WRECKAGE OF DEATH PLANE FOUND IN SNOW



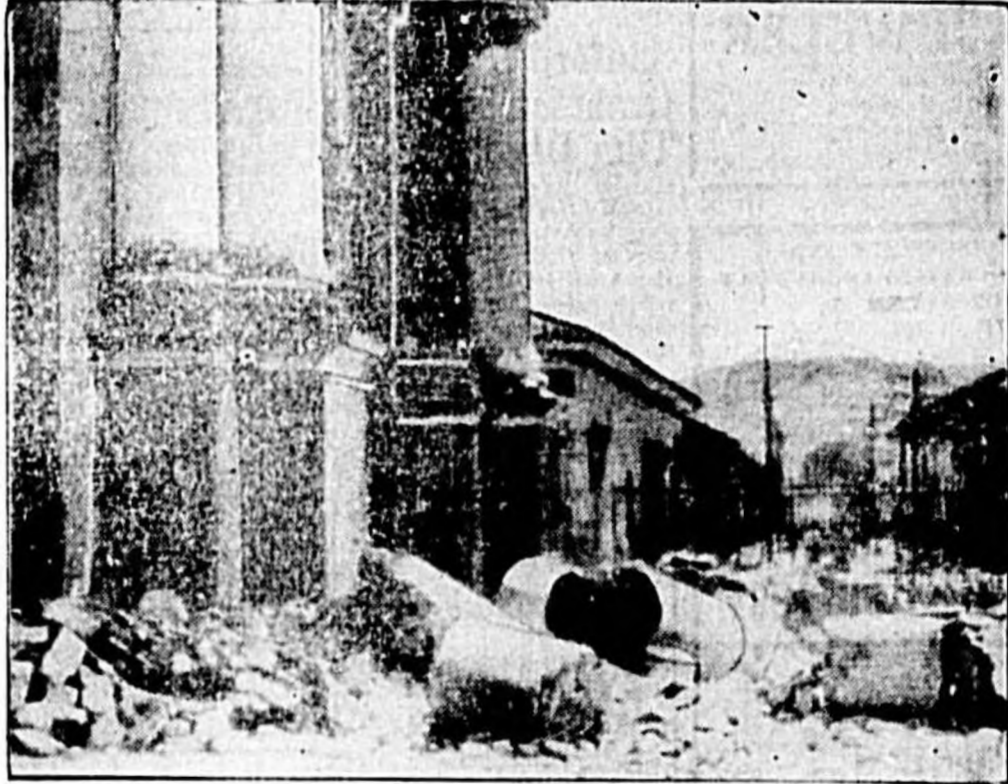

The County Commission

While extending to the new Board of County Commissioners, which actively takes charge of County affairs tomorrow morning, a full expression of our confidence in their ability to perform the duties they are assuming in an eminently satisfactory manner, and pledging them our utmost co-operation in all matters pertaining to the progress and development of Seminole County, The Herald would say a word in commendation of the retiring Board.

The job of a county commissioner is generally a thankless one. On his shoulders and those of his fellow commissioners the public is apt to throw full responsibility for the orderly and successful operation of all county departments. And yet until very recently he has received no pay for his work, and even now is compensated on a basis scarcely comparable to that of a day laborer.

He is expected to manage the intricate and far-reaching affairs of an organization more complicated than any industry in the county. He is supposed to be intimately aware of the most minute details in dozens of different departments. He is required to handle financial problems with the economic foresight and astuteness of the most successful banker. And if the radio of one of his constituents does not work properly, or the hens have failed to lay, he is expected to do something about it, and do it quick.

Particularly would we like to call attention to the long and faithful public service of John Meisch, retiring chairman of the Board of County Commissioners. Mr. Meisch first became a member of the board in 1923, and was immediately elected its chairman. He has been re-elected to the board no less than 6 times, and has served continuously as its chairman for 14 years. Last year he declined to seek re-election again.

During that 14 year period in which Mr. Meisch has stood at the helm of Seminole County's ship of state, Florida passed through the biggest boom in the history of the State, probably in the history of any State. That was a time when almost every public official, and almost every one else for that matter, lost his head, and did things which he would not have thought of doing under ordinary circumstances. But Mr. Meisch managed somehow to keep his feet on the ground, and avoid involving the County in excessive financial burdens.

Also during his term of office, the State was plunged into the worst depression any people ever endured, and the whole nation and all the rest of the world were soon in a similar predicament. Throughout this trying period Mr. Meisch was besieged by countless pleas for aid, and endless plans for increasing county costs, while almost every taxpayer begged for tax reduction. It was a difficult position in which to be placed, but one in which Mr. Meisch again managed somehow to keep expenses at a minimum, while at the same time performing necessary functions and maintaining the County's credit.

In the later years of his chairmanship, Mr. Meisch has been ably assisted on the Board by Sammy Long of Chuluota, C. B. Searcy of Longwood, W. B. Williams of Oviedo, and Charles Dunn of Sanford. Mr. Williams is the only member of the old board to hold over on the new. Tomorrow D. L. Thrasher and F. A. Dyson of Sanford, together with W. G. Kilbee of Geneva, and W. B. Ballant of Altamonte Springs, join Mr. Williams in forming the new County Commission. To them all we extend our best wishes for a long and successful administration.

The Human Element

Reckless speed, carelessness, and intoxication have been branded as the major factors in the cause of 1936's automobile traffic accidents, according to the Executive Committee of the National Safety Council which made the indictment at its late December meeting in New York.

Both pedestrians and motorists were named as guilty of the carelessness and intoxication during 1936 "that threaten to set for the year a new all-time high of persons killed and injured in traffic accidents that will eclipse even the 1935 record of 37,000 dead and 1,285,000 injured."

With the second year of the Five-Year Campaign it is sponsoring to reduce motor vehicle accident deaths 35 percent by the end of 1940 now under way, the Council expressed chief concern about the "human element" in the accident problem.

"While we recognize the urgent need for improvement of our highway systems and our traffic law enforcement programs, we know that greater carelessness on the part of drivers and pedestrians would promptly and drastically reduce the traffic toll."

The Executive Committee further said, "Even though there has been a marked jump in automobile mileage and a resultant increase in accident exposure, we recognize no excuse for circumstances that produce an ever-increasing toll of lives."

Nearly complete reports show that auto accident deaths reached a slightly higher level for 1936 than in 1935. However, council officers said they were encouraged by the increased emphasis placed on intelligent safety work during 1936. The consensus of opinion was that when the saturation point in automobile mileage is reached, death rates could be expected to drop fast.

Germany Launches At Weak Throat Seen In Spain

Third Spanish Ship Held By Nazis In Retaliation

BERLIN, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Nazi Germany backed its latest demand for Spanish marine "retaliation" today with the third show of warship force and laughed at the "childish demands" of Spanish nationalists.

Twenty-four hours after it had been a matter of public knowledge the Government announced seizure of a Spanish merchantman, Maria Joazeiro, off the northern Spanish coast at noon Sunday by the German cruiser Konigsberg.
