2 Dope Charges Facing Teacher

Direct information on the 26-year-old Winter Park Junior High School teacher, Mrs. Rose Anderson, was filed Wednesday in Circuit Court. The attractive blonde physical education instructor was charged with possession of a narcotic drug and with possession of a hallucinogenic.

Mrs. Anderson was bound over from County Court to Circuit Court.

Her arraignment (at which time her plea of guilty or not guilty to the charge will be placed) is set for 9 a.m. Sept. 30 in Seminole County Circuit Court.

Meanwhile, she is free on \$5,000 bail.

The information, filed by State Attorney Abbott Herring, charges that Mrs. Anderson did, in the vicinity of 224 Carriage Hill Drive, Cassaberry, knowingly and unlawfully have in her possession and control cannabis (hashish), contrary to Florida law.

Count two of the information states that she also had in her possession the hallucinogenic mescaline.

Mrs. Anderson was arrested by the Cassaberry police on Sept. 16. A cache of 500 mescaline tablets and a quantity of marijuana and hashish, valued at over \$2,000, was reportedly found in her possession.

The Orange County teacher has since resigned her teaching position.

Criminal Calendar Explained

Seminole Unlike Orange

Seminole County has not dismissed criminal charges against accused persons who are not brought to trial within the state required three terms of court.

This was revealed to The Herald today by State Attorney Abbott Herring when questioned concerning the situation in Orange County, where five persons have been released of criminal charges in the past four days for failure of that judicial system to prosecute the charges in court within three terms of criminal court.

Herring, who is also Broward County state attorney, along with Seminole, said he knew of no cases being dismissed in the Seminole courts as a result of not trying the case.

Thomas Speer, assistant state attorney, spoke up to explain the situation in Orange. It is different than Seminole since terms of court there are much shorter than here. "A court term in Seminole County lasts for six months and this would mean that persons asking for a speedy trial must wait 18 months before their cases would be dismissed in accordance with the law," Speer disclosed.

The length of court terms in Orange is from 30-60 days and that means that persons asking for a speedy trial must wait 18 months from five to six terms of court in Orange to one in Seminole, it was revealed.

2 Dope Charges Facing Teacher

Stupid . . . absolutely stupid.

The only sensible remark made was "the kid belongs in school, not in jail."

Dig deep enough, and you're bound to come up with some dirt . . . which brings us around to one of our favorite subjects—the up-coming Clay fight in Atlanta.

You'd wonder why the Georgia legislators wouldn't sound off . . . there was a time when similar muscle was proposed for Tampa, and you know what public indignation did to that idea.

Well, Georgia State Senator Leroy Johnson is HELPING PROMOTE THE FIGHT . . . seems like the gentleman owns a little piece of the action and is a stockholder in House of Sports, Inc., promoters of the fight.

What can you do? Send a telegram—one to the Mayor of Atlanta and the other to Gov. Lester Maddox. Incidentally, we got as far as the governor's press aide to let our ideas known to him on this subject, and did get a promise that Maddox would return our call.

Contract Calls For \$3.9 Million

Courthouse Pact Signed

County Commission Chairman John Alexander yesterday signed a contract in the amount of \$3,900,000 for construction of the new courthouse by Greenhut Construction Company, Pensacola. The contract deletes \$224,000 from the original bid for construction of jail facilities.

The commission had inserted a proviso into the contract that a starting date be given up until Dec. 1, 1970, otherwise the contract is void. In the event that the contract is null and void, a stipulation was made that preliminary costs or expenses incurred by the contractor prior to the start order were reimbursed in an amount not to exceed \$30,000.

The \$2.9 million bond issue cannot be placed upon the market until the Florida Supreme Court ruling of Sept. 16, which affirmed a June 12 ruling of the Seminole County Circuit Court which authorized sale of the certificates, is final. There is a 15-day period from the date of the ruling in which a petition for a rehearing may be filed. Such a petition was filed yesterday by Harlan Tuck.

Fire Dept. Urged For Fern Park

"There are too many residential buildings in Fern Park who are without fire protection and it's time something is done about it." These are the words of Andrew B. Kelly, who is organizing a volunteer fire department for the Fern Park area.

"Business at any and all levels, investments, income, personal belongings and on occasion life. The purpose and mission of any fire department is to prevent, contain and extinguish a fire when it strikes regardless of day or time but its ultimate responsibility is to save lives and property at all costs."

"Nothing can cause greater horror than to experience a fire . . . you'll help but then find it . . . not coming; this can be expected in many unprotected areas of Seminole County but we hope no longer hear this cry in Fern Park," Kelly said.

"We are starting with absolutely nothing in the way of equipment, pumps, first aid gear or fire house. At the present time we have seven volunteers and are looking for more men willing to serve the community."

Kelly said he cannot at this point say when the department will be ready to answer fire calls, but he hopes to be operational by the first of the year.

A meeting with the fire chiefs of the adjoining fire departments of Altamonte Springs and Seminole-Goldenrod was conducted last week and the chief officers expressed concern for the need of a fire department in the unprotected area of Fern Park to combat fires and provide adequate safety and protection for its citizens.

