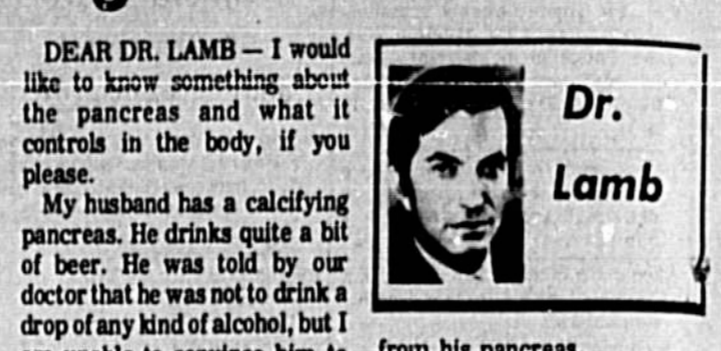

Pancreas Helps Digest Food



DEAR DR. LAMB—I would like to know something about the pancreas and what it controls in the body, if you please. My husband has a calcifying pancreas. He drinks quite a bit of beer. He was told by your doctor that he was not to drink a drop of any kind of alcohol, but I am unable to convince him to stop. I am embarrassed to say that he has loose bowels (very loose). He weighs 140 pounds and is 6 foot tall. He is extremely nervous. I have talked to him nicely and I have scolded him and nothing helps. I told him that I would write to you for information on the hazards involved. DEAR READER—The pancreas is an important organ in our ability to digest food. It is located just below the stomach and attached to the first part of the small intestine. It is from four to six inches long. The gland in animals is often used for sweeteners. There are two parts of the gland, the tissues that form pancreatic juice (we form from one to three quarts a day) and the small ducts of Langerhans, called throughout the pancreas that form insulin. The pancreatic juice drains into the small intestine through a tube that is joined to the common bile duct. The bile and pancreatic juice mix together with the partially digested food from the stomach. The pancreatic juice contains the enzymes that accomplish most of the breakdown of starch from various carbohydrate foods. It also contains the enzymes that break down fat. So, most of the food we eat must be acted upon by enzymes from the pancreas before it can even be absorbed to us any good. Failure to break down food, particularly the fat, leads to diarrhea and large foul-smelling stools. Part of your husband's problem here may be

There's a saying EARlings—that politics makes strange bedfellows. And that was never truer than over in Langwood recently when the council refused to refund a \$25 bond to newly elected councilman Stephen Barton. Seems Barton had workers leave up a few signs at crucial locations to say "thank you" to citizens who voted him into office. But the signs exceeded the city-imposed deadline, and officials refused to return the \$25 bond—even though Barton cried foul.

Some County planning chiefs, The Ear has learned, fear the controversy over the car lot scheduled for construction on U.S. 17-92 near Spring Hammock could strain relations between planners and county commissioners. After all, it's not the easiest job in the world for planners to sell the commission a comprehensive land plan while commissioners and planners are at odds over what effect the dealership might have on the environment at the hammock. County Planner Bill Kercher, however, reports that planners will stay out of the hammock controversy from now on—unless the county commission requests additional information.

One minute of blissful silence will now be observed at Longwood council meetings, which is pleasing to The Ear. It replaced the customary prayer after Councilman Lawrence Goldberg complained about prayers offered in "Jesus" name. Goldberg may have done more of a service than he realized. One veteran Longwood observer said the moment of silence will be "the most blissful part of the evening."

Keys, or key rings? That is the question, EARlings. Democratic Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski quipped recently that elected officials now may request courthouse Key Rings from Democratic commissioners. The issue centers on Republican Commissioner John Kimbrough's steadfast refusal to release any courthouse keys requested by elective officials—other than commissioners. Circuit Court Clerk Art Beckwith Jr. has been hopping mad, as have others, since locks on courthouse doors were changed last June. "If they (officials) want keys, they'll have to see the Democratic commissioners." "But if it's Key Rings they want, they can come see the Democrats."

For awhile last Thursday, The Ear wondered who was planting what. Both Commissioner Bill Kirchoff and Bob French showed up at tree-planting ceremonies at the courthouse in Sanford. Just prior to the digging, though, Kirchoff told a county planner he planned to plant French, instead of the tree. Topping it off, Kirchoff said he planned to plant the amiable Democrat in a "square hole." Following the ceremony, however, French managed to get the last word. "He (Kirchoff) stood off to one side and told me how to handle the shovel. . . . Republicans do that, you know. . . ."

The Ear slipped into Circuit Judge Robert B. McGregor's Sanford courtroom to hear jury selection in an armed robbery trial. Lawyers quizzed each prospective jury member about any firearms they owned. One little lady was "loaded for attorney" when she was asked the question. She rattled off this answer: "I have a .38-caliber police special revolver that's wrapped in a chamois, inside a zipper bank bag, in a shoebox, behind a blanket, on the top shelf of a closet in my back bedroom. President Carter's unconditional pardon to all Vietnam draft evaders didn't go over too well with Sanfordites interviewed around town Friday. Nine out of 10 interviewed by The Herald opposed the President's action. Not surprisingly, past Commander Jim Ripley of American Legion Post No. 53, said, "I don't think he ever should have done it. Those (draft evaders) should have gone into the Army the same as I did."

