop Curves That Irk Golfers

PORT WASHINGTON, N. Y. (AP)—The commercial possibilities of a no-slice, no-hook golf ball are being pondered by Frederic H. Atwood.

Like many great discoveries, this one sprang full-fledged, not from Atwood's brain, but from under the wheels of a mowing machine.

At least that's how Atwood supposes the golf ball he picked up last summer on the Toytown Tavern golf course near Winchendon, Mass., got streamlined. It was in fact very much the shape of a tear drop.

Just for fun Atwood teed off with it and, strange to relate, it flew straight as an arrow. Additional experiments showed that, as he would, the streamlined golf ball followed a bee-line. After trying it out to his own satisfaction, Atwood passed the ball along to John A. Hunt, a former golf professional at the club, now with the U. S. army air service. From discreet inquiries, Private Hunt uncovered the non-military secret that the tear shape was responsible for the direct flight.

Mr. Atwood points out that a player using such a ball for drives doubtless could get permission from fellow players to substitute a perfect spheroid on the putting greens. Of course,

Jake, a 22-year-old youngster from the Bronx, is champion of the world's two best welterweights, Harlem Ray Robinson and California Jackie Wilson. He's still young as a main bout attraction and may yet create a furor among the 160-pounders.

Even though he picked on a guy 16-pounds lighter, it was quite a flower in his bonnet when Jake snapped the 40-straight triumph Sugar Robinson had strung together. It won't hurt LaMotta's gate appeal to be known as the conqueror of the sensational

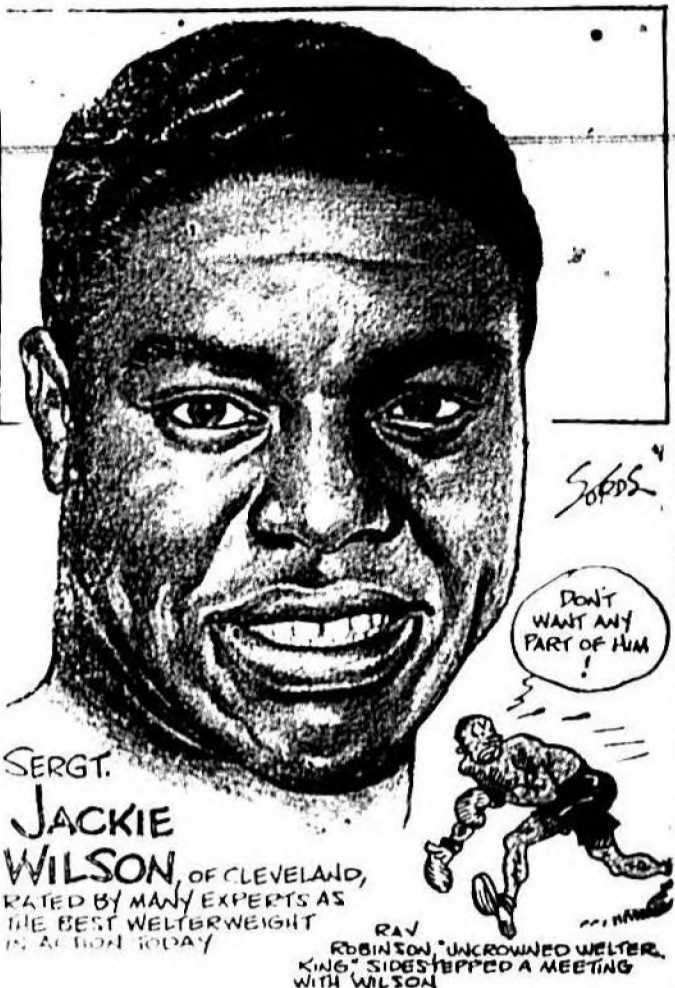
under tournament rules the ball could not be changed without penalty.

Robinson. He'll soon have new opportunities to show what he can do with fellows his own size.

Jake has what the Hoak Boulevard gentry call eccentric training ideas. He likes to go 30 rounds a night. That is, he shadow boxes 10 rounds, and then shadow boxes another 10. The reason, he says, is to wind himself up and then to unwind. Furthermore, while most fighters take their gym workouts in early afternoon, Jake prefers the evening. His fights are at night and he figures he should do his practicing then, too.

La Motta lost and then fought a draw with Jess Barcott, beat Jimmy Edgar, Charles Hayes and Vic Delicourt before upsetting the Sugar.

Jake isn't much to look at. He's far from shakes as a boxer or a puncher. He's more of a mauler, an aggressive guy with lots of stamina who takes a punch well, and keeps boring in. He sort of discourages and wears down the other fellow.

Just as an example of what a few pounds can do, LaMotta, at 127, lost to Robinson last October. But at 161, his normal weight, Jake whipped Ray, And, at about the same weight, he beat Wilson. Jackie, it develops, wasn't at his best for the fight because the Mitchell Field army sergeant took the scrap on rather short notice and only got in a couple of days of gym work. His admirers say that and giving away too much weight, accounted for his poor showing against LaMotta.

Without taking anything away from the world champion, one Freddie Cochrane, now in military service, most observers agree that Robinson and Wilson are the two best welterweights and that either could take Freddie. So the 10-rounder matching them here on Feb. 19 is in effect a world championship without a title at stake.

The fact that Robinson can and has been beaten probably will boost Jackie's stock. And it remains to be seen what effect, if any, his first defeat will have on Robinson.

