

### Puerto Rico Is Beginning To Seek Its Independence

 WASHINGTON—An increasing trend in favor of independence is taking place in Puerto Rico as a result of the end of World War II and the clamor for liberation voiced by dependent people around the globe.

Puerto Rico was a colony of Spain for some 400 years and has been an island possession of the United States since 1898. It has 2,000,000 people.

The increasing independence sentiment has been reported by colonial experts here as the result of the recent formation of a political party in the Caribbean island to seek independence on the basis of:

1. Friendly negotiations with the United States.
  2. Security for the Puerto Rican people under a liberal social and economic domestic policy when independence is achieved.
- Showdown in 1948
- This is the first time a political party with a platform based on independence has been organized in the island. Its strength will be tested in the 1948 elections.
- Independence parties had been formed previously. They failed when they preached hostility or terrorism against the United States, or when they forgot their pledges after coming into power.
- The new independence party of Puerto Rico has been organized to offer evidence to the U. S. Congress and the federal administration that the island wants its freedom.
- Party leaders say President Truman called upon Congress to allow Puerto Ricans to choose its political future but that they do not expect Congress to authorize a plebiscite.
- These leaders do not blame Congress. They feel the problem to be considered was of such magnitude that they present a speedy and conscientious solution. Since they believe that a plebiscite authorized by Congress would be hard to obtain, independentists want to have their own referendum.
- The Popular party, in control in Puerto Rico, does not advocate any particular form of government. It is committed not to seek any. The Republican and Socialist minority parties advocate statehood. The Liberal party, also a minority, wants a plebiscite.
- One independentist leader visiting here recently said, "If the people vote us into power, it will mean a majority of the voters are in favor of independence."
- Could Embarrass Congress
- With this support from the voters, the party could ask Congress to grant Puerto Ricans its independence on the ground that the people

want it. They give considerable importance to the fact that the party, if voted into power, would have a resident commissioner speaking for independence in the U. S. House of Representatives.

An interesting development in the formation of the new party is that it found itself with a three-vote minority in the Legislative Assembly without ever going to the polls. This three-vote minority is stronger than those of the other minority parties.

This is what happened:

The Popular party controlled 54 of the 68 seats in both Senate and House. It elected several assemblymen strongly in favor of independence, but the executive body of the party decided that none of its members could belong to any organization supporting independence and to the party at the same time.

The three legislators belonged to the Congress of Puerto Rican Independence, a non-partisan organization active in favor of liberation. When the alternatives were put up to them, they resigned from the party, joined the new independence party but did not resign their seats in the legislature.

Washington officials who deal with Puerto Rican affairs feel that the United States may be embarrassed if the independence movement takes control of the island government.

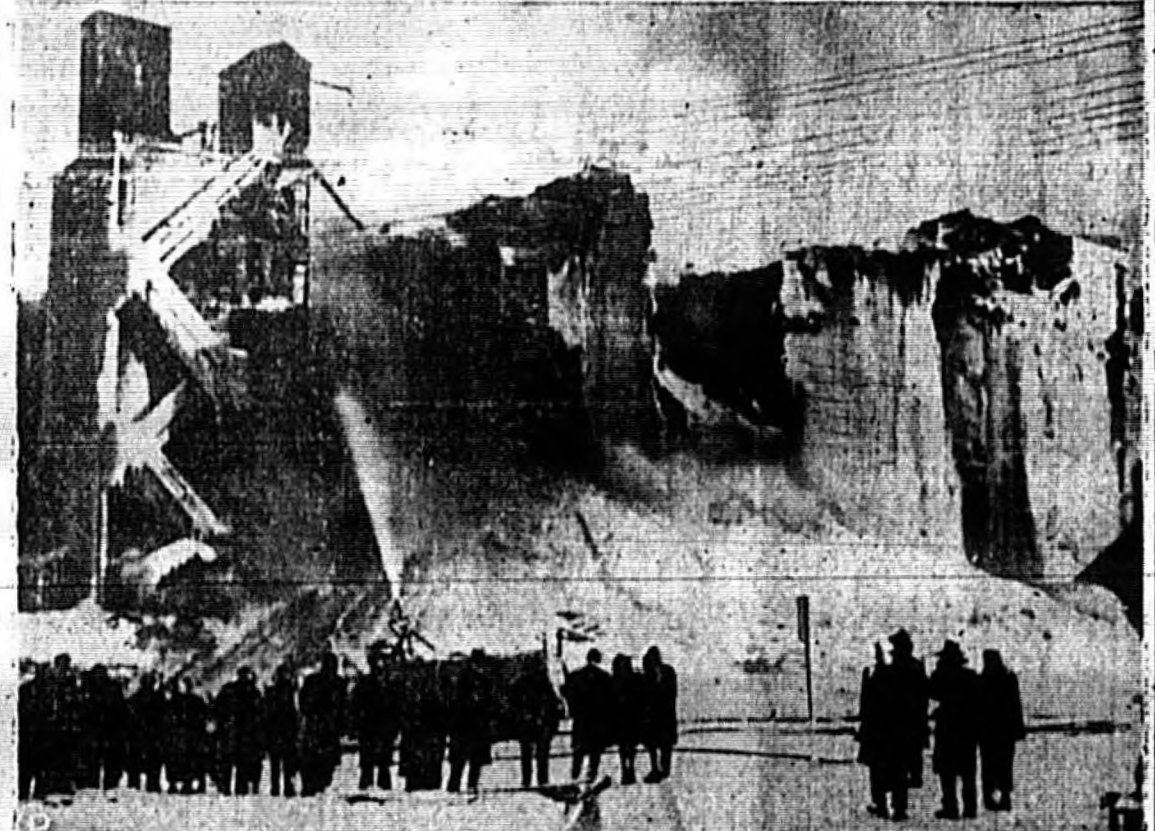
### HOW PARTIES LINE UP AS 80th CONGRESS CONVENES