Junior Ronny Ryan favored "some kind of a pardon," but felt "he shouldn't have made it a blanket pardon. He should have considered them more individually." At Sanford Plaza, J.H. Messer said, "I wouldn't have done it. It's not good for the country. It might set a precedent for future wars."

A tall blonde woman was asked to comment on draft evaders. "I don't think I better," she answered. "I've got too many friends who did that." She didn't elaborate. Only Richard Prescott thought the pardon was "a good idea. It's time we buried the hatchet," he said. "The war's over."

4 Fern Park Stores Hit By Burglars

The burglary of four businesses in Fern Park and an attempt to burglarize another on Oxford Road in Fern Park was being investigated today. Sheriff's reports indicate that the businesses involved in the Fern Park burglaries were the Flower Basket, Shirley's Closet, the Golden Bath Shoppe, and Betty Lee's Styling Salon. The burglars also attempted to enter Better Than Pants in the same complex, but were stymied by a brick wall. A hammer and a tan coat reportedly were abandoned by the frustrated burglars. According to Dep. Randy Pittman, the burglars entered the Flower Basket, then chopped a hole into the rear interior wall of Shirley's Closet. They left that store by chopping another hole in the wall, entering the Golden Bath Shoppe. The yeggs also gained entry to Betty Lee's Styling Salon, and tried to chop a hole through the Better Than Pants store, but were brought up short by a brick wall. Dep. Pittman reported that some of the stores were ransacked, soft-drink machines and cash registers broken into, and a color television set taken. Total value of missing cash and other items was still undetermined when Pittman made his report.

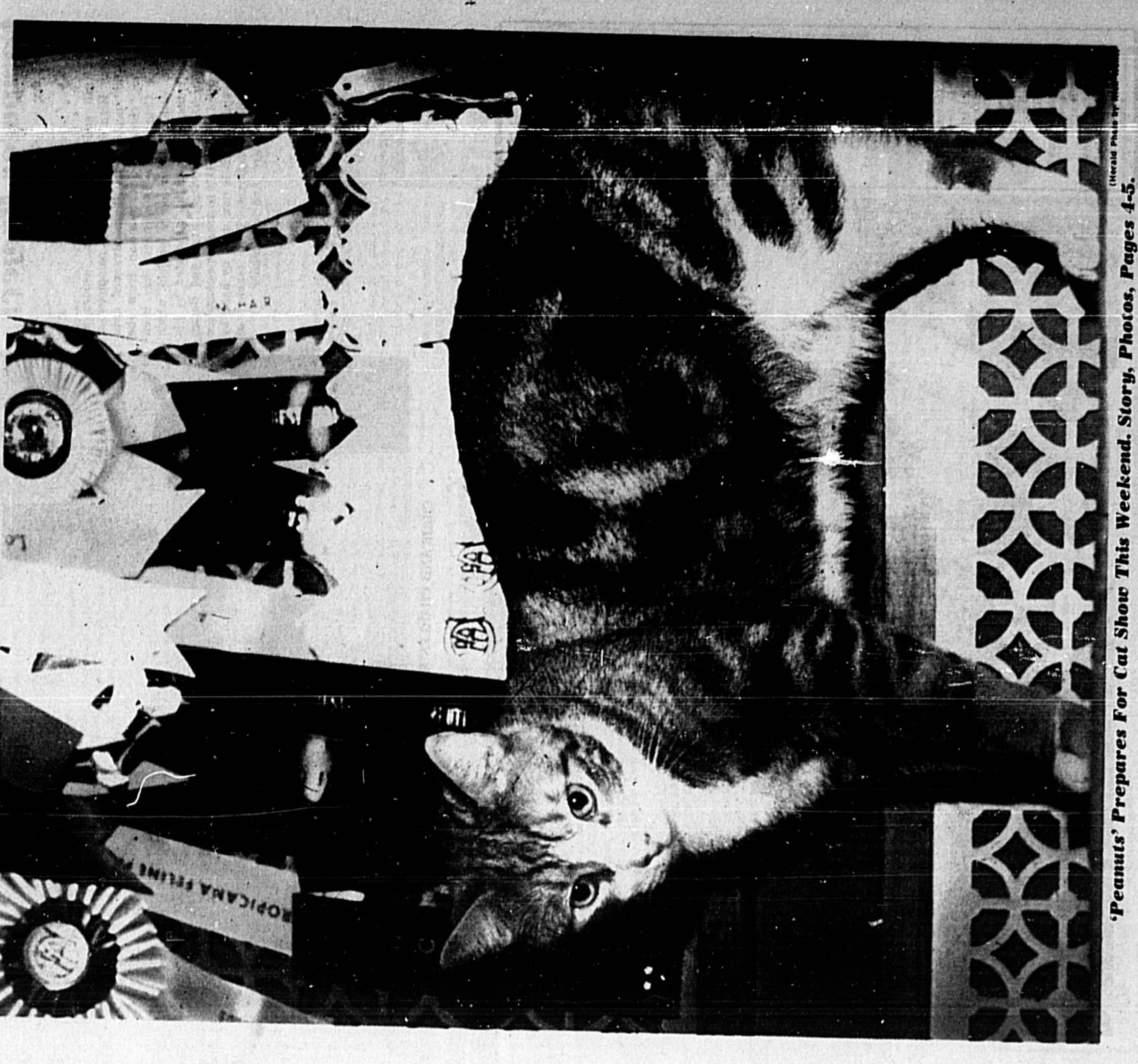