### Tall Gobs Find It Easy To Drop Ball Down Into Basket

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. Feb. 23. (AP)—The Comets of Corpus Christi Naval Air Station—The University of the Air—can't surprise their grins these days as the University of Texas leads the way down the Southwest Conference basketball stretch.

If Texas—or any other conference team for that matter—wins the championship it will be something of an empty honor as far as the Comets are concerned.

Corpus Christi Naval Air Station has one of the hottest cage teams seen in this section in a long time. There's no use wasting time passing the ball. The tall fellows—they average 6 feet 4—just flip it around to each other with their finger tips. Nobody has been able thus far to do anything about it.

The Comets have won 12 straight games, averaging 57.4 points, and included in the string are seven victories over Southwest Conference outfits. The NAS boys have beaten Texas twice, Rice three times, Texas A. and M. once and Texas Christian once. They haven't played Arkansas yet. Southern Methodist and don't meet Baylor until Feb. 19, but Rice defeated Arkansas, Texas beat Baylor, and have been beaten by about everybody. So you can see that Corpus Christi Naval Air Station already is uncrowned champion of the Southwest.

They've played only three close games, beating Texas by five points and Rice by five and three respectively. The other games have been easy as the Comets scored from 45 to 86 points.

But there really is no reason why the Comets shouldn't be good. Just take the starting five. Before this year they had played in approximately 750 games, mostly at colleges and universities over the country.

Leading the scoring parade this season is tall Bob Kinney, all-conference star at Rice last year. Kinney has hit the bucket for 210 points, which is more than 17 per game. Bob is the tallest man on the team—6 feet 8 and a half inches. He has scored 138 points.

When Lieut. Jack Gray, former University of Texas coach, looked over his prospects before the season started he said:

"Things just can't be that good. It isn't possible to find a group of basketball players in a few weeks with so much experience and the ability to operate as a team."

Well, the bluejackets have made quite a believer out of Jack, to his pleasure and to the discomfort of NAB foes.

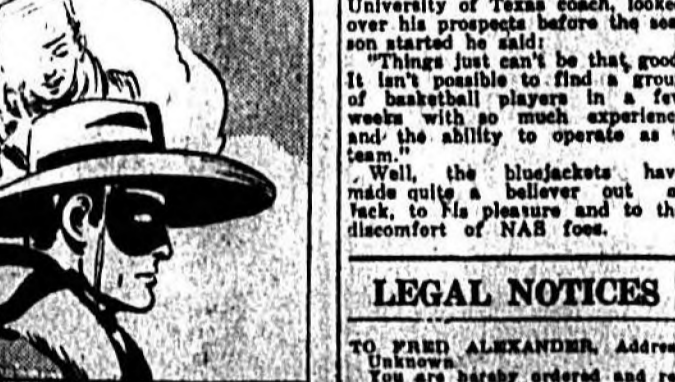

## Reds Capture Three More Ukraine Towns

### 600 Germans Killed In Taking Of Number Of Villages North Of Kursk

(By Associated Press)  
The Russians today smashed deeper into the northern Ukraine northwest of Kharkov where the capture of Sumy, Lebedin and Akhtyrka fashioned a bulge aimed at Kiev and the rail junction of Konotop. Despite spring thaws, the drive proceeded with the capture of more strongly fortified settlements.  
A water barrier was forced and about 600 Germans were killed in the capture of a number of towns north of Kursk, where the Russians had driven to within 40 miles of Orel. In other sectors the Red army also was actively pressing the campaign although the German high command claimed four drives were frustrated and 10,000 Russians were killed north of Orel.  
The triumphant Red army, spurred by Premier Stalin's praise and exhortation to drive the Germans from Russia, marked its 25th anniversary yesterday by accelerating its smash westward through the Ukraine, recapturing three important Nazi strongpoints along the route leading from Kharkov to Kiev.  
Answering Stalin's order to give the invaders no respite, the "army of avengers," as he termed them, marched into Sumy, 100 miles north of Kharkov, Akhtyrka, 48 miles to the south, and Lebedin, about half way between them and 20 miles farther west.  
Lebedin, less than 175 miles east of Kiev, and the capture of the three towns, announced in a special communique broadcast by the Soviet radio here by the Soviet Minister marked advances of from 20 to 40 miles in the Red offensive.  
The special bulletin also announced the capture of the town of Krasnodar, 100 miles north of Kharkov, on the main Kursk-Orel railway 40 miles south of Orel, in an operation some distance to the rear of the advance.  
The Germans have continued to hold Orel despite the fall of Kursk, Kharkov and other points in their defensive lines, and despite the fact that the Russians have closed in from three sides and stand only a little more than a score of miles away.  
Sumy, a provincial capital, lies 75 miles east and slightly south of Konotop and on a railway that stretches through the town to the west from Moscow. It is a strategic point in that region.  
Violent fighting continued on the southern front, with Red army troops advancing west of Rostov and southeast of Voronezh, and beating off "fierce enemy counterattacks" in the Krassnodar area in the midnight communique.  
Without naming them, this war bulletin said one Soviet unit captured a fortified position in the hands-to-hand fighting in the west from Moscow, killing 200 Germans, and that other Russian units drove into several populated places southwest of Sumy, where they met enemy resistance was overcome in that sector, and 100 Germans killed, the war bulletin said.
