

**DEPOSIT BOXES OF ROTHSTEIN REVEAL CLUES**

Parting Information Leads Toward Opium Ring Theories Which Have Been Alleged

Certificates of Stock Also Found

Will Disclose Fact That Gambler Made Lover Beneficiary

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(INS)—Vital clues, unearthed in the first of Arnold Rothstein's safety deposit vaults to be forced open, today were being followed doggedly by investigators trying to solve his murder, his alleged implication in an international opium ring and his supposed connection with the \$5,000,000 Nicky Arnstein bond role.

Assistant U. S. Attorney Blake's search of Rothstein's box had yielded up start leads toward the opium ring, stock certificates with a value of \$2,000,000 were found in the gambler's various real estate enterprises, most of which had been mortgaged. There were about 12 pieces of jewelry, with an estimated value of \$10,000. There were two insurance policies, one for \$25,000 named the widow, Mrs. Carolyn Rothstein, beneficiary, the other, for \$20,000, beneficiary, to his family. The policy had been changed to name Mrs. Norton, his ex-girlfriend, beneficiary.

This is the first disclosure that the widow's love rival had been mentioned by Rothstein other than in his death will which he made with a struggling wife.

The search of Rothstein's box was started for a 100,000 trust fund for 10 years, about one-half the sum the law was willing for.

Several grocery stores, which have joined The Herald in bringing the cooking school to Sanford, will give away baskets of groceries while the Florida Power and Light Company will make awards of electrical cooking devices and other handy articles for the housewife.

The cooking school is carried on the lecture plan. A model kitchen will be built on the stage and will be equipped electrically. Miss Howard will follow a fixed program each day preparing and cooking various dishes and lecturing as she works. She will explain each step as it is taken and will cook the food correctly while her audience watches. Recipes for each article she makes will be supplied to those who attend.

The daily lunches in cooking, the simple way in which to prepare a difficult dish, the proper food to serve on certain occasions, all will be set forth by Miss Howard. Baking and desserts will be emphasized, and cakes, pies and meats will be included. For her

True to tradition, many traders in stocks in the final session, rather than carry them over the week-end with its uncertainties, they gave an irregular appearance to a portion of the market. Sales during the first hour were 1,264,000 indicating that the total turnover for the two hour session would be around 2,500,000 shares.

**Abuses Seen In Present Measure**

Norris Says Plan Will Be First Thing Considered On Meeting

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—(INS)—The pledge of both major parties, during the campaign just ended, to curb the use of federal injunctions in labor disputes, will be tested as soon as Congress meets, it was learned today.

A new anti-injunction bill already has been drafted by a Senate Judiciary subcommittee, definitely prohibiting use of federal injunctions to break strikes, to prevent meetings of strikers or to prevent workers from going on strike. The bill was drawn by Senators George W. Norris (R) of Nebraska, John J. Blaine (R) of Wisconsin, and Thomas J. Walsh (D) of Montana.

The Senate Judiciary Committee will be asked to act upon the bill as soon as the Senate meets, Norris announced, and an effort will be made to secure its enactment by Congress at the short session.

The measure has the endorsement of the American Federation of Labor and many progressive organizations.

"Our subcommittee has drawn an anti-injunction bill," Norris said, "it will be the first thing considered by the Senate Judiciary Committee. Both parties have agreed that there has been an abuse of the use of injunctions in labor disputes by the federal courts but neither platform recommends any specific remedy.

This bill should not be opposed by either major party but I realize that their pledges for curbing the abuse does not mean they will support our bill. Neither Mr. Hoover nor Governor Smith approved our measure but on the other hand, neither has opposed it. I am hopeful therefore that the measure will be enacted at the short session."

**Investment Trust Of Huge Resources Will Be Organized**

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(INS)—A huge investment trust—perhaps the largest in the world—is about to be organized by a group of leading investors and industrialists, according to an apparently authentic report circulated in the financial district today.

Upwards of \$500,000,000 of security holdings will be concentrated in the trust at the outset, it was said. The Fisher Brothers of Detroit were credited with being active in the formation of the organization, details of which are expected to be announced in the near future. Negotiations are reported to have been under way for some time either with the Bankers Trust Company in connection with the incidental financing.

Large blocks of stock in various companies, with various members of the group, have invested heavily, it was put into the new company, including both preferred and common stocks in numerous companies.

Eventually the new company will be expanded, according to the report, and the organization is expected to come day by day as a book of \$1,000,000,000.