Kelly says he will start a fund raising campaign to purchase firefighting tools and equipment and will evaluate the area to strategically locate the fire station. In the meantime, all correspondence should be directed to Kelly in care of the Fern Park Fire Department (Proposed), Post Office Box 647, Fern Park.

Your articles in The Herald have been very magnificent and thought-provoking. I would like to extend my sincere congratulations to you for the splendid editorial entitled "Patrolism is Pass" on Sept. 18.

It was a perfect duplication of my sentiments. The loss of prayers, disrespect for the flag, and indifference to development of patriotism for our country, disrespect for teachers as well as parents, lying, subterfuge, and stealing are all conducive to present-day riots, instability of character and moral lawlessness.


During my period of high school teaching, discipline was a prime requisite. Also, between and in classes, unnecessary noise, loud talking or yelling in the halls was punishable by the principal. The pandemonium in today's schools and waiting outdoors during free periods was nonexistent.

After serious thought, may I propose a solution to some of these problems.

1. Build more and smaller schools in every section or district of a county. Leave off the frills, stress the necessary noise, loud talking or yelling in the halls by omitting or not needing being.
2. Require all parents to take a course in raising children before they are five years old preferably starting at age one.
3. If schools get too small, have girls attend mornings, boys in afternoons.

No much stress is placed today on teachers keeping up-to-date with modern math, science, etc. Far much prefer teachers raised in the old system with strict discipline. Old fashioned math, history, etc., than the majority produced today. Children are taught high school material before their minds are mature enough. Thanks for listening.

Following this meeting in The Herald over reported lack of enough books for the burgeoning school population at Crooms High, a Sanford ninth grade facility, Angel indicated he personally would look into the report that there is shortage of science, algebra and music accessories books at the former black facility that now is predominantly white, according to the 90-10 white majority county racial composition.

Crooms inherited the ninth grade after the School Board decided to put in middle schools at the former county junior high institutions with sixth-eighth grades, thereby moving


Until the School Board leased the stadium from the city starting this year, the cost of providing paid law enforcers

Allen Attends Assessor Convention

Seminole County Tax Assessor Guy Allen last week attended the 47th Annual Convention for Florida Tax Assessors. Held in Fort Lauderdale, the convention was attended by 50 of the state's 67 tax assessors and selected members of their staffs. As a 500 prize, awarded at 9 a.m. on the first day of the convention Monday, Sept. 21, Allen won a free trip to Nassau on the S.S. Bahamas Star. "Put I intend to give that trip to some person in my office," said Allen. The three day convention featured guest speakers Richard Pettigrew, House Speaker and legislative committee chairman; Don Reed and Warren Henderson. They also heard an address by John Westberry, the Director of Personal Property Division with the Department of Revenue in Tallahassee. Kenneth Mackay Jr., a member of the House Ad Valorem Taxation Committee discussed the Full Value versus Assessment Ratio; Study which is now being conducted by the office of the Auditor General. He warned the assessors of suspension or removal from office if the tax rolls were not at 100 per cent assessed at the completion of the 1971 rolls. Warned Allen: "With the current trend towards complete data on all assessing level, by local people, and completely taken over by the State. Cancer Victim Treatment Will Be Remote Control

By JOHN PHILIP SOUSA Associated Press Writer SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) - Cancer victims now will be treated by a revolutionary system that shoots radium into patients by remote control. Dr. Carl F. von Eszen says he and associates at the University of California developed the system to overcome one of radiotherapy's toughest problems - getting radiation to a cancerous area without destroying intervening tissue. "The instrument shoots small beads of radioactive cobalt into patients through thin metal or plastic tubes," he said Wednesday in an interview. "The beads are moved through the tubing and positioned at the cancer site by a series of cables operated by remote control." Development of the system took three years and was done in collaboration with Atomic Energy of Canada, Ltd., said von Eszen, professor of radiology and director of the division of radiotherapy at the University of California San Diego Medical School. "The entire treatment takes only a few minutes," he said, "and it can be done on an outpatient basis." The machine, covered with lead to protect the patient and the operator, has three tubes which are inserted in body cavities such as the mouth, rectum and urinary tract, von Eszen said.



Final Hours Before Five Deaths

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) - The bright and penetrating early morning sun seemed to be the perfect setting for a day in which Mary Anne Reinisch had so many associates. There was a promotion in the office. She lapsed from the breakfast table as her parents and young sister watched her race into the womanly fury of last minute preparations for work. It was 7:30 a.m. Wednesday. One hour later, Mary Anne and three other girls lay dead from a gunman's bullets in a state office building where they worked. Their assailant was dead also. While Mary Anne, 27, was putting the finishing touches on her hair and makeup, Linda Willis, 10 miles away in suburban Waterford, jumped into the family automobile with her mother, Mrs. Mary Willis. The two crossed the Mohawk River, turned south and headed toward Albany and the complex of modern state office buildings where both were employed. Patty Chronik, 22, arose late and shortly after 7:30 a.m. was seated at the breakfast table with her family. The one-story brick house is within walking distance of the office complex. Patty drove her own car to work. A few minutes before the other three set out for work, Sandy Peters, 24, a bride of three months, was whisking along the New York State Thruway heading toward Albany. All four girls came from middle-class homes in quiet residential sections. The homes were well-kept, the lawns well maintained. Mrs. Reinisch had worked in the state unemployment office since 1960. Sandy Peters had been a senior stenographer for the state Labor Department since 1968. Miss Chronik began with the Labor Department as a stenographer in 1965 and Miss Willis had been a typist for the department since 1964. Wednesday morning, Mary Anne was to meet her new boss and satisfy a dream one of her coworkers said she had talked about for many months - becoming a senior stenographer and sitting at one man's desk. The fifth character in the grisly scenario was the man who police say took the lives of the four girls, then turned his hunting rifle on himself. State Opens Bids For Four Road Jobs