Luis Munoz Marin, Senate president and leader of the Popular party, who has advised the people that the new party will create problems to the United States in its international relations.

He has told the people that the island's political future is the exclusive problem of the United States and Puerto Rico and that it will be up to him and his party to solve the problem when the time comes.

Puerto Rico got its first native governor in 460 years of Spanish and American colonial rule last August. This step, the people were told, was in line with both the Popular party's and the federal administration's policies toward self-government.

Independentists, however, have conceded no importance to the appointment. They say it does not solve any of the fundamental political, social or economic problems of the island.

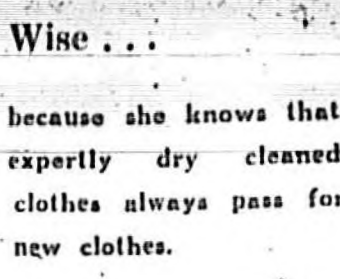

## China Report Issued Today By Marshall

### General Lashes Out At Reactionaries; Sees Vital Need For Liberal Leadership

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Gen. George Marshall released no words in a statement he issued today summing up the long months he spent trying to arrange a peace agreement between Chinese Nationalists and Communists.

The General bluntly denounced what he called the dominant reactionary group in China's government and the provocative policies of Chinese Communists. He pinned his hopes for a possible settlement on two things, China's new constitution and the chance that liberal leadership might come to power and end China's civil strife.

Lashing out at the die-hard in Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's government, Marshall said: "The reactionaries in the government have evidently counted on substantial American support, regardless of their actions. The Communists by their unwillingness to compromise in the national interest, are evidently counting on an economic collapse to bring about the fall of the government, accelerated by extensive guerrilla action against long lines of rail communications, regardless of the cost in suffering to the Chinese people."

The American General then took a rap at what he called the very harmful and immensely provocative phase of the Chinese Communist Party's propaganda. He said he wanted to tell the American people that in the deliberate misrepresentation and abuse of the action, policies, and purposes of the United States government, the Communist propaganda has been without regard for the truth.

He said the evidence is plain that the Communists are trying to spread the Chinese people and the world, and to arouse a bitter hatred of Americans. The Nationalist government propaganda, he added, also have made many misrepresentations but these are not based on the same vicious nature of the Communist propaganda.

Gen. Marshall said that as he sees it, one thing can save the situation in China and that is for the liberals in both the government and in the minority referred to them as a splendid group of men, but men who, as yet, don't have the political power to exercise a controlling influence. Then in a temperate note of optimism, the American General said that he now has the firm hope that a democratic China has been laid down by the newly adopted constitution, practical measures will be taken.

## Football Directly Responsible For 21 Deaths In 1946

Football has been held directly responsible for 21 fatalities during 1946.

In a survey presented to the American Football Coaches Association, Doctor Floyd Eastwood of Purdue University said that in the deaths that occurred in college ranks, Eastwood recommended that a committee be appointed to study the designs of helmets as a possible means of further safeguarding players.

The coaches, meanwhile, recommended that wearing apparel of players be so designed as to be as light as possible. It was pointed out that many injuries had resulted from hard elbow pads, forearm and knee braces.

## C. S. Woolworth, Dime Store Founder Dies

SCRANTON, Jan. 7. (AP)—The man who helped found the American dime store, C. S. Woolworth, died today. He was 83 years old, and had been ill for several weeks.

