The nmunists by the'r unwillingness to compromise in the national interest, are evidently counting on an economic collapse to bring about the fall of the government, accelerated by extensive guerrilla action against long lines of rail communications, regardless of the cost in suffering to the Chinese

The American General took a rap at what he called the very harmful and immensely provocative phase of the Chinese Communist Party's propaganda. He said he wanted to tell the American people that in the deliberate misrepresentation and abuse of the action, policies, and purposes of the United States. purposes of the United States rovernment, the Communist propa-

He said the evidence is plain out the communists are trying to Disad the Chinese people and the world, and to srouse a bitter hatred of Americans. 