New Anti-Injunction Bill Has Been Drafted By Senate Group For Coming Session

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**Commission Boosts Total With Appropriation Of \$2,000**

Combine To Smack Of International Consequences Reported

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(INS)—A tremendous steel producing combine, smacking of international proportions, was reported to be in the making today.

According to apparently well founded information in Wall Street the Republic Iron & Steel Corporation will join three prominent steel companies previously consolidated under a corporation with assets of more than \$250,000,000.

The Atlas Steel Corporation has been acquired by the Ludlum Steel Company as the first step. Reports say further that when their firms have completed details incident to merging they will be taken in by the Central Alloy Steel Corporation, which in turn probably will be absorbed by the Republic Iron & Steel Corporation.

Last April the Republic Iron & Steel Corporation, with \$170,000,000 assets, took over Trumbull Steel Corporation, which specializes in high grade steels and controls 50 per cent of the country's alloy steel business and has assets in excess of \$7,000,000.

Last October Dr. Rudolph Preussing and Heinrich Arns, representatives of the Krupp Steel Works of Germany, announced that pooling arrangements covering various kinds of alloy steel had been made between the German concern and the Ludlum Steel Company. Other companies included in the arrangements were the Central Alloy Steel Corporation and the First Sterling Steel Company.

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**Thirty New Members Join County Agricultural Club At Meeting Friday Night**

Fred Dorner Urges Greater Participation In Club Affairs; Hundhausen Talks To Members On Growing German Moss

The newly formed Seminole Agricultural Club received added impetus last night with the addition of 30 new members. The occasion was the last of a series of farm talks that have been staged in recent weeks under the auspices of the agricultural department of the Seminole High School.

Fred Dorner, president of the club, speaking during the round-table discussion, urged that the club be pushed forward to fill a needed place in the agricultural life of the community. He asked every member to get new members and declared the organization should have several hundred active participants to be a success. He stated that the club had been formed purely for educational purposes.

The organizers propose to hold a meeting once a month at which time some speaker, an expert in his particular field, will be invited to address the club. A round-table discussion will follow each lecture, each member being asked to express his views and give the benefit of his experiences.

H. Hundhausen, a representative of the U. S. Export Company, gave a short talk before the club. He reviewed the production of German post moss, expressed the belief that local soil might be adapted to its growth, and urged that local growers experiment with the crop.

Following Mr. Hundhausen's talk, the experimental work of Foster in the celery delta was considered, the discussion being led by Alex R. Johnson, head of the agricultural department of the high school. The work covered a period of four years from 1923 through 1927. The members manifested a keen interest in the subject and this part of the program was declared to have been especially enjoyed.

Amount of fertilizer per acre for one production of celery were first taken up and then followed discussions of the best formula to use, amounts of nitrate of soda to be used as top dressing, sources of nitrogen, potash and phosphorus in the formula. The results of the lengthy experiments conducted by Foster also came in for a careful study.

Before the meeting closed, a vote of appreciation was extended by the farmers to the agricultural department for furnishing experts who have recently spoken before the club.

Series Of Conferences And Football Game Will Occupy Time Of Herb Before Leaving Maryland Will Sail Tomorrow

PALO ALTO, Cal., Nov. 17.—(INS)—President-elect Hoover divided his last business day at home between a series of conferences with California Republican leaders and the great stadium football game at Stanford University.

After three busy hours in his study, clearing his desk of the myriad matters requiring his personal attention before his departure tomorrow night for San Pedro, the first leg of his Latin-American goodwill tour, Mr. Hoover will motor with his family and secret service escort to Stanford Stadium to watch the annual clash of the Cardinal warriors with the squad of the University of Washington. It was the President-elect's second successive Saturday afternoon at the stadium in which he delivered his speech of acceptance before some 80,000 in August. Last Saturday he witnessed Stanford's crushing victory over Santa Clara College.

Following a conference at his San Juan Hill home last night with William H. Crocker, Republican national committee chairman of California, the President-elect planned to receive a score of Bay Region Republicans at his home before the game today. Mr. Hoover will take this opportunity to formally express his appreciation to the party organization in his home state for its fine work in behalf of his presidential candidacy.

The Special Southern Pacific train carrying the Hoover party to San Pedro Harbor, will leave here Sunday night at 7:30. It will move on a non-stop schedule to Glendale, Cal., just west of Los Angeles, where a brief stop will be made early Monday to enable newspaper correspondents aboard to file their reports. The train will then continue to San Pedro direct without a stop in Los Angeles. The battleship Maryland is expected to weigh anchor about 11 A. M. Monday.