Woolworth opened his first store in Scranton 54 years ago. Later he formed the F. W. Woolworth Company with his brother Frank. It was Frank who was credited with thinking up the idea of a five and dime store. But Charles was credited with making the firm a success. He began his career ascending from the lowest rank at Watertown, N. Y., for \$4 a week.

The brothers formed the partnership in 1880 and later made Fred M. Kirby of Wilkes-Barre a partner. Charles was chairman of the board since 1919 when Frank died.

Fraser, a MacClenny nurseryman and state senator, presented his certificate of election to Gay and said, "I am here to demand and assume the responsibilities of this office." Gay replied, "I am holding office by commission of the Governor and I don't think I can surrender it to you."

Apparently the skirmish was intended to set up a full scale court test. Fraser and his party left immediately for the office of Attorney General Tom Watson to seek permission to bring a court action for the ouster of Gay.

Fraser claims the office through his election in November, but Governor Millard Caldwell has declined to issue a commission to him. Caldwell said Fraser is ineligible because he was a member of the state legislature which revised the comptroller's salary.

Gay, stating that by appointment of the governor and that he will refuse to turn over the keys until he presented a commission for Fraser signed by the governor.

There was much alteration, remodeling and repair of structures during the year and 137 permits were issued for this purpose.

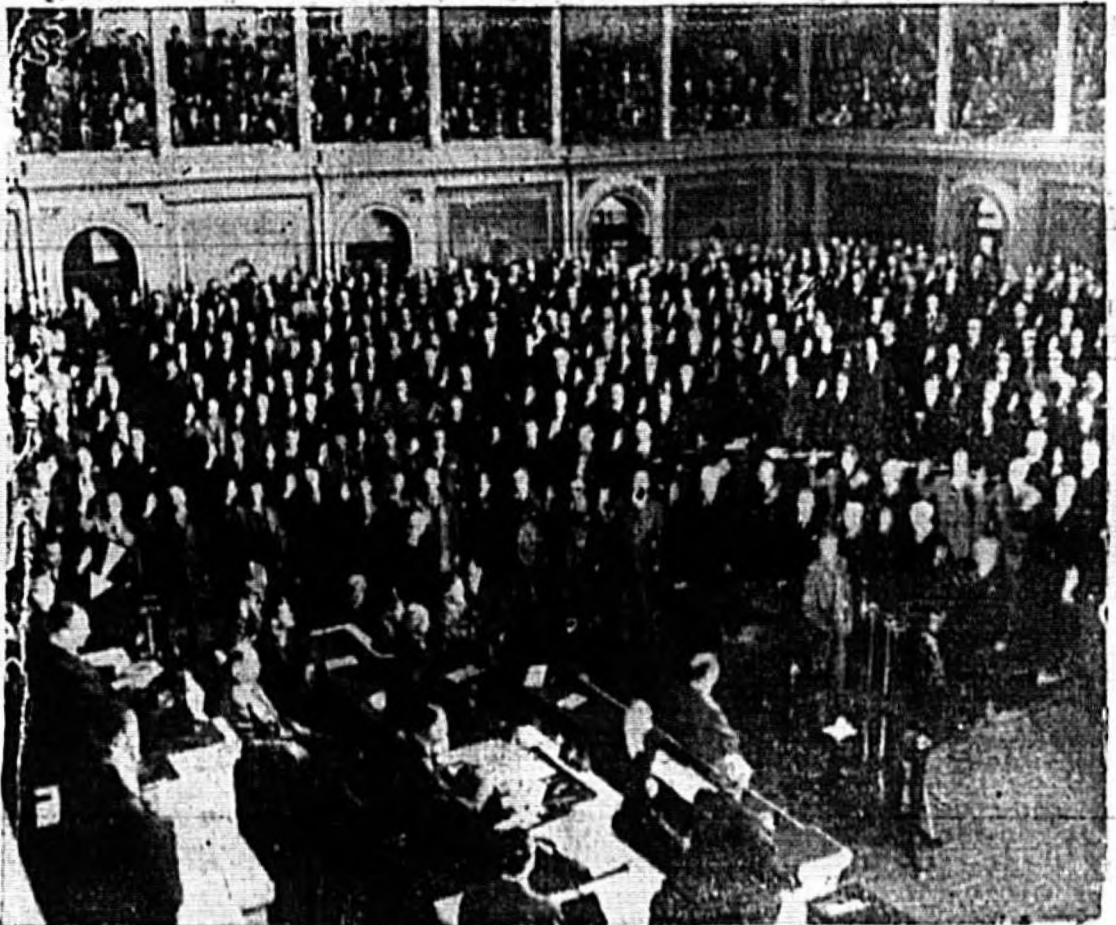
## French Use Paratroops
