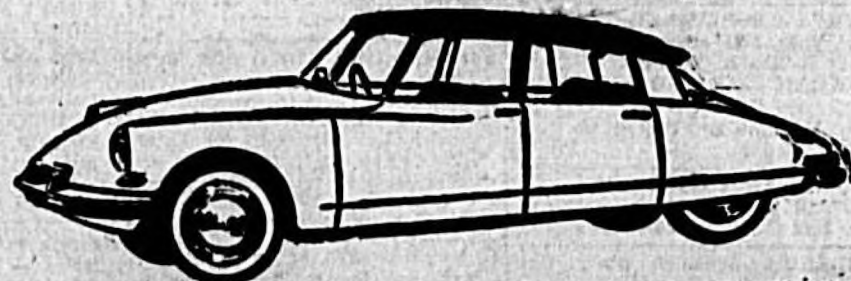

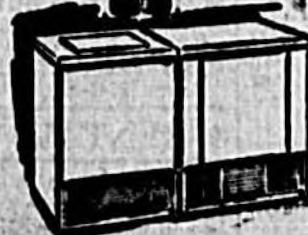

Florida Loan Co. Constructing New, Modern Building

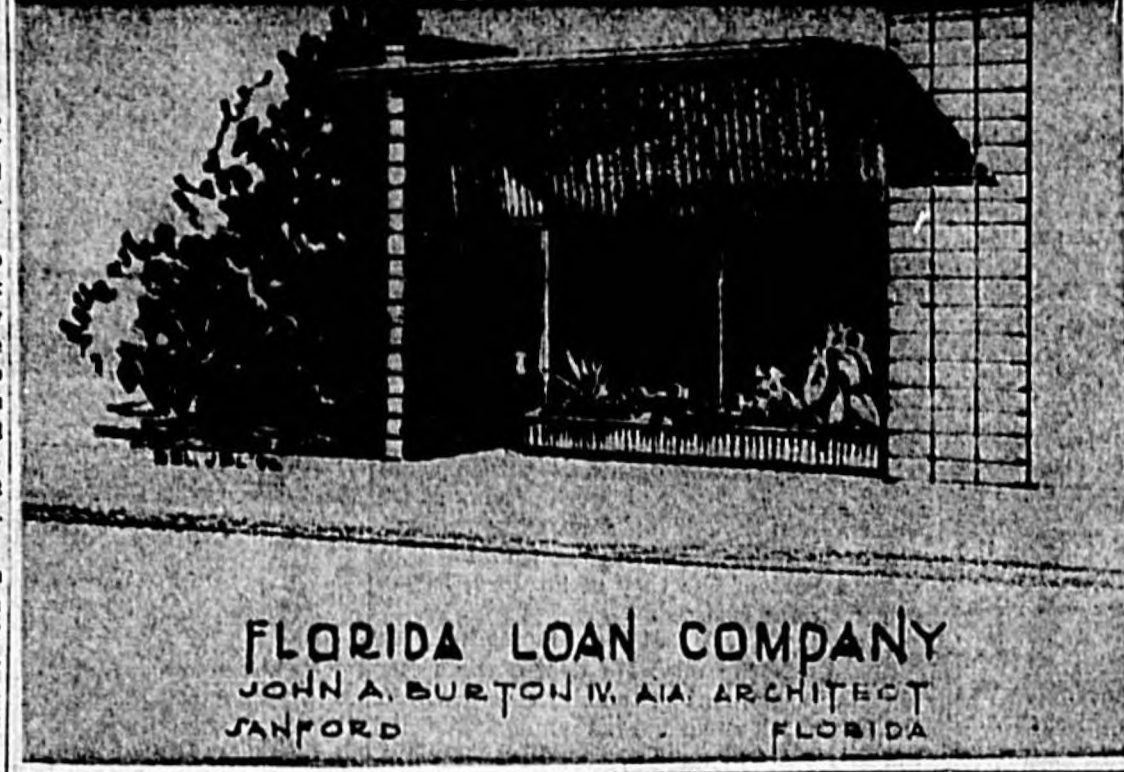
A modern one story building to house the Florida Loan Co. offices is being constructed on Sanford Ave. between First and Second Sts.