John Griffin Mott, Los Angeles attorney and close friend of the President-elect will make the South American tour as the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Hoover. Mott is a specialist in Latin American affairs, is expected to be an intimate counselor of Mr. Hoover throughout the trip. He will share this function with Henry F. Fletcher, former ambassador to Chile, and Mexico, who was assigned to the tour by President Coolidge at Mr. Hoover's request.

The Furbers were released after arraignment bonds of \$5,000 each had been made. Mason Street, Jr., Miss Stevens's fiancé, who had established an alibi was not questioned further, it was learned.

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**Missouri Floods Growing Serious**

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 17.—(INS)—With the Blue River here out of its banks in the worst local flood in 10 years and many persons driven from their homes, flood conditions in Kansas City's environs and in Southwest Missouri and Southern Kansas continued serious today. More than a 27 hour rain, ranging from a total of 10 inches in some parts of Kansas to 5 inches in Kansas City, had fallen in the past 48 hours in small creeks, rivers and overflow lowlands from Kansas City to the Oklahoma State line and far west as Eldorado, Kan. Railroad service on five lines was paralyzed this morning. Highways were overflowed in all directions in Southwest Missouri and Southeastern Kansas. Dozens of motorists were stranded in small villages unable to proceed.

**Stocks Continue To Skyrocket On Hoover Impetus**

\$1,250,000,000 Increase In Security Values Recorded Since Poll

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(INS)—The skyrocket stock market which has followed the election of Herbert Hoover as president of the United States continues on its record-smashing way.

Before the opening of the market today it was estimated that the value of securities has been increased by approximately \$1,250,000,000 by the wave of furious buying which has deluged both the New York Stock Exchange and the Curb Market since the election.

Records for heavy trading have been established on both the exchange and the curb, the sales of the former reaching the all-time height of 6,411,250 yesterday and on the curb 2,351,800.

Broker's commissions are roughly estimated at \$200,000,000 during the first five trading days this week. These figures, of course, cannot be computed accurately owing to the wide variations of prices charged for execution of buying and selling orders.

This is a "Tom, Dick and Harry market" with every one in it. The millionaire and his chauffeur and the grand dame and her maid theoretically rub shoulders in the rush for profits and easy money.

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**First Officer Places Blame On Heavy Seas**

Witness Squirms Uncomfortably When Interrogated About Cause Of Foundering

Replies Indicate He Knew Little

Admits Cargo Shifting Caused List To Ship; Tells About Leaks

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(INS)—Squirring uncomfortably under a severe grilling, Frank W. Johnson, first officer of the ill-fated Vestris which sank off the Virginia Capes with a loss of 115 lives, testified today that in his opinion "exceptionally bad weather" caused the sinking of the Vestris.

"What in your opinion, you being the highest ranking officer who survived, caused the sinking of the ship," U. S. Attorney Charles H. Tuttle demanded in a loud voice.

"Exceptionally bad weather," the officer, a broad, worried looking man of about 35, replied. Previously Johnson had testified that the ship listed badly at 7:30 Sunday and that soon the cargo slipped through the bulkhead of the ship, a distance of 35 feet. Examination on his part revealed, he said, that there probably had been some packing some had broken through.

He admitted that the shifting of the cargo caused the list of the ship. He admitted, too, that water poured through a "half door" back of the coal ports.

A two inch stream of water came through this "half door" Sunday night, he testified.

Q. (By Tuttle) what did you do as officer in command?

A.—I tried to have the engine on the door tightened.

Q.—What was the capacity of your pumps?

A.—You are the first officer.

A.—I don't know.

Q.—Have you any explanation of why the ship sank?