Macasphalt Corporation, of Lakeland, was low bidder for contracts to improve four Seminole County roadways at an estimated cost of \$640,000 when the State Department of Transportation opened bids at Tallahassee, it was reported this morning by Associated Press. AF "unbunched" individual road bids for three counties into one lump sum. Macasphalt has a local plant on SR 419 near Five Points.

C. A. (Bill) Benedict, DOT district engineer at DeLand told The Herald this morning that the state department probably will let the contracts within six weeks, with actual construction to commence shortly thereafter.

AF followed DOT's technical language style in its report, but it was "translated" for The Herald by William Bush, Seminole County engineer. The roadways, type of project, distance and DOT's estimated cost are:

State Road 46 from Melroseville Avenue in Sanford east to the Volusia County line (Lake Barney bridge), resurface, 14.5 miles, \$200,000.

State Road 426 from SR 520 in Oviedo to SR 46 at Geneva, straighten, widen and resurface, 6.8 miles, \$297,000.

State Road 46A from County Club Road to Old Lake Mary Road in Sanford, resurface, 0.7 mile, \$25,000.

State Road 427A (27th Street) from U. S. 17-92 to Sanford Avenue (Oviedo Road) from Sanford Ave. to one mile east of Seaward Coast Line Railroad, 1.1 miles, \$18,000.

Increase Request Pondered

A public hearing upon a requested rate increase by Central Florida Utilities which was continued from Sept. 6, was conducted yesterday by the Board of County Commissioners.

The company, which services 388 customers in the south Seminole area, had requested an increase of from \$2.50 to \$3.30 upon the first 4,000 gallons of water and 30 cents per 1,000 gallons above the 4,000 gallon minimum.


George Stewart, President of the company, told the board that since Southern Gulf Utilities and the City of Sanford are requesting more money that his firm "did not want to be penalized."

Commission Chairman John Alexander shot back that some companies may "be collecting less." He went on to say that the board was amenable to businesses receiving a fair return for their investments, but that when spending of funds was excessive, the board had the authority to reduce rates. Under new laws, the county has the authority to regulate private water and sewer companies outside of municipalities.

Alexander went on to question what was a fair and reasonable amount for administrative salaries. Alexander said that he considered the family owned company salaries "excessive" as far as the rate structure is concerned. President George Stewart receives a salary of \$17,000; vice president Florence Stewart receives \$9,000; and general manager David Stewart \$10,000.

Stewart told the board that the increase would effect a gross income to the company of \$33,700, as opposed to the present \$27,000.

County Attorney Harold Jimson said the board that it had 33 days from the close of the hearing to render a formal decision, at which time the board must give a written statement (Continued on Pg. 6A, Col. 4)

High Rise Okayed; Funding Is Delayed

By BILL SCOTT

U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has approved the feasibility in Sanford of a \$2 million skyscraper for the elderly but there is a hold-up over the actual funding of the project.

This was confirmed today by George Allen, press secretary for U. S. Rep. William Chappell, who telephoned that HUD had approved Bram Towers but, since President Richard M. Nixon had vetoed the HUD appropriation bill, the money for the project had been held up until the next congressional session.

That session, expected after the Oct. 16 to Nov. 10 recess will include a new appropriation bill for HUD, which will fund the elderly housing project.

Allen explained that HUD's action in approving the feasibility means the project has been approved but there are no funds to go ahead with construction of the complex, to be located on First Street, between Cypress and Pine Avenues.

An option on this site will run out on Dec. 15, according to Allen, and it is hoped the HUD money bill has been approved by Congress in time to avert any problems.

John Krider, Bram Towers executive committee chairman, stated that HUD had promised to avert any difficulty over the option in the event Congress had not appropriated funds at the Dec. 15 deadline.

Composed of 14 stories, the complex will house efficiencies and one-bedroom apartments to be inhabited by single persons 62 years of age or over or married couples with at least one being over 62 years of age.

There will be 64 one-bedroom and 37 efficiency units with wall to wall carpeting, drapes, kitchen ranges, frost-free refrigerators and garbage disposal.

Rental prices are expected to start at \$75 monthly for efficiencies and increase to \$100 monthly for one-bedroom units. Maximum income limitations for occupancy is \$4,200 a year for single persons and \$4,800 a year for married couples.