A. No.

Q. Any theory?

Q. Did you have anything to do with the sending out of the SOS?

A. No.

**Washington, Nov. 17.**

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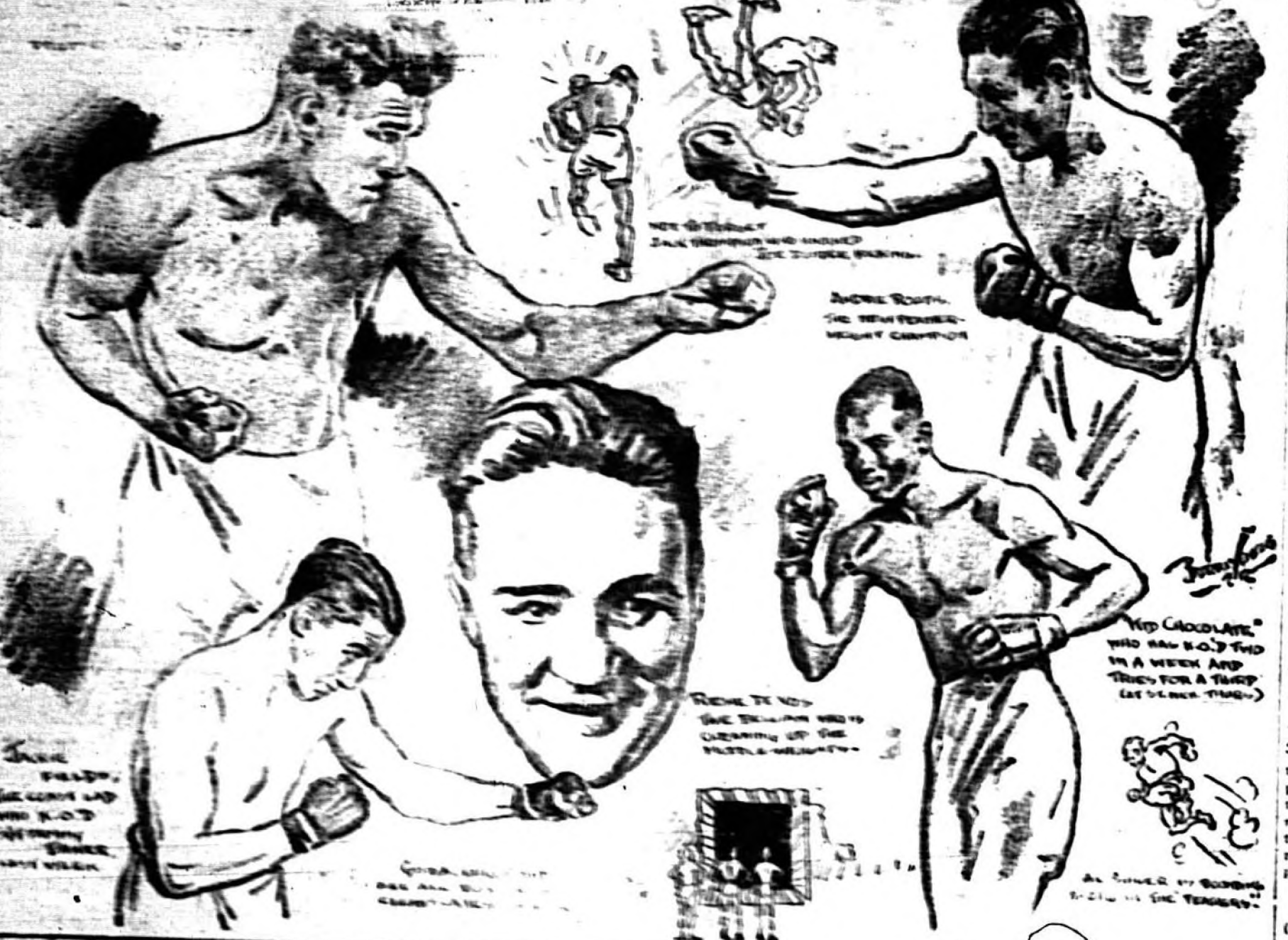

### Quiet Lovers Trial For Death Woman's Husband

LUDOWICI, Ga., Nov. 14.—(INS)—Two alleged clandestine lovers, Mrs. Sue Delk, 28, and D. Stafford, Jr., 25, today faced trial for the fatal poisoning of the latter's husband, Stoney K. Delk, 35, at his home in Jacksonville, Fla., last week.

Testimony by neighbors that couple had been meeting secretly was presented at the grand jury session. Delk's death Sept. 14, autopsy performed by state chemist after his body was exhumed showed traces of poison, according to records here.

That her son of 17, appeared in court on a charge of passing, could neither read nor write, although he had had compulsory education at an elementary school, was testified to by a teacher in Jacksonville, Fla., recently.

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## Brake Lining May Be Tested By Blow Torch, Says Expert

As a result of the development of a simple method of testing the safety of brake lining before it is used on cars there should be fewer automobile accidents from inefficient brakes, according to a statement made by the chief engineer of the Russell Manufacturing Company of this city. If car owners and repair men would apply a blow torch to the brake lining they are considering for their car it would not be necessary to risk having inferior, unseasoned linings on the brakes. The flame of the blow torch, he explains, will burn the cotton and gummy treatment of adulterated lining as well as greatly reduce its bulk. Under this severe but simple test good lining will not burn, nor will its bulk and efficiency be changed.
